The Pastor's Getter

There are two old jokes I have heard about meetings. The first is that at the Last Judgment, when Jesus comes to judge the living and the dead, he will say to those on his right side, "Come my beloved, enter the Kingdom of God for you were very faithful and good Catholics, and for you on the left, I want you to break up into small groups and go have a meeting!" The second one is even simpler: "On June 30, 2015, the entire Catholic Church will come to a complete stop because everyone will be at a meeting!" I am sure neither joke is a side-splitter.

I go to many meetings in the parish as well as with the Diocese and the Redemptorists. Actually I find meetings helpful (unless they are scheduled during a Met game, or even worse, during a Jet game!) Parish meetings are important to evaluate what we are presently doing and what we hope to do in the future. It was at the meetings of our pastoral council and our finance council that we came to the decision to have a capital campaign.

Now our building committee is giving excellent counsel on how to implement the various projects of the campaign. We had a very good Lent and our liturgy committee does great work to make our liturgies so enriching. Our discipleship committee is working on a booklet that will outline the many ministries of the parish. These are just a few examples of the many meetings our parish has to plan for both the present and the future. I am so very grateful.

The Diocese of Rockville Centre is comprised of three geographic regions called vicariates. There is the Western, Central and Eastern Vicariate. Within each vicariate there are smaller groupings of between 8-16 parishes called deaneries. There are thirteen deaneries in the diocese and each is made up of several parishes. Our parish is deanery five and is in the Central Vicariate under the leadership of Monsignor James McNamara. Father John Derasmo, the pastor of St. James Parish is the dean of our deanery.

The parishes in deanery five are Our Lady of Hope, Carle Place; St. Raphael, East Meadow; St. Kilian, Farmingdale; Our Lady of Mercy, Hicksville; Holy Family, Hicksville; St. Ignatius Loyola, Hicksville; St. Bernard, Levittown; St. Pius X, Plainview; St. James, Seaford; St. Brigid, Westbury; and St. Martin of Tours, Bethpage.

Recently, the Diocese of Rockville Centre has called parishes to conduct meetings to put a process in place to help parishes plan for the future direction of their parish as they seek to grow in the love of our Lord Jesus Christ. They have begun the process in two deaneries, number 5 and 7. This process of future planning has been going on for several months. Each parish was asked to have ten people attend a meeting with people from deanery five. I sent an invitation to our staff and committees to see who might wish to be part of this project. We had ten people attend and we were presented with some very detailed materials about demographics taking place in our deanery.

This material was not only about the present but sought to identify information about the future. This material was prepared by a professor from St. John's University. We were given about 75 pages of statistics and trends to read (I would prefer the sports pages of the *New York Post*). Some members of our team found the material very enlightening and others felt it was information they had clearly observed from living in this area. We also received a presentation on how important it is to plan for the future in a parish on every level to include care of the buildings, finances, formation programs, liturgies, programming for various ages groups and so on. We were encouraged to study our vision statement and see if it was helpful in moving us toward the future. It was a good meeting, but we were certainly left with a great deal of material to absorb.

Examples of future planning were provided by some parishes that had adopted good methods. Each pastor was asked to appoint a smaller executive planning committee (since meetings for the 13 parishes of the deanery that included all would have at least 130 members, which can be somewhat unwieldy for a meeting). I asked the ten men and women who had already volunteered to be on the large committee, who might wish to serve on the executive committee. I provided Monsignor McNamara with the names of Ann Hughes (chair), Martin Meaney and John McCarthy. I think this a very well-balanced team since Martin is head of the pastoral council, John is chair of the finance committee and Ann has good experience in working previously on such large scale processes.

The executive committee has had several meetings to organize and take initial steps to proceed with the larger committee, as well as all the committees and ministries and all the parishioners of our parish. Recently, the executive committee attended a meeting with all the other executive committees of our deanery. We were asked to report what we had done so far. I was very impressed with some of the fine ideas I heard from other parishes. Still, without sounding boastful, our parish had been doing a significant amount of future planning while seeking to address particular needs and goals in the present. This was also the feeling of the other members of the committee who attended. I certainly think Father Tizio (as well as previous pastors and clergy) and the people of the parish had left our parish in a good position in terms of ministries and functioning committees.

When I came to St. Martin's, almost four years ago, I did a planning booklet called *Discerning the Future* based on my meeting with the clergy, staff, members of various ministries, as well as a survey of all the parishioners. When we conducted the capital campaign, the Lynch Associates did surveys and interviews of parishioners. Last year several of the councils and committees, as well as the staff, had to prepare ideas about the future for a Diocesan Visitation with Monsignor McNamara.

