# Letter from the Pastor



The Russian writer Leo Tolstoy wrote a beautiful story about seeing Jesus in the face of the poor. Grace Johnson in her book, *The Candle in the Window*, adapts this story for children and is accompanied by beautiful artwork. It is a book for children of any age. I think it has a great message for Christmas or any other time of the year. I am reading this story (with several further adaptations by me) to the children in our religious education program. The book is available on Amazon.



#### The Candle in the Window



Once upon a time in a little German village named Stille Nacte, there lived a man who owned a store where he repaired people's shoes. His name was Gunther. The village was in the mountains so it was very cold and there was always lots of snow in the winter. The day was December 24, Christmas Eve. Gunther was a very hard working, good man and everyone liked him. But he was also a very sad man. He was sad because many years ago, his wife Hilda and his son Hans died when they were traveling on a train. They were his family and now he felt he had no one in his life. He found the time of Christmas especially difficult because everyone was decorating, singing Christmas carols and going to parties. Gunther's heart was too sad for these celebrations and he hoped that Christmas would pass quickly since he was so lonely. He stopped

putting up any Christmas decorations because they only made him cry when he thought of his family.

Early in the morning, his first customer was a man named Lord Von Schroder. He was a really stuck up man who thought he was the most important person in town. He came into the shoe store and told Gunther, "I want my boots repaired in a few hours since I am going to a party, and I want to dance in them." Gunther complained, "I have too much work already, and it is Christmas Eve." This bossy man just ignored him and left the shop.

A little while later, Gunther had a visit from his cousin Elsie. Elsie always tried to visit Gunther especially at Christmas. She was married and had six children. When she came into the store, she said, "Gunther, why don't you have any decorations up in your shop here? This is also where you live and it should have some Christmas cheer!" Gunther just smiled sadly and said nothing. Elsie had brought Gunther a gift. It was a stuffed toy of a little shepherd boy. She said to Gunther, "The shepherds in the fields were the first to hear the singing of the angels about Jesus our Savior being born. I want you to have this as your Christmas gift." "Thank you, Elsie, and I know you want to make me happy but I am too old and sad for Christmas." Elsie said to him, "Gunther, nobody is too old for Christmas. It is the day that Jesus came to the world to give us life. Where is your Christmas nativity set? You **must** put it up!" Gunther said, "it is somewhere upstairs in this house but I didn't have time to get it." Elsie said, "Gunther, don't you believe in Jesus? That he came into our world because he loved us and wanted us to someday be with him forever?" Gunther said, "I **do** believe it but I still have a very hard time celebrating anything." Elsie gave him a kiss and wished him a Merry Christmas. "I will see you in church tonight. "

Soon after, a young woman came into the shop with two young children. Gunther felt like he knew them but he was not sure who they were. They were very polite and nice but he thought they were a bit different than most other people. They were talking among themselves and looking at the machines in the shop.

Gunther asked, "Do you have shoes to pick up or need something repaired?" They mystified him! "I am Greta," said the young looking woman, "and this is Franz and Carrie. We love to visit people on Christmas Eve." Gunther asked, "Are you looking for money?" He said to them, "I don't have any money to give you; I am very poor."

The three laughed and said, "We do not want money; we are here to place a candle in the window of your shop. We do this all the time on Christmas Eve for sad people. Gunther, where is your Christmas crèche; is it up in the attic?" Greta said, "I will send the children to get it."

Gunther tried to explain politely, "I do not celebrate Christmas anymore," but the children kept decorating the window with holly and putting a candle in it. The shoemaker asked, "why are you putting a candle in my window?" Greta stopped what she was doing and said, "There is a beautiful legend that the Christ Child, who could find no home in Bethlehem other than a stable, walks about the earth on Christmas Eve, and if he sees a candle in the window, he knows that is a home that will welcome Him in for a visit."

Greta then said, "I am going to make you a promise right now - Jesus our Lord and Savior will come and visit you today in this shop. I promise you that with all my heart." Gunther saw that the woman and the young people were very sincere and good. Something about them made him really believe them. He thought what they were saying was true. When they left the store, for the first time in many years, he got very excited and ran to the shop to buy some Christmas cookies and eggnog for Jesus. He came home and started clearing up his shop. He was so excited. The store door opened and it was Lord Van Schroder, who entered demanding, "Where are my boots! I need them to dance!" Gunther said to the Lord, I have someone far more important to see today than you. For all I care, you can dance in your feet. Now go away!" Lord Van Schroder was shocked at this.

