Letter from the Pastor

Perhaps you can remember the great reaction to the movie *The Exorcist*, based on William Peter Blatty's novel of the same name. It was a movie that frightened many, ridiculed by some, discussed and debated by numerous people, and even led a few to be convinced they needed an exorcism. According to the author, the novel and movie were based on a true story of possession of a young man (not as the Linda Blair character in the movie) that took place in the Washington, D.C. area many years ago. Although I enjoyed the movie and thought it had some wonderful moments of faith in the context of facing evil, I rarely ever speak about the Devil. I suppose I wonder if in our sophisticated scientific age one would find such discussions medieval. I believe in the teaching of the Church that the Devil is real, but I do not think a great deal about him. (Actually the Devil is neither male nor female since Satan is a spirit.)

A few years ago, I was in my office in Brooklyn when a Bishop called me and asked me if I could give him the name of one or two Redemptorists that might be willing to train and be available for exorcisms. At first I thought it was a prank that one of my confreres might be playing on me, but it was not. The Bishop explained that the Church has a few priests whom they call upon, rather rarely, to consider performing an exorcism. This is only done after great study and consultation in order to rule out the possibility that the issue is not really a case of possession, but rather an emotional, physical, or psychological problem, or one of a kind of false hysteria. Only bishops can authorize exorcisms in the Catholic Church. The Bishop on the phone said that they were looking for a man who was very emotionally stable, a man of experience, a man of deep faith with a strong prayer life, and reasonably good health. They would need some training in terms of reading and meeting with an experienced exorcist. The word *stable* ruled me out but I did tell him I would get back to him in a few days with a name or two. I am not sure if the name I suggested agreed or was chosen. I can tell you that most priests would not want any part of this ministry since dealing with Satan in an exorcism can be a physically, emotionally, and spiritually testing to the minister himself.

Although people are fascinated by stories of exorcism, I am not sure we know what to make of such a happening, and we may even wonder if they are true. In our culture, the devil is seen as a name for sports teams, a funny little fellow with horns, pitchfork and a tail. He is a good costume for Halloween. I think most of us do not take the devil too seriously. One might think of Flip Wilson saying, *The Devil made me do it*.

Yet, in the Gospel, we frequently encounter scenes of Jesus encountering the evil one. Lent always beings with the story of Jesus being tempted in the desert. We read of Jesus freeing people from the power of Satan. Many scripture scholars do point out that it would seem that many of the exorcisms in the Gospels were less about driving out Satan and more about healing a mental or physical condition. Yet, it is clear there are moments in the Gospel where Our Lord comes face to face with Satan.

There is a tradition in the Church that after God created the angels, it was revealed to the angels that the second person of the Blessed Trinity would become a man and redeem humanity. It is said that some angels refused to accept a God who become human. Thus, they rejected God and became the fallen angels. The name Lucifer means Light Bearer since he was at one time a beautiful angel of God. It is believed the angels, like us, all had free will and could choose to follow God's plan or reject it.

To be absolutely clear, Satan is inferior to God. God allows him to roam the earth but he is not in any way the equal of the Divine. Satan does not ever force a human being to do evil; he can tempt us, but we always have our free will. We do not live in fear of Satan because Jesus Christ our Redeemer has overcome the power of Hell and saved us from the power of Satan if we but call upon him. Why in those very extremely rare cases, God permits a person to be possessed by the evil one is beyond human explanation. No one really knows why.

It is easy to scoff at Satan and doubt his presence. Still, when I read of some of the great evil that has and continues to occur in the world, I wonder if his fingerprints are there in Auschwitz, Rwanda, child abuse, September 11th and so many more in the litanies of sin in the world.

As I was thinking about these things, I happened to read an interview in *New York Magazine* with Judge Antonio Scalia, one of the Supreme Court Justices. Scalia is considered one of the great intellects on the Court although many reject him for being too conservative in his opinions. He is a devout Catholic with a son a priest. In the middle of the interview that was about his legal opinions, his 26 years on the Court, and his judicial philosophy, Justice Scalia started speaking about the Devil. Here is part of the interview (the questions are in bold print and Scalia's response in ordinary text:

(The Questioner in bold text; Justice Scalia's responses in regular text)

Can we talk about your drafting process—

[Leans in, stage-whispers.] I even believe in the Devil.

You do?

Of course! Yeah, he's a real person. Hey, c'mon, that's standard Catholic doctrine! Every Catholic believes that.

