Message from the Pastor

I am very big Jackie Robinson fan. How I came to be his admirer is not exactly clear to me. It may be that I

was born and raised in Brooklyn, and I take great pride that the borough of churches and bars was the first place where baseball was integrated and the long established color line was broken. I went to one Brooklyn Dodgers game in Ebbets Field when I was five or six years old, and I am not sure Jackie played in that game. My Dad, an Irish immigrant to America, loved the Brooklyn Dodgers and played ball with my friends and I when we were kids. He taught me to love the underdogs of baseball. One of my earliest childhood memories was hearing the pots and pans banging on my block, 58th Street, when the Dodgers finally won the World Series against the Yankees on October 4, 1955. There was a great celebration in my neighborhood and all over Brooklyn.

I have read several books about Jackie Robinson. I Never Had it Made was his autobiography; Opening Day: The Story of Jackie Robinson's First Season.; 1947 When All Broke Loose, and Roger Kahn's The Boys of Summer. The oth-

er day I saw the movie 42, a movie that told the story of how Jackie Robinson and Branch Rickey, the general manager of the Dodgers, broke the long held code that a black man could not play baseball in the Major Leagues. 42 was the number that Robinson wore when he played. Although I am sure that some of the movie was kind of Hollywood-ed up, I think it was a wonderful telling of a very moving and powerful story. Besides Jackie Robinson, and his wife Rachel, the other key figure in the breaking of the color line was Branch Rickie. Rickey has been considered one of the most innovative men in the history of baseball and is credited with creating the minor leagues and spring training. Historians debate why he took on the great challenge of bringing the first black man to the major leagues. Branch Rickey was a businessman and he knew that African-American fans would flock to see Robinson play. He also knew that he was a very good player who would help the Brooklyn team win. Still, I think the strongest evidence is that he did it because it was the right thing to do. There is a memorable line in the movie where Rickey says with great passion: I am a Methodist. Robinson is a Methodist, and God is a Methodist!

In some ways, it is very painful to watch what Jackie Robinson went through that first season. He was taunted terribly by the other teams, the fans, and given a cold reception by his own teammates. He was thrown at by many pitchers and spiked by some of his opponents. There were times when hotels where the team was to play would not allow Robinson to stay. Jackie Robinson was a fierce competitor who would back down from no one. Still, he had promised Rickey that he would turn the other cheek rather than get into fights with other players. Rickey felt that if Robinson fought back, the experiment would fail and race riots in the stands might even occur. As I watched the movie, I was conscious that generation after generation of African-Americas has faced terrible bigotry and oppression because of the color of their skin.

42 is also a story of conversion. Many of the Dodgers, some of them from the deep South of the 1940's who were raised with deep prejudice slowly began to respect Jackie as a player, appreciate him as a human being, and grow to care about him as a friend. That is an amazing story of conversion. The same thing was happening to many Americans. There are those who would argue Jackie Robinson may have as much an impact on changing America's ideas about race as did the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr.

It was two Christian men who made this happen — Branch Rickey and Jackie Robinson. Two men of courage and conviction. When Rickey first told Robinson of his plan, and that Robinson must not argue or fight with those who would taunt him, he opened a book published in the 1920s, Giovanni Papini's "Life of Christ," and read Jesus' words: "But whoever shall smite thee on the cheek, turn to him the other also." Robinson knew the Gospel and knew what was required of him. He replied, "I have two cheeks, Mr. Rickey. Is that it?" This meeting between the two Methodists, Rickey and Robinson, ultimately transformed baseball and America itself.

In a recent article in the Wall Street Journal, Chris Lamb wrote the following: It took awhile for Robinson as a young man to understand what that faith in God meant. He was involved in more than one fight, and scrapes with the law, prompted by racial antagonism. Arnold Rampersad, in his 1997 Robinson biography, describes how the teenager was rescued from the streets by the Rev. Karl Downs, the minister of Scott United Methodist Church in Pasadena. Downs became a father figure to Robinson and brought him back into the church. Downs became the channel through which religious faith "finally flowed into Jack's consciousness and was finally accepted there, if on revised terms, as he himself reached manhood," Mr. Rampersad writes, "Faith in God then began to register in him as both a mysterious force, beyond his comprehension, and a pragmatic way to negotiate the world." From that point on, Robinson made a habit of praying beside his bed before going to sleep.

The same articles goes on to say: As influential as Rev. Downs had been, though, no one had a more profound impact on Robinson's life than Branch Rickey, whose religious devotion was such that he didn't attend baseball games on Sundays. During their first meeting, after Rickey had read aloud the passage from Papini's "Life of Christ," he also asked Robinson to read from the section about "nonresistance." Robinson understood what was needed for him to succeed.

After I left the movie, it stayed with me. I thought about the institutional blindness of that age and how ignorant people could be. But that might not be fair. I have to ask myself if I carry prejudice against other people, maybe because of their race, their age, their sexual orientation, their religion, their education, or their economic status. I need to examine my own heart and see where I may be blind to my Brothers and Sisters. It is far easier to watch the movie and cheer 42 than to look into my own heart. The Gospel can be haunting: "What you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you do to me."

