Letter from the Pastor

A few days later, when Jesus again entered Capernaum, the people heard that he had come home. They gathered in such large numbers that there was no room left, not even outside the door, and he preached the word to them. Some men came, bringing to him a paralyzed man, carried by four of them. Since they could not get him to Jesus because of the crowd, they made an opening in the roof above Jesus by digging through it and then lowered the mat the man was lying on. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralyzed man, "Son, your sins are forgiven." Mark 2

You might have noticed two new pictures that have been added to the Church gathering space: one is a picture of four men carrying their friend to Jesus, and the other is an image of Jesus healing this man of his paralysis. I love this Gospel. For me, it is a great story of friendship and family. The four men who carried the paralytic to Jesus (we do not know if they were family or friends) must have loved this man very much to make this arduous journey. And, when they arrive at the house where Jesus is, they can't even get into the building because the crowds around Jesus are so great. So they go up to the roof and open a hole so they can lower their friend down to encounter Jesus and find healing and forgiveness.

When we had our recent capital campaign, I began almost every session and meeting with this Gospel because I think it is a perfect image of what a parish is. To me a parish is a community of members who have the goal of being with Jesus themselves, and helping others to get to the Lord. We need each other to meet the Lord and have a faith community. We carry each other to meet Christ in good times and in bad. I like the prayer that we say right before the Sign of Peace at Mass: *Look not on our sins, but on the faith of the Church*. Even if my faith is weak, I draw strength from the rest of the community. I know I am inspired by the confessions I hear, by the presence of people in the church at Mass and before the Blessed Sacrament, by the dedicated care of the poor at the Parish Outreach, by the dedication of those who minister to those grieving at funerals, to the homebound, and the countless other ways you make Christ visible here at our parish.

One of the most amazing parts of the capital campaign for me was when more than 150 people showed up at a meeting of volunteers. I was stunned by that and the love that they and so many others have for the parish and parishioners of St. Martin's. I know you, like me, are delighted by the results of the capital campaign and the generosity of so many through their donations, their prayers, and their volunteering. I am confident we will begin working on the projects in the coming months. Now, I want to continue our direction of moving forward to the future as a parish community. Many parishes have what are called stewardship committees and programs. Stewardship is based on some very simple but profound beliefs. The overall pillar of stewardship is that everything I have in my life, including my life itself, is a gift from God. My faith, my family, my friends, my work, the world around me, and most importantly the promise of eternal life are all gifts that God the Father, through his Son Jesus Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit, has lavished on each one of us. Since God has been so good to me, how can I respond to this overwhelming goodness and generosity on the part of our God? As the Psalmist says, *what re-turn can I make to the Lord for all the good he has done for me*. The best way we can respond to God is by being his disciple, as we follow Jesus, the Word made flesh. We seek to live our faith day to day, in all moments of our lives. One of the key ways of living our faith and responding to God's generosity is reflecting on my use of my time, my talents, and my treasure.

I confess that as soon as a priest uses the word *stewardship*, people say, "*Ah, Father is going to talk about money*." To me it is almost impossible to hear the word *stewardship* and not think about finances. Because of this reality, and because we think the word *stewardship*, however good it is, does not capture the fullness of being a follower of Jesus, a committee who has been meeting for almost a year, has decided to use the word *discipleship* rather than *stewardship*. Here is a definition of a disciple of Jesus:

The first word for Christians was not "Christians" but "disciples." Newcomers to the faith saw themselves in relationship to the risen Lord Jesus in some way similar to the relationship of the first disciples to the earthly rabbi Jesus. A disciple learns by hearing his Master and doing like his Master. This is explicitly commanded by Jesus in John 13: "You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord' and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I your Lord and Teacher have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set an example that you should do as I have done for you." The disciples are chosen by Jesus. He says, "You did not choose me, but I chose you to go and bear fruit." So it our my plan to incorporate an ongoing program of reflection and practical steps to incorporate a vision of being disciples of Jesus as we seek to be in relationship with Jesus, to learn from him, follow him, and to seek others to follow him by using our time, our talents, and our treasure as faithfully as we can. I know we have been doing this already in our Catholic lives; this is nothing new. What I hope to do is continue to reflect on these realities in a systematic way to help enhance our discipleship.

