The Pastor's Homily

January 25, 2015

Get Out of the Boat!

"As he passed by the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting their nets into the sea; they were fishermen. Jesus said to them, "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." Then they abandoned their nets and followed him. He walked along a little farther and saw James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John. They too were in a boat mending their nets. Then he called them. So they left their father Zebedee in the boat along with the hired men and followed him." Mark 1: 16-20

here is a story I like about a mother telling her son to get out of bed on a Sunday morning and go to Mass. The son is in bed, covered with blankets, doing all he can to ignore his mother's call. She shouts, "Get out of that bed and go to Church." He mumbles back, "I don't want to," and rolls over. But she is persistent. She comes to the door and begins to knock loudly on it. Again she demands, "Get up and go to Church!" Again, he says no. Finally, he says to her, "Give me two good reasons why I should go Church today!" The mother firmly speaks, "I'll give you your two reasons: You're fifty years old and you are the pastor!"

What got <u>vou</u> to Mass today? I might even push the question further and say, "What got you out of bed today?" I am sure all of us have our routines of waking up in the morning. I usually wake up at about 5:30 a.m., but I would confess that is not the exact time I get out of my bed. I usually turn the radio on and listen to WFAN, an all sports station. But it takes about an hour before my feet actually hit the floor, and there have been a few times when Sue, our sacristan had to knock on my door at 6:30 a.m. and remind me that I have the 6:30 Mass!

What gets us up in the morning? I suppose the most direct answer is that most of us have to work for a living. We can't stay in bed all day. We work to provide for our families and ourselves. We work so we can eat and have a roof over our heads. Perhaps, we get up because we're yearning for that first cup of coffee in the morning, or a nice bagel with cream cheese and jelly. It could be that today is the day of the big game and we excited about watching our son play soccer, or to see our daughter dance. Maybe it's a holiday and the whole day is pretty much mine to enjoy with my family. You may be one of those persons who wakes up fully alive and vibrant. You welcome the day with joy and delight. Or, you may be one of those folks who are grumpy until noon. There is an old joke that Redemptorists wake up twice a day, at 5:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., but the value of an afternoon nap will be a discussion for another day.

I wonder what got Peter, Andrew, James and John out of their fishing boats as they hear Jesus say to them, "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." What led them to make that incredible leap of faith out of the boat and onto the dry land to follow this young Rabbi Jesus? The Gospel of the call of these disciples is rather stark; there is little dialogue. Did the Apostles ask Jesus a million questions about what he was inviting them to? Did the Andrew take out his iPad and google Jesus to find out who this man was and what this invitation was all about? Did Peter ask about the benefits that Jesus was offering: was there going to be a retirement plan and what kind of health care was being offered? Did John wonder about the salary that would be offered? Can we picture poor Zebedee, the father of James and John, as his two sons step out of the boat? This is the family business. I can picture him saying, *How I am going to leave you this boat when I die. You can't leave.*

s I ponder this Gospel, it is a shocking story. One of our challenges as Catholics is that we hear these Gospels over and over again, to the point that they no longer really surprise us; we get use to them. We know Peter has a wife. We wonder if any of these men had children-what about their responsibilities to family? By all evidence, this seems to be a rather hasty and poorly planned decision. Still, when God calls, when the Lord touches your heart, what other response would we expect? I often heard the one thing a parent or a priest can not do is talk a couple out of marrying when they are madly in love. The whole world may think the couple is making a mistake, but love, emotional and irrational as it can be, has captured their. That is what is going on in this Gospel account. Jesus has captured the heart of these disciples. There is something about him that is different and amazing than any other person they have ever known and they long to be with Him.

There is foreshadowing note in the Gospel that following Jesus will have a price. This account begins with the news that John the Baptist has been arrested. King Herod and the Roman do not want any preachers upsetting the people with talk of the kingdom of God. I love the fact that Jesus chose working men with calloused hands who were use to laboring through the day to be his first disciples. He did not seek out the most talented and the brilliant to be his first followers but these plain men. Jesus is building up a community; he will not preach the Gospel by himself. He will teach others about his Father's message and send them into the world when he returns to the Lord.

I have been often asked in my life, When did you get the call? I jokingly say that I got it about five years after I was ordained. When did you decide to get married? Perhaps and even better question, how many times since you have been married, have you chosen to continue to love and be commit to your spouse. Loving another person is never a one-time decision. Many of us grew up with the language of call and vocation. God calls people to be priests, brothers and nuns. The rest of us were in the category of the laity. Vatican II emphasized what has always been a truth of our faith: we are all called to be disciples of Jesus by our baptisms. That is the sacrament in which we became followers of Jesus. It is at our baptisms, with a deepening as we receive the Sacrament of Confirmation, that we make our commitment to get out of the boat and follow Jesus as did the first disciples.

