Letter from the Pastor

I went to see the movie *Titanic* in 3D at an Imax theatre the other day. I saw the movie several years ago when it first came out, but the 3D (once I got use to the funny glasses) and the Imax really made for an amazing viewing experience. I am not sure why, but I find the accounts about the *Titanic* fascinating. My mother used to talk about it when I was growing up. She was two years old when it sank, but I suppose there was still much talk about the ship when she crossed the Atlantic to come to America in the late 1920's. I read somewhere, that after Jesus and Lincoln, the *Titanic* is one of the most searched words on the internet. With this being the 100th anniversary of her sinking on April 15, 1912, there have been many television shows and newspaper articles about the ship and its tragic fate. Additionally, since the discovery of the *Titanic* on the bottom of the sea in 1985, there is more known about her now than at any other time. What *is* it about this disaster that continues to make her story so captivating?

For me, the story is as current at today's daily newspaper. It is a story certainly of humanity's ambition to make things bigger, greater and stronger. Today we seek faster cars and planes, taller buildings, new medical developments, an understanding of the complexity of DNA and the atom. We may think, as did some people in 1912, that human beings can achieve anything - that we can build a ship not even *God* can sink.

There was great nobility among many of the people on the *Titanic*. We think of the brave men in the engine room who kept working until the very end so the ship would have lights so that more people could be saved. We think of the heroic musicians who stood on the freezing deck playing lighthearted music until their feet were covered with water. We recall the many men who helped board women and children into the lifeboats and stepped back bravely, knowing that their lives would soon end. Arthur Roston, captain of the rescue ship *Carpathia*, that finally found the survivors in their lifeboats, had put his own ship at risk of hitting ice as he raced to the accident scene. I love the story of the Isador and Ida Strauss. He insisted she get into the lifeboat but she refused. She said that they were always together and would face death together. There is the courage of Benjamin Guggenheim and his valet who put on a his finest clothes, ordered a brandy, and faced death with such grace.

However, it was also clear that class status and money *did* matter in spite of the call for women and children first into the lifeboats. More first class people were saved than those in third class. A good number of first class male passengers got into lifeboats while almost no third class males survived. Many of those who died were poor immigrants coming to America with new dreams and hopes. The captain of the *Titanic*, Edward Smith, perhaps prodded by the chairman of the board, Bruce Ismay who was on board and who did get into a lifeboat, basically ignored the warning of ice and did not slow the massive ship down to avoid danger. The final moments of this great ship brought out the best and worst of human beings. As it sank, there were three priests praying with their people while others pushed and shoved one another to get into a lifeboat. What we saw on the decks of the *Titanic* 100 years ago is no different than what we see in our own society today.

I think what most fascinates people about the *Titanic* are the questions, "what would *I* have done in such a situation?" "How would *I* have acted?" "What would my faith have meant to me? Would I be faithful to the values I believe in?" Gratefully, it is most unlikely that any of us will ever face such a challenge as did the passengers on April 15, 1912. Yet, we are all passengers on the "*ship of life*." None of us knows what lies ahead today or tomorrow.

I suppose the deepest truth is that what is *most* important is not how I die, but how I seek to live each day of my life.

On the Feast of St. Joseph, we pray for all workers who provide for their families and themselves. However great or ordinary, the work is done for the glory of God. It is an act of love and praise. May God sanctify all our work. I ask a special blessing on all those who work with such dedication here at St. Martin of Tours. We also think of those who are suffering from lack of work and unemployment. We pray that through the intercession of St. Joseph the Worker, they may find fruitful employment. - **Father Pat**

May 1 - The Feast of St. Joseph the Worker

Apparently in response to the “May Day” celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pius XII instituted the feast of St. Joseph the Worker in 1955. But the relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers has a much longer history.

In a constantly necessary effort to keep Jesus from being removed from ordinary human life, the Church has from the beginning proudly emphasized that Jesus was a carpenter, obviously trained by Joseph in both the satisfactions and the drudgery of that vocation. Humanity is like God not only in thinking and loving, but also in creating. Whether we make a table or a cathedral, we are called to bear fruit with our hands and mind, ultimately for the building up of the Body of Christ.

Comment:

“The Lord God then took the man and settled him in the garden of Eden, to cultivate and care for it” (Genesis 2:15). The Father created all and asked humanity to continue the work of creation. We find our dignity in our work, in raising a family, in participating in the life of the Father’s creation. Joseph the Worker was able to help participate in the deepest mystery of creation. Pius XII emphasized this when he said, “The spirit flows to you and to all men from the heart of the God-man, Savior of the world, but certainly, no worker was ever more completely and profoundly penetrated by it than the foster father of Jesus, who lived with Him in closest intimacy and community of family life and work. Thus, if you wish to be close to Christ, we again today repeat, ‘Go to Joseph.’” (see Genesis 41:44).

Quote:

In *Brothers of Men*, René Voillaume of the Little Brothers of Jesus speaks about ordinary work and holiness. “Now this holiness (of Jesus) became a reality in the most ordinary circumstances of life, those of work, of the family and the social life of a village, and this is an emphatic affirmation of the fact that the most obscure and humdrum human activities are entirely compatible with the perfection of the Son of God....this mystery involves *the conviction that the evangelical holiness proper to a child of God is possible in the ordinary circumstances of someone who is poor and obliged to work for his living.*”

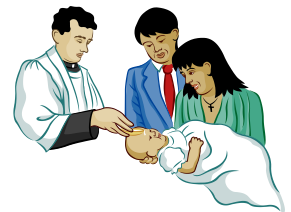