A little while later, a very old woman came into the store. She spoke. "I saw the candle in the window and I was so hungry I almost fainted." Gunther told the woman to sit down. He got the woman some cookies and eggnog and she thanked him. She was holding his Christmas crèche. She was looking at Jesus in the manger. She started to cry. "Oh, I love Jesus!" she said. "When I was young I had such a statue but I had to sell it to eat!" Gunther told her, "I think Jesus would want you to have it." "No," she said. "I could not take your Baby Jesus. What would you do for Christmas?" Gunther insisted the woman take it. He gave her a little money he had saved and she said, "This Christ Child was the best gift I ever got!"

Gunther kept looking out the door for Jesus. "When is he coming? Were those three young people playing a trick on me?" The door opened again and it was a man who had no coat. He was shivering from the cold. Gunther asked, "What can I do for you? Did you come to buy shoes?" The man was embarrassed. "No," he said, "I was so cold and when I saw the candle in your window, I thought this might be a warm place where I could stop by." Gunther felt so sad for the man. "I am glad you stopped in. Where is your coat?" "I do not have one," said the poor man. "Well," Gunther said, "I have two coats and one is now yours!" The man insisted no, that he was ashamed to take the coat. Gunther said, "I can only wear one coat at a time and I insist you take the coat!" The man put it on and felt its great fur warmth. He thanked Gunther. Gunther was glad to have helped the poor man, but he was nervous that Jesus might walk by the store thinking that Gunther was too busy. He did not want to miss Jesus when he came into the store.

A little later, a young girl came in the store. She said, "The candle made me want to come in. Gunther said, "Why are you out on the street alone? Where are your mother and father?" "I have had no mother or father for a long time. I live on the streets and try to get food when I can." Gunther's heart broke for the little girl. He gave her cookies and told her to sit by the fire. He called his cousin Elsie to come to the shop. He did not know how to help the girl. The little girl had seen the toy shepherd and was holding it. You could see that she really loved it.

Gunther asked, "What is your name?" She replied, "My name is Maria." She put the shepherd down because she knew it was not hers. "I want you to have that shepherd for Christmas. It is my gift to you." The little girl hugged the shepherd and then Gunther. Now Elsie came to the store and Gunther explained to her about the homeless girl. Elsie said, "I will find out what is going on, but if there is no family, she will become part of my family. It is always good to have one more at the Christmas table." The little girl took Elsie's hand and with the other, she held on to her shepherd.

"What a day! What a strange day!" Gunther thought, "I had those three young people put the candle in the window, then three people who had great needs visited me. I am happy that I could help them but I am so disappointed that Jesus did not come. Maybe he was angry at me for not being happy about Christmas. I am so sad!"

As the day turned to night and he dozed in his chair, the three mystical people came into his shop. It was Carrie, Greta and Franz. Gunther looked at them and said, "Your promise was not true! I waited all day for Jesus to come into my shop, and he never came. You promised me that and now I believe you have made a fool of me!

Greta saw that Gunther had an old Bible on one of his shelves. She spoke, "Gunther, take that Bible on your shelf and turn to the Gospel of Matthew and read from Chapter 25." Although the shoemaker was upset with the three visitors he did what Greta asked. He read, "Jesus said to the people who came before him after they had died these words, 'I was hungry and you fed me; I was cold, and you gave me a coat; I was alone and you took care of me. You are blessed! Come into my kingdom forever!" The people were confused. "Lord, when did we see you hungry, or need a coat or to be taken care of. When did these things happen?" Jesus said, "Whatever you do for people who are in need, you do to me." Gunther started to cry!

Greta said to Gunther, "Jesus came into your shop three times today. Jesus was the woman who was hungry. You gave her food and then you gave her the Christ Child in your nativity set. Jesus was the man who was cold and came into your store and you gave your coat. Jesus was the little girl who had no home and you found her a home and you gave her the shepherd."

