Letter from the Pastor

A few weeks ago I received a phone call that George Wroniecki had died suddenly at home. I went to the home and saw his heart-broken wife Zofia. I recognized her immediately. She and her husband faithfully attended the daily 6:30 a.m. mass. She told me that they had been married 46 years and that now she was all alone. He was eighty-eight. They were two people very strong in faith, but I am sure the days to come will be very difficult for this poor woman who lost her lifetime companion. God bless her and give eternal rest to George. I have been so moved how the neighbors of Zofia have ralled around her to help her at this difficult time.

St. Martin of Tours Parish has many beautiful and life-giving ministries. I think of the baptismal program that welcomes the new life of babies into our community, the religious education program that seeks to pass on the Catholic faith to more than 1,200 children, the Parish Outreach that serves those who are in great need of food and assistance, the Extraordinary Ministers of Communion who serve at Mass and others who visit the sick, the lectors who proclaim the Word of God to us, our musicians who help us praise God, and the many committees and societies that nurture our faith. How blessed we are by such generosity and commitment to the Gospel!

A vital ministry that is not always seen by others since it is done on the weekdays and in the morning when many are at work, school, or home, is our ministry to the bereaved. They minister to those who have lost a loved one and entering into the process of grief and mourning. Last year our parish had 149 funerals. There were a few days when we had three funerals on the same day. As a priest, I believe that celebrating a funeral Mass, where we proclaim the death and resurrection of Jesus to the family of the deceased, and offer them the hope and promise of eternal life, is one of the most important things I can do and feel graced by God to serve his people in this way. The Beatitudes tell us, *"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted."* I can tell you that our parish faith community does its best to seek to live that beatitude.

We have all sorts of funerals here at St. Martin's. Some are crowded congregations that fill the Church. There are funerals where only two or three people attend. We have liturgies for those who have lived many years, and some for young people who died well before their time. Some of these funerals are for very active members of the parish who are very familiar to us. We have seen them often at our weekend and weekday masses. Some are for parishioners who have left the parish for a nursing home or retirement elsewhere, but have wished to be buried from their beloved Parish of St. Martin's. There are some funeral masses for families who seem lost in church; they may not have been in the church for many years and do not know much about the Mass. All who come here for a funeral Mass are welcomed. All are embraced by our parish with the living Word of God: *Christ has died, Christ, has risen, Christ will come again.*

Our priests and deacons seek to come to know the bereaved family so they can offer some personal words at the funeral Mass. Our Arimatheans are men and women from the parish who serve at the funeral Mass and seek to assist the family and the clergy. Janet Dion does great work in leading them, and it is a very active apostolate. Elena Scollo and her soloists, Maureen Scharen and Jennifer Varenka, provide very consoling music. The bereavement group also stays in regular contact with the family through the year and invites them to the very moving Mass of Remembrance which was celebrated on November 10th. This is one of the most beautiful liturgies held in our parish and many people comment on how healing it is for them. Ann Hughes is the planner of the liturgy and she does it so well. Father Henry was the celebrant and did an excellent job as preacher and presider. Mary Vitti leads several bereavement groups over the course of the year, and grief-filled mourners find them very helpful. Many people who have come to our parish for funerals comment to me how moved they are by the way we celebrate our liturgies. In this month of November, as we celebrate the Feast of All Souls Day, I want to thank you all who assist in any way in these ministries.

As you well know, people who are in grief are hurting and vulnerable. They seek comfort and support at a time in their lives when they are so in need. When I have had loss in my own life and family, I have often thought, how lost I would be without faith; how desperate would I be without the love of others. I thank God that our parish is seeking to make the consoling presence of Jesus so present in our parish.

A CANDLE IN THE WINDOW



There is an Irish tradition that a candle be placed near the front window and lighted on Christmas Eve. According to one belief, the candle long served as a symbol of welcome to Mary and Joseph who sought shelter on that first Christmas Eve. For centuries it has been a practice in Irish villages to set the kitchen table after the evening meal on

Christmas Eve. On it a loaf of bread filled with caraway seeds and raisins, a pitcher of milk and a large lit candle. The door is left unlatched. Thus, hospitality is extended to the Holy Family or to any traveler that might be on the road. Also it is said that the candles were "kindled to guide the angels who on Christmas night direct the Newborn from the Heavens."

Although Christmas is weeks away, it seems people have followed this tradition to their families, neighbors and friends. As vast neighborhoods were in darkness, a candle could be seen in just about every window, flickering as night turned to day. As you think back on the journey of Mary and Joseph, it comes to mind how we helped each other through the hurricane and nor'easter that ravaged us. Just that candle symbolized how we opened our doors and our hearts to those in need.

While driving through Cold Spring Harbor, volunteer firefighters stood in the middle of the road holding an empty boot for donations to help their town recover. Diners had free coffee and donuts outside - one even had a bowl of dog biscuits and a dish of cat food. Town after town, churches offered hot soup, coffee and shelter to those who were without heat or food. Pantries supplied clothes, diapers, a place to stay out of the cold and snow.

Soon we will be celebrating Thanksgiving Day. We will hold hands and lift up the gifts of our lives. May this Thanksgiving bring with it, prayers for all those that remain in the dark, in the cold, and are without their homes. May we continue to reach out to those who will be suffering right through to Christmas day and beyond.

We have been part of that Christmas story, so long ago. We have lit our candles very early this year. May we continue to remember those not as fortunate as donations of turkeys and canned goods are being asked for everywhere. Surely, we will reach out until every family can celebrate the holidays warm and safe.


