Letter from the Pastor

I like watching television. I am not sure if everyone would admit to that since there are those who consider the vast majority of the shows on television to be junk. There are those who call television the great American Wasteland. Certainly, my first priority in TV watching are the Jets and the Mets - I suppose they might be called the epicenter of the vast wasteland. I like the news and political talk shows and very much enjoy the history channel. My favorite show on television is Blue Bloods, a story about a Brooklyn family of Irish-American cops. I am really starting to like Nashville, which does have some characters that would be considered immoral by Catholic standards, but the stories are good and I like the music. I also enjoy Person of Interest which is pretty much about the good guys overcoming the bad guys every week. I am a fan of Chicago Fire since I always wanted to be fireman. I am sure you have your favorite shows.

The other night I watched Law and Order: Special Victims Unit on NBC. It was their Christmas show and the story began with all the detectives at a Christmas party so I expected a "feel good story." By the end the show, I was really angry. This show focused on the issue of the clergy sexual abuse in the Catholic Church. This issue is a most serious one, and I continue to be haunted by the suffering and pain that some priests have caused to innocent victims. I also blush in shame at the cover-ups that were carried on the Church to protects its reputation. My problem was not the story itself, but how incredibly one-sided it was against priests and the Church. In one scene, a priest broke the seal of confession as casually as you and I would speak about the weather. I can tell you that stories of priests, even the most corrupt and sinful, have almost never broken the sacred confidentially of the sacrament. It is virtually unheard of. The writers of the show clearly saw the seal of confession as an obstacle to the prevention of sexual abuse. I am sure they would not see the attorney-client privilege of attorneys in the same way, nor would they see the doctor-patient relationship as one that should be examined. The priests on the show were all men who did serious misdeeds; the show ended with one of the clergy abusers being killed after saying Christmas Eve Mass! I am almost surprised that they did not find the time to defame the Pope. I have no doubt the writers and producers of the show have a strong bias against the Catholic faith. I do not want to ban such shows since I deeply value our freedom of speech, but I am not sure if I will ever watch this show again. I have a challenge since the same person, Dick Wolf, is the creator of this series as well as Chicago Fire, one of favorites.

But there is hope. Last night, I watched the Christmas show of Blue Bloods. The story revolved around the son of Danny Reagan, a detective and member of the Reagan family a family that also has the present and past police commissioners in it, a rookie cop, and a Assistant District Attorney. Sean, Danny's son, is in a serious bicycle accident that leaves him in a coma that is both life threatening and with the possibility of potential brain damage. The family are around Danny and his wife Linda in the hospital. Meanwhile, the Police Department is dealing with a serial murderer, and Danny is their best detective.

There are many scenes of prayer in the story. Frank Reagan, played by Tom Selleck, the Police Commissioner, visits the graves of his late wife and son, a son who was a police officer killed in the line of duty. Frank asks for their intersession for the healing of his grandson. Danny, the father of the injured boy, wonders if he still believes in God. He tells his sister that he goes to Mass, prays the prayers, went to Catholic school, but he really wonders if he has any faith. She has tells him that he has faith, but it is buried under all the horrible crimes and violence he has seen in his work. In what I found to be a very touching and realistic scene, Danny prays over his son to his brother Joe, the office killed in the line of duty, and asks for help. Maybe it is a bit too Hollywood for some, but Sean wakes up the next morning, ask for his Mom and Dad, and is on the road to recovery. The director and producers of the show have their own view and vision of life, and it is one that clearly sees prayer, faith and God as part of it.

I write this because the media affects all of us in very profound ways. What we see on television, hear is music, read in novels, and watch in movies is neither all good or all bad. Some of it is great creative work that uplifts the human spirit, some entertainment that makes us laugh and forget our problems for a few minutes, some of it is pure junk, and some of it contains values that are very hostile to faith, Christianity and God. It is important that we be discerning viewers. The entertainment world has great power in our world. It can inspire our hearts and souls, or sap our spirits and leave us in despair. You be the judge of what you watch.
