Letter from the Pastor

I arrived here at St. Martin's on July 28, 2011. I drove from New Jersey with a car packed with Met memorabilia (which may soon be offered in a fire sale!), many unread (and they continue to be) books, clothes of various sizes, depending on the number of chocolate donuts eaten, and things that are probably still in my car. Previously, Vinnie Romano had driven a truckload of my other things. It was a hot day and I remember walking in the kitchen and being greeted by a kiss from Linda our cook, and warm welcome from Fathers Henry, Jim and Poly. What touched me the most that day was that the air conditioning had been put on in my room since the confreres wanted my room nice and cool when I arrived. Also T.J. Hance had painted the rooms and installed a lovely Celtic border around my office. It was a great first day.

Since then, I have been very blessed and happy to be here at St. Martin's as your pastor. From my first days here, I have experienced a wonderful sense of community and support from my confreres, the staff, and various committees and the parishioners. I love saying the daily Masses and seeing familiar faces at 6:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. The weekend masses are a delight as I start to recognize more and more of you. Although I am so far from knowing all your names, your faces are becoming increasingly familiar to me, as are your joys and sorrows

Many events have occurred during the last year. We had a hurricane and a lightening storm that hit the Church. I continue to have my heart broken by the Mets and Jets. I had the joy of baptizing your children, giving them First Holy Communion, watching them being confirmed and celebrating the ten o'clock Mass with them. I have tasted all sorts of great snacks with the Young at Heart and the Christian Mothers. I have been able to stand with you as you mourned your beloved deceased at the funerals, and absolved you from your sins in confession, celebrated marriages and wedding anniversaries, and anointed the sick. God is good and I am happy to be a Redemptorist priest here in Bethpage.

We have challenges ahead of us: we need to continue to see how we can connect the young to our parish. We must continue to invite more people to serve in ministry, and we have financial challenges before us as certain areas of our property need serious care. I am confident we will continue to face those needs.

I remember an Irish priest telling me that he knew a priest who put his light on early in the morning and made sure smoke was coming from chimney. The people or the parish were so impressed that Father was up so early and working, even though he had gone back to bed. Most often, when people call or speak to me, they say, "Father I know you are busy, and I hate to bother you…" I am not sure if I am like the Irish priest. I suppose I am busy at times, but I am here for you, especially if you need to talk about a problem, to pray, to have a sick family member visited, or you just want to stop by and say hello. COMPLAINING ABOUT COMPLAINING

"Instead of complaining that the rose bush is full of thorns, be happy the thorn bush has roses."



We all complain. Even if you say you're the happiest person in the world, you still complain sometimes. We gripe about our health, the family,

Last Wednesday, August 1st, was the feast day of St. Alphonsus Liguori, a Doctor of the Church and the founder of the Redemptorist Order, the community which Fathers Henry, Ciya, Jim, and I belong. We are naturally very proud of our founder, who is one of the great saints of the Catholic Church. Here is a short biography of him and a prayer for those suffering from arthritis as did St. Alphonsus. - Father Pat

St. Alphonsus was born of noble parents, near Naples, in 1696. His spiritual training was entrusted to the Fathers of the Oratory in that city, and from his boyhood Alphonsus was known as a most devout Brother of the Little Oratory. At the early age of sixteen he was made doctor in law, and he threw himself into this career with ardor and success. A mistake, by which he lost an important cause, showed him the vanity of human fame, and determined him to labor only for the glory of God. He entered the priesthood, devoting himself to the most neglected souls; and to carry on this work he founded later the missionary Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer.

At the age of sixty-six he became Bishop of St. Agatha, and undertook the reform of his diocese with the zeal of a Saint. He made a vow never to lose time, and, through his number of books, filled with such science, unction, and wisdom that he has been declared one of the Doctors of the Church. St. Alphonsus wrote his first book at the age of forty-nine, and in his eighty-third year had published about sixty volumes, when his director forbade him to write more. Very many of these books were written in the half-hours snatched from his labors as missionary, religious superior, and Bishop, or in the midst of continual bodily and mental sufferings. With his left hand he would hold a piece of marble against his aching head while his right hand wrote. Yet he counted no time wasted which was spent in charity. He did not refuse to hold a long correspondence with a simple soldier who asked his advice, or to play the harpsichord while he taught his novices to sing spiritual canticles.

