The Pastor's Letter

Today We Begin



his past winter, and I am almost afraid to use the word past, has been extremely difficult. It seems since Christmas, and especially through the days of February, we have experienced a great period of freezing temperatures, with plenty of snow and ice to follow. Many meetings and religion classes were cancelled. Attendance was down at our Sunday Masses since we wanted no one to risk a broken hip or worse as they navigated the icy streets. Your poor Grand Marshall of the Bethpage St. Patrick's Day Parade walked through a frozen tundra that was reminiscent of Siberia, but of course he never complained.

I am not sure if it was my imagination, but it seems that we had more funeral since Christmas than we usually have at a similar time, and many of us were ill with colds, pneumonia and other illnesses. We have lost people we have loved and sat with people suffering serious medical conditions.

August brought us the news of Michael Brown, a young African-American man being shot by police officer Dareen Wilson. The country debated was this shooting justified as riots ensued. During the Christmas seasons, we learned that two police officers, Wenjian Liu and Rafael Ramos, were in the car near Myrtle and Tompkins Avenues in Bedford-Stuyvesant, in the shadow of a tall housing project when a gunman walked up to the passenger-side window and assassinated them both. They left behind weeping families and a nation wondering where we were heading. Some wondered if racial peace and harmony would ever be possible.

We have experienced on a daily basis the savagery of ISIS as they killed people in the most cruel and brutal ways. We have been particularly pained by the ongoing murderous assault on Christians in the Middle East and Africa. Iran is seeking a nuclear weapon and Israel is threatening to destroy this nation before it gets such a weapon. We are deeply troubled by these events but we feel almost powerless to do anything to change these realities.

It has been cold and cruel winter full of bad news and chilling weather. What gives us hope? What can lift our spirits to live our daily lives with enthusiasm and courage? Through some of the coldest days of February, I found myself thinking that this is a spring that we would truly appreciate and treasure for all that has gone before us. I think we are blessed to live in a place that has the four seasons. However bitter were the days of winter, we know that spring, with its lengthening sunlight, its first touch of gentle breezes and warmth, is coming. With the emergence of nature breaking forth in multitude of new life and colors. Oh, how we need this spring.

he word Lent means spring. The word Easter refers to the Passover moon and the first days of lack L spring. We are moving into the season of light and life. Nature is being renewed, and we walk with a lighter step. Many of us grew up with stories that ended with They all lived happily after. Most of us do not like movies or television shows that conclude with an unhappy ending, or even worse, an ending that leaves us in doubt about what really happened. I think we might run the risk of seeing the Resurrection of Jesus, after his terribly cruel passion and death as a happy ending that makes us feel good about the story of Jesus. I think sometimes preachers and teachers of the Gospel might even fall into this trap. Actually, the Easter Gospel is the beginning of our Catholic faith. We are here tonight because of Easter. Without the Resurrection of Jesus from the tomb on the third day by the power of God the Father through the Holy Spirit, Jesus would be at best a footnote in history. Without the Resurrection, the apostles go back to their fishing boats and try to forget about the one they called Master. Without Easter, Mary of Nazareth remains hidden from history as a woman whose son died a criminal on a cross. If we do not have the glory of this day, a stone rolled back, angels telling us not to look for the living among the dead, Mary Magdalene confusing a gardener with the Risen Jesus, there would be no Eucharist, forgiveness of sin, baptism, and the very Gospels themselves. No one would write about a dead men on a cross who ended up in a borrowed grave.

On Good Friday, all but a very few, the Blessed Mother and perhaps the apostle John, understood and believed there was more to come. All the rest returned to lives where they worked, experienced pain and sorrow and eventually died. There was nothing more. The inspiration, the wonder, the excitement of the Beatitudes, the call for justice for the poor and an end to oppression, a call for the mercy and love of God all came crashing down in his bloody death. It was all darkness and doubt.

