## Letter from the Pastor

In the summer of 1994, I had one of the greatest meals of my life at a restaurant named *Margherita's* in a little town outside of Naples named Scala. I was with twelve Redemptorists from all over the United States and Canada. The view from our large table overlooking the Amalfi Coast was spectacular.

The food, ah the food! It had a very thick paste, which I had never had before or since, that I loved. The pasta was followed by meats, fish and vegetables, olives and salad. Good red Italian wine flowed. The meal was topped off with delicious pastries, fruit and cheese, and lemoncello. This was the first time I tasted this after-dinner drink made from fresh lemons from the area. I have since grown fond of it. What a meal of good food and lively conversation among Redemptorists.!

What brought us to this charming restaurant was, in fact, the building. At that very spot on November 9, 1732, St. Alphonsus Liguori, a thirty-six year old priest from the city of Naples along with seven companions, founded the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer - the Redemptorists. I am not sure what it says about our order that our very founding site is now a restaurant, but there is a lovely plaque on the wall of the building noting this important moment.

Today in a different area of the town, there continues to be an active Redemptorist community, as well as a community of contemplative nuns called the Redemptoristines. After we ate our meal, we did a bit of visiting in the area. One of the highlights for me was to see in another building, now broken down, the Redemptorist coat of arms that had been drawn on the wall by one of the companions of Alphonsus. Our coat of arms proclaims: *With Him is Plentiful Redemption*. It is protected by glass, but it was very moving to see these areas that I had heard about since I was a young man.

Today there are more than 5,500 hundred Redemptorists in 77 countries all over the world. We work among the poorest of the poor in Africa and South America with immigrants from many lands. We run retreat houses and shrines including St. Anne de Beaupre in Quebec and Our Lady of Aparacida in Brazil, one of the largest shrines in the world and recently visited by Pope Francis. We give parish retreats and missions, serve in parishes, and write. We have a University School of Moral Theology in Rome. We are famous for our devotion to Our Lady of Perpetual Help. The word Redemptorist is really a nickname for our formal title: The Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer.

The stories of the first days of the Redemptorists were not without the struggles. Of the first seven men who came with Alphonsus to Scala, only one person remained, Brother Vitius Curtius. The others found the life too hard and grew homesick for Naples. Eventually other men did come and join Liguori. Still Alphonsus had trouble raising money and establishing residences for his men so they could live a religious life and go forth and proclaim the Word of God. Over time though, the Congregation started to take root in Naples.

At one point, the Church called Alphonsus to become a Bishop of the Diocese of St. Agatha of the Goths and this new assignment affected his ability to devote himself to his Congregation. At the same time, there was a great deal of political turmoil between the kingdom of Naples and the Vatican. Each felt it had the right to approve religious orders and their rules. St. Alphonsus wanted the Redemptorist rule approved by both Church and the state so his community could live in peace.

In his old age and severely infirm some confreres, perhaps thinking they were doing good, had Alphonsus sign a blank paper that eventually led to the Congregation being split into two divisions. It broke his heart since he did not agree with what had been done. In truth, since the agreement led to certain houses not being part of the official Redemptorists Congregation, St. Alphonsus died in a community that was not officially approved by the Vatican agreement that the confreres had made. It was only in the next century that all this was corrected and the Congregation was unified.

I tell this story not to bog you down in facts, but because as I ponder the beginning of my order, I see lots of struggle, failure and disappointment. I sometimes give a talk that I call a theology of failure since so many great enterprises in the world, and in the Catholic Church, only took root after many years of ups and downs. Moses never saw the promised land. Our Lord Jesus was rejected by many of those to whom he preached the Good News. We are a church of sinners and saints.

God never promises nor does he demand success, but rather he calls us to have trusting hearts and a committed spirit. Failure can overwhelm us but we pray for the grace to pick ourselves up and start again. In the DNA of the Christian is hope. Jesus died on the cross *but* he rose triumphant on the third day.

This year we will conduct these hour-long programs beginning at 7:30PM on the following Wednesdays:



(Vatican II, Constitution on the Liturgy, 112-118)

Our Nation was founded on the principle that all people are ENDOWED BY THEIR CREATOR WITH CERTAIN UNALIENABLE RIGHTS. As the DECLARATION of INDEPENDENCE explains, these rights are NOT GIFTS FROM A CIVIL GOVERNMENT, BUT INHERENT AND GOD-GIVEN COMPONENTS OF OUR HUMANITY. The Constitution proclaims that THE VERY PURPOSE OF GOVERNMENT IS TO SECURE THE BLESSINGS of these liberties for OURSELVES AND POSTERITY.

To the Founders, foremost among these rights was the FREEDOM OF CONSCIENCE - the FREEDOM to HOLD, and LIVE according to, ONE'S RELIGIOUS PRINCIPLES. James Madison deemed this right THE MOST SACRED OF ALL PROPERTY, and wrote PROTECTION FOR RELIGIOUS EXERCISE into our FIRST AMENDMENT. George Washington so respected the rights of religious believers that he RE-FUSED TO FORCE PACIFIST QUAKERS to FIGHT IN HIS ARMY, though he desperately needed men in the fight for independence.

Our Catholic Church defends the same conception of FREEDOM, including in religious matters. Like our nation's founding documents, the Church teaches that GOD gives people their natural rights. And, like our Nation's Founders, the Church views RELIGIOUS FREEDOM FOR ALL PEOPLE...CATHOLICS, PROTESTANTS, JEWS, MUSLIMS, HINDUS, ATHIESTS, AGNOSTICS and EVERYONE ELSE...as an inherent human right! The Church teaches that faith is an act of free will, and therefore all people should be FREE TO LIVE BY THEIR OWN RELIGIOUS VIEWS - even wrong religious views, as long as the just requirements of public order are observed.

Congratulations to all! Our campaign is now over \$1,634,000.00. Our new building committee has had its first meeting to begin planning the steps we now need to address the building concerns that were presented during the campaign. An excellent group of experienced men and women have stepped forward to work on this very important committee. Now that we have the money committed, we want to move forward with the projects. I hope we can begin this coming spring.

I want to assure you that I am committed to transparency in keeping you well-informed about the campaign and building projects. I hope to do this mostly in the bulletin since I think there was some weariness in hearing about it as Masses. The money raised will only be used for the projects that we spoke about: the repair of the school bricks, the school roof, the paving of the parking lot, some updating of 208 Broadway, the food pantry, possible boilers for the school, the bathrooms in St. Alphonsus Hall and the cafeteria, and the renovation of the school auditorium into a gym-like space for the young of the parish. The capital campaign funds are reserved for *only* these needs.

If you see any other projects going on, or any other purchases that we make, they are not being done with funds for the capital campaign, but are from our regular parish operating budget or from specific donations for particular items.

I will write an overall evaluation of the campaign after Christmas. (I think you might need a rest from a long letter about the campaign from me at the present time.) Donations and pledges are still welcome.