What does this mean in practicality? I assure you I do not plan on spending much time on talking about treasure in the coming two years; we have done more than enough of that with the capital campaign and you responded beautifully. Now I want us to reflect on all the gifts God has given us and how well we respond to that. So in the coming months you will be hearing about time and talent, and various ways we can use these two precious gifts to follow Christ.

Save the date: On Saturday, March 15th beginning with the 9:00 a.m. Mass, followed by some talks and discussions and ending with lunch, we will have a parish faith assembly to reflect on what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. Everyone in the parish (except children under the age of 13) is invited. In particular, I do hope those who are presently in ministry will attend. You will be hearing more about this in the coming weeks. Thanks for being people who carry me to Jesus, and I know that is not easy due to the chocolate donuts.

January 22, 1973 marks the very sad date of the decision of the United States to legalize abortion

in the United States. It was on that date in 1973 that the Supreme Court of the United States handed down two infamous decisions: Roe vs. Wade and Doe vs. Bolton. As a result, "no significant barriers of any kind whatsoever exist today in the United States for a woman to obtain an abortion for any reason during any stage of pregnancy" (1983 Senate Judiciary Committee Report).



Certainly, we think of the million of lives that have been lost through

abortions. I also think of the women and men who have made the decision to have abortions. Many of them carry great pain and sorrow and long for healing. In truth, the entire fabric of the United States continues to be impacted by these decisions of the court.

It does seem that some limited progress is being made in terms of respect for life since polls show more and more people moving to life positions. Yet, there have been ongoing challenges in terms of religious liberty and abortion with the Affordable Health Care Act.

Since 1973, there has been a march in Washington D.C. often in the bitter cold, as people of every age and faith have protested the pro-abortion decisions of the Court. It is amazing how many young people choose to march.

Many of us for a variety of reasons, cannot get to Washington on January 22nd. So the parish will have a holy hour before the Blessed Sacrament on January 22nd between 3:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. as we pray for our nation and for all who have been impacted by the decisions of January 22, 1973. 

Liturgically Speaking...

WHY DO WE DO THIS AT THE MASS?

At the beginning of the Mass, after the sign of the cross, when the priest welcomes the people with "The Lord be with you" and the people respond with "and with your Spirit," why is this so?

This goes back to St. Paul in Galatians 6:18 -*The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit, brothers and sisters – Amen;* Philippians 4:23 *The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit;* and 2 Timothy 4:22 –*The Lord be with your spirit. Grace be to all of you.*

The people acknowledge that the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of the Risen Jesus, is with the priest as well as with them (the people) because every person actively and fully participates in the Mass - regardless of one's role.

"UNCLE" FATHER PAT WANTS YOUR HELP!

The parish is looking for some people to do ministry on Ash Wednesday. As you know, Ash Wednesday, March 5th, is one of the busiest days of the year in the parish. Many people come to church to receive ashes as Lent begins. Some are regular members of the parish, while others may have drifted from the regular practice of their faith. Others may like information about the parish, or a word on how to reconnect to the Church.

You would be asked to attend a service or two and be available to anyone who might seek out such assistance. You would have a badge that would identify you as a member of our welcome team. You do not have to be an expert on the Church or the parish. Your main goal would be to put a warm face on our parish; if people want more assistance you can tell them how to get in touch with the parish staff. We would have one training session a week or so before Ash Wednesday. This is a one time commitment and your help would be a great blessing and perhaps you can be an instrument of grace that our Lord uses to invite someone into a