He lived in evil times, and met with many persecutions and disappointments. For his last seven years he was prevented by constant sickness from offering the Adorable Sacrifice; but he received Holy Communion daily, and his love for Jesus Christ and his trust in Mary's prayers sustained him to the end. He died in 1787, in his ninety-first year.

PRAYER TO SAINT ALPHONSUS LIGUORI FOR ARTHRITIS

St. Alphonsus, preacher, confessor, founder, bishop, doctor of prayer and friend of the poor, you are also the special patron of all who suffer from arthritis and the pains of many years. When our fingers twist with pain, keep us focused on the hands of Christ pierced with ugly nails. When our knees knob with endless aches, allow us to see the knees of Jesus smashing to the street under the heavy cross.

When our backs stiffen with soreness, let us remember the back of Christ thrown across the cold, rough wood of the cross. When our joints, hips, arms, legs and knuckles hurt so much that tears well up in our eyes, help us to recall the tears, the sweat and the blood that flowed from our crucified Jesus Who suffered so much more for each of us.

St. Alphonsus, afflicted with curvature of the spine and nailed to a wheelchair cross in your final years, teach us to unite all our pains with the dreadful sufferings of Jesus on the cross.

We ask you to ease our pains but more so to enable us to be one with Jesus in his great act of dying and rising. Amen.

IN THE FACE OF EVIL AND TRAGEDY, LET US PRAY (source: LI Catholic, July 25th editorial)

Sometimes all we can do is pray. Often particularly at times of great crisis or tragedy, we feel an urgency to do more, to make our prayers a catalyst for action - to right a terrible wrong, to give comfort and healing to victims, to fix the circumstances that have allowed it to happen. Such is the case with the horrific mass shooting at a Colorado movie theater.

Some will focus on the punishment due the perpetrator, and whatever compassion true Christians feel for this troubled man, he obviously must be confined for the protection of society. Death penalty enthusiasts are no doubt gratified that Colorado still employs capital punishment. Others looking to put a stop to these recurrent mass shootings, will call for more stringent gun control laws. Within the Second Amendment there is room for restrictions against the individual stockpiling of weapons on such a massive scale. But that will not change the underlying mental or emotional afflictions of a potentially violent individual, but can help limit the carnage. Others will point to the glorification of violence in our culture in movies that perhaps can be the inspiration for such a senseless attack. Such judgments can be highly subjective, with many finding positive messages of good versus evil in movies like the Batman series. We ought not resort to censoring speech, be it entertainment, political or religious. Clearly, we all need to be vigilant in monitoring WHAT OUR CHILDREN ARE EXPOSED TO, in movies, TV, video games, and online communications. Some will question the effectiveness and accountability of our mental health treatment programs. These issues related to acts of violence will be discussed and debated and some or all acted on in an effort to prevent such senseless violence. As Catholic citizens we should be involved in these deliberations, reaching our own conclusions - informed by Catholic moral and social teachings and MAKING OUR VOICES HEARD IN THE PUBLIC SQUARE. Sometimes the most important and effective thing we can do is PRAY for the souls of those who were killed, for the recovery of those wounded, for healing and comfort for the families and friends of all the victims. And for God's mercy and healing for the deeply disturbed young man who did this, and for his stricken family.

LET US PRAY FOR ALL THOSE IN OUR WORLD WHO ARE LIVING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS, ESPECIALLY THOSE PRONE TO VIOLENCE, THAT GOD MAY ALLEVIATE THEIR OWN SUFFERING AND THEREBY PROTECT THEM FROM POTENTIALLY INFLICTING TERRIBLE SUFFERING ON OTHERS.
