

Father Crotty: God's Own Gentleman

Redemptorist Missionary, Superior, Parochial Administrator and Hospital Chaplain, Father Vincent Paul Crotty, remembered by many as a gentleman and as a "gentle" man, died on December 16, 2011 surrounded by his confreres in St. John Neumann Residence at Stella Maris in Timonium, Maryland.

Fr. Crotty was born in Sayre, Pennsylvania on November 29, 1923 and professed his first vows on August 2, 1944. He was ordained on June 19, 1949. For the first thirteen years of his priesthood he served on the foreign missions in Brazil in Ponta Pora, Campo Grande, Ponta Grossa, and Curitiba. In 1964 he returned to the United States to serve for more than four decades in parish and hospital ministry in Rochester NY, Ephrata, Lancaster, and Tobyhanna PA, Baltimore MD and Bethpage NY.



Prior to his ordination, Father Crotty himself wrote:

"My calling to the priesthood, and more especially to the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, came about in a rather peculiar way.... I had never seen a Redemptorist or even heard of them. One day our pastor, Father Houlihan, came into our classroom and asked us what we would like to be in life. Some wished to be doctors, nurses, lawyers, soldiers, and teachers.... When he asked if any of us ever thought of becoming a priest, I raised my hand.... Later, after consulting with my parents, he recommended that I apply to the Redemptorists where he himself had once studied. I was accepted into their seminary at the age of thirteen, maybe more motivated by their sports facilities than by any religious spirit at first. But that changed as I grew older and more mature."

During his assignments in the United States Father Crotty pastored inner-city parishes, country parishes, and was frequently able to offer some ministry in Spanish because of his background in Portuguese. Most often there were schools attached to the parishes which opened their doors to at-risk children from low-income families. During his years of hospital chaplaincy Father Crotty visited patients on a daily basis to bring them the grace and comfort of the sacraments along with his own healing presence. His namesake, St. Vincent Ferrer said, "Whatever you do, think not of yourself, but of God." Father Crotty certainly personified this epitaph.

The founder of the congregation, St. Alphonsus Liguori, wrote: "God does not wish me to speak of justice and punishments, but of pardon and peace." Of the many thousands of inspirational thoughts that the Redemptorists inherited from this great saint, it was this quote that Father Crotty chose to highlight during his Golden Jubilee of Ordination in 1999. Those who knew him will agree that Father Vin not only chose these words, but also lived them—every day of his life.

Father Vincent served here at St. Martin of Tours from 1988-2007. During those years, the parishioners came to love his kind and gentle ways; he also loved this parish very much and often spoke about it when he was in nursing care at the St. John Neumann Residence. He now joins Fathers John Radley, George Keaveney and Thomas Schmidt as Redemptorists who served at St. Martin's and have now gone home to God. We have good friends in high places to bring our prayers. The Parish of St. Martin's will have a memorial Mass for Father Vincent on January 3, 2012 at 7:30 p.m.

May he rest in the same peace that he brought to so many others. Amen.

He Keeps Showing Up

Of a couple who did not wish a religious ceremony as part of their wedding day. They had decided to get married with a secular ceremony that would not be conducted in a church. My friend was sitting in the back of the room where the ceremony was being held. He was in his clerical clothes. Just as the ritual was about to begin, another priest in a Franciscan habit came and set next to him. The person leading the wedding read from some poems and spoke about love. Perhaps without even realizing it, the wedding officiator used the word God. The Franciscan turned to my friend with a twinkle in his eye and whispered, "God always has a way of showing up." The follower of St. Francis turned out to be Father Mychel Judge, the fire chaplain who was the first official victim of the terror attacks of September 11, 2011. God always has a way of showing up.

We know that a few months later at Ground Gera where men bent on evil took the lives of more than 2,800 innocent victims, the recovery workers found some steel beams that formed a cross. For the men and women who found this cross, it was not just some steel beams that had randomly been found. For them, and for so many other people, it became a symbol of the belief that God was present there, with both those who had died and with those who were seeking to recover the dead. In a place where evil had been perpetuated, God had shown up. He showed up not only in the twisted steel beams, but in all the goodness that was in the hearts of the victims and those who sought to help them and their families. Hate met love and love prevailed. God has a way of showing up.

This past summer I had the wonderful opportunity to go on a pilgrimage to Lourdes, one of the great shrines of the world. It is believed that the Mother of God appeared in 1858 in a little town near the Pyrenees to peasant girl named Bernadette Soubirous. Although there were skeptics and doubters, many came to believe that God, through his mother Mary, had visited this town and spoke to Bernadette. Since those days in 1858, millions upon millions of pilgrims have come to Lourdes to encounter God and his grace.

Justilea Justilea Into the cave where the young girl had gone to look for firewood on a dreary February day, I experienced an overwhelming sense of awe and wonder. I firmly believe that God had shown up there. Even more convincing to me of the overwhelming presence of God as I stood on the very ground where Bernadette had met Mary, was witnessing the amazing care of hundreds upon hundreds of volunteers who were assisting people in wheelchairs and stretchers. The sick and infirm are treated with tender love and care at Lourdes. Wheelchairs are pushed, gurneys rolled, people gently lifted into the baths, and umbrellas held over the infirm to protect them from the rain. What you do to the least of my brothers and sisters you do to me. I saw the living God in the presence of so much love. God has a way of always showing up.