Jesus keeps on inviting us to our mission to follow him: he invites you and me to get out of the boat a hundred times a day as we seek to be good spouses, parents, grandparents, children, family, friends, parishioners. Each of us can easily choose to become selfish, complacent, unforgiving, unchanging, and cold to the people of our lives. We can roll under the covers and be alone. Yet, by the grace of God, we can also say Yes to those many little nudges, invitations, whispers that Jesus through his Holy Spirit will bring to us today.

Today at this Mass, we are welcoming the Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians of Nassau County. Their patron is the great Irish Saint Brigid of Kildare whose feast day is February 1st. Most people know the great saint of the Irish is Patrick, but there are many other great Irish saints and chief among them would be Brigid. She lived in the 6th century and her family was brought into the Christian faith by St. Patrick. Brigid became a nun and founded great monasteries in Ireland.

The Ancient Order of the Hibernians is the oldest and largest Irish Catholic organization in the United States. Their core values are friendship, unity and Christian charity. Through it's charitable arm, Hibernian Charity, the AOH is able to raise money for a number of Irish and Catholic causes in the America and in Ireland. They hear the invitation to get our of the boat by seeking to love and serve those who are need as did their patron St. Brigid. St. Brigid was famous for helping the poor and needy. I will end this homily with a somewhat humorous poem about her desire to love and serve God's children.

"The Giveaway" (from The Love Letters of Phyllis McGinley, New York, Viking Press, 1957)

Saint Brigid was a problem child. Although a lass demure and mild, And one who strove to please her dad, Saint Brigid drove the family mad. For here's the fault in Brigid lay: She would give everything away. To any soul whose luck was out She'd give her bowl of stirabout; She'd give her shawl, divide her purse With one or all. And what was worse, When she ran out of things to give She'd borrow from a relative. Her father's gold, her grandsire's dinner, She'd hand to cold and hungry sinner; Give wine, give meat, no matter whose; Take from her feet The very shoes, And when her shoes had gone to others, Fetch forth her sister's and her mother's. She could not quit. She had to share; Gave bit by bit The silverware, The barnyard geese, The parlor rug, her little niece's christening mug, Even her bed to those in want, And then the mattress of her aunt. An easy touch for poor and lowly, She gave so much and grew so holy That when she died of years and fame, The countryside put on her name, And still the Isles of Erin fidget With generous girls named Bride or Brigid Well, one must love her.





Why do Catholics pray for the dead?

(this response is from Busted Halo)

The earliest Scriptural reference to prayers for the dead comes in the second book of Maccabees. The books of Maccabees were among the latest written books found in the Old Testament. They recount the struggle of the Jewish people for freedom against the Seleucid Empire, around 100-200 years before the birth of Christ. They are written from an Orthodox Jewish point of view. The second book of Maccabees tells how Judas Maccabee, the Jewish leader, led his troops into battle in 163 B.C. When the battle ended he directed that the bodies of those Jews who had died be buried. As soldiers prepared their slain comrades for burial, they discovered that each was wearing an amulet taken as booty from a pagan Temple. This violated the law of Deuteronomy and so Judas and his soldiers prayed that God would forgive the sin these men had committed. (II Maccabees 12:39-45).

This is the first indication in the Bible of a belief that prayers offered by the living can help free the dead from any sin that would separate them from God in the life to come. It is echoed in the New Testament when Paul offers a prayer for a man named Onesiphorus who had died: "May the Lord grant him to find mercy from the Lord on that day." (II Timothy 1:18). The cave-like tombs under the city of Rome, which we call catacombs, bear evidence that members of the Roman Christian community gathered there to pray for their fellow followers of Christ who lay buried there. By the fourth century prayers for the dead are mentioned in Christian literature as though they were already a longstanding custom.

The practice of praying for the dead is rooted first in Christian belief in the everlasting life promised in Jesus' teachings and foreshadowed by his disciple's experience that God had raised him from the dead. After death, even though separated from our earthly body, we yet continue a personal existence. It is as living persons that God invites us into a relationship whose life transcends death. Praying for the dead has further origins in our belief in the communion of saints. Members of this community who are living often assist each other in faith by prayers and other forms of spiritual support. Christians who have died continue to be members of the communion of saints. We believe that we can assist them by our prayers, and they can assist us by theirs.

Our prayers for the dead begin at the moment of death. Often family members will gather in prayer around the bedside of the person who has died. The Order of Christian Funerals includes a Vigil Service for the deceased, which can be held in the home, in the church, or in a funeral home chapel, the funeral Mass and the Rite of Committal (which generally takes place at the burial site). The prayers express hope that God will free the person who has died from any burden of sin and prepare a place for him or her in heaven. Death remains a mystery for us–a great unknown. Yet Christian language evokes a hopeful imagination in the presence of death, an assurance that our love, linked to Christ's love, can help bridge whatever barriers might keep those whom we love from fully enjoying the presence of a loving and life-giving God.