Every Catholic believes this? There's a wide variety of Catholics out there ...

If you are faithful to Catholic dogma, that is certainly a large part of it.

Have you seen evidence of the Devil lately?

You know, it is curious. In the Gospels, the Devil is doing all sorts of things. He's making pigs run off cliffs, he's possessing people and whatnot. And that doesn't happen very much anymore. No. It's because he's smart.

So what's he doing now?

What he's doing now is getting people **not** to believe in him or in God. He's much more successful that way.

Well, you're saying the Devil is persuading people to not believe in God. Couldn't there be other reasons to not believe?

Well, there certainly can be other reasons. But it certainly favors the Devil's desires. I mean, c'mon, that's the explanation for why there's not demonic possession all over the place. That always puzzled me. What happened to the Devil, you know? He used to be all over the place. He used to be all over the New Testament.

Right, what happened to him?

What happened to him? He got wilier.

Isn't it terribly frightening to believe in the Devil?

You're looking at me as though I'm weird. My God! Are you so out of touch with most of America, most of which believes in the Devil? I mean, Jesus Christ believed in the Devil! It's in the Gospels! You travel in circles that are so, so removed from mainstream America that you are appalled that anybody would believe in the Devil! Most of mankind has believed in the Devil, for all of history. Many more intelligent people than you or me have believed in the Devil.

* * * * * * *

Interesting comments from a very bright man! I like that we have our statue of St. Michael in the gathering area. It depicts St. Michael overcoming Satan in a great fight. I love the symbol, but is not really Michael who overcomes evil, but Jesus Christ himself. He took upon himself the sins of the world and sets us free from their power. Although we have a healthy respect for the power of Satan, we do not walk in fear because we have been saved by the Blood of the Lamb. We are the beloved children of God.







DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

When I was little, I remember my mother saying to me, "You don't know what goes on behind closed doors!" It wasn't until I grew up that I truly understood what she meant by those words. Not all families are like those we saw on T.V. like "Father Knows Best" or "The Brady Bunch." What goes on behind some closed doors can be brutal, violent and sometimes lethal. The sad part is in many cases we have no idea what is going on, because it can be a hidden secret by those suffering it. Abuse can be kept silent by its victims.

Domestic violence is a hidden scourge on our families and communities. Those who are victimized often keep it a PRIVATE MATTER for various reasons: fear, shame, well-intended efforts to preserve the family. Aggressors, IF THEY EVEN RECOGNIZE THEIR PROBLEM, are not likely to have it addressed. Yet it touches many and knows no boundaries of RACE, SOCIAL CLASS, ETHNICITY, CREED or AGE (most victims are first abused as teens). Statistics suggest ONE in FOUR WOMEN experience domestic violence in their lifetime, and THREE in FOUR AMERICANS are reported to know a victim, though most episodes are NOT REPORTED TO AURTHORITIES. Although the majority of victims are female, an estimated 15% are males.

Domestic violence and emotional abuse are typically used together in a relationship to CONTROL THE VICTIM. Persons may be MARRIED, LIVING TOGETHER OR DATING. Examples of emotional abuse include NAME-CALLING, PUTDOWNS, RESTRICTING CONTACT WITH FAMILY or FRIENDS, WITHHOLDING MONEY, PREVENTING A PARTNER FROM WORKNG, ACTUAL OR THREATENED PHYSICAL HARM (HITTING, PUSHING, SHOVING), SEXUAL ASSAULT, STALKING and INTIMIDATION.

Some victims of domestic abuse have a tendency to NORMALIZE violent behavior based on experiences in their family of origin, where they struggled with their sense of self-worth, setting boundaries, or emotional dependence. Even though the family of origin was dysfunctional, its unhealthy equilibrium may have been the only thing the person knew. Consequently, some may feel guilty about considering betraying the abuser, or fear they will be judged or further deprived of affection if they disclose or attempt to leave. Characteristics have been there is no TYPICAL ABUSER. In public they may appear FRIENDLY and LOVING to their family, while the VIOLENCE IS HIDDEN FROM VIEW.

If you believe someone you know may be in a TROUBLED SITUATION, you should CALL A HOTLINE NUMBER for assistance, or ENCOURAGE THE PERSON to do so THEM-SELVES. (911, THE LOCAL HOTLINE, or the NATIONAL DOMESTIC VIOLENCE HOTLINE: 1-800 787 3224) Victims can access DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SHELTER.
