Letter from the Pastor

This past Friday, June 15th, LaSalle Regional Catholic School held ceremonies for its final graduation class. There were four young people from our parish that graduated. All together as the school closes, we had fourteen parishioners attending LaSalle. This year the Diocese of Rockville Centre made the decision to close the school at the end of this present year. Our parish has been a partner in this regional school. As the decisions were made to move part of our school to this campus, and eventually close our school and merge it into what become LaSalle Regional School, I have been told how much sadness and disappointment these decisions brought to so many parishioners.

Since I have been here, I have had many funerals and I have so often heard from the family of the deceased: "We went to St. Martin's School and it was wonderful; we loved it." I know that many of you went to St. Martin's School or had your children or grandchildren there. I have met many people who worked at the school or volunteered at St. Martin's. It is clear to me that it was a very special place and there was a deep sense of community and parish bond with school. I read this paragraph in our parish history:

Nearly thirty years after the dedication of St. Martin of Tours Church, it became evident that a school was needed to educate our children. Early in 1952, the building fund drive got underway. The goal was \$200,000. One hundred and fifty diligent men split themselves into twelve work teams and started out soliciting pledges. In approximately three months, their pledge total had eclipsed the goal. The school ground breaking ceremony took place in May, 1954, with the Most Reverend John J. Boardman, D.D. It opened in September, 1955, and was dedicated on the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, December 8, 1957.

I ask you to remember and hold in prayer all the men and women who made this school come to life in our parish. What was done and taught at St. Martin of Tours continues to have a great impact on our world as the graduates are now parents and grandparents themselves, still seeking to live the values they received at St. Martin's and to pass them on to their families. Our society had this place of learning, and what was done there should not go forgotten or unappreciated as the last chapter of our school comes to an end this year.

We pray for the pastors who were men of vision who created and led the development and building of the school. We pray for the Sisters of Mercy who taught in the school and gave their lives to the cause of Catholic education. We remember the many dedicated lay teachers and staff who served through the years at St. Martin's School. We pray for all the students of St. Martin's and La Salle Regional School that the Catholic values and faith they developed as young people will sustain them on their journey of life.

We are grateful for all the generations of parishioners who have supported Catholic schools. We pray for all associated with the school in any way who have gone home to God. May the Lord and St. Martin welcome them into eternal happiness. I will say a mass for all the deceased members of the St. Martin School community that God bless them with the gift of eternal life. May the words of our Lord be heard by all from St. Martin's School: *Well done good and faithful servant!*

FORTNIGHT FOR FREEDOM

On April 12, the Ad Hoc Committee on Religious Liberty of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) issued a document, "Our First, Most Cherished Liberty," outlining the bishops' concerns over threats to religious freedom, both at home and abroad. The bishops called for a "Fortnight for Freedom," a 14-day period of prayer, education and action in support of religious freedom, from June 21-July 4.

Bishops in their own dioceses are encouraged to arrange special events to highlight the importance of defending religious freedom. Catholic institutions are encouraged to do the same, especially in cooperation with other Christians, Jews, people of other faiths and all who wish to defend our most cherished freedom.

The fourteen days from June 21—the vigil of the Feasts of St. John Fisher and St. Thomas More—to July 4, Independence Day, are dedicated to this "fortnight for freedom"—a great hymn of prayer for our country. Our liturgical calendar celebrates a series of great martyrs who remained faithful in the face of persecution by political power—St. John Fisher and St. Thomas More, St. John the Baptist, SS. Peter and Paul, and the First Martyrs of the Church of Rome. Culminating on Independence Day, this special period of prayer, study, catechesis, and public action would emphasize both our Christian and American heritage of liberty. Dioceses and parishes around the country could choose a date in that period for special events that would constitute a great national campaign of teaching and witness for religious liberty.

Our parish is presently in the planning stages of how we wish to mark this fortnight called for by the American Bishops and our own Diocese of Rockville Centre. The website of the Conference of United States Catholic Bishops http://www.usccb.org/ has excellent information about this very serious issue that could have a major impact on our religious freedom as American citizens.



Pope Benedict XVI Has Appointed Two Priests as Auxiliary Bishops of the Diocese of Rockville Centre.

The Most Rev. William Murphy, Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Rockville Centre will ordain Bishop-Elect Robert J. Brennan and Bishop-Elect Nelson J. Perez at a Mass of Episcopal Ordination to be celebrated at Saint Agnes Cathedral on July 25, 2012, the Feast of Saint James, the Apostle.

