Letter from the Pastor

Our Lady of Perpetual Help: June 27 is the Feast Day of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. Her image is located in Church's prayer space, between the statues of St. Martin of Tours and the Holy Family. The following is how the icon became part of the history of the Redemptorists and St. Martin's.

Religious Orders are often associated with certain images that come to mind when we hear their name. When we think of the Jesuits, we think of highly educated priests who conduct excellent high schools and colleges. They are known as great teachers (our Holy Father Pope Francis is a Jesuit). When we hear the name Franciscans, we think of brown habits, St. Francis of Assisi and his love of animals, and bread lines to feed the poor. The Dominicans in their white habits, are famous as preachers and promoters of the rosary. How about the Redemptorists, the order that serves St. Martin of Tours Parish? I am sure you have your own impressions of our Congregation, but one quality we are well-known for is our love of the Blessed Mother, especially under the title of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. I would say there is not a Redemptorist Church or monastery that you visit in any one of the seventy-seven countries where we serve that would not have an image of the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. When a Redemptorist leads a mission or a retreat, he almost always refers to this reference.

The history of the icon is very interesting. We first hear of it in the 14th century on the Island of Crete where it was at the home of a wealthy merchant. The legend is the merchant stole the image from a Church because it was a picture that had been associated with miracles. The story continues that eventually the Blessed Mother appeared to the youngest child in the family, a little girl. Our Lady told her that she wanted this icon brought to Rome and placed in a church that was between the two great Basilicas of St John Lateran and St. Mary Major. The merchant ignored the plea from his young daughter until the family suffered a series of misfortunes and the thief decided to follow the wishes of the Blessed Mother that had been revealed to his daughter.

So the icon was brought to the Church of St. Matthew's in Rome since it was a church that was between the two great Basilicas as had been requested by the Mother of God. Here it became a very beloved icon and people prayed before it, found great comfort with it, and felt the power of the Blessed Mother in their lives. In 1798, Napoleon's armies marched through Rome and captured the city. The conquerors thought there were too many churches in the city and ordered thirty churches burned. One of the churches to be destroyed was the Church of St. Matthew's. Before the Church was burned, the Augustinians who were in charge of the Church, rescued several precious items and brought the icon across the Tiber River to the Church of St. Mary's.

It seems that over time and perhaps because there are so many precious statues and paintings in Rome, the icon became forgotten. It ended up in the sacristy of the Church and its sacred history was forgotten, except for one old Augustinian named Brother Augustine. Brother was in charge of the sacristy and the altar boys, and whenever they were getting ready for Mass, he would point to the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help and tell the boys that this was a very special painting with a glorious history. I suspect the half-asleep servers probably did not pay much attention to the old religious. One of Brother Augustine's altar boys was a young boy named Michael Marchi (more about him later). So our famous miraculous picture was in a small sacristy, abandoned and unremembered.

The Redemptorists were founded in 1732 by Alphonsus Liguori in a little town named Scala outside the city of Naples. The order grew slowly and steadily, and by the 1850's had expanded to Western Europe and the United States. The Holy Father at the time, Pope Pius IX, ordered the Redemptorist to establish a motherhouse in Rome since all the large orders of the Church were expected to do so. Ironically our founder St. Alphonsus told us to stay out of Rome because he thought we would get in trouble there, but we had to follow the wishes of the Pope. So the Redemptorists bought a large piece of property on a street named the Via Merulana and built our headquarters. We are still there to this very day and I have stayed there many times.

As is true for any family or group that buys a piece of property to build a home, you begin to wonder about the history of the property and who lived there before you. Records were not as detailed as they are today and the Redemptorists could not find out much information about who had preceded them on this street. There was a persistent rumor that there once had been a church with a famous icon of the Blessed Mother there, but no one knew where it was or what it looked like. The priests and brothers would often find themselves talking about this when they gathered for recreation. One day a young priest newlyly ordained, listened to the conversations and suddenly spoke up, *I know exactly where the icon is.* It was Father Michael Marchi who spoke. Brother Augustine's altar boy had grown up to become a Redemptorist. Over time the Redemptorists discovered the history of the painting and the Blessed Mother's wish that it be placed between the two Basilicas, a wish she had named to the young daughter of the merchant many years before.