Now our pastoral and finance councils, as well as our staff, are preparing materials that evaluate where we are and our vision for the future for the superiors of the Redemptorists who will be visiting our parish on May 14th. We have done a great amount of study indicating where we are and where we need to go over the past four years. Thus, this new study from the Diocese is good but certainly far from anything new for us.

We need to be careful of vision fatigue planning. Still no parish should ever allow itself to grow complacent nor rest on its laurels. Most people are very happy with our parish, but there is always room for challenge and growth. So our parish will do its best to fully participate in this diocesan process. Since most of the people involved so far in this particular process are members of the councils, committees, and staff of the parish, it is important that we listen to **all** parishioners who have dreams and visions for the future. **We are planning a Parish Assembly on May 16**th **from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. (lunch included).** Part of the agenda of this assembly will be a discussion of the diocesan process for planning for the future which I have written about. I do ask every parishioner to attend the assembly (we will add more water to the soup).

This is a letter with a great deal of information and one that might have your eyes glazing over. You may be longing for a Jet joke by now. Ultimately all of this information, as well as everything that we do at St. Martin's, is about seeking to help us know the love Jesus has for each of us, and to help us respond to how we live our lives in the light of that love.

If you have read every line of this letter, word for word, I owe you one jelly bean! God bless you always.

RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

LIFE MATTERS, RELIGIOUS LIBERTY AND THE AMERCAN SOUL

When Christians and other people talk bout THE DIGNITY OF THE HUMAN PERSON, and THE SANCTITY OF HUMAN LIFE, they're putting into words what we all instinctively know - and have known for a very long time. Unique in nature, and unlike any other creature, men and women possess something elevated and sacred that demands our special respect. When we violate that human dignity, we do evil. When we serve it, we do good, and herein lies one of today's many American ironies. We now live in a society that speaks persuasively about protecting the environment and rescuing species on the brink of extinction. But then it tolerates the mass killing of unborn children, and contemplates the killing of the sick and elderly in name of their "DIGNITY."

Modern critics of religion like to point out that God is ABSENT from the U.S. Constitution. And of course that's true, but not because God was unwelcome. In effect, God suffused the whole constitutional enterprise. Nearly all he Founders were religious believers, and some were quite devout. The Founders saw religious faith as something separate from government but vital to the nation's survival. The American Founders also presumed the existence of natural law and natural rights. These rights are inalienable because they are guaranteed by the Creator, by "nature's God," to use the words of the Declaration of Independence. Such ideas seem to be out of fashion in much of legal theory today. But these same ideas are very much alive in the way w actually reason and behave in our daily lives.

Today, people of faith are facing a multitude of threats to religious liberty that demand our active witness and opposition. One state would have forced Catholic parishes to be restructured according to a congregational model. The Justice Department has argued that a federal agency can redefine and override who a Christian church considers a "religious" minister according to their faith.

State immigration laws forbid clergy to give sacramental and pastoral care to immigrants who lack residency documentation. Catholic charities in some jurisdictions have been driven out of ADOPTION and FOSTER CARE services because they refused to place children with same-sex couples or unmarried cohabiting opposite-sex couples. Catholic humanitarian services have been discriminated against on the awarding of government grants because they refuse to provide or refer for contraceptive and abortion services.

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) preventive services, mandate requires almost all private heath plans to cover contraception, sterilization and abortion-inducing drugs. FOR THE FIRST TIME IN OUR HISTO-RY, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WILL FORCE RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS TO FUND AND FACILTATE COVERAGE OF DRUGS AND PROCEDURES CONTRARY TO THEIR MORAL TEACHING, AND PURPORT TO DEFINE WHICH RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS ARE RELIGIOUS ENOUGH TO MERIT AN EXEMPTION.

It is important for our own integrity and the integrity of our country THAT WE STAND UP today against these and other attacks in our RELIGIOUS FEEDOM. History affords many examples, both before and since America's founding, where restraints n religious liberty presaged the denial of other human rights. BY STANDING UP FOR RELI-GIOUS LIBERTY NOW, we can begin to renew the soul of America and strengthen our nation's commitment to all the rights and freedoms we enjoy as children of God. In so doing, we may also discover in our own lives what it means to be fully human.

Certainly, even if a name is removed, we will continue to pray for the person and his or her safety since we pray for all those in the military at our Masses. If you wish to speak to me about this, you are most welcome. I would welcome military families to let me know how they feel about this concern. I hate to allow terrorists to control our lives in any way, but I do not want to put anyone at risk.