May is the Month of the Blessed Mother

The world is resplendent with spring's increased light and new growth. It is Mary's month in the Easter season and all of nature rejoices with the Queen of Heaven at the Resurrection of the Son she was worthy to bear. During the remainder of Easter time, let us endeavor through the prayers of the Holy Liturgy and the Holy Rosary to deepen our gratitude for the mystery of our Baptismal rebirth in Christ.

"The month of May, with its profusion of blooms was adopted by the Church in the 18th century as a celebration of the flowering of Mary's maidenly spirituality...With its origins in Isaiah's prophecy of the Virgin Birth of the Messiah under the figure of the Blossoming Rod or Root of Jesse, the flower symbolism of Mary was extended by the Church Fathers, and in the liturgy, by applying to her the flower of the Sapiential Books-Canticles, Wisdom, Proverbs and Sirach.

"In the medieval period, the rose was adopted as the flower symbol of the Virgin Birth, as expressed in Dante's phrase, 'The Rose wherein the Divine Word was made flesh,' and depicted in the central rose windows of the great gothic cathedrals from which came the Christmas carol, "Lo, How a Rose 'Ere Blooming." Also in the medieval period, when monasteries were the centers of horticultural and agricultural knowledge, and with the spread of the Franciscan love of nature, the actual flowers themselves, of the field, waysides and gardens, came to be seen as symbols of Mary..."

CARDINAL O'MALLEY'S ADDRESS AT THE BOSTON MARATHON INTERFAITH MEMORIAL

Excerpts from Cardinal O'Malley's address:

"This years Patriots Day celebrations were marred by an act of senseless violence that has caused us all great shock and pain. It made us realize the horror of the September 11th terrorist attacks and is a stark reminder of the darkness that can lurk in the human heart and produce such evil. And yet, the same tragedy brought us together as a community like nothing else ever could. The generous and courageous response of so many assures us that there resides in people's hearts a goodness that is incredibly selfless. We saw that when summoned by great events we can be remarkably committed to the well-being of others, even total strangers. We became a stronger people, a more courageous people, and a more noble people. The police, emergency workers and even bystanders and passers-by did not hesitate to put themselves in harm's way to help the injured and the frightened.

This Patriots' Day shakes us out of our complacency and indifference and calls us to focus on the task of building a civilization that is based on love, justice, truth and service. We do not want to risk losing the legacy of those first patriots who were willing to lay down their lives for the common good. We must overcome the culture of death by promoting a culture of life, a profound respect for each and every human being made in the image and likeness of God and we must cultivate a desire to give our lives in the service of others.

In the face of the present tragedy, we must ask ourselves what kind of community do we want to be; what are the ideals that we want to pass on to the next generation. It cannot be violence, hatred and fear. The Jewish people speak of *Tikkun Olam*, "repairing the world." God has entrusted us with precisely that task, to repair our broken world. We cannot do it as a collection of individuals; we can only do it together, as community and family. Like every tragedy, Monday's events are a challenge and an opportunity for us to work together with a renewed spirit of determination and solidarity and with the firm conviction that love is stronger than death."

The Respect Life Committee sends their prayers to the people of Boston, to the families that have lost loved ones, to the families that will gather to help their injured, to all those that responded to the tragedy of that day. And may humanity never again be sacrificed for ideology.

IN TIMES OF TROUBLE...

The terrorist attack at the Boston Marathon left us shaken again as a nation. The deaths, the terrible injuries, the devastation on the faces of the people, the bravery and skill of the rescue workers brought me back to the terrible, sunny Tuesday of September 11, 2001. I am not sure what we can say about such evil as we witnessed on April 15th in Boston. Without diminishing in any way the horror of this reality, I wonder what we learn from this tragedy. It is an obvious conclusion that wicked people exist in our world and have not the slightest hesitation in inflicting suffering to others. We also know that there are people of grace - ordinary citizens, doctors, nurses, EMTs, police and firefighters and so many others who sought in some way to assist the wounded. We can also be sure that family and friends rallied around those in pain and sought to bring comfort. As much as there is evil in the world, there is far more goodness.

The four people who died in Boston were young, ages 8, 23, 26 and 28. On that April morning, none of them thought it would be their last day on earth. I think of Matthew 24:42: "Therefore be on the alert, for you do not know which day your Lord is coming." None of us know what will be our last day or hour on earth, and should seek to live being prepared to go home to God.

Perhaps even more importantly thank thinking about death, I think the lesion of Boston, of September 11th or any sudden death, is how fragile life is. Do we have any unfinished business in life? Is there someone with whom we need reconciliation? Did I leave the house today angry at someone, or perhaps fail to give a kiss goodbye? Were my last words to someone I love harsh and cold? If I knew that a certain day was to be my last, what would I do on that day? With whom would I want to speak?

I remember after September 11th trying to live by those words by trying to leave no one with bad feelings in my heart. Life was too precious to waste squabbling and being resentful. I succeeded for a few days, but quickly found myself going back to my old ways and failing to live in the present with an attitude always seeking peace. It is very difficult to live a life of grace, gratitude and generosity and very easy to slip into selfishness. It is sad that only a terrible tragedy or a sudden loss of someone close awakens this in me again.

There are no easy or comforting thoughts about the Boston bombings. But if you can live a day, a week, a month with greater appreciation of your own life and the lives of those that God places around you, a blessing of light will come forth from a day of darkness. - Father Pat
