Letter from the pastor

I am delighted to inform you that our Provincial Father Kevin Moley CSSR has assigned Father Ciya Thomas CSSR to our community at St. Martin's and that he will become part of our Redemptorist community and parish pastoral team. Father Ciya arrived on Thursday, March 8th. Father is a member of the Liguori Province of the Redemptorists which is located in the Alwaye area of India. He is from the same province as Father Poly who was with us last summer and who did such fine pastoral work in our parish. When I was provincial I came to know several men from this province and found them to be outstanding priests and Redemptorists. I am very confident that Father Ciya will be a great blessing to our parish and to the Redemptorist community.

Through the years the Redemptorist leadership has considered St. Martin's to be a pastoral ministry that certainly has more than enough ministry for four Redemptorists. At times we have had three men here and at other times four, depending on the personnel available in our province. Fathers Henry, Jim and myself felt we were able to meet the pastoral need of the parish, and very grateful for the great support and ministry of so many especially Deacons Jim Biggin, Gene Capobianco and Tom Hennessy. Yet we are delighted that Father Provincial has decided to send us another man. I am sure his gifts and talents will be a blessing to our parish. A downside to all this is that we will no longer need to have Father Ed Faliskie come here regularly on weekends. I know he was very much appreciated by all who heard him celebrate mass and preach. We are most grateful for his generous assistance and hope to welcome him back from time to time.

The Redemptorist Congregation is a worldwide order with more then 5,500 men in 77 countries. In some of our units, the Congregation is receiving many vocations such as provinces in India and Africa which have many young members. At our last General Chapter, the term "solidarity" became an important reality to us Redemptorists. As we understood the term, provinces that were able, might consider sending confreres to unites that needed assistance. At the same time, provinces that had financial resources might help support those that were in economic need. The Baltimore Province which serves St. Martin's has had a long standing reputation for assisting other provinces in financial need. Although our economics have their challenges today in a very changed world economy, we still try to help support provinces in need since we so believe in the work that they are doing. So, it is hoped that the Redemptorists will offer some economic support to the wonderful work being done in Alwaye India.

I have found that most of the parishioners have been very happy with the Redemptorists in the 25 years that we have been here. I think there are advantages and disadvantages to being served by a religious community in a parish. I think the advantages are that a religious order brings a sense of community life and traditions that are part of their order. In our case, as you know we have a great love for Our Lady of Perpetual Help, St. Alphonsus, St. Gerard and our other saints. Since we are committed to community life, we try to staff our communities with at least three or four priests. On the other hand, I know that some find it very hard when our order moves a man that they have grown close to. Since we are a missionary order, that is part of our life, and I know it is not always easy for the parishioners. Also, at times we must attend certain Redemptorist meetings which means that we may be absent from the parish for a few days. In the case of Father Ciya, I think this is certainly a plus to our religious order and yourselves since there is a shortage of priests in the United States, and yet our parish will have four. God is good.

In a couple of weeks when Father Ciya has gotten the lay of the land, I hope to have a mass of welcome for him with a reception to follow. Having arrived here not too long ago myself, I know first hand what a warm and welcoming community we are and I am sure Father Ciya will be happy in this parish community.

St. Martin of Tours Baptism Program

Our baptism program was revised 9 years ago, and has evolved with changes to better accommodate our parishioners. Baptisms are scheduled for Sunday afternoons at 3:00 p.m. The process begins when parents contact Deacon Gene Capobianco at (516) 933-4690. At that time, he schedules the family for Gathering, Baptism and Reflection dates. The following is a description of the program, detailing each step:



The Home Visit: The first step in our process is a visit to the home of the family whose baby is to be baptized. The program volunteers, called Companions, make this visit to greet the family and welcome them. The Companions fill out the required paperwork for church records and pray with the family.

The Gathering: The Gathering is once a month for those babies being baptized the following month. It is a prayer service with scripture reading, a review of the baptism process and a DVD called "Your Baby's Baptism." The Gathering takes place on a Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. in the Parish Hall.

The Baptism: The third part of the program occurs on a Sunday afternoon usually on the first or third Sunday (except when there is a holiday) at 3:00 p.m. where the sacrament of Baptism takes place.

The Reflection: The Reflection is scheduled every two months at the 1:00 p.m. mass and is for all of the babies that were baptized in the previous two months. There is also a special blessing for the mother and father. At the conclusion of the mass, the families are invited to the Parish Hall for a reception and an evaluation of their experience with the whole process. Baptism certificates are distributed at the end of the Reflection.

COMPANIONS

At the heart of this very rewarding ministry are the volunteers called *Companions*. They are the people who reach out to families with newborn babies and are representatives of the Parish of St. Martin of Tours. Since our parish has many young families with young children, we need more Companions to reach out to them. If you think you may be interested in this ministry, please call Deacon Gene Capobianco at (516) 933-4690.

The Alleluia and the Lenten Seasons

In the language of worship, there are words and phrases that are not translated, words that seem to need no translation. Amen is such a word, a Hebrew word that indicates assent, "so be it." and the word by which a congregation expresses its participation in a prayer said by the officiate. Kyrie eleison, Greek for "Lord, have mercy," is a phrase that continued in use long after Latin became the official language of liturgy of the West. Alleluia is a word that is heard throughout the Christian world, whether the language of the local liturgy is Latin or Greek, Slavonic or Armenian, French or English. It is a word that has occasionally been translated but, more often than not, has been left un-translated. It is the Greek and Latin form of the Hebrew word Hallelujah, a word which means "praise the Lord." In the West, alleluia came to have a particular association with the celebration of the most important feast of the Church year, Easter, and this led to some unique, beautiful and interesting customs.

The association of alleluia with Easter led to the custom of intentionally omitting it from the liturgy during the season of Lent, a kind of verbal fast which has the effect, not of depressing the mood of the liturgy, but of creating a sense of anticipation and even greater joy when the familiar word of praise returns. Indeed, when the alleluia does return, it is with an incredible flourish.

Before the proclamation of the Gospel at the Great Vigil of Easter, alleluia is sung to an exceptionally elaborate tone. It is a moment of unrestrained fervor as a singer intones the elaborate alleluia, and the congregation sings it back. The cantor raises the pitch and sings the alleluia a second time, and again the congregation echoes it back. Once more, the cantor raises the pitch, and the congregation responds. And then the good news is proclaimed that Christ is risen from the head. The dramatic effect of the return of the alleluia is heightened considerably by the fact that no alleluias have been heard since Lent began.

RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE ASSISTED SUICIDE: DEATH BY CHOICE?

Assisted suicide means deliberately and intentionally providing an individual with the means to commit suicide. It means that doctors would provide lethal overdoses of drugs to patients so they can end their lives. Across the country assisted suicide is being promoted at a "choice" that should be available only for adults, only in "hard cases," and only under supposedly careful guidelines. This promotion, however, is just the first step of a strategy developed by assisted suicide advocates to achieve their goal of death on demand. Assisted suicide often receives little attention and many people who deeply respect human life are unaware of the threat of assisted suicide. Assisted Suicide as Cost Containment: Concerns about health care for the elderly are currently reaching a boiling point. If assisted suicide is added to the cauldron, the final result can be doubly lethal.
