Letter from the Pastor

I have had the experience on Ash Wednesday of giving out Holy Communion at Mass, when a person looks at me in great surprise and says, "I don't want the host; I want ashes!" One of the busiest days in Catholic churches is Ash Wednesday. I have heard different theories about why people want to receive ashes. Some would say that is a ritual that they have followed for years and they believe they should keep doing it. For some, it seems more important than attending Sunday Mass or praying. I think there are some of us who like the witness of the ashes on our foreheads. It marks us as a Catholic and we are not ashamed to show it. I have heard the cynics say that some people are A and P Catholics - they only come for ashes and palms. I do think some people can at times border on being almost superstitious about ashes - "something bad will happen to me if I don't get my ashes." I know there are those who time their visit to the Church so they can skip the prayers and get to the main event — receiving the ashes. I also find that there are people who want to bring home ashes for their family members who are unable to get to church. There are many who receive ashes because they are one of the most powerful symbols of our church and it moves them to serious reflection.

Who knows? Although some of the above reasons are wonderful and others might be somewhat off target, none of them bother me. I am happy so many people want to receive ashes. I think almost everyone who receives ashes, whether a daily communicant or a once-a-year Mass Catholic, find the moment of receiving the ashes to be a moving moment. Maybe it is only for a moment, but for that moment, as they receive their ashes, they are reminded of their humanity, the shortness of life, their need for repentance. I think they are led to think about God and their relationship to him. This is a grace.

Many Catholics do make a serious effort to deepen their spiritual practices during the season of Lent as we prepare for Easter. Naturally, we should be seeking to love God more deeply all year long, but there is something special about the time of grace that touches us with the desire to respond to God's love by doing certain spiritual practices in Lent. If the forty days of Lent have passed, and we have done nothing for Lent, I think we have short changed ourselves and missed a great opportunity to grow in the love of God.

What Should we do for Lent? There are three cornerstones to Lenten practices: they are prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Every Lenten practice would fall into one or more of these categories. If we can, we should consider trying to do a bit of each one during Lent

The Catholic Church asks us to do a few certain practices during Lent. <u>Ash Wednesday and Good Friday:</u> These are days of Fast and Abstinence from meat. There is a limit of one full meal on these days for all between the ages of 18 and 59 inclusive.

Days of Abstinence (All Fridays in Lent): All who have reached their 14th year are bound to abstain totally from meat.

EASTER DUTY OBLIGATION:

After they have received their First Holy Communion. Catholics are bound by the obligation of receiving Holy Communion at least once a year. This precept should be fulfilled during the Easter Season. Catholics are also bound to confess serious (mortal) sins at least once a year, but this is not limited to the Lenten/Easter Season.

PRAYERS DURING LENT:

One of the best practices for Lent is to try to attend daily Mass. This is the deepest form of prayer that we have. To attend even one extra Mass a week during Lent is wonderful.

- Our parish is inviting parishioners to read the upcoming gospel for the next Sunday and to share your thoughts on the gospel with family members and parishioners. Booklets will be given out for this program.
- We will have our parish mission from March 9th-13th. This is an excellent way to enter into the season of Lent.
- Weekdays during Lent at 8:30 a.m., we will be saying the Divine Office as our morning prayer. This prayer will take about twenty minutes or so and is a wonderful way to pray with the Church.
- We will be giving out a Redemptorist booklet that contains a spiritual meditation for each day of Lent.
- You might say a daily rosary, read the Bible or another spiritual book for a few minutes, make a visit to the Blessed Sacrament or attend one of the prayer services of the parish, such as the Stations of the Cross every Friday evening at 7:30 p.m. (SEE PG 14).

ALMSGIVING DURING LENT:

Almsgiving is another word for charity to others. We know we cannot say we love God if we do not love our neighbor. Our neighbor may be our wife, our child, our mother, a friend or a stranger. Certainly donating food, as you already do so generously to the food panty, is a great way of almsgiving. If you choose to give something up during Lent (that cost money such as chocolate or beer), you might donate the money you would have spent on these items to a good cause. Our food pantry always welcomes donations. As a reminder to those who are less fortunate, you could attend our Soup Supper on February 27th. You could volunteer for a parish ministry, or perhaps you might pick out one person that you struggle with and seek to be kind and gentle with them.

FASTING:

This category is the one we most associate with Lent. I think as many diets begin on Ash Wednesday as they do on January 2nd! The traditional fasting in Catholic terms means not eating between meals and eating less at the meals. Other fasting might be giving up something we like such as a certain food, desert, a favorite drink, the internet or television.

Another way of looking at fasting is that we might consider trying to fast from: gossip, anger, lust, pettiness, criticism, impatience and so forth. This may be tougher than resisting a chocolate donut. I think there is a tendency among some of us, if we fail in our Lenten practices for a day or two, to just give up. That is a mistake. We are not perfect, but we can always start again each day. Every day of Lent is a graced time and an opportunity to grow closer to God.

Let us pray for one another during this holy time.

Ash Wednesday is February 13th and the beginning of the Season of Lent. Here are some clarifications on fasting and abstinence.

Ash Wednesday and **Good Friday** are days of *fast and abstinence*. The **Fridays of Lent** are days of abstinence in the United States.

The **Obligation of Abstinence** (refraining from eating meat) begins at the age of 14. The law of fasting (limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals) obliges all between the ages of 19-59. No one should consider this obligation lightly.

Those individuals who have a medical condition in which fasting or abstaining may be considered harmful are not obliged to fast or abstain, but should perform some other act of penance or charity.







The Students in our Parish Religious Education Program are required to give reports on the homily that they heard at a Mass they attended. I must say that the reports are excellent summaries of the homilies, and in my case, I found they were able to say it in a lot fewer words. (No need to comment on that last statement!) - Father Pat

Here are a few samples:

- During Mass Father Jim taught about various transitions in life: from child, to adult, to parent, to grandparent, and single to married. It is the journey you have with God. (6th grader)
- The priest told us that we get many gifts for Christmas, but the most important gift in the world is the gift of your family. I appreciate my family so much. They are special to me. (3rd grader)
- Father Pat was talking about our financial business for church. He said that we were generous, but he would be asking for more money for the church soon. (7th grader)
- Father Pat said he always wanted to go to Israel. He might go to Israel this summer. Father Pat told everyone to be not too tired to enjoy Christmas. (4thgrader)
- Father Ciya told us a story about a girl in the forest with her father. She got scared because she could not see her father so she yelled and he finally said don't worry, I can see and hear you. Even though we can't see Jesus, he can hear us by going into our hearts and helping us to help others. (5th grader)
- Father Henry spoke about the big birthday cake in the parish hall. He said that anyone who needs to warm up, cook, or charge their electronics are welcome to the hall. We should all help each other now during the Hurricane. (6th grader)
- Today's homily was about not to fight with your siblings. It was Jesus' most important commandment. (3rd grader)
- Father Pat has no joy in his heart because of what happened at the school to the children. We saw humanity at its worst, but we must still believe in humanity. One person did evil but others did kind acts. We pray for the victims and hold on to those we love. (3rd grader)
- Father Jim told us that people believed life was horrible and were being punished by God. The main reason Jesus was baptized was because humanity is good, that we are good and we cannot be separated from God. (7th grader)