Responding To Your Questions

I am delighted that some parishioners choose to email, write, phone, or speak to me about topics of concern about the parish. It is a desire of mine to be approachable and to listen to what you have to say. I must confess, I do occasionally misplace a note or email and fail to respond and I apologize for that. Sometimes I put a suggestion aside because I want to think about it or consult with others such as the clergy, the staff, the pastoral council or other groups (and then forget or lose sight of it). Occasionally the wheels of the parish grind slowly and it takes a while to get an answer. However, here are three topics that have been brought to my attention:

1) Some people have asked that the 5:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday evening be earlier, perhaps at 4:00 p.m. or 4:30 p.m. This is certainly a reasonable request. I think this suggestion is made because there are some people who do not like to drive in the dark. I appreciate this concern and I have consulted with both the staff and the pastoral council about this issue. We have decided to stay with our present schedule because it would make scheduling Saturday weddings more difficult if we changed the 5:00 p.m. to an earlier time. Even though there are not that many weddings, I believe our parish must do its best to work with couples getting married.

We *have* improved the lightening in the parking areas. There was the opinion that there would be as many people upset with changing the time of the 5:00 p.m. as there would be those who would be happy. No schedule will work for everyone. For those who do not want to drive at night, there are at least four masses, the 8:30 a.m., the 10:00 a.m., the 11:30 a.m. and the 1:00 p.m. that are in the daytime with plenty of light.

2) I was also asked why we do not have communion distribution begin in the front of the church rather than at the back as we presently do. I consulted with several people and was told when the church was renovated, this method proved to be the most practical. There is no theological or spiritual reason for this decision. We give out Holy Communion this way on the weekend because we think it is the most orderly and practical way. I do thank those who asked me to consider this question.

3) Finally, there was some complaint that there are certain weekdays when parking becomes difficult with the 9:00 a.m. Mass participants still attending the liturgy and those coming in for a 9:45 a.m. funeral who are looking for a place to park. Naturally, we want to be as supportive as we can to those who are coming to a funeral while at the same time respecting those who attend daily Mass.

After consultation with the staff, it was decided to have weekday funerals at 10:00 a.m., rather than at 9:45 a.m., and this then leads to the 10:45 a.m. funerals to begin at 11:00 a.m. and the 11:45 a.m. funerals to begin at 12:00 p.m. However, on Saturdays we will continue with the 9:45 a.m. and 10:45 a.m. times because of the cost of overtime for burials after a certain time at the cemeteries. This new policy seems to have worked out and I appreciate those who brought it to my attention.

You may not always agree with the decisions that are made, but I do promise you that your recommendations are listened to and taken seriously. If you want to blame someone, see Father Ciya.

The Tabernacle Has Been Repaired

I am happy to announce that our tabernacle has been repaired. As you might remember from previous notes in the bulletin, there had been an ongoing serious problem with the doors of the tabernacle. The tabernacle is at least 90 years old and is a great treasure of the parish. I am grateful to several parishioners who gave money without even being asked. The cost of the repair is about \$1,200.00 and a new door was placed on the tabernacle since the old door was beyond repair.

I think Mr. John O'Reilly did wonderful work in matching the new door to the tabernacle. The key and door is much more user-friendly than was the former door that kept getting broken. There was a fear, as did happen about six years or so ago, the Blessed Sacrament could get locked in the tabernacle with no easy way to open the door.

Can we even begin to imagine the amount of people who have received Holy Communion that was kept in the tabernacle between Masses? I like to think about the generations after generations of people who prayed in front of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament where the Eucharist was reserved in the tabernacle. Prayers were said for children who were ill, young people getting married, husbands at war, for work during the Depression, for faith, for a loved one suffering from cancer, for a good mark in a school test, to pass one's driver's test, to meet a nice fellow, the prayers of December 7, 1941, November 22, 1963, and September 11, 2001.

This weekend as a way of expressing gratitude to God for all the people who have prayed in front of the Blessed Sacrament, and as a way of showing the parish the repair, and most importantly as a way of honoring the great gift Jesus gave by his presence in the Eucharist, the new tabernacle will be placed in the prayer area of the Church for the weekend Masses. After this weekend, it will be returned to its designed place in the Eucharistic Chapel.
