

Letter from the Pastor

I have the experience, as I am sure you have, of being with someone, perhaps a good friend or your spouse, while they speak to you of something that was important to them. You nodded and appeared to be listening, but it was clear that your mind was a thousand miles away. Soon you got an elbow to the ribs saying, "*Are you listening? Have you heard one word that I said?*" In Scott Peck's classic best seller, *The Road Less Traveled*, he makes a strong point that the experience of someone being *truly* present to another person is rather rare. Very often when we are listening to someone, our minds are already formulating our responses. It is very hard to just be *present* to another person.

This weekend is the Celebration of the Feast of Corpus Christi (Latin for the Body of Christ). The Church invites us to reflect on the great gift that God has given us in the Eucharist. Some of us grew up with frequent benedictions and forty hour devotions to the Blessed Sacrament. There was a great emphasis on the Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. In most churches, the tabernacle was the main focus of the church. We looked for the burning candle in the red sanctuary lamp to show that Christ was present in the Eucharist.

Over the last several decades, there has been a shift in our liturgical approach to a greater focusing on the celebration of the Mass. The altar is emphasized as the place of sacrifice and as the table where we are fed with the body and blood of Jesus Christ. Certainly, this makes sense since the Mass is the celebration of the dying and rising of our Lord. When we celebrate Mass as parish community, we are following the words of Jesus at the last supper: *Do this in memory of me*. The celebration of the Mass is the central act of worship and prayer of our Catholic faith.

Nonetheless, our Catholic faith also calls us to be attentive to the ongoing Real Presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. We say that God is everywhere and he is. He is in nature, in our hearts, in heaven, wherever there is love and kindness, and also with those suffering. Yet, there is a very special and divine presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament that is reserved in the tabernacle. We can pray anywhere and focus on God. Still, prayer in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament is considered especially privileged.

We live in a world of noise and distraction. I must confess that I almost always have music on in my office or when I am driving. When I go for a walk, I take my radio. I have an iPod. I put on the television even when I am not watching it. Although we may say that I just want some peace and quiet, I wonder if we really *do* desire solitude.

I am always touched when I come into our church and see a parishioner or two sitting quietly in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. I say to myself I should do more of that, but I often let the rush of life takes over and miss the opportunity to have some quiet time with God. As we celebrate this feast of Corpus Christi, I invite you to consider making a visit to the Blessed Sacrament and spending some moments in front of the Lord. You can pray the rosary, read the scripture, talk to Him in your own words, or just be there. It is a wonderful gift to sit with the Lord.




Eucharistic Parish Procession Sunday, June 10th at 6:30 P.M.

Speaking for the Church: Our Shepherds (6 of 7)

Our Catholic faith is clear: Christ is present in his Church. What seems to many a mere institution is in fact a holy people. It is a mystical body that has Christ as its head. It is a pilgrim people that journeys to the Father. By baptism, it is us. And by Christ's design, it is hierarchically ordered. This order, like any good order, ensures unity, vitality, and growth. Out of love, the Lord Jesus gave us, his body, overseers to teach, govern, and sanctify. Striving to be faithful imitators of Christ the Good Shepherd, those overseers, the bishops, lay down their lives in service so that God's people may be built up and Christ proclaimed.

This basic teaching of our faith is important to remember amid the current conversation surrounding the HHS mandate. After all, there are many voices in the debate, even in the Catholic fold, and the tendency today is to treat the voice of the bishops as one among many. To do so though is to forget their Christ-given place among us. Bishop Murphy reminds us that the bishops speak for the Church. "There are many opinions among Catholics," he says, "but if you want to know what the Church teaches and what her faith demands, ask the bishops who, alone as the successors of the apostles in union with the pope, are the ones who can be trusted to offer, not an opinion, but the authentic teaching of the Catholic Church."

To assist them in their role as shepherds of the flock, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops formed an Ad Hoc Committee for Religious Liberty in September 2011. The committee was charged with identifying threats made towards religious freedom and addressing the profound impact those threats would have on the faithful.