Why do we Catholic pray for the dead? The above articles gives some scriptural evidence, found both in the Old and the New Testament, for the value of praying for our beloved deceased. Catholics believe in Purgatory. Here is what I think is a good definition of Purgatory:

Purgatory (Lat., "purgare", to make clean, to purify) in accordance with <u>Catholic teaching</u> is a <u>place</u> or <u>condition</u> of temporal punishment for those who, departing this life in <u>God's grace</u>, are, not entirely free from venial faults, or have not fully paid the satisfaction due to their transgressions.

hat I find very helpful in this definition is that Purgatory is called either a place or a condition. I think there is a natural tendency to think of Purgatory as a place of punishment, something like a jail, where we have a sentence of ten or twenty years to undergo. I prefer the word condition that the above definition uses. Purgatory is about letting go of the world as we know it, about reviewing our lives and how we lived them, about seeking forgiveness for our sins, and about waiting to be with God for all eternity. God's time is not our time. Purgatory may be a brief moment when all our life flashes before us, or it may be a longer time. No one really knows.

What we do know is that we love our beloved deceased. They were and always will be part of our lives. I love the Catholic Church's teaching of the communion of saints. We the living share in the life of God with all those who have died and are with God or waiting to go home to God. Above our five saints in Church, we read the words from the Letter to the Hebrews: we are surrounded by a Great Cloud of Witnesses. I like to think of our relationship with the deceased as the crowds that line the streets for the New York Marathon. The crowds are cheering the runners home to the finish line. They give them encouragement and support. We are both the runners and the crowd. We are encouraging with our prayers those who have died, we are cheering them on to God. And, our deceased are with God cheering for us as we seek to get home to the Lord.

Why Mass stipends?

The Mass is the greatest prayer we have as believers. At the Eucharist, we go to the Father, in the name of Jesus, in the power of the Holy Spirit. Every Mass is in union with the Last Supper, the Death of Jesus on the Cross, his Resurrection, and the Outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the world. There is really only Mass and every daily or Sunday Mass shares in the divine offering of Jesus to the Father. So it is only natural that we on earth would do all the we can to have our beloved deceased remembered at Mass.

The Mass stipend, the donation, is to help support the priest in his ministry. You are not paying for Mass, but rather the money given is a donation in support of the ministry of the priest as he goes about his priestly duties. At St. Martin's, we do our best to keep this stipend at a low suggested donation. If there is any person in the parish, who longs to have a Mass said for someone, and cannot afford any donation, please let me know and we will have a Mass said for your intention.

The Church is very serious about Mass intentions

Once a mass intention is accepted, it is a serious obligation on the part of the Church and parish to make sure that Mass is properly recorded and said. We take this responsibility most seriously. Rarely we may make a mistake and announce the wrong Mass, but we always try to address the situation as quickly as we can.

How many Masses should we have said for our deceased:

That is a personal question. The Church teaches that the Mass is of infinite value because it is the sacrifice of our Lord Jesus Christ. A mass said for any of our beloved deceased is part of the infinite value. Still, I know many, as do I, take comfort in remembering our beloved deceased on special days such as the anniversary of their deaths, their birthdays, and so. This is a lovely custom and one that brings great comfort to families. It is part of belonging to the communion of saints.

When will the Mass books open for 2016?

In the practical. For many years, Carmella Biggin has and will continue to guide the process of Mass intentions. We are most grateful for how well she does this ministry. Part of our challenge in opening the Mass books for 2016 is that there are certain times (not too often) when all the Redemptorists are called to their annual meetings. Unfortunately, these meetings are often announced only about six months before they are held. With the election of a new Provincial Redemptorist Provincial, I anticipate that it will take him some time to plan the schedule for our future meetings. This makes saying the announced Masses at the time very difficult. Additionally, there is no guarantee that there will always be four priests stationed at St. Martin's. We also have about 150 funerals a year, and occasionally we get ill or go on vacation. Saying Mass is not exhausting; it is a great honor. Yet, the mind of the Church is that priest should not say too many Masses on one day lest it become almost a routine to him. It is the preference of the Church that a priest limit how many times he says Mass on one day.

When you go to a baseball game, there is a warning in small print on the ticket that if you get hit with a bat or ball, the team is not liable. God bless small print. Well, I want to say to you that I want to open the Mass books for 2016 as soon as possible, but <u>I want to say in large print that there is outside chance, if unforeseen circumstances develop and the clergy is either not able to be here due to their annual meetings or because of sickness of some other cause, we may have to ask those who have Masses signed up for to be flexible to a change. The Mass for your intention will be said, but there is a remote possibility that we might have to change the date. I think that is fair and understandable. God bless our beloved deceased and you their loving family and friends who remember them so faithfully.</u>

I plan on opening the parish mass books after Easter. I also hope that our first day will be on a Saturday so all can have equal access to having the opportunity to have Masses said for special occasions.

Prayer for the Dead

God our Father, Your power brings us to birth, Your providence guides our lives, and by Your command we return to dust.

Lord, those who die still live in Your presence, their lives change but do not end. I pray in <u>hope</u> for my family, relatives and friends, and for all the dead known to You alone.

In company with Christ, Who died and now lives, may they rejoice in Your kingdom, where all our tears are wiped away. Unite us together again in one family, to sing Your praise forever and ever. Amen.
