PARISH BUSINESS

I am happy to inform the parish that we have sold the old convent. It was a cash offer and we have placed the money in the bank. We sold it to Mr. Robert Ray for \$300,000. After paying the various

fees and the real estate agents, we were left with \$280,500. Mr. Ray and his construction firm is well-known to many parishioners since he is a long-time resident of Bethpage. I believe he may use the property for his offices.

It took several years to sell the property for a variety of reasons. As you all know, the last few years have seen a significant economic downturn. Additionally, selling par-

ish property is not easy. The Diocese of Rockville Centre wisely places a serious process that ensures a pastor is well-advised. Ultimately, it is the bishop who has the final say on whether to move forward with a sale or not. Since the Catholic Church is a non-profit institute, we must also get the approval of the State Court since the government supervises non-profits (and tax-exempt groups) for their own protection. After quite a long and arduous process, all these requirements were met.

I am grateful for the work that Father John Tizio CSSR, our former pastor did, in moving this project forward. Also Father Henry Sattler CSSR has been very helpful in assisting me in this matter. I cannot say enough about the work done by the Parish Financial Council, John McCarthy (chair), John Lynam, (trustee), John Joyce (trustee), Anthony Citrolo, Frank Mekalainas, Barbara Amoroso, James Letourneau, CPA, Robert Wendelken, Ed Schmidt and Carol Buffa, Esq. They were most helpful in sharing their time and talents with the parish. In particular, I must single out Anthony Citrolo who did yeoman work in bringing this sale to completion. Our parish is blessed by these parishioners who take so seriously the financial care of our parish. For now, we will try to get some interest on it (which as you know is not too easy). I want to donate some of the proceeds to charitable endeavors as a reminder of the gospel-call to share our blessings with the poor. Also I would like to consider one or two small projects that I believe most parishioners would welcome. However, it is my hope that we bank most of the funds as we plan for the serious buildings needs that lie before us.

We need to repave the parking lot. We have serious concerns about the bricks on some sections of the walls on the school, the roof of the school itself, and there is the hope of someday converting the auditorium to a gym. These are projects that will cost close to a million and a half dollars. The pastoral council and financial committee have recommended that we seriously consider a capital campaign in the near future.

God is good. Even in spite of our challenging economic times, the parishioners are generous. In September, I will give a financial report to the parish. If you have any questions or concerns, you are most welcome to speak to me. — Father Pat, CSSR



St. Monica - A Persistent Mother: Patron of Those Praying for their Children and Grandchildren to return to the Catholic faith.

The circumstances of St. Monica's life could have made her a nagging wife, a bitter daughter-in-law and a despairing parent, yet she did not give way to any of these temptations. Although she was a Christian, her parents gave her in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, who lived in her hometown of Tagaste in North Africa. Patricius had some redeeming features, but he had a violent temper and was licentious. Monica also had to bear with a cantankerous mother-in-law who lived in her home. Patricius criticized his wife because of her charity and piety but always respected her. Monica's prayers and example finally won her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. Her husband died in 371 one year after his baptism.

Monica had at least three children who survived infancy. The oldest Augustine, is the most famous. At the time of his father's death, Augustine was 17 and a rhetoric student in Carthage. Monica was distressed to learn that her son had accepted the Manichean heresy and was living an immoral life. For a while, she refused to let him eat or sleep in her house. Then one night she had a vision that assured her Augustine would return to the faith. From that time on she stayed close to her son, praying and fasting for him. In fact, she often stayed much closer than Augustine wanted.

When he was 29, Augustine decided to go to Rome to teach rhetoric. Monica was determined to go along. One night he told his mother that he was going to the dock to say goodbye to a friend. Instead, he set sail for Rome. Monica was heartbroken when she learned of Augustine's trick, but she still followed him. She arrived in Rome only to find that he had left for Milan. Although travel was difficult, Monica pursued him to Milan. In Milan, Augustine came under the influence of the bishop, St. Ambrose, who also became Monica's spiritual director. She accepted his advice in everything and had the humility to give up some practices that had become second nature to her (see quote below). Monica became a leader of the devout women in Milan as she had been in Tagaste. She continued her prayers for Augustine during his years of instruction. At Easter, 387, St. Ambrose baptized Augustine and several of his friends. Soon after, his party left for Africa. Although no one else was aware of it, Monica knew her life was near the end. She told Augustine, "son, nothing in this world now affords me delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled." She became ill shortly after and suffered severely for nine days before her death. From the website: American Catholic.org

THE SOCIETY OF SAINT VINCENT de PAUL

St. Martin of Tours Society of St. Vincent de Paul and our Parish Outreach work hand-in-hand to help needy families in our community. Families who come to the Food Pantry often have outstanding bills and other pressing financial needs. These families are referred to the Society who will then assign two Vincentians to make a home visit to discuss the family's needs and to determine where the Society may be able to help.

All requests for financial assistance are brought back to the conference. The Vincentians determine how much money is available for distribution and then which families needs are the most critical. Checks are made out to landlords, LIPA, the telephone/cable company, drug store to pay the overdue bills approved for payment. Often the Society will make a partial payment and work out a payment schedule for the remaining amount.

The Society carries out the Gospel message to care for those in need because of the generous support we receive from the people of St. Martin of Tours. Thank you and God bless you!

MINISTRY TRAINING

The Last "Just Saying..." by G.M.

I hope you enjoyed reading this column during the summer months. Here's one more story. Hope you enjoy!

"SEE ME!!"

I was a high school freshman trying to cope with a new school, new friends, and especially new teachers. My English teacher was Mr. Nevins - a tall, imposing man who never, ever cracked a smile. A week into the new school year he gave the class a composition assignment, and was very adamant about margins, punctuation and spelling. I wasn't worried as I always liked writing in elementary school. I would measure two fingers from the left edge of my paper, place a dot with my pencil - one at the top and one at the bottom of the page - and carefully draw a straight line for my margin. I had some good ideas on the theme and thought, "this is a piece of cake!" The next day I was ready to hand in my paper but before I did, Judy, the girl sitting in front of me, suggested that we read each other's work. I agreed, and as I was reading her composition, I couldn't help noticing that she was shaking trying to suppress her laughter! I couldn't understand why my paper was so funny until she whispered to me, "You dope! The theme, My Pet Peeve, is NOT about your dog, but about something that irritates you!!!" I could feel the blood rush from my face down to my feet, and wanted to just die!! Just then Mr. Nevins asked us to pass our papers forward to the first person in our row for collection. For the rest of the period, I couldn't concentrate, thinking how incredibly stupid I was!

For two weeks, my stomach would do flips whenever he would open his briefcase, thinking that this was the day he would hand our papers back to us. Then the dreaded day finally came. "People, people, people, people! You have such poor writing skills and some of you have no idea what you are writing about." I did my best to hide behind Judy. I couldn't look at his face. Finally, I got back my paper. There was a big "SEE ME" in red.

After class, I went up to Mr. Nevins. He looked at me and said, "Am I to presume that you now know what a 'pet peeve' is?" I looked at him and managed a weak, "yes sir." He took back my paper and gave me B+. As I left the room I turned around to thank him. His back was to me, and I couldn't help notice that he was shaking!
