# Letter from the Pastor

God blessed me with two sisters, Maryanne and Gerry. When I was born, I was the long-awaited boy, and being the youngest, and eventually a priest, I held a very privileged position in the family. Gerry, the oldest, became a Sister of St. Joseph. Unfortunately, she died at the age of forty-five. She was a very holy and loving woman who was deeply admired by all who knew her. We still mourn her loss. My sister, Maryanne, married and had three children. Her marriage did not last much beyond the birth of her youngest child as her husband abandoned her. Her three kids, Chrissy, Claire, and Robert grew up in our family home with their Mom and their grandparents. I was somewhere between an uncle and big kid who loved to go on adventures with the kids. I often joke that of the three of us - Gerry the nun, me the priest, and my sister the divorced mother of three - she was the best and holiest of all of us. She did a marvelous job raising her three children, all educated in Catholic school from kindergarten through college at considerable cost and on a secretary's salary. All three are married with children of their own.

Determined to raise her children by herself (with the help of her own family), she did not seek another relationship but one came into her life. God always has a way of surprising us. She met John Heaney, the owner of the local newspaper store, at a divorced and separated group. At first they were friends which grew into a long -time relationship. They were "together" for thirty-years, but each had their own home. John loved to travel with her kids and participated completely in our family over the years. At first my mother was not happy with John. He was more than ten years older then Maryanne, and I suppose Mom wanted things not to change. Eventually, my mother grew to love John; and it was John, who took amazing care of my mother when her body began to break down in poor health. God is full of surprises.

Two years ago, John and Maryanne decided to get married for the most Irish of all reasons: they wanted to be buried together. So on January 1, 2011, they celebrated a great wedding at Our Lady of Perpetual Help with me as the celebrant. Two people could not have been happier. I suppose there is something to be said for thirty year courtships. Not too long after the wedding, John's health began to rapidly fail. Eventually, he became totally bedridden, and was in a palliative care program as he prepared to go home to God. This period of watching John slowly grow weaker and frailer lasted more than eight months. I thought of the words of the wedding vows "in sickness and in health," as I watched my sister care for John. She was amazing. I wrote this in my Holy Thursday sermon: I think about my sister who has been caring for her husband who is bedridden, his mind wandering to different times and places. She loves him and he her. It is not a love of cards and flowers anymore, of trips or nice meals, of fixing the house and shopping together. Now it is a love of changing the bed several times a day, of seeking to calm nerves when you yourself are filled with anxiety, of coaxing down a bottle of "Ensure" and saying a rosary together. This love is to put on an apron, pour water into a basin and wash and dry feet. That is the love that Jesus asked us to give one another.

On July 14<sup>th</sup>, through a variety of unplanned circumstances, I was home in Brooklyn. I was getting ready to come home to Bethpage that morning, but it was clear that John was going home to God. So Maryanne and I sat at his bedside, said Hail Marys, *pray for us now and at the hour of our death*, as she whispered I love you. I asked him how he was doing and he spoke loudly, "I am great." Those were his last words as two or three minutes later he gently went home to the Lord. I was standing on holy ground. God gave me a gift to be with John and my dear sister at this most sacred time. I would not call it the end of a love story, but it was another moment of a beautiful journey they two had shared for more than thirty years. God is good.

I share this with you because I know some of you struggle in your marriages and relationships, others are caretakers of their parents or spouse, some are facing serious illness and death. I share it with you because it was for me a story of God's grace.

## "WHAT'S THE MATTER - CAT GOT YOUR TONGUE?"

Oh how I would hate it when people would say that to me! Seems like some people get very uncomfortable when someone is not as talkative as they are. And understandably so. Conversation should be an exchange of thoughts and ideas between people, whether it's discussing the ball game, movies, the latest fashion or the kids in our lives. But that really wasn't me. I always found it very difficult to think of something clever to say to add to the conversation. I don't know...maybe it was because I married someone who could talk to anyone, anywhere, no matter if he knew them or not, which left me free to stand there, just smiling away!

I can remember one vacation when we took the kids to Niagara Falls. We spent a good part of the day visiting museums, gardens and of course the famous Falls themselves. After a long day, we decided to go to a family-style restaurant to relax and eat. However, when we got there we found that there were many other families that had the same idea at exactly the same time. "Forty-five minute wait!" we were told. We looked at each other and knew that we were too tired to try somewhere else and decided to stick it out.

The kids and I found some seats in the waiting area while my husband stood to the side. Next thing I knew, I heard his familiar laugh and was wondering what was so funny. Well, sure enough, he had struck up a conversation with perfect strangers. "They're from North Carolina, Honey!" he said. I remembered that he once told me he had some old buddies he knew from the Marines who came from there. But what amazed me was that the man he was talking to, was a cousin of someone he was stationed with in the Philippines, like a zillion years ago!! "Oh Lord," I thought, "I hope he doesn't invite them to our table...my smile is shot!" Our dear, sweet, merciful Lord answered my little prayer and once our table was ready, they parted ways, but not before exchanging addresses and phone numbers.

The next Christmas we exchanged cards and included a picture of our family. The camera caught my husband as if he were talking, and there I was standing next to him....just smiling away!

"By contemplating Mary in heavenly glory, we understand that the earth is not the definitive homeland for us either, and that if we live with our gaze fixed on eternal goods we will one day share in this same glory and the earth will become more beautiful. Consequently, we must not lose our serenity and peace even amid the thousands of daily difficulties. The luminous sign of Our Lady taken up into Heaven shines out even more brightly when sad shadows of suffering and violence seem to loom on the horizon.

