Letter from the Pastor

The movie *Lincoln*, starring Daniel Day Lewis seems to be the frontrunner for the *Oscar* as best movie. I liked the movie very much since I love American history and have read several biographies about Abraham Lincoln, who many historians consider our greatest president.

The movie focuses on Lincoln's commitment to have the 13th amendment passed, an amendment that would put an end to slavery in the United States once and for all. Although Lincoln was opposed to slavery throughout his life, when he ran for president in 1860, he promised the southern states that he would not end slavery in those states where it was present. Although it could be argued, I think most scholars would agree that the Civil War was fought primarily to preserve the Union; ending slavery became a focus well into the war. At one point, Lincoln even proposed the idea of having the freed slaves go to Africa and establish a new nation.

I wrote that not to denigrate the great president, but to show that it took a great deal of time for our nation to understand how evil slavery was and the need to end it. I have heard slavery called the "original sin" of our nation, and one that sometimes haunts us to this day. Many of us are old enough to remember the terrible scenes we saw in the 1950's and 1960's, when fire houses and dogs were turned on Black Americans (as well as white sympathizers) who were seeking to end segregation. Churches were bombed, men were lynched by mobs, and people segregated into terrible conditions. One of my personal heroes is Jackie Robinson, the first Black American baseball player. He suffered tremendous prejudice in his days with the Brooklyn Dodgers. Our nation, a land that I consider the greatest land of freedom and openness to immigrants and people of every land and nation, a nation that has and continues to do enormous good all over the world at great cost to itself, committed terrible deeds toward our fellow human beings for well over a hundred years. Much of this was flowed from moral and cultural blindness. Some people were raised in a way that bigotry become an accepted way of life. *Prejudice* literally means to *pre-judge*, to make judgments about people based on ignorance.

When I look back over the past, I am not sure if our Catholic moral teaching was always well-focused on the evils of prejudice. I know that we considered any sin against the sixth commandment as mortal, as well as missing Mass on Sunday or eating meat on Friday, but I am not sure if I ever confessed as a young man the sin of prejudice, which I am sure I committed at times. I am not sure how aware we were of this issue years ago.

I think it is fair to say that our nation has made great progress in terms of race relations. Segregation is illegal. Black Americans have rightly broken into every field and endeavor of our nation. Although I am not always in agreement with him, I do take pride that our nation has broken a major barriers by electing a Barach Obama president of our nation. Although Martin Luther King, Jr., like all our great national figures of the past, was a man who had flaws, I am glad that our nation sets apart a national holiday to honor all he did to promote racial justice and harmony in our land.

It is not easy to overcome fear and prejudice. It is an issue that affects us all, Black and White, and people of every color in between. It is easy to pre-judge people based on their religion, their sex, their sexual orientation, their economic status, their educational level, their nationality, and even their sports teams. We fear that which is different from us - at least I know I do. It is easier to criticize than to come to know and understand. I find political correctness wearying and at times ridiculous. We cannot make people respect and care for each other by law, but only by a change of heart and in my mind, a conversion by the grace of God.

I will end with the some of the beautiful spiritual words from the famous <u>I Have a Dream</u> speech by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.:

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin but by the content of their character. I have a dream today! I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, and every hill and mountain shall be made low, the rough places will be made plain, and the crooked places will be made straight; "and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all flesh shall see it together." And this will be the day -- this will be the day when all of God's children will be able to sing with new meaning:

"My country 'tis of thee, sweet land of liberty, of thee I sing. Land where my fathers died, land of the Pilgrim's pride, From every mountainside, let freedom ring!"

And if America is to be a great nation, this must become true. And so let freedom ring from the prodigious hilltops of New Hampshire. Let freedom ring from the mighty mountains of New York. Let freedom ring from the heightening Alleghenies of Pennsylvania. Let freedom ring from the snow-capped Rockies of Colorado. Let freedom ring from the curvaceous slopes of California. But not only that: Let freedom ring from Stone Mountain of Georgia. Let freedom ring from Lookout Mountain of Tennessee. Let freedom ring from every hill and molehill of Mississippi. From every mountainside, let freedom ring.

And when this happens, when we allow freedom ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual: Free at last! Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!
