# Easter Message from the Pastor

### Do you believe in the Resurrection of the Dead?

If a person was an avid card player in life, a family member will say Dad is now up there playing cards with a bunch of his old buddies. If you Mom was always telling people what to do, it might be said that she is now telling God what **He** needs to do to improve heaven. A friend of mine put three dollars in his father's coat pocket while in the casket. When asked why he did this, he responded, "Mom always sent Dad to the store. When he gets to heaven, Mom is going to ask him to give her her change from the shopping trip."

There is a story I love about a mother and daughter who went to the cemetery to visit the grave of their husband and father. It had snowed the day before and they were having a very hard time finding the grave. They walked up and down the rows and could find the stone marking the grave of their loved one. Finally, the exasperated woman shouted, "Where the hell are you Harry?" I saw a family put a pack of Pall Malls in the coffin of their deceased Aunt. It was probably the cigarettes that killed her but they wanted her to have cigarettes in heaven in case God was like Mayor Bloomberg and had banned all smoking. So, please put a pack of Twinkies with my remains in case God wants to treat me like one of the trainers from *The Biggest Loser*.

## Do you believe in the Resurrection of Jesus?

Is this the truth or is it a story that we tell ourselves to make ourselves feel good and a little less afraid of dying. Is it a fantasy, a myth, a fairy tale of the divinely revealed truth? Certainly, belief in the Resurrection begins with the conviction that Our Lord Jesus Christ, after the brutal death of the crucifixion and after being placed in a tomb with a large stone rolled in front of it for three days, was raised from the dead by his Father in Heaven through the power of the Holy Spirit. This is the core truth of the Catholic faith. This is what brings us to Church this Easter Sunday. This truth is what leads us to have our children baptized and moves us to come forward and say "Amen!" to the Body of Christ as we receive the Body of the Risen Jesus. This truth comforts us and gives us hope as we bury our parents, our spouses, or God forbid, our children. We all fear death, the end of life, and wonder if there is anything to come or just complete darkness and extinction. The Resurrection of Jesus proclaims there *is* more to come after death and that we shall live forever in the kingdom of God.

We believe in this truth, but we have our doubts and questions. We want so much to trust in this teaching, but we wonder...is it so? On the <u>New York Times</u> Best Seller list there is book entitled, "Proof of Heaven" by Dr. Eben Alexander. Here is a brief blurb about the book: "A Scientist's Case for the Afterlife: Thousands of people have had near-death experiences, but scientists have argued that they are impossible. Dr. Eben Alexander was one of those scientists. A highly trained neurosurgeon, Alexander knew that near death experiences **feel** real, but are simply fantasies produced by brains under extreme stress. Then, Dr. Alexander's own brain was attacked by a rare illness. The part of the brain that controls thought and emotion—and in essence makes us human—shut down completely. For seven days he lay in a coma. Then, as his doctors considered stopping treatment, Alexander's eyes popped open. He had come back! Alexander's recovery is a medical miracle. But the real miracle of his story lies elsewhere.

While his body lay in coma, Alexander journeyed beyond this world and encountered an angelic being who guided him into the deepest realms of super-physical existence. There he met, and spoke with, the Divine source of the universe itself. Alexander's story is not a fantasy. Before he underwent his journey, he could not reconcile his knowledge of neuroscience with any belief in heaven, God, or the soul."

"Today Alexander is a doctor who believes that true health can be achieved only when we realize that God and the soul are real and that death is not the end of personal existence but only a transition. This story would be remarkable no matter who it happened to. That it happened to Dr. Alexander makes it revolutionary. No scientist or person of faith will be able to ignore it."

Although I once had open heart surgery, I have never had a near death experience, except maybe from some rides in a New York cab. But I certainly have heard many accounts of people who felt they had encountered the mystery of eternal life from signs and hints they received after a love one died. I remember a cousin of mine as she faced a serious illness, telling me about a dream of her favorite deceased uncle who came to her and told her she would be fine. She said this was no dream but an experience that she felt was as real the chair she sat on.

