Letter from the pastor

I love history, with a particular bent toward American history. Last summer, I stood on Little Round Top in Gettysburg, PA, the site of the most famous battle ever fought on American soil. I was with my great nephew Thomas, also a lover of the American past. Our guide described a pivotal moment of the battle that was fought ferociously by both Union and Confederate soldiers. Whoever could hold this hill would win the battle, and whoever would win this battle would most likely win the entire war. For a moment he invited us to think how differently our entire lives and world would be if this battle had had a different outcome.

I hold the American military, many of them teenage boys, who landed on D-Day, as well as *all* the soldiers who fight to protect our nation, in the highest regard. Again, this was an incredibly crucial moment in the history of the world. If this invasion had failed, then the horrors of Nazism might have survived and gone on to further inflict terrible agony on the world. Historians like to debate as to which are the key moments of history - those times and events that have been major turning points in human history.

I believe that the Feast of the Annunciation, the day that Angel Gabriel told Mary of Nazareth that God was inviting her to be the Mother of God, to give birth to the long-awaited Messiah, is the most important day in the history of the world. I am not sure if theologians and religious experts would agree with me; they might argue for Good Friday, Easter, or Christmas, or maybe Pentecost. The feast is usually on March 25th, exactly nine months before Christmas. This year, because the 25th falls on a Sunday of Lent, it has been moved to the 26th of March.

A young girl, perhaps no more then fifteen or sixteen years old, is frightened by this heavenly intervention from Gabriel. We can only imagine the confusion in her heart when she is asked to be the Mother of God. What a question to be asked of her! Although Mary is engaged to Joseph, there have been no sexual relations and she wonders how she can be pregnant. She asks Gabriel "how can this be?" since she is a virgin. The Archangel tells her that the Holy Spirit will overshadow her and that God will take root in her womb.

Ponder that for a moment: God is entering the womb of Mary. Cells become form and take shape that will eventually be the flesh and blood of the Son of God and the Child of Mary. Heaven and earth come together in this young girl! Our salvation and redemption, long promised and anticipated, is beginning in a most dramatic way. As we say every Sunday in the Creed, the Word becomes flesh and dwells among us.

It is important to note that Mary has a choice: God never forces; he invites. Mary can say yes or no to this amazing vocation. A theologian once said that after Gabriel has asked Mary, every angel surrounded her and whispered a prayer, "Please, say yes, please say yes!" Humanity chose to reject God when Adam and Eve chose to disobey God in the Garden of Eden. Now, at this moment of the Annunciation, the entire history of salvation and redemption depends on the choice of a young girl from Nazareth. Mary, in spite of the most incredible confusion and anxiety that must have been in her heart, simply says, "Yes, let it be done according to his plan."

The prayer that we learned as children from our mothers, "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee, and blessed art thou among woman and blessed is the fruit of thy womb" are the words that the Archangel Gabriel spoke to Mary at the Annunciation. Every time we say this prayer, we are remembering this great moment in the history of salvation.

'Hail, space for the uncontained God'

We know the scene: the room, variously furnished, almost always a lectern, a book; always the tall lily. Arrived on solemn grandeur of great wings, the angelic ambassador, standing or hovering, whom she acknowledges, a guest. But we are told of meek obedience. No one mentions courage. The engendering Spirit did not enter her without consent. God waited. She was free to accept or to refuse, choice integral to humanness.

Aren't there annunciations
of one sort or another
in most lives? Some unwillingly
undertake great destinies,
enact them in sullen pride, uncomprehending.

More often those moments when roads of light and storm open from darkness in a man or woman, are turned away from in dread, in a wave of weakness, in despair and with relief.

Ordinary lives continue. God does not smite them. But the gates close, the pathway vanishes.

She had been a child who played, ate, slept like any other child – but unlike others, wept only for pity, laughed in joy not triumph. Compassion and intelligence fused in her, indivisible. Called to a destiny more momentous than any in all of Time, she did not quail, only asked a simple, 'How can this be?' and gravely, courteously, took to heart the angel's reply, perceiving instantly the astounding ministry she was offered: to bear in her womb Infinite weight and lightness: to carry in hidden, finite inwardness, nine months of Eternity; to contain in slender vase of being, the sum of power – in narrow flesh, the sum of light. Then bring to birth, push out into air, a Man-child needing, like any other, milk and love – but who was God.

RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE GOD IS THE BIGGER ELVIS

Mother Dolores Hart, O.S.B., a former actress turned cloistered nun, attended the Academy Awards show to support an Oscar nominated documentary, "God is the Bigger Elvis," about her and her abbey.

Mother Dolores was an award-winning actress who performed in two Elvis Presley movies. In 1963 she was about to sign a seven figure contract and was engaged to a Los Angles businessman when she decided to join the Benedictine Abbey of Regina Laudis in Bethlehem, Connecticut where she is now prioress. The 37 minute documentary talks about Mother Dolores' story and about life at the abbey. It was nominated for the best documentary/short category and is set to premiere APRIL 5th on HBO." Mother Dolores said, "I left Hollywood at the urging of a mysterious thing called "vocation." It's a call that comes from another place that we call God because we don't have any other way to say it. It's a call of love. Why do you climb a mountain?"

She allowed cameras to access the abbey to help those who are soul searching. "We wanted to invite the world into another order of life that might give some hope," she said. The documentary interviews Mother Dolores and other nuns like Sister John Mary, an Oxford-educated former advertising executive who came to the abbey after a period of addiction. The director said she made the film to explore what makes someone with Mother Dolores' level of success chose the religious life. Mother Dolores remains a voting member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

St. Martin of Tours Baptism Program

Our baptism program was revised 9 years ago, and has evolved with changes to better accommodate our parishioners. Baptisms are scheduled for Sunday afternoons at 3:00 p.m. The process begins when parents contact Deacon Gene Capobianco at (516) 933-4690. At that time, he schedules the family for Gathering, Baptism and Reflection dates. The following is a description of the program, detailing each step:

The Home Visit: The first step in our process is a visit to the home of the family whose baby is to be baptized. The program volunteers, called Companions, make this visit to greet the family and welcome them. The Companions fill out the required paperwork for church records and pray with the family.

The Gathering: The Gathering is once a month for those babies being baptized the following month. It is a prayer service with scripture reading, a review of the baptism process and a DVD called "Your Baby's Baptism." The Gathering takes place on a Sunday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. in the Parish Hall.

The Baptism: The third part of the program occurs on a Sunday afternoon usually on the first or third Sunday (except when there is a holiday) at 3:00 p.m. where the sacrament of Baptism takes place.

The Reflection: The Reflection is scheduled every two months at the 1:00 p.m. mass and is for all of the babies that were baptized in the previous two months. There is also a special blessing for the mother and father. At the conclusion of the mass, the families are invited to the Parish Hall for a reception and an evaluation of their experience with the whole process. Baptism certificates are distributed at the end of the Reflection.

COMPANIONS

At the heart of this very rewarding ministry are the volunteers called *Companions*. They are the people who reach out to families with newborn babies and are representatives of the Parish of St. Martin of Tours. Since our parish has many young families with young children, we need more Companions to reach out to them.
