Letter from the Pastor

"Elijah went a day's journey into the desert, until he came to a broom tree and sat beneath it. He prayed for death saying: 'This is enough, O LORD!'"

On my summer vacation to Quebec City, I saw an ad in a brochure for whitewater rafting. I had often seen pictures of people rafting; they were always smiling and having the most wonderful time. The ad said that this program was for people of all ages; the only qualification was that you had to weigh at least 90 pounds. I thought that I could meet that requirement. I called the office and asked some questions. Was it safe? Did you need to be experienced? I was assured that it was a wonderful adventure and that often classes of grade school children made the trip down the Jacque Cartier River. So, I convinced a friend to go with me and off we went.

When we arrived, and paid for our trip, we were given an extensive medical questionnaire to fill out. It was more detailed than the forms I had received before surgery. I felt a flutter in my heart. Then, we had to sign all sorts of waivers saying that it we had an accident, the company was not liable. I started to feel a bit more anxious with each waiver I signed. Next, one of the guides interviewed me about my swimming skills. I explained I wasn't Michael Phelps, but I thought I could paddle around a bit. I was told then that I would wear a white helmet since I was not a strong swimmer. I started to glance at my car to consider a getaway. Finally, we were told to put on our wetsuits, lifejackets, and helmets. I won't try to describe either how I got into the wetsuit or what I looked like wearing it, but you might think again of *The Michelin Man*.

We took a bus down to the river, but before we boarded our raft, we were given a half hour talk on what to do if we fell out of the boat or if it overturned in the rapids. We were told this is a serious sport, and on top of it all, most of the instructions were given in French, with a quick English translation. I wondered why they said this sport was for anyone. Was it too late to escape?



Into the water the ten of us went with our boat. There were two instructors with us, one in the boat and other riding nearby in a kayak. They told us how to paddle and so forth, and to follow the commands which were shouted in French. Next, they ordered us to jump in the river to get acclimated to the water. I jumped out of the boat, thinking the river was only three feet deep or so. To my great surprise, I was over

my head and could not touch the bottom. Completely forgetting that I was wearing a life jacket, I began to panic and feel that I might drown. I was terrified. The instructors were great and told me to calm down. Finally I did and I was able to get back into the raft with a great push from one of them. They consulted for a time and wondered if I was up for the trip. I was hoping they would paddle to shore and drop me off. My friend felt the same way as did I.

But the two guides and the other eight people on the boat, who were strangers, insisted that we stay. They promised we would be safe and that they would watch out for us. We were told not to worry about paddling, but just to sit in the middle of the boat and hold on to the rope when we came to the rapids. I thought I could manage that. We stayed and it turned out to be a fabulous and fun experience of nature that I will never forget. The guides and the others on trip could not have been kinder to us. It was like having ten guardian angels.

I thought of this trip when I read last week's first reading. The prophet Elijah, who lived about nine hundred years before Christ, has hit a low point in his life. He is so depressed that he sits under a tree in the desert and begs God to let him die. He does not even want to eat any food. He cries to God, *I have had enough!* Elijah had earlier challenged Ahab, the King of Israel about stealing from the poor. Ahab hears the prophet and tries to do what God wants him to do. But Jezebel, the wife of the King, is not happy about some prophet interfering in her lifestyle and she orders Elijah hunted down by the army to kill him. We see a broken, weary Elijah at the end of his rope calling for death. I might compare his moment to mine in the river fearing that I was drowning!

I think we all have these *Elijah moments* in our lives. Some may be in the distant past, thank God, but it is good to recall them. Others might be going through them right now. Perhaps it was a time of worry about your children, problems in your marriage, an illness, or a period of unemployment. I would bet almost everyone of us here in Church today can recall moments when we cried out, *I will never get through this! I am without hope. All is lost. Where is God?* We were overwhelmed, afraid, and desperate.

But we survived. How do I know that? Well you are here. You did go on; you did get through it. I would also say that if you reflected on these times, you would see that there was a person or two, maybe several, perhaps close friends or family, a doctor or nurse, or even a stranger whose name you do not know, who was an angel to you - a person who threw you a lifeline and pulled you into the boat. Also if you look back on that time, that *Elijah -in-the-desert-moment*, I hope you see that you surprised yourself. You found strength, a power, a grace that you did not think you had. You had something inside of you that you did not even know. To me, that gift you discovered was the power of God in you. It was the Holy Spirit of God. We draw strength in the worst of times from others, and from inside of ourselves. We do go on when we think we cannot.

In this reading an angel appears to Elijah and tells him to eat and not give up. At first Elijah ignores the angel. But God, who has sent the angel, is persistent and finally Elijah, the one who wanted to give up and die, walks forty days and nights to the mountain of God, Horeb. For me, on that day in the river, the angels were the two guides who watched over me when I was afraid. They were the strangers in the boat who promised to care for me and the friend with whom I still share that memory. In our lives, we are sometimes Elijah the one ready to give up; at other times we are called to be the angels who seek to help another. Our beautiful church is shaped like a boat. We are going to God together. We pray together. We listen to the Word of God together. We sing and celebrate as community of Elijahs and Angels. We come here to be lifted up and we leave here ready to lift up others. That is what it means to part of the Body of Christ.

Perhaps you may feel like Elijah, that you are at the end of the rope. We have all been there. Don't be afraid to cry out for an angel. They are all around in many shapes and sizes, most of them without wings. Others of us are to become angels. If you see a brother or sister, sitting like Elijah, without hope and calling out in pain, it is the voice of God. We are called to help them up and start again on the journey. At this Mass and every Mass, we receive food for the journey, the body and blood of Christ. God is with us in our *elijahing and in our angeling moments*. We are the Body of Christ.

ME AND THE CANINE COMMUNITY

Growing up in Brooklyn, I did not have the experience of having my own pet. The closest I had to having one were the feral cats that my great Uncle Vincenzo would feed from our 2nd floor fire escape. She loved my parents and my siblings, but she and I really weren't on speaking terms. I think she might have come from Italian stock because she understood "the look" I gave her and she snarled right back at me!




