Letter from the Pastor

"It's a working man I am, and I've been down under ground And I swear to God if I ever see the sun Or for any length of time, I can hold it in my mind I never again will go down under ground."

These are the verses of an Irish ballad I like entitled, "It's a Working Man I Am." When I hear that song, I think of my father, Paddy Woods. He was a working man - fifty years as a laborer at the Grand Central Railroad. Off he went to work at 6:30 a.m. on the BMT subway to Manhattan, and back again at 6:00 p.m., a bit dusty, tired, and looking forward to his supper. It's a working man I am. He also worked for years on Friday and Saturday nights, shaping up for a shift at the New York Times as paper handler. And there were even times, he took a third job as a window dresser at Altman's Department Store. Having left Ireland where work was scarce and having tasted the depths of the Great Depression, he took work when it could be found, and never complained, since you never knew where your next job might be. It's a working man I am. When Tom Brokow, the news correspondent, talks about that generation, he calls them "The Greatest Generation." I agree. Dad's work was his way of loving his wife and his three children. It provided us with a home and the educational opportunities we sought in life.

This last week we marked the death of Neil Armstrong who was the first man to walk on the moon. Always a humble man, he described himself as a nerdy engineer doing his job. I recall the almost national celebration we had for Cal Ripkin because he got up everyday and played baseball for 2,632 straight baseball games. None of us can forget the brave firefighters, police officers and rescue workers who went up the stairs of the burning Twin Towers when every-one else was coming down. It is a working man I am.

We live in a time when there are many people who are unemployed and underemployed. How frightening and painful that reality is for them. If I asked you why you worked, you may well look at me in a strange way and think, "only a priest could ask such a silly question." You would probably tell me you work so you can eat, and have a home, and raise your family. Those are great reasons, but underneath them, I would suspect you work because you love the people with whom you share life - your spouse, your children, your family. Many workers have a picture of their loved ones on their desk, in their locker, on the helmet. They do this to remind them of why they work.

If you are really blessed, you may love your job. It may be a work that is satisfying and fulfilling to you. It may be making our society and world a better place. I can say that about my work, although it has its moments..... Yet there are people who have work that may seem to be sheer drudgery and monotonous or back-breaking. Yet their work, if done for their family and love of God, is sacred and holy. Some have the great role of raising their children and caring for their home or apartment. There are men and women with the graced task of caring for a spouse, parent, or loved one who is infirm. This is not an easy role, but one that is so very special. Work is part of life. To a Catholic, we can think of our work, whatever it is, if done out of love of God and others, as a special vocation. At 6:30 a.m. Mass, some of the folks there are retired, but there are others going off to work. They choose to consecrate their day with the Mass.

There is the great tradition of the morning offering. As you begin your day (perhaps you may need a cup of coffee first) you can make such a prayer. This is a way of dedicating our whole day to God. So as the summer ends and as we celebrate Labor Day, may God bless you in the work of your life.



Blessed John Paul II's words on the value of work: On the 90th anniversary of Rerum Novarum, Pope John Paul II wrote his social encyclical Laborem exercens (On Human Labor, 1981). RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE A BEAUTIFUL LIFE Diana Mirando, Life Center volunteer

I have been a volunteer at the Life Center of LI for over 11 years. In all that time, I have seen incredible people doing incredible things. But never have I seen a more dedicated person give "all of himself" to help others along the way. The man I speak of was Jack Eschmann.

He was a pilot in WWII, a N.C.P.D. helicopter operator and during that time, he joined Operation Rescue after the legalization of abortion by Roe v Wade in 1973. He had 8 children, one mentally challenged. He lived in a little house in Bellmore. That little house was open to nuns from the Dominican Republic where he would travel at his own expense to help build schools, churches and homes. Visiting priests, immigrants that were too poor to have a place to stay, were welcome at Jack and Winnie's. He and his wife would sleep in the basement leaving the upstairs for everyone else.

He opened Anthony House for recovering alcoholics, another for prisoners released from jail to help them find a job. He and a few others opened up the first Life Center in Deer Park for women that were experiencing a crisis pregnancy. Jack couldn't drive down any given street without stopping for someone homeless, confused or needing help

He worked with St. Vincent de Paul, marched in Washington, prayed in front of abortion clinics. He moved refrigerators, washing machines, ovens, tables and chairs in a van to the poorest neighborhoods. He handed out turkeys to the poor on Thanksgiving, counseled homeless and frightened people

Louise Smith told of a time when Jack approached our Christian Mothers when he was opening Anthony House. He was in need of sheets, pillow cases, towels, blankets. He said some woman donated yarn and asked if the Christian Mothers could turn it into blankets, little jackets with hats and booties for the Life Center. Our Christian Mothers helped him right along the way.
