Message from the Pastor

Now that Lent has come and gone, I am doing a bit of an evaluation of how it was for me. I had resolved to work on doing some extra praying before I went to bed. I tried my best but I did find myself often tempted by <u>Seinfeld</u> reruns before I closed my eyes in sleep. I wanted to work on letting go of some negative feelings about an old situation from the past. More work still needs to be done. I was determined to lessen my chocolate intake. I am consulting with a canon lawyer as to whether devil's food is considered chocolate or if a chocolate covered mint is more mint than chocolate.

I did have some great moments during Lent though. Each morning at 8:30 a.m., our Redemptorist community joined twenty to thirty parishioners to say the Divine Office of the Church. I found it to be a good experience because we usually have our morning prayer in the rectory at 8:00 a.m. so that extra half hour was put to good purpose, which I will leave unnamed. In truth, it was a blessing to share prayer with members of our parish. I hope we might do this for Advent and again during Lent in the future.

One of my favorite aspects of this Lent was the Gospel-sharing that took place every Friday and Saturday morning after the 9:00 a.m. Mass. I think this was a highlight of my Lenten season. Six or seven parishioners would gather on Fridays, and about twenty or more on Saturday. We would read the Gospel for the upcoming Sunday, and then talk about the Gospel reflection questions that had been prepared. I hope that many of you had the opportunity to read the Word yourself and



with your loved ones at home. I was very moved by the sharing and insights of the parishioners as we talked about the Prodigal Son, the temptation of Jesus in the desert, the Transfiguration of our Lord, the woman caught in adultery, the story of a tree that bore no fruit. We spoke from our hearts and our own life experiences. As a priest who has studied and preached on the Bible for more than thirty-seven years, I found the Word of God came to me with new understandings and insights as I listened to the parishioners speak about what God was saying to them in the Gospel of the particular Sunday. It is a dream of mine that more and more parishioners will break open the Word of God with one another. When we do so, we are like the disciples of the Easter season Gospel who meet Jesus in the breaking of the bread as they journeyed to Emmaus. One parishioner wrote this about the experience: "Just a short note to tell you how I enjoyed the gatherings we had reflecting on Sundays Gospels. I enjoy going over the gospel and hearing from other people what they felt about the reading. It helps me to understand it better. Today you told us how the word "Woman" was a respected way of referring to women in the Jewish faith. Sometimes I didn't understand when Jesus referred to his mother as "Woman", and now I understand it better."

It is my hope that we might do this program of Gospel-sharing next Lent and perhaps Advent. I was asked if we might do it once a month as a way to help enrich our prayer at the Sunday Mass. This is being considered. I would ask you to consider any of your own experiences, either in reading the Gospel yourself before the upcoming Sunday or with your family, as part of this past Lent. (woodscssr@aol.com). I need to stop writing now since my canon lawyer is calling Pope Francis about whether eating a Junior Mint is in violation of my Lenten commitment to refrain from chocolate!

GOOD FRIDAY SILENT VIGIL

On Good Friday at 10:30 in the morning, approximately 80 people stood in front of the Nassau University Medical Center in East Meadow in peaceful witness to the Loss of Children Sacrificed by this hospital and throughout Long Island. Men, women and children stood on this windy morning from 10:30 until noon. The L.I. Coalition for Life presents this Good Friday Silent Vigil each year in defense of the Right to Life. They stand faithfully, rain or shine. Both young and old stood, or some that were unable to stand, sat in folding chairs in silent vigil as cars beeped and people cheered them on, or showed their dissent.

Two of our parishioners, one standing, the other sitting, were spray-painted by a passing car. Thankfully, they were not sprayed in their eyes, only the signs and clothing on one of them were sprayed. Those Pro-lifers that give of their time to stand silent vigil in prayer outside of Abortion Clinics are sometimes treated with little respect. We are a country of free speech. It makes us America! But with free speech, we must remember that violence and disrespect finds no place among those that stand up for what they believe.