What begins today for all of us is a call for spirit of joy and peace in our hearts, however dark the news of the day can be. God's justice will ultimately prevail. What begins tonight leads to the witness of St. Francis of Assisi, the victory of St. Therese of Lisieux over depression, Blessed Mother Theresa comforting the dying of Calcutta, Saint John Paul II standing before the Communists and demanding the people be given the Gospel, and our smiling Pope Francis offering us a message of Mercy and Hope. This resurrection begins the story of Christian soup kitchens, Catholics orphanages, hospitals for the poor, faithful caring for the abandoned of society in the name of Jesus, a parish outreach center, first communions, voices crying out for the protection of all life, from conception to natural death.

The power of the Risen Christ gives us the strength to seek to forgive those who have hurt us, to honor our life commitments when we are tempted to walk away from their challenges, to have hope in the face of addictions, to see the earth as a gift from God, to be grateful for all that we have, and to trust, deep in our hearts, believe that Jesus Christ is Risen and that one day I will rise with him. Today, we know that we shall see again those we have loved and mourned and buried. Tonight is not they lived happily ever after. No, tonight is the beginning of our faith in the one who said he would rise on the third day. Because of tonight, we walk with a hope in our hearts and joy in our souls.

CHRISTIAN TRADITIONS AND EASTER

EASTER BUNNY

The Bible makes no mention of a long-eared, short-tailed creature who delivers decorated eggs to well-behaved children on Easter Sunday; nevertheless, the Easter bunny has become a prominent symbol of Christianity's most important holiday. The exact origins of this mythical mammal are unclear, but rabbits, known to be prolific procreators, are an ancient symbol of fertility and new life. According to some sources, the Easter bunny first arrived in America in the 1700s with German

immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania and transported their tradition of an egg-laying hare called "Osterhase" or "Oschter Haws." Their children made nests in which this creature could lay its colored eggs. Eventually, the custom spread across the U.S. and the fabled rabbit's Easter morning deliveries expanded to include chocolate and other types of candy and gifts, while decorated baskets replaced nests.



EASTER EGGS

Easter is a religious holiday, but some of its customs, such as Easter eggs, are likely linked to pagan traditions. The egg, an ancient symbol of new life, has been associated with pagan fes-

tivals celebrating spring. From a Christian perspective, Easter eggs are said to represent Jesus' emergence from the tomb and resurrection. Decorating eggs for Easter is a tradition that dates back to at least the 13th century, according to some sources. One explanation for this custom is that eggs were formerly a forbidden food during the Lenten season, so people would paint and decorate them to mark the end of the period of penance and fasting, then eat them on Easter as a celebration.



EASTER CANDY

Easter is the second best-selling candy holiday in America, after Halloween. Among the most popular sweet treats associated with this day are chocolate eggs, which date back to early 19th century Europe. Eggs have long been associated with Easter as a symbol of new life and Jesus' resurrection. Another egg-shaped candy, the jelly bean, became associated with Easter in the 1930s (although the jelly bean's origins reportedly date all the way back to a Biblical-era concoction called a Turkish Delight). This is highly endorsed by your Pastor.



We at St. Martin's are very proud of you and pray that the Holy Spirit will always guide you.

We as a parish congratulate the parents of these young men and women. You have made a very serious effort to raise your children in the Catholic faith. With all the other responsibilities you have and all the many activities you bring your children to, I know it is a sacrifice to keep bringing your son or daughter to religious education every week. God bless your commitment. Confirmation is not an ending, but a new beginning in the Christian life and I strongly encourage you to continue to do all you can to pass on the Catholic faith to your child. As they continue to mature, they are moving into a most complex and confusing world, with many paths that can lead to serious problems. I am convinced the values of Jesus Christ will be the greatest guide they can have in navigating their way forward. I also offer a word of thanks and encouragement to the sponsors who have journeyed with the young person as he or she moved toward confirmation. They valued you and saw something special in you as their sponsor.

It takes a great many people to prepare our young people for the Sacrament of Confirmation. I cannot thank enough the men and women who volunteer their time and talent to be religious education teachers and aides for our program. You are important evangelists in the life of the parish. I know it is not always easy teaching in the afternoons, evenings and Saturday morning, but you do it with great joy and commitment. Thank you!
