Letter from the Pastor

Welcome St. Monica

Through most of my 38 years as a priest, in particular over the past 25 or so, one of the very difficult pastoral issues that many face is that their adult children do not actively participate in the Catholic faith in which they were raised. In the many retreats, missions and conversations I have had with parents, this is a concern that surfaces regularly. As I listen to the parents express their feelings, I hear a variety of emotions: anger, confusion, guilt, sadness and worry. Some of their family members go to Mass for Christmas and Easter and others do not go at all; some choose to marry in the Catholic Church and others do not; and some have their children baptized and other do not.

The parents often say something like, "I don't understand what happened. We took our kids to Mass every Sunday. We sent them to Catholic school or to religious education every week. Should we have done something differently?" The first counsel I give parents is to not take on the burden of guilt. You did the best you could raising your children and seeking to pass on the Catholic faith to them. They are now adults and responsible for their lives. Certainly, it is very appropriate to feel sadness and disappointment that some of our adult children may not practice their faith since we love our faith, it brings us joy and comfort, and we want our own children to have this same gift. Yet, please do not blame yourself: that is not fair to you.

I also encourage parents not to go to war over the practice of the faith. It is important not to let the non-practice of religion become a wedge between you and your adult children. They are your sons and daughters and you love them very much. I certainly encourage you to invite them to Mass and other events at the Church, but I found strong pressuring is often counter-productive.

Why they don't go to church is a very complex question. I would first point to the fact that our culture has grown increasingly secular. I often say we have been hit with a wave of secularization. What we take in from the movies, the internet, the music, and society in general is that religion is not very important. We rarely see people with religious values shown in television shows. In some ways, I think our modern society is almost seeking to make the practice of faith irrelevant. I think young parents today are very busy. Since both parents almost always have to work out of necessity (to pay property taxes and so forth), they come home, help with the homework, go to soccer practice or dance class, eat a bit, watch a little television and go to bed. I am not excusing them since I know many of you raised six and seven children and still made your faith a central part of your lives. But, this sense of busyness seems to be part of today's world. Also, the Church must look at itself; it has not always been a witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ. The terrible sex abuse scandal has caused some to turn away from the Church. Others find some of our teachings very difficult to accept. And, I would say, that some people do not go to church because they are simply lazy and do not want to give up any part of their Sunday to God.

I know parents worry that their son or daughter may face the danger of losing their souls. Certainly, our eternal salvation is a great concern for each one of us since we will all one day stand before God. I do believe God calls us to worship him regularly. Still, I also know that Jesus was so often forgiving sinners and speaking of the mercy of God that I have great hope in the mercy and love of God for sinners. Only God can read hearts and judge a human being and I believe he is both a just and gentle judge.

When parents speak to me about their adult children not going to Mass, I often ask them if their son or daughter is a good person. They will almost always say Yes. Oh, Father, he is a wonderful son or she is a great daughter; He or she is a great parent and they are so very good to me. They are really good people. What that says to me is that you raised them well and gave them very good values. They often re-discover

their faith at certain times: an illness or death in the family, a tragedy such as September 11, 2001, the birth of a child, or seek God at Christmas, Easter or Ash Wednesday. They may not practice their religion every Sunday, but they have seeds of faith within them. Perhaps, they pray more often than we know. We entrust them to the loving arms of God.

I have purchased a painting of St. Monica, and I am going to place this image in the prayer area of our church as a visible symbol of our prayers for our children who have drifted from the practice of their faith. She is the patron of parents who pray for the return of their children to the faith. Truthfully, I believe many of our children have faith, but our prayer is that they will be part of a faith community and worship God. Monica prayed for many years that her son, Augustine, would become a believer in Jesus. Her prayers were eventually heard and he went on to become one of the greatest saints of the Catholic Church. We pray to St. Monica, not demanding a visible result, but in faith, knowing that all prayers are answered in God's own time and ways. St. Monica, we turn to you and pray that you bring our prayers to Jesus for our children or grandchildren who are struggling to believe and to be part of a community that follows Jesus.

Here is some information about St. Monica: (taken from the Franciscan website: (Americancatholic.org) The circumstances of St. Monica's life could have made her a nagging wife, a bitter daughter-in-law and a despairing parent, yet she did not give way to any of these temptations. Although she was a Christian, her parents gave her in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, who lived in her hometown of Tagaste in North Africa. Patricius had some redeeming features, but he had a violent temper and was licentious. Monica also had to bear with a cantankerous mother-in-law who lived in her home. Patricius criticized his wife because of her charity and piety, but always respected her. Monica's prayers and example finally won her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. Her husband died in 371, one year after his baptism.

Monica had at least three children who survived infancy. The oldest, Augustine (August 28), is the most famous. At the time of his father's death, Augustine was 17 and a rhetoric student in Carthage. Monica was distressed to learn that her son had accepted the Manichean heresy (all flesh is evil), and was living an immoral life. For a while, she refused to let him eat or sleep in her house. Then one night she had a vision that assured her Augustine would return to the faith. From that time on, she stayed close to her son, praying and fasting for him. In fact, she often stayed much closer than Augustine wanted.

When he was 29, Augustine decided to go to Rome to teach rhetoric. Monica was determined to go along. One night he told his mother that he was going to the dock to say goodbye to a friend. Instead, he set sail for Rome. Monica was heartbroken when she learned of Augustine's trick, but she still followed him. She arrived in Rome only to find that he had left for Milan. Although travel was difficult, Monica pursued him to Milan. In Milan, Augustine came under the influence of the bishop, St. Ambrose, who also became Monica's spiritual director. She accepted his advice in everything and had the humility to give up some practices that had become second nature to her (see Quote, below). Monica became a leader of the devout women in Milan as she had been in Tagaste.

She continued her prayers for Augustine during his years of instruction. At Easter, 387, St. Ambrose baptized Augustine and several of his friends. Soon after his party left for Africa. Although no one else was aware of it, Monica knew her life was near the end. She told Augustine, "Son, nothing in this world now affords me delight. I do not know what there is now left for me to do or why I am still here, all my hopes in this world being now fulfilled." She became ill shortly after and suffered severely for nine days before her death. Almost all we know about St. Monica is in the writings of St. Augustine, especially his *Confessions*.

St. Augustine of Hippo, whose feast day is August 28th along with St. Thomas Aquinas, is considered one of the greatest minds the Catholic faith has ever produced. Here are some of his prayers.

St. Augustine on Prayer: "Our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee, O God!"

According to St. Augustine, we need not pray for what we need because God already knows before we even ask. Instead we ought to pray, he suggests, to increase our desire for God, and so that we might be able to receive what He is preparing to give us. No matter what our attitude is toward the baby, he or she is an awesome gift full of worth and value from God. He cared so much, he was there with you before you were even born.

Each person in our society has value and worth. They are loved by God and should be protected and cherished. Whether it is the ELDERLY, the UNBORN, or the HANDICAPPED, we should STAND UP IN ONE VOICE TO DECLARE THE DIGNITY AND SANCTITY OF THEIR LIVES.


