Letter from the Pastor



I am sure that you have read recently some quotes from a lengthy interview that Pope Francis gave recently to a Jesuit group of magazines. Having read the entire interview, I found myself very excited and joyful about the vision that the Pope has for the church, moved by his love of God's people, and inspired by his deep spirituality. I believe that the Holy Spirit is moving powerfully through Pope Francis. Like many Catholics and non-Catholics, I continue to be drawn to this Pope. Still I do recognize that there are some Catholics

who may wonder if he is somehow weakening important church teachings. New leadership can create both excitement for many and anxiety for some. I think if one reads the entire interview, he or she will find that the Pope is certainly a man of the Church who is most faithful to the teachings of Christ. He may stress certain aspects of our beliefs over others, but he is certainly committed to all of the teachings of our faith. I would recommend that you read the interview in its entirety. Here are some excerpts from this remarkable interview which are some of my favorite sections. Again, it is always best to read the entire talk to get the full context.

Question: Who Is Jorge Mario Bergoglio? (The given name of the Pope)

The Pope: "I do not know what might be the most fitting description.... I am a sinner. This is the most accurate definition. It is not a figure of speech, a literary genre. I am a sinner. Yes, but the best summary, the one that comes more from the inside and I feel most true is this: I am a sinner whom the Lord has looked upon. "I am a sinner, but I trust in the infinite mercy and patience of our Lord Jesus Christ, and I accept in a spirit of penance."

Question: Why did you choose to be a Jesuit?

The Pope: "And then a thing that is really important for me: community. I was always looking for a community. I did not see myself as a priest on my own. I need a community. And you can tell this by the fact that I am here in Santa Marta. At the time of the conclave I lived in Room 207. (The rooms were assigned by drawing lots.) This room where we are now was a guest room. I chose to live here, in Room 201, because when I took possession of the papal apartment, inside myself I distinctly heard a 'no.' The papal apartment in the Apostolic Palace is not luxurious. It is old, tastefully decorated and large, but not luxurious. But in the end it is like an inverted funnel. It is big and spacious, but the entrance is really tight. People can come only in dribs and drabs, and I cannot live without people. I need to live my life with others."

Question: What does it mean for you to think with the Church?

The Pope: We should not even think, therefore, that 'thinking with the church' means only thinking with the hierarchy of the church. "This is how it is with Mary: If you want to know who she is, you ask theologians; if you want to know how to love her, you have to ask the people. In turn, Mary loved Jesus with the heart of the people, as we read in the Magnificat. We should not even think, therefore, that 'thinking with the church' means only thinking with the hierarchy of the church."

Question: What is your vision of the Church?

The Pope: The church needs most today is the ability to heal wounds and to warm the hearts of the faithful; it needs nearness, proximity. I see the church as a field hospital after battle. "I see clearly," the pope continues, "that the thing the church needs most today is the ability to heal wounds and to warm the hearts of the faithful; it needs nearness, proximity. It is useless to ask a seriously injured person if he has high cholesterol and about the level of his blood sugars! You have to heal his wounds. Then we can talk about everything else. Heal the wounds, heal the wounds.... And you have to start from the ground up.

"The church sometimes has locked itself up in small things, in small-minded rules. The most important thing is the first proclamation: Jesus Christ has saved you. And the ministers of the church must be ministers of mercy above all.

Question: I mention the divorced and remarried, same-sex couples and other difficult situations. What kind of pastoral work can we do in these cases?

The Pope: The confessional is not a torture chamber, but the place in which the Lord's mercy motivates us to do better. I also consider the situation of a woman with a failed marriage in her past and who also had an abortion. Then this woman remarries, and she is now happy and has five children. That abortion in her past weighs heavily on her conscience and she sincerely regrets it. She would like to move forward in her Christian life.

The Pope: "We need to proclaim the Gospel on every street corner," the pope says, "preaching the good news of the kingdom and healing, even with our preaching, every kind of disease and wound. In Buenos Aires I used to receive letters from homosexual persons who are 'socially wounded' because they tell me that they feel like the church has always condemned them. But the church does not want to do this. During the return flight from Rio de Janeiro I said that if a homosexual person is of good will and is in search of God, I am no one to judge. By saying this, I said what the catechism says. Religion has the right to express its opinion in the service of the people, but God in creation has set us free: it is not possible to interfere spiritually in the life of a person.

A person once asked me, in a provocative manner, if I approved of homosexuality. I replied with another question: 'Tell me: when God looks at a gay person, does he endorse the existence of this person with love, or reject and condemn this person?

The Pope: We cannot insist only on issues related to abortion, gay marriage and the use of contraceptive methods. This is not possible. I have not spoken much about these things, and I was reprimanded for that. But when we speak about these issues, we have to talk about them in a context. The teaching of the church, for that matter, is clear and I am a son of the church, but it is not necessary to talk about these issues all the time. (Editorial comment: lest anyone think the Pope is weakening the teaching of the church on abortion, the Pope recently urged Catholics not to be involved in abortions of any kind.)

Question: What is your preferred way to pray?

The Pope: "I pray the breviary every morning. I like to pray with the psalms. Then, later, I celebrate Mass. I pray the Rosary. What I really prefer is adoration in the evening, even when I get distracted and think of other things, or even fall asleep praying. In the evening then, between seven and eight o'clock, I stay in front of the Blessed Sacrament for an hour in adoration. But I pray mentally even when I am waiting at the dentist or at other times of the day."

"Prayer for me is always a prayer full of memory, of recollection, even the memory of my own history or what the Lord has done in his church or in a particular parish."

Let us pray for our Holy Father Pope Francis as he leads the Church forward. May we all seek to have his heart that loves the poor and seeks to address their needs; may we mirror his deep love of Christ and inviting others to share in the Good News that Jesus has given us; may we imitate him in his commitment to prayer and service to the Church.

RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE LIFE MATTERS: DOCTOR ASSISTED DEATH BY SUICIDE

A central facet of traditional medical ethics has been embodied in the phrase "FIRST, DO NO HARM." Specifically, the original HIPPOCRATIC OATH recited by physicians for millennia; ensured that they WOULD GIVE NO DEADLY DRUG, even if ASKED. Sadly, few medical school graduates are still being asked to recite this oath. Instead, the door has been thrown open for some doctors to PARTICIPATE IN, and even PROMOTE, giving deadly drups with the direct intent to END human life For such doctors, the timed-honored principle of avoiding harm has been cast aside as they become willing accomplices for killing their patients.

The truth is that we are not isolated, self-sufficient individuals. Every human being is part of a huge network of interdependent relationships with others. How physicians respond to the patient's request for lethal drugs can have a profound effect on a patient's choices as well as on his view of himself and his inherent worth. When a patient says, "I want to die," it may simply mean, "I feel worthless."

Today promoters of assisted suicide have succeeded in spreading ASSISTED SUICIDE to WASHING-TON STATE and they continue to push for legislation in numerous other states. Using seductive euphemisms for situational killing, including DEATH WITH DIGNITY, CHOICE IN DYING, and AID-IN-DYING, they deliberately distort end-of-life care and options while fanning flames of FEAR and INTRACTABLE SUFFERING AT DEATH. They claim to advocate for patients and cite numerous so-called SAFEGUARDS.

In reality the assisted suicide laws in **OREGON and WASHINGTON** are severely flawed and really don't provide protections for patients. **For example, the law does not require that the patient have unbearable pain or any suffering, for that matter.** The state's Medicaid health plan will no long pay for many important services and drugs, including some pain medications. At the same time, assisted suicide is fully covered and sanctioned by the state of Oregon. (funded by collective tax dollars).

To concur with the intention of another person to commit suicide and to help in carrying through SO-CALLED ASSISTED SUICIDE means to COOPERATE IN, and at times to be the ACTUAL PERPETRATOR OF, an injustice. This can never be excused, even if it is requested. Moreover, the act of EUTHANASIA appears all the more perverse if it is carried out by those, like relatives, who are supposed to treat a family member with patience and love, or by those such as doctors, who by virtue of their specific profession are supposed to care for the sick person even in the most painful terminal stages.

Some Reports and Necessary Repairs

Once again, we are having serious concerns about our tabernacle. As I wrote previously, the tabernacle is quite old, one that is very hard and expensive to repair when the locking mechanism breaks down, something which is happening more and more frequently. As you know, in the not too recent past, we had the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle when it became unable to be opened. The tabernacle, along with the Sacred Eucharist, had to be sent out to Kansas City for repair. I love the parish tabernacle and I am most reluctant to give up on it. However, as pastor, I have a most serious responsibility to care for the Eucharist in a way that is both reverent and safe.

I am optimistic that we have found a potential solution. John Reilly, who has a solid reputation with our parish in terms of our past dealings with him, as well as with other parishes, can put a new door on the tabernacle. The ornate door that is presently on the tabernacle will remain but it will no longer be used. A simple brass door will become the main door that can be opened and shut with a lock. While the front door of our tabernacle may no longer be as beautiful as it once was, I think the tabernacle will continue to look very good. This project will cost around \$1,000.00 which will come from our operating budget. I hope this work will be done by Christmas. I thank all of you for your ongoing patience.

The rectory needs a new roof. At first we thought that the roof could be done with patching and area repairs, but we now are convinced the best stewardship is to replace it. We will use the same company that did the church roof since we were pleased with their work. This project will cost \$16,000.00 which I hope we can gather from our operating expenses. If not, we may have to use some of our savings. I am not sure exactly when this project will begin but I hope it will be done in the coming weeks since we are getting water damage in the rectory.

I deliberately chose a picture of three men gossiping since I believe that men gossip at least as much as women are accused of doing. Spreading gossip, while never a good thing to do, is hard to resist. However, it can

often cause hurt and damage to people's reputations and cause division within a family, a business, or in our case, a parish. I am not addressing gossip here, but a completely fabricated falsehood. I found preaching at all the Masses last weekend about our capital campaign a good experience since many people thanked me for the talks and for seeking to be honest with them.

The next day I was told that there is at least one person telling other people that I intend to take down the *Living Tree* in the Gathering Space that memorializes the donors contributions from the campaign to renovate the Church. I was both stunned and hurt to hear that someone was saying something that was absolutely false and potentially dangerous to what I consider a very positive relationship that I share with most parishioners. No such idea has ever been considered, discussed or as far as I know, even thought about at any meeting in which I have been present. I have the deepest respect for memorials, especially those that honor the parents and grandparents of our parishioners. I ask whoever is saying this to please stop since you are not correct.

I am beginning to consider what would be an appropriate new memorial to recognize what we are doing in our present campaign of *Paving the Way for Christ*. I like the idea of tiles that donors could use to name themselves, their family, or a deceased loved one. Some parishioners have mentioned bricks to me; I have a brick for my Dad at Citifield and I find the idea attractive but they can be a bit more costly than tiles, and quite frankly, I am not sure where we would put them. I do not know where we will put a memorial, but my initial preference is that it be either in one of the gathering spaces, or outside of the Church. For me, this is a sign that we are part of the living stones of our Church. I will be doing further consultation with parishioners and welcome any ideas you may have.

If any one has any questions or concerns about the Capital Campaign, or any other matter of our parish life, please either email, call me, or come see me. Very often when people call me, they say *Father I don't want to bother you, I know you are busy*. I am busy but, I would be convinced, not as busy as most of you are, and I see being with people one on one as one of my most important ministries.