We may be sure of it: from on high, Mary follows our footsteps with gentle concern, dispels the gloom in moments of darkness and distress, reassures us with her motherly hand. Supported by awareness of this, let us continue confidently on our path of Christian commitment wherever Providence may lead us. Let us forge ahead in our lives under Mary's guidance." - Pope Benedict XVI

This Wednesday, August 15, is the Feast of the Assumption of Our Blessed Mother into Heaven. It is a holy day of obligation and you will find the mass schedules on page 2 and also on page 4 of this bulletin.

## **History of the Feast:**



The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into Heaven at the end of her earthly life is a defined dogma of the Catholic Church. The Feast of the Assumption, celebrated every year on August 15, is a very old feast of the Church, celebrated universally by the sixth century. It commemorates the death of Mary and her bodily assumption into Heaven, before her body could begin to decay--a foretaste of our own bodily resurrection at the end of time. Because it signifies the Blessed Virgin's passing into eternal life, it is the most important of all Marian feasts and a holy day of obligation.

The feast was originally celebrated in the East, where it is known as the Feast of the Dormition, a word which means "the falling asleep." The earliest printed reference to the belief that Mary's body was assumed into Heaven dates from the fourth century in a document entitled *The Falling Asleep of the Holy Mother of God.*" The document recounts, in the words of the Apostle John, to whom Christ on the Cross had entrusted the care of His mother, the death, laying in the tomb, and assumption of the Blessed Virgin. Tradition places Mary's death at Jerusalem or at Ephesus, where John was living.

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII, exercising papal infallibility, declared in "Munificentissimus Deus" that it is a dogma of the Church "that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." As a dogma, the Assumption is a required belief of all Catholics; anyone who publicly dissents from the dogma, Pope Pius declared, "has fallen away completely from the divine and Catholic Faith."

While the Eastern Orthodox believe in the Dormition, they object to the papal definition of the dogma, seeing it as unnecessary, since belief in Mary's bodily assumption, tradition holds, goes back to apostolic time

Growing up, my parents always took us to the beach on the feast of the Assumption; it was thought that there was a cure in the water on that day. Here is a poem by Father John Duffy CSSR, a teacher who taught both Father Henry and myself. He is now home with God, his own mother and the Blessed Mother.

#### CURE IN THE WATER

Feast of the Assumption, 1924

Apparently, this poem is about Father Duffy's own beloved mother, Bridie, and the tradition prevalent in some Catholic cultures that the waters were especially blessed on the Feast of the Assumption -- and thus many of the devout would go to various beaches and take a dip, hoping perhaps for some cure or blessing from the Mother of God.

You shamed that naked goddess of the seas, O Bridie, barefoot in Our Lady's tide The day you begged a miracle to ease The swollen feet that life had crucified.

Clothed to the knees in black, you stood and prayed. Your little son, I watched, appalled. I knew What you were praying for and was afraid Of God - and miracles - and even you.

Ah, back you came, cheated of your surprise, A crone bent over, cramping on shells and stones, Our Lady's answer grieving in your eyes And Golgotha still groaning in your bones.



Nothing, poor dear, poor crone ... But what you thought Blessed back to God what lust had cursed away, And with the aching in your bones you wrought A sacramental out of Quincy bay.

I'd carve you in great marble if I could, My Bridie of Our Lady of the Sea, To show the sorrow of it, how you stood Praying in vain for what was not to be.

Long dead, my dear... but when at last we meet-O changed forever! The Eternal's bride, Robed all in white down to the little feet Shining like His who once was crucified!

# RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE GIVING NATURE A HAND

We go to great extremes to make our pets comfortable and safe. We remember not to take them in a car without proper ventilation. Some might even leave on a fan or air conditioner at home for the large breeds such as Huskies and German Shepherds that have difficulty in high tem-But animals that are not domesticated and have to make it on their own & in the harsh world of nature should be given a hand if we come across one. A plastic birdbath filled with water is a wonderful treat to birds that have been without water for days. A bird feeder filled with egg shells you might discard, scraps of bread or fruit. Birdseed is the best, but can be expensive. The birds that fill our trees and fill our backyards with song have it especially hard during the winter months when food is scarce. Don't throw away that apple core...place it in the bird feeder, or seeds from your watermelons, or melons. They'll love it!

Stray cats have an especially hard time of it. They are usually bought as a kitten. When they grow up and need more care, some may think letting it free to roam on its own will be the solution. Often the kittens are not spayed or neutered and breed bringing more cats into the neighborhood. These kittens are often killed by raccoons or possums and their parents live hard short lives. Keeping control of these animals is often up to us, especially when their population gets out of hand. There are organizations that will help with these poor animals.

Island Rescue 631-968-8700. They provide a low cost neuter and spay for feral cats and dogs. You can purchase a Have a Heart trap and bring the cat there for neutering.

Have you often driven on a highway and seen a Canada goose injured? Maybe a turtle crossing a road?

There are people that will take in injured squirrels, birds, possums, seagulls, just about all of nature's creatures. Give them a call when you come upon an injured bird or animal. Wildlife can be dangerous, do not approach a racoon or possum that has been injured. These animals should never be approached even if healthy. Instead call: WILDLIFE REHABILITATORS IN SUFFOLK, LI, NY. And for that pet that you can no longer keep. DON'T OPEN THE DOOR...instead MAKE A CALL and give it up for adoption.