In 1866, the Redemptorists met with Pope Pius IX and told the Holy Father the story of the icon. After he heard the account, he decided to give the image to the Redemptorists and have her placed in the Church of St. Alphonsus, the church built on what had once been the site of St. Matthew's. As he gave the image to the Redemptorists, he said three words, "*Make her known!*" From that moment on, Redemptorists have sought to follow the Holy Father's directive. Without getting too braggadocios, I would say we have been doing that very well since the icon is perhaps the most well known icon of the Blessed Mother in the world and is present in countless churches and homes everywhere. Under the title of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Mary has brought many blessings to God's people and to the Redemptorists. When the Redemptorist Order came to St. Martin's twenty-six years ago, we brought our Mother to our new home in Bethpage.

Next week I will provide an explanation of what the icon means. May we all be blessed through the intercession of Our Lady of Perpetual Help!


Prayer to Our Lady of Perpetual Help

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

In 1634 a mix of Catholic and Protestant settlers arrived in Southern Maryland from England aboard the ARK and the DOVE. They had come at the invitation of the Catholic Lord Baltimore, who had been granted the land by the Protestant King Charles I of England. While Catholics and Protestants were killing each other in Europe, Lord Baltimore imagined Maryland as a society where people of different faiths could live together peacefully. This vision was soon codified in Maryland's 1649 Act Concerning Religion (also called the *"Toleration Act")* which was always the first law in our nation's history to protect an individual's right to freedom of conscience.

Maryland's early history teaches us that, like any freedom, RELIGIOUS LIBERTY REQUIRES CON-STANT VIGILANCE AND PROTECTION, OR IT WILL DISAPPEAR. Maryland's experiment in religious toleration ended within a few decades. The colony was placed under royal control and the Church of England became the established religion. Discriminatory laws, including the loss of political rights, were enacted against those who refused to conform. Catholic chapels were closed and Catholics were restricted to practicing their faith in their homes. The Catholic community lived under this coercion until the American Revolution.

By the end of the 18th century our nation's founders embraced FREEDOM OF RELIGION as an ESSEN-TIAL CONDITION OF A FREE AND DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY. Soon the BILL OF RIGHTS was ratified and RELIGIOUS FREEDOM HAD THE DISTINCTION OF BEING THE FIRST AMENDMENT. RELIGIOUS FREEDOM IS INDEED THE FIRST LIBERTY!

This is our American heritage, our most cherished freedom. IF WE ARE NOT FREE IN OUR CON-SCIENCE AND OUR PRACTICE OF RELIGION, ALL OTHER FREEDOMS ARE FRAGILE. If our OBLIGATIONS AND DUTIES TO GOD ARE IMPEDED, OR EVEN WORSE, CONTRADICTED BY THE GOVERNMENT, THEN WE CAN NO LONGER CLAIM TO BE A LAND OF THE FREE! IS OUR MOST CHERISHED FREEDOM TRULY UNDER THREAT?

An Update on the Possible Capital Campaign

On the weekend of June 8th and 9th, I spoke briefly at all Masses after communion about the feasibility study that Lynch Development Associates conducted in our parish during the month of May. (I missed the 10:00 a.m. by misreading my watch!) Lynch provided the executive summary which was printed in last week's bulletin. So what is the next step for our parish?

Since the study revealed strong support in terms of a love for the parish, a high regard for the clergy, and a strong willingness to support the case study of needs that were presented to them, I have written to Bishop Murphy asking him to allow our parish to conduct a capital campaign over three years to provide funds to care for and maintain our property and buildings. A copy of the feasibility study was enclosed with the letter. I have a strong hope that the Bishop will approve this request.

After consulting rather extensively with the Pastoral Council, the Finance Council, the Stewardship Committee and the clergy, we have decided to retain Lynch Development Associates to guide our campaign pending the Bishop's approval to move forward. The campaign is seeking to raise 1.5 million dollars.

Upon approval, Lynch Development will work with me and other parishioners in organizing the campaign. We will need volunteers to serve on various committees. It is my hope to begin the first phase and have it completed by Advent. Since it would be a three year campaign, people would have three years to complete their pledges.

As I read Lynch's positive report, it gave me great confidence to move forward. Over the past two years since I have arrived here, I found you to be people who love your parish and who are very generous in support of St. Martin of Tours as it moves into the future.
