Letter from the Pastor

I was home with my family on New Year's Day enjoying a delicious dinner. I like to engage my great nieces and nephews in conversation by asking them questions. Occasionally if I ask the right question and am persistent, they will put down their electronic gadgets and respond. So I asked Fiona, a third grader, *What was the best part of Christmas for you?* She thought for a moment and said, *Opening my presents*. So I turned to Sean, a rambunctious first grader and asked him the same question: he quickly said, *Not having to go to school*. Now I might have preferred an answer such as going to Mass on Christmas Eve or having your Uncle Pat come to visit us for a few days, but I liked the honesty and innocence of their responses.

As I was preparing this homily, I decided to ask myself the same question: What was the best moment of Christmas for me? I thought of the great array of baked goodies, donuts, candies, and fruit baskets that came into the rectory over the past two weeks, many of them draped in chocolate. Or the several bottles of Irish "holy water" that were given to me often called Jamison. It made me know that people were truly listening to my sermons. As one person put it when I thanked them for the gift, "Well, you dropped enough hints in your preaching about Jamison!" So many parishioners sent the priests lovely Christmas cards, many with Masses being offered for us, as well as very kind words for our ministry among you. As we celebrated the masses during the Christmas season, we were constantly wished Merry Christmas and blessings in the New Year. The parishioners of St. Martin's certainly make their priests and deacons feel very loved, especially at Christmas.

There are so many moments I consider as I ponder what the number one highlight of the season was. Certainly Christmas dinner with my family was a highlight as were visits with close friends. I loved the spiritual preparation that our parish made for Christmas. I enjoyed the Gospel sharing that took place every Saturday morning as we spoke about the upcoming Sunday Gospels. I enjoyed the daily morning prayer that was said with a group of parishioners at 8:30 a.m. before the 9:00 a.m. Mass. I referred to this group as the *Monks of St. Martin's*. During the Wednesday evenings of Advent, we had parish prayer services that touched me very deeply as I listened to the Spirit of God speak through those who attended.

On December 23rd, a great crew of parishioners came into church under the creative direction of Ann Hughes and filled our space with glorious colors and decorations that gave praise to the newborn King. I assiduously avoided this work group since I am afraid I might be asked to start moving plants. Throughout the days of Advent, I could, as I would go over to church, hear Elena Scollo and her talented musicians and choir members preparing to praise God in song. Sitting in the Church at 11:30 p.m. before the Midnight Mass and listening to the choir was a most peaceful and prayerful moment for me in the midst of a very busy day.

I love Christmas at St. Martin's and sharing such a time of faith with all of you...but back to my highlights. I would have to say there were two at the top of my list, and they have been the same for all three years that I have been your pastor. I love walking into the church at 3:30 in the afternoon on Christmas Eve. Every seat is taken in anticipation of the 4:00 Mass. As the crowd keeps growing our sacristan, Dominic, makes several announcements that Mass is also available at the Knights of Columbus Hall and in the school auditorium. It is hard to describe, but there is a feeling of electricity in the church. The joy and delight of the congregation is almost touchable. Little children are wearing their Christmas finest, and the men are wearing Christmas ties of bright colors. I love this moment, with the church full and everyone eager to celebrate the birth of Jesus. This year I added another exciting touch to the 4:00 Mass. I managed to set off the fire alarm by using too much incense. The piercing sounds led babies to cry and me to panic until Sue, our lead sacristan, found the off switch. Equally moving to me is the children's Christmas pageant that we have at the 6:00 p.m. Mass. Cookie, her daughter and Martha do a fabulous job in organizing the children and dressing them in their costumes. I am the director of this pageant. We have one practice in anticipation of the production that would rival Radio City. The practice moves me to prayer since we seem to have too many shepherds, no kings, and debates over who should be the Blessed Mother. Yet, the pageant always goes beautifully, the Christmas story is told once again, and the wonder of the children moves everyone. This year Mary was about eight inches taller than Joseph but they got along well. Joseph was even willing to take Mary's hand on the way to Bethlehem - I am not always able to get our Joseph to do that.

I sometimes wish that every week here at St. Martin's could be like Christmas Eve, with the church full to overcrowding, the people delighted to be at Mass, and joyful in singing and praying as the Good News of Jesus is announced. We know that there are many Catholics who only come to Mass at Christmas and Easter and perhaps Ash Wednesday. We also know there are some in our families who won't come to Mass even on Christmas - they say they no longer believe. I suppose we could be tempted to resent those who come only on Christmas, since they take the best seats and the nearest parking spots. But I know we don't allow that feeling to take hold. Rather, we are happy that they have chosen to come to Mass, even if it is just for this one day to hear that the Son of God was born in Bethlehem of the Virgin Mary. The star that guided the Magi to the stable still shines and brings people to the crib to look at the Baby in wonder and hope. All are welcome at St. Martin's.

The Feast of the Epiphany for me is about people yearning for God and searching for him. We come here to St. Martin's because we have found God present in his Word, in the Eucharist, in our faith in Jesus Christ. The Magi, the Wise men, the Kings, were men searching for God and the truth as they studied the stars and great books seeking wisdom. A bright star led them to the stable and Jesus. Every person is made by God and longs to be with God. Some seekers follow different paths to God, some get lost along the way, some never begin the journey, some get caught up in distractions and side trips and get off track. There are those who get a glimpse of God in their newborn child, in a loving relationship, at a time of loss, or in a moment of quiet when they least expect to hear Him. God never gives up on his people. He sends shin-



ing stars of every kind into everyone's life. Some are bright and lasting; others are shooting stars that last only for a moment. God keeps seeking to reveal himself to all people in a thousand different ways.

We are blessed to know Christ as our Lord and Redeemer through the gift of faith, but we can never allow ourselves to feel we are better than those who do not know him or who have stopped believing. Sometimes these very people are the ones who give us a fresh glance at the mystery of God. We are searchers, yearning for something that we cannot always understand. We pray that they see the stars God sends into their lives and follow a path that brings them into the mystery of the Divine. And, we pray that we never take for granted the many ways that God shows himself to us every day of our lives.

I invite you to look over these past weeks of Advent and Christmas and ponder and treasure as did the Blessed Mother after the birth of her Son Jesus: where have I seen the star shining over the newborn King? Where have I sensed the living God? The last verse of the Gospel about the Kings is: They returned home by another way. This verse is very telling: after one meets the living God, they are changed and go forward in life in new way.

Any money pledged to the campaign can only be used for parish specific projects and is not taxed in any way by the diocese. I am also confident that our regular Sunday collections, which are critical for the day-to-day operations of the parish, will continue.

I will be meeting with our very fine building committee this coming week to move forward on the school building work, either starting with the bricks or the roof. I would like to begin this work in the spring as phase one of the campaign. God bless all our parishioners. Father Pat