Archbishop-designate William Lori of Baltimore was named as chair. Under his leadership, its members have worked closely with national organizations, charities, ecumenical and interreligious partners, and scholars to form a united and forceful front in defense of religious freedom for every American. Since January 2012 the committee has clearly articulated the specific ways in which the HHS mandate poses serious threats to America's heritage of religious freedom and has shown how the mandate's regulations impact Catholic institutions.

Recognizing the importance of educating the faithful in this matter, the committee has provided on its website various resources and legislative updates to help Catholics around the country stay informed. Most recently, the committee has issued a guiding document entitled Our First, Most Cherished Liberty: A Statement on Religious Liberty. In that statement, the overall sentiment is made clear in the opening lines: "We are Catholics. We are Americans. We are proud to be both...To be Catholic and American should mean not having to choose one over the other." "As a community of faith, we must commit ourselves to prayer and fasting that wisdom and justice may prevail and religious liberty be restored."

He was a Thirteenth Century Dominican. He wrote a beautiful Eucharistic Hymn that we continue to sing to this day. In Latin, it is called the *Pange Lingua* which means *Sing My Tongue*. We sing it on Holy Thursday when we reverence the Blessed Sacrament at the end of Mass. The last two verses make up the hymn the *Tantum Ergo* that we sing at Benediction. In English, we sing it as the hymn *Down in Adoration Falling*. I invite you to pray it on the Feast of Corpus Christi.

Pange Lingua

Sing, my tongue, the Savior's glory, of His flesh the mystery sing; of the Blood, all price exceeding, shed by our immortal King. Destined, for the world's redemption, from a noble womb to spring. Of a pure and spotless Virgin born for us on earth below. He, as Man, with man conversing, stayed, the seeds of truth to sow; then He closed in solemn order wondrously His life of woe. On the night of that Last Supper, seated with His chosen band. He the Pascal victim eating, first fulfills the Law's command; then as Food to His Apostles gives Himself with His own hand. Word-made-Flesh, the bread of nature by His word to Flesh He turns; wine into His Blood He changes; what though sense no change discerns? Only be the heart in earnest, faith her lesson quickly learns. Down in adoration falling, This great Sacrament we hail, Over ancient forms of worship Newer rites of grace prevail; Faith will tell us Christ is present, When our human senses fail. To the everlasting Father, And the Son who made us free And the Spirit, God proceeding From them Each eternally, Be salvation, honor, blessing, Might and endless majesty. Amen. Alleluia.

ASSISTED SUICIDE: DEATH BY "CHOICE"? Across the country assisted suicide is being promoted as a "CHOICE" that should be available - only for adults, only in "hard cases," and only under supposedly careful guidelines. This promotion, however, is just <u>the first step</u> of a strategy developed by assisted -suicide advocates to achieve their goal of DEATH ON DEMAND. Unfortunately, assisted suicide often receives very little attention, and many people who deeply respect human life are unaware of the threat of assisted suicide.

WHAT IS ASSISTED SUICIDE? Assisted suicide means deliberately and intentionally providing an individual with the means to commit suicide. It means that doctors would provide lethal overdoses of drugs to patients so they can end their lives.

<u>Note:</u> Today a pharmacist in Oregon or Washington can dispense a lethal prescription, accompanied by instructions to take it with a light snack and alcohol to cause death. And health insurance can pay for that prescription.

Concerns about health care costs and general financial uncertainty, along with serious discussions about limiting health care for the elderly, are currently reaching a boiling point. If assisted suicide is added to the cauldron, the final result can be doubly lethal. Making assisted suicide a medical treatment gives it the status of only one among many options for the treatment of certain conditions. In cost-effectiveness assisted suicide differs in a major way from other treatments. It is extremely affordable and can always be covered by health insurance. The force of economic gravity can lead to increased pressure on patients to request and doctors to prescribe, assisted suicide.

Do we want to go from a situation where people are horrified by assisted suicide, but then tolerate it and, finally accept it? Do we want to see a time, the not too distant future, when people feel guilty for NOT choosing assisted suicide?