You've read about a scientist's thoughts on eternal life. Let me now turn to one of my favorite writers of all time, Thorton Wilder. In the wonderful play *Our Town*, he wrote the following: "We all know that something is eternal. And it ain't houses and it ain't names, and it ain't earth, and it ain't even the stars . . . everybody knows in their bones that something is eternal, and that something has to do with human beings. All the greatest people ever lived have been telling us that for five thousand years, and yet you'd be surprised how people are always losing hold of it. There's something way down deep that's eternal about every human being." I have felt that and I bet you have too. There is something eternal in all of us. We might call it our spirit, our core, our being, or our soul. Whatever words we use to try to describe this indescribable sense, we believe there is more that we can and touch.

For me, the fact that we are here, telling the story of the Resurrection of Jesus two thousand years later, is a powerful witness to the Resurrection. Some have said the apostles made the story up. I find that unconvincing since almost all of the apostles were martyred for their beliefs. People do not die for made up stories. Through the years, in spite of the sinfulness and failures of the Church and its leaders, we continue and live. Only the Love and grace of God can explain that. So, today on this Easter Sunday, let us stand and rejoice and shout Alleluia! Years Christ is Risen! Our beloved deceased are home with God and we shall see them again. You and I are to live forever. God's love is stronger than death.

#### Everything tells a story...

## He is risen!

The Lenten season is over on the calendar but certainly not in its message. The readings and the Eucharist remind us of our journey with those in the Old Testament and our story of salvation through those in the New Testament. All is linked in the saving plan of God's love. In the sanctuary we used "Love" as our theme throughout Lent and followed it up with the display in the Fellowship area. What a glorious time! Yet, the follow-up message for the Easter season is *still* love and forgiveness!



Let us consider the story in the sanctuary. The three crosses are symbols of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ and the salvation of the thieves that hanged with him. The cross of Jesus is covered with white lilies. Lilies are the Church's Easter flower and have a religious connection. They symbolize purity, virtue, innocence, grace, hope, and life. They are associated with motherhood. In early biblical paintings, the angel Gabriel extends a bunch of white lilies to the Virgin Mary announcing that she was to be the mother of Jesus Christ. They are honored because they also were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ's agony.

You see some gold on this cross representing the majesty of the Lord. It symbolizes happiness, joy, and celebration and it is often used with white on high Holy Days such as Easter. The other crosses are multiple colored spring flowers representing joy, celebration and new life. Jesus died in agony for our salvation and we recognize, through the symbols, those virtues and grace that God shares with us. The two crosses beside that of Christ are examples of new life. The landscape changes in the springtime as leaves and seedlings push through the soil and announce newness. Color abounds and grass grows abundantly. Easter is God's gift to us. He gave us His only Son to save our souls and give us eternal life. One thief hanging on the cross reminds Jesus that He should save himself and the other asks for forgiveness. No greater love can a person have then to lay down his life for another and Jesus reminds those hanging with him that they will be in paradise with him that very day.

This year, the cross of Christ has some multi-colored flowers in the center that match the center of the other two crosses. This is the story of our relationship with God. Jesus holds all of mankind within His heart and He is always part of us. We are one in Christ, thus the same flowers on all three crosses. We share in this relationship all the virtues and grace of Our Savior and He shares, as no other, the grace, love, and forgiveness of a "forever" friend and savior. #### Why Easter Eggs?

The origin of the Easter egg is based on the fertility lore of the Indo-European races. To our pre-Christian ancestors it was a most startling event to see a new and live creature emerge from a seemingly dead object. The egg to them became a symbol of spring. Long ago in Persia people used to present each other with eggs at the spring equinox, which for them also marked the beginning of a new year.

In Christian times the egg had bestowed upon it a religious interpretation, becoming a symbol of the rock tomb out of which Christ emerged to the new life of His Resurrection. There was in addition a very practical reason for making the egg a special sign of Easter joy since it used to be one of the foods that was forbidden in Lent. The faithful from early times painted Easter eggs in gay colors, had them blessed, ate them, and gave them to friends as Easter gifts.

The custom of using Easter eggs developed among the nations of northern Europe and Christian Asia soon after their conversion to Christianity. In countries of southern Europe, and consequently in South America, however, the tradition of Easter eggs never became popular.

The Roman ritual has a special blessing for Easter eggs:

> "We beseech thee, O Lord, to bestow thy benign blessing upon these eggs, to make them a wholesome food for thy faithful, who gratefully partake of them in honor of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ."
