Letter from the Pastor

A Disturbing Gospel

Jesus said to the Pharisees: "There was a rich man who dressed in purple garments and fine linen and dined sumptuously each day. And lying at his door was a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who would gladly have eaten his fill of the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even used to come and lick his sores. When the poor man died, he was carried away by angels to the bosom of Abraham. The rich man also died and was buried, and from the netherworld, where he was in torment, he raised his eyes and saw Abraham far off and Lazarus at his side. And he cried out, 'Father Abraham, have pity on me. Send Lazarus to dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue, for I am suffering torment in these flames.' Abraham replied, 'My child, remember that you received what was good during your lifetime while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented. Moreover, between us and you a great chasm is established to prevent anyone from crossing who might wish to go from our side to yours or from your side to ours.' He said, 'Then I beg you, father, send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, so that he may warn them, lest they too come to this place of torment.' But Abraham replied, 'They have Moses and the prophets. Let them listen to them.' He said, 'If they will not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded if someone should rise from the dead." Gospel Luke 16:19-31

As I reflect on my trip to the Holy Land this past June, I have a thousand precious memories. When I remember saying Mass in the tomb where our Lord Jesus lay for three days, and then was raised from the dead by his Father, I am moved to awe. When I think of being in the dark pit where Christ was held captive the night before he died, sorrow fills my heart. As I recall my clumsy struggle to get into the muddy Dead Sea and float, I laugh how I quickly lost one of my water crocs that now lie in the Dead Sea. I also have a certain memory that haunts me: as I was getting on our very nice air-conditioned bus that would take us to a delicious lunch, I found myself approached by a young Palestinian boy, perhaps, seven or eight years old, who was begging for money. I looked at him in his ragged clothes and reached into my pocket to pull out a dollar bill. As I did this and started to hand him the dollar, seven or eight children came upon me reaching and grapping for that same dollar, begging me to give them each one. I felt helpless since I knew I could not give a dollar to every poor Palestinian child. I felt sad at the reality of poverty in our world, and perhaps most of all, I felt guilty for being able to travel, to have spending money, fruitful work, good health care, plenty of good food, and a comfortable place to sleep. It is not the first time I have had that feeling, nor will it be the last. I feel this way when I see a homeless person sleeping on a grate on a cold winter's night, or a person holding out a can begging for money on a street, or when I see children who have nothing at Christmas. I feel guilty and quickly try to focus my attention on something else.

Today's Gospel raises the question: how do we live in a world that is filled with poverty and hunger, and what can I do about it? I, like you, have been faced with this nagging question all my life. I tell myself that I am not rich. I live a kind of ordinary, relatively simply life. I have never flown in a private jet, eaten a Kobe steak, drank Don Pérignon champagne, or sailed around the world on the QE II. Still, I know I have a life-style better than more than 90% of the world.

Hearing it said that the poor should work harder or that they are lazy, that the government has spoiled people and made them dependent on welfare and food stamps, doesn't satisfy the nagging feeling that this Gospel leaves me with as I see Lazarus, in the form of the poor, standing at my gate. Nor does it console me to say, "Well, I have worked hard to get where I am. Nobody did anything for me to help me. I deserve what I have."

I know there are deep rooted causes of poverty and I can theorize with the best of the pundits. I can argue that it is the break down of the modern family in our society that is causing poverty, that our educational system is failing many who are in most need of learning, that there are not enough jobs for people, that poor medical and that mental illness can be part of the reality of those most in need of help. I can blame the Democrats or Republicans for their policies, and say they are the cause. I can claim it is the fault of Wall Street, poor immigration policies, and political corruption, and still know that does not relieve me of my responsibility. Lazarus is still at my door.

I believe almost all our political leaders, whatever their party, do want to help the poor. The United States and her people have always been generous in seeking to address people in serious distress. Many approaches have been tried. I think of Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty as a very good movement that was lost in the expenses of the Vietnam War. I think of Social Security as a great safety net for people in need, but a program that is on the road to going broke. I believe the Affordable Health Care Act, popularly known as "Obamacare," is a topic which I wish to avoid discussing with a 1000 foot pole. The goal of this act is to provide all Americans with health care. The Catholic Church has supported such a value for a long time. The problem with this particular approach is that many feel it is unfair, overly costly, and destructive to our present health care system. Who knows? It does seem that there is history of our nation wanting to help the poor and not knowing how. I think of the words of Jesus, *The poor you shall always have with you*. Yes, the poor we shall have always with us, but what does our Lord ask of you and me as we reflect on the poor?

Today's Gospel of the rich man in purple (which was a very expensive color to make in Biblical times is a sobering one. The rich man has a lavish life and when he dies he finds himself in Hades (the Jewish term for hell). His sin is not that he was bad to Lazarus, the poor man who sat outside his door, eating food scraps and having dogs lick his wounds. The rich man's sin was that he never even noticed or saw Lazarus. He was invisible to the rich man.

God does not condemn the rather comfortable but ordinary life that most of us live here in the United States in our parish. Jesus had wealthy friends. Although I may not always agree with the charities that Mayor Michael Bloomberg and Bill Gates, both billionaires, support, I do admire that they seem to care about others and not just keep their personal wealth for themselves. Money in of itself it not evil; it can actually do a great deal of good for people.