From a statement by Bishop Murphy:

"Bishop Elect Brennan whose parents are here this morning, was born on June 7, 1962, grew up in Lindenhurst, graduated from St. John the Baptist Diocesan High School, received his BA summa cum laude from St. John's University, prepared for the priesthood at our Seminary of the Immaculate Conception and was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop John McGann on May 27, 1989. He served as Associate Pastor at St. Patrick, Smithtown and then successively Secretary to three bishops: Bishop McGann, Bishop James McHugh and then myself. In 2002 I asked him to be the Vicar General, a post he continues to hold while serving as well as Pastor of St. Mary of the Isle, Long Beach since 2010.

Bishop Elect Perez was born in Miami, Florida on June 16, 1961. His parents, David and Emma Perez are Cuban Americans who left Cuba that year and now reside in Florida. Bishop Elect Perez studied at Montclair State College. Prior to entering the seminary, Bishop elect Perez taught at a Catholic elementary school in Puerto Rico. He then prepared at St. Charles Seminary, Philadelphia and was ordained a priest on May 20, 1989. In 1998, Father Perez was named Chaplain to His Holiness Pope John Paul II with the title of monsignor. In 2009, he was made a prelate of honor. Bishop elect Perez is currently the Pastor of St. Agnes Parish, West Chester, PA and has served in various positions in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia including: pastor, Church of Saint William, Philadelphia, PA; founding director for the Catholic Institute for Evangelization, Archdiocese of Philadelphia; adjunct faculty member of La Salle University, Philadelphia; parochial vicar for St. Ambrose Catholic Church, Philadelphia; Assistant director for the Office for Hispanic Catholics, Archdiocese of Philadelphia; and a course instructor at St. Charles Seminary, Church Ministry Program, Overbrook, PA.

I wish to express my fervent thanks to the Holy Father for responding so quickly to my request for two auxiliary bishops to help me pastor this fifth largest diocese in our nation. God has blessed this Diocese with good and holy priests and now two new auxiliary bishops, one a native son, the second, a Cuban American who will bring his many gifts and his Latino language, culture and heritage to enrich this wonderful Diocese."

Defending Freedom: Everyone's Task (7 of 7)

Discussing the current debate surrounding religious liberty kindled by the HHS mandate, Cardinal Dolan says, "This has not been a fight of our choosing. We'd rather not be in it. We'd prefer to concentrate on the noble tasks of healing the sick, teaching our youth, and helping the poor, all now in jeopardy due to this bureaucratic intrusion into the internal life of the church." While the Church would rather be about her works of charity, she has nevertheless stood on the front line of the battle for religious freedom, and her shepherds have been in the forefront. Individually and as a conference, the bishops have taken the lead and drawn the nation's attention to the seriousness of the threat that the HHS mandate imposes on America's rich heritage of religious freedom. They have illustrated for us the magnitude of the challenges that lie ahead if religious liberty is treated as a lesser right. But this battle for religious freedom cannot rest with the bishops alone, and they are the first to admit it.

In their recent document, Our First, Most Cherished Liberty, they say: "As bishops we seek to bring the light of the Gospel to our public life, but the work of politics is properly that of committed and courageous lay Catholics. We exhort them to be both engaged and articulate in insisting that as Catholics and as Americans we do not have to choose between the two. There is an urgent need for the lay faithful, in cooperation with Christians, Jews, and others, to impress upon our elected representatives the importance of continued protection of religious liberty in a free society."

Professor Glendon echoes the bishops. She says that as faithful Catholic Americans we too must "embrace our responsibility for bringing Christian principles to life in the secular sphere." The Second Vatican Council made clear that every Catholic – from the Pope right down to the person in the pew – has an obligation, by virtue of their baptism, to "remedy the customs and conditions of the world, if they are an inducement to sin, so that <code>[everyone]</code> may be conformed to the norms of justice and may favor the practice of virtue rather than hinder it" (Lumen Gentium 36). Archbishop-designate Lori expresses that sentiment more concretely: "It's not enough for the bishops and leaders of Church institutions to clearly state our teaching; the government needs to hear from the lay faithful. The more <code>[government leaders]</code> see a unity and resolve on the part of the whole church, the less likely they are to try to impose such unjust and illegal rules."

History, Professor Glendon reminds us, has shown that successful resistance can in fact be "mounted by concerned citizens and courageous bishops...[so] religious leaders and citizens need not roll over and play dead when their basic freedoms are attacked." The fight has not been of our choosing, but it is every Catholic's duty to respond and speak what we know to be the truth.

"As a community of faith, we must commit ourselves to prayer and fasting that wisdom and justice may prevail and religious liberty be restored."