During this Geason of Christmas, we see the presence of God in our world. Toys for Tots, donations to the poor, the Giving Trees in parishes, and so many other good deeds to serve the needy are more prevalent at this time of year than at any other time. The Christmas season has a powerful way of tugging at our hearts. Christmas carols, decorated trees, and Jolly Santas make us - no matter how much struggle we have in our lives - think of others and how we might gift them and make them happy. Look into your heart during this Christmas season and you will feel the pull of God's love. God has a way of always showing up.

Christmas "Christmas", "Merry Christmas", and "Jesus", or try to silence Christmas Carols, and hide Christmas trees and crèches from appearing in the public, the wonder and awe of this time of year cannot be checked. We need only see the crowded churches on Christmas Eve and Day to know that people, whether they are daily mass goers or folks who attend Mass rarely, long to hear the story once again of the Baby born in Bethlehem and laid in a manger. We never grow tired of the Christmas pageant with little boys and girls wearing aluminum foil angel wings and bathrobes to show they are the shepherds in the fields. In a world that sometimes presents a daily dose of bad news, we long to hear the angels sing, Glory to God in the Highest and Peace on Earth to All Those of Good Will." If it has been a year when we faced unemployment, a life-threatening illness, a divorce, or the loss of a family member or dear friend, we need to hear again that "Unto you has been born a Savior. He is to be called Jesus, the Emmanuel, a name which means "God with us." God has a way of showing up.

On Christmas Day, we long for forgiveness and reconciliation in our heart. If there is a family member, neighbor or friend with whom we have not spoken to in years, we will feel the impulse to call, to send a Christmas card or to just wish it wasn't that way. That impulse is called grace. It is a nudge from God that is inviting you to forgive. We will sit with our family and friends and for a moment, before we give in to the exhaustion of too much shopping, too much eating, and too much spending, and having to assemble a toy that calls for en electrical engineer, or break up an argument about whose toy is it, we will feel for a moment a joy and peace that, however flawed and human is my life and those around me, I am blessed to be a member of this family, have my faith, and all the blessings of my life. That moment is a gift from God. Savor and enjoy it. God keeps showing up.

God keeps on showing up. He showed up as a Baby in a little town called Bethlehem. He was born to a young woman named Mary and protected by her husband Joseph. He came to us as a poor person with nowhere to lay his head other than a manger in a stable. Soon he became an exile, like so many people of our world today, who have to move because of war, famine, or lack of work. His family took him and fled into Egypt. We see him at a wedding in Cana, quietly turning water into wine so a newly married couple will not be embarrassed because the wine at their reception is running out. He sees a grieving widow who has lost her only son, and gently touches the funeral bier and raises the man back to life. Crowds gather around him hungry for his words that move their hearts, and he feeds them bread and fish to ease their human hunger. God keeps showing up.

He is at a well with a woman who had been rejected by her village for being a sinner, and he saves a condemned woman about to be stoned to death for an act of adultery. He is criticized relentlessly because of the company he keeps - sinners, prostitutes, tax collectors, and those who have lost faith. The heroes of his stories are lost sheep, prodigal sons and Samaritans. He loves to see sparrows in flight and fields of purple flowers, and to walk on the Sea of Galilee as he calms it for his terrified friends. God keeps showing up.

He washes the feet of his disciples on the night before he dies, and then he has a final meal with his friends. He takes the most ordinary food, bread and wine, the staples of life, and tells the disciples that every time that they eat and drink this food, he will be with them. His command is: "Do this in memory of me." We do at every Mass we celebrate. This is my blood. Wherever a red sanctuary candle burns in a Catholic church, Christ is present in the Tabernacle. He keeps showing up.

We find him kneeling in a garden sweating blood, condemned to death by a Roman Procurator, viciously scourged and crowned with thorns. We find him nailed to a cross, gasping for breath as he forgives those who have crucified him. He dies on that cross. God keeps showing up.

We find on Easter morning walking in a garden, cooking fish on the shores of Galilee for disbelieving apostles, and he is met in the breaking of the bread, in the upper room where the apostles are gathered. He keeps showing up. The one who was thought to be dead and buried is alive. He is Risen.

This profound and awesome presence of the God who keeps showing up has its most dramatic moment when he took flesh in the womb of his mother and was born on the first Christmas. We call him Jesus Christ, Our Lord and Savior. We are told that he is Emmanuel, a name which means "God with us." So as you celebrate this Christmas Season and as you enter into the new year of 2012, rejoice and be glad! Be filled with hope because he keeps showing up!

His you and your family enter into the Year of Our Lord Jesus Christ, He will keep showing up in your life. Watch and Listen and you will see and hear him everyday, in the difficult, the joyful, and the ordinary moments that make up your life.