I know that we cannot help everyone. If we gave to every charity that asked us for a donation, we would not be able to provide for ourselves or our families. Some of us receive ten appeals in a week for donations and may feel troubled that we cannot meet help them all. I advise you to pick one or two you wish to help, if you are able, and do what you can. You can certainly give food to our food pantry as so many of your generously do and know that it will help those who are in genuine need.

We cannot help every person in our life. We are not social workers, doctors, therapists or philanthropists. Some people do not want help and resist it. There are even family members and friends, who may not be materially poor, but need help, but when we offer it, they may refuse it. We are all limited in what we can do. There may a Lazarus in your family who is sitting at your door. Do you see the person or is he or she invisible? I do believe we must be cautious of the sin of the rich man who does not have an inkling that there is a suffering man outside his door. I think of the great Catholic woman, Dorothy Day who said, *Religion should comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable*. None of us should ever be satisfied with the suffering of the poor. It should bother us and make us think. It should lead us to honestly ask: what can I do to help a particular person, with my own financial and human limitations?

I think the sin the Gospel challenges us of an attitude of not even seeing the needs of the world around us. Although we cannot fix the problems, we can allow it to move us to ask what can I do. To notice, to have our hearts moved and our minds troubled, is an important step on our journey to see how best to live and act with the *Lazaruses* who are at our doors.

RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE October Is Respect Life Month

Our Nation was founded on the principle that ALL people are "endowed by their Creator with certain Unalienable Rights." As the Declaration of Independence explains, these rights are NOT gifts from a civil government, but INHERENT AND GOD-GIVEN components of our humanity. The Constitution proclaims that the very purpose of government is to "secure the blessings" of these liberties for "ourselves and our posterity."

FEDERAL LEGISLATION: The Supreme Court session begins October 7, 2013. Experts say that in this session or the next the Court will hear one or more cases regarding the HHS Contraceptive/Abortificient/Sterilization Mandate and issue a **broad ruling** on the matter. This is because two Circuit Court rulings are in direct conflict: the 10th Circuit said that *Hobby Lobby Stores* are EX-EMPT due to Religious Freedom, while the 3rd Circuit said *Conestog Wood Products* must OBEY the mandate - NO EXCEPTION. *Hobby Lobby* said that IT WILL CLOSE SHOP IF FORCED TO OBEY. The suit against the HHS MANDATE which includes the DIOCESE OF ROCKVILLE CENTRE, has NOT PROGRESSED since December 5, 2012.

Priests for Life suit vs the HHS Mandate was REINSTATED on August 19, 2013 in the US DISTRICT COURT (WASHINGTON DC). The court has not yet ruled on the merits of the suit pending the Mandate's final version. When it came on June 28, 2013, **Priests for Life** said the final version does NOT PROVIDE SUFFICIENT RELIEF, so the court will now hear the case. October: Month of the Holy Rosary

The month of October each year is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary. by Rev. Matthew R. Mauriello | Source: Catholic.net

The month of October each year is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary. This is primarily due to the fact that the liturgical feast of Our Lady of the Rosary is celebrated annually on October 7th. It was instituted to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary in gratitude for the protection that she gives the Church in answer to the praying of the Rosary by the faithful.

The feast was introduced by Pope St. Pius V (1504-1572) in the year 1571 to commemorate the miraculous victory of the Christian forces in the Battle of Lepanto on October 7, 1571. The pope attributed more to the "arms" of the Rosary than the power of cannons and the valor of the soldiers who fought there.

Legend tells us that the Rosary as a form of prayer was given to St. Dominic (1170-1221) by Mary, the Mother of Our Lord, who entrusted it to him as an aid in the conflicts with the Albigensians. The Dominican pope, St. Pius V, did much to further the spread of the Rosary and it thereafter became one of the most popular devotions in Christendom. It was the same Pope St. Pius V, who in 1569 officially approved the Rosary in its present form. It had been completed by the addition of the second half of the "Hail Mary" and the "Glory be to the Father" at the conclusion of each mystery.

Current scholarship traces the development of the Rosary to the High Middle Ages where it came into being in various medieval monasteries as a substitute for the Divine Office for the lay monks and devout lay persons who did not know how to read. Instead of the 150 psalms, they would pray 150 "Our Fathers" counting them on a ring of beads known as the crown or "corona". With the growth of popularity of Marian devotion in the twelfth century, the "Psalter of the Blessed Virgin Mary" developed now substituting 150 "Hail Marys" in place of the "Our Fathers."

The 150 "Hail Marys" were subsequently subdivided into 15 decades by the young Dominican friar, Henry Kalkar (1328-1408), with each decade referring to an event in the life of Jesus and Mary. The Dominican, Ananus de Rupe (1428-1478) further divided the episodes in the history of salvation into the joyful, sorrowful and glorious mysteries.

The Rosary is primarily a scriptural prayer. This can be summarized by the traditional phrase used by Pope Pius XII (papacy: 1939-1958) that the Rosary is " a compendium of the entire Gospel" (AAS 38 [1946] p.419). The Rosary draws its mysteries from the New Testament and is centered on the great events of the Incarnation and Redemption.

Our Holy Father, Pope John Paul II has called the Rosary his favorite prayer, in which we meditate with Mary upon the mysteries which she as a mother meditated on in her heart. (Luke. 2:19) In this month of October, let us consider this beautiful prayer of the Rosary as a means that we too can use in order to draw closer to Jesus and Mary by meditating on the great mysteries of our salvation.