"Gunther, Jesus visited you three times today on Christmas Eve and you were very good to him. He loves you very much and he told me to tell you that your dear wife and son are with him in heaven and that you will someday see them again!" Suddenly, Greta and the other two disappeared from the shop. Gunther

was alone. He looked at his watch, jumped up from his chair, and started walking to Church for Christmas Eve Mass. He knew that Jesus would come again to him at Mass in Holy Communion. There would never be a sad Christmas again for him because he would always put the candle in the window.



### The Parish Jesse Tree

In our sanctuary for Advent is a Jesse Tree. The Jesse Tree consists of a stump and a branch coming out of it. This image is found in the prophet Isaiah in the readings for the Second Sunday of Advent and it represents Jesus' family tree. The name is taken from Isaiah 11:1, in which Jesus is referred to as a shoot coming up from the stump of Jesse, the father of David.

The ornaments on the Jesse Tree tell of Jesus' ancestors and of the events leading to Jesus' birth. At the 10:00 children's Mass, for the second, third, and fourth Sundays of Advent, the children will be putting on different religious ornaments that tell the key stories of the Bible that led to the birth of Jesus.



I love the image of the Jesse Tree from the prophet Isaiah. There is nothing deader than a stump. Tree stumps are a problem; they are hard to remove. The prophet is comparing God's Chosen People, Israel, to a dead tree stump. So often they have abandoned the God who so loves them as do we. Still, from this dead wood will come new and vigorous life: a branch will come forth that will bring a new creation into the world in Jesus, the Son of God. The Jesse

Tree is a great sign of hope for anyone who feels hopeless. God is with us always. I thank Pat Astarita for graciously making our Jesse Tree. It is a perfect symbol.

Any child who wants to hang a small picture on the Jesse Tree on December 22<sup>nd</sup> at the 10:00 a.m. children's Mass is welcome to do so at the time of the homily. The picture should be small and have a string to hang it on the branch. It could be a picture of the child, the family, or something that he/she feels is special and wants to use to tell the story of God's love.

# The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

We will celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick within the 9:00 a.m. Mass on Saturday, December 21st.

### What Happened to the Last Rites of the Church:

The Anointing of the Sick is one of the seven sacraments that Jesus gave to the Church. People used to speak about *Last Rites*. Vatican II moved the focus of the sacrament from those who were dying to those who were seriously in need of healing. Now that the Last Rites is promoted as the Sacrament of the Sick, as it encourages anyone who is seriously sick to call upon the priest in order to receive the Sacrament. This is in harmony with the words found in the Bible where it says, "Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord." James 5:1. Certainly, if someone in your family is near death, it is important to call the rectory for a priest to come and anoint the person and say the prayers for the dying. This can be done at home or in the hospital.

## The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

At the same time, as the Church reflected on the words of the Letter of James (quoted above), and as it pondered the healing ministry of Jesus while on earth, the Sacrament of the Sick became open to more than the dying. People who were about to have surgery could be anointed. Those who were elderly and facing the burdens of aging were invited to receive this sacrament. Anyone with a serious or chronic illness is welcome to this healing sacrament. Anyone with a significant physical, psychological, or spiritual need can benefit from the Sacrament of the Sick. If you are having surgery or if someone is homebound and ill, you are welcome to be anointed in Church, the rectory or at your home. You just need to call the rectory (931-0818).

### How is the Sacrament Celebrated?

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick consists of the priest laying hands on those to be anointed and then blessing their forehead and palms with Oil of the Sick, one of the special oils of the church. The priest says, as he makes a cross on your forehead with blessed oil, "Through this Holy Anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the Holy Spirit." And then he says, as he anoints the palms of your hands, "May the Lord who frees you from your sins, save you and raise you up." The one receiving the Sacrament responds, "Amen."

### Effects of the Sacrament

There are some rare times when people do experience a physical experience of healing. However, that is very unusual. Furthermore, receiving the Sacrament of the Sick is an experience of knowing that Jesus is with us in our fears, anxieties, struggles, pains, and burdens. The sacrament may not remove these realities, but it does invite us to enter into the reality that God is Emmanuel: He is always with us. Sometimes illness and health concerns can move us to isolation. The Sacrament of the Church reminds us that we are not alone - our parish and faith community are with us!
