The Pastor's Letter

It takes a lot of *chutzpah* to throw a party for oneself. Since I do not lack in that particular virtue, I am marking my fortieth year as a Redemptorist priest on June 14th at the 1:00 p.m. Mass. The Mass will be followed by a luncheon in the parish auditorium. Many priests have a great celebration for the 25th anniversary of ordination (which I certainly did fifteen years ago). Then they celebrate again on their 50th anniversary of ordination.

As you might remember, I lost four cousins within a month during the Christmas season. There were four wakes where family and friends offered consolation to one another while saying we have to start meeting for happy occasions, and we certainly have for weddings, baptisms and first communions. One of my cousins who died, Patricia, was a young woman in her fifties. Last year, knowing she had cancer, she planned a beautiful graduation party for seven members of the family who had graduated from college, high school, grade school and kindergarten. After that great success, she was working on a family reunion but she left us before it could happen. God rest her soul and all our beloved deceased!

Life is short and happy events should be celebrated. Without being overly dramatic or "Irish" for that matter, only God knows who will be around ten years from now, including yours truly. I am so very grateful to God for calling me to be a priest and for all the incredible blessings he has given me over the past forty years. Like those of you who have had wedding anniversaries, it is so hard to believe how fast time has passed since I was a nervous young deacon awaiting the laying on of hands by the late Cardinal Terrence Cooke as he ordained my classmates and me to the priesthood.

An anniversary or a jubilee is really a Biblical term. This is how the Book of Leviticus describes a Jubilee Year:

You shall count seven weeks³ of years, seven times seven years, so that the time of the seven weeks of years shall give you forty-nine years. Then you shall sound the loud trumpet on the tenth day of the seventh month. On the Day of Atonement you shall sound the trumpet throughout all your land. And you shall consecrate the fiftieth year, and proclaim liberty throughout the land to all its inhabitants. It shall be a jubilee for you, when each of you shall return to his property and each of you shall return to his clan. That fiftieth year shall be a jubilee for you; in it you shall neither sow nor reap what grows of itself nor gather the grapes from the undressed vines. For it is a jubilee.

A jubilee - an anniversary, has two major components: 1) to thank God for what has been 2) to ask God to bless and to guide for what will be. On my fortieth anniversary of my priesthood, I could not begin to name the countless gifts God has given me through the workings of the Holy Spirit. I have been brought to amazement by how God works in the lives of his people and how he has used me, a very human and sinful creature, to be one of his instruments of grace. As I look at my life as a priest, I am very humbled by pondering how God allowed me to minister in his name. Whatever our calling in life, be it marriage, the single life, divorced, widowed, young or old, we know all our lives are a mystery, and we stand in awe at the wonder and workings of the Lord. God and his people have allowed me to enter their lives at the best and worst of times, to be with them in both joy and sorrow, and the bonds those moments create are very powerful.

od has brought me to many places over this forty-year journey. I spent years teaching high school students, guiding seminarians on the way to the Redemptorist life and priesthood, serving the Redemtorists as an administrator, and preaching innumerable retreats and missions in a great variety of places. Each ministry was a wonderful path to encounter and serve God with my humble efforts. I can look back at each of those assignments with powerful memories of people who became part of my life and memory.

Without sounding patronizing in any way, these last four years at St. Martin's have been so very special. It is the first time in my forty years I have served full time in a parish, sharing life with the thousands of people who make up our parish. It may not be the most spiritual of images, but I think of the words from the television show *Cheers* to capture how I feel about St. Martin's:

Be glad there's one place in the world Where everybody knows your name, And they're always glad you came; You want to go where people know, People are all the same;

You want to go where everybody knows your name.

Where everybody knows your name,






The Respect Life Committee will be presenting an "End of Life" seminar on Saturday, June 6th at 10AM in St. Alphonsus Hall.

ast week, we experienced a very powerful witness of the bond that police officers share with one another as we saw thousands policemen and women gather from the United States and Canada to stand in tribute to Officer Brian Moore who died in the line of duty. Police officers come because they know well the dangers of walking the beat or riding in a patrol car. They come in support of one another, in support of the family of Brian Moore, and to make a clear statement on the value of any police officer's life.

I think we were all touched by how the local community in our surrounding areas joined in support of Brian Moore, his family and the police. I heard a story about the employees of St. Joseph Hospital as they lined up outside their hospital to offer water and support to the police officers who were attending the funeral. We still see many of our streets lined with blue ribbons that were donated by local florists. Once this young man was pronounced dead, the police and the local community had a very clear mission: to honor a fallen hero and to offer support to his family and to one another.

Today, on the feast of the Ascension, we see our Lord Jesus Christ give the apostles and the Church its mission, not only for a day or week but until he returns in his glory. We hear that mission so clearly proclaimed by Jesus in today's Gospel. Jesus said to his disciples: Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved; whoever does not believe will be condemned.

This is the work of the Church and all who believe in the Good News of Jesus Christ: *go and proclaim the Gospel to all creatures and baptize them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit.* I always read this Gospel at baptisms since it tells us why we are church baptizing a baby. We are doing what Christ said to do.

I met a priest the other day who told me about the five L's that every pastor must face: lights, locks, lawns, leaks, and liability. I must say that in the past four years I have had experience with all of these key realities of pastoring. We have had leaks and lights difficulties. The keys in my office are still a mystery to me. When Genny, our parish secretary, tells me there is lawyer on the phone, my heart skips a beat!

Fortunately the lawns give me no worry since we have a great gardening committee. If there was a good word beginning with an L for capturing parishioners saying it is too cold in church or it is too hot in church, I would add that to the list.

Yet in spite of the five L's, I love being a pastor. It is a delight to baptize children, marry couples, celebrate first communions, anniversaries, preside at the Holy Eucharist, forgive sins in the name of Jesus, teach children, and be part of such a beautiful parish community. I would say that as I think about all the ministries I have as a priest here at St. Martin's, celebrating funeral Masses is the most powerful. Now you may say that is because I am Irish and there is something about death that fascinates us, but that is not the case. There is no greater moment to preach the Gospel than at a funeral Mass. The congregation is feeling a deep sense of loss, is wondering about the ultimate meaning of life, and reflecting on their own mortality.

o matter how the homily is shaped at funeral Mass, the message is consistently unified: *Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again*. That is the core of the proclamation of the Gospel. This message is proclaimed in all our sacramental celebrations, in particular at the celebration of every Mass, but I think it is most clearly heard at a time of loss when our hearts are seeking comfort and meaning.

The parish of St. Martin of Tours, the Diocese of Rockville Centre, the Pope, the Cardinals and all the Vatican exist for one purpose only: Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature. Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved; whoever does not believe will be condemned. From our first days, we have been a missionary church. The apostles, guided by the Holy Spirit, began to build up communities of believers. Men and women, both lay and religious, have left home to go on the foreign missions to proclaim the Gospel. We have an experience of a missionary here at St. Martin's in Father Ciya who has left home to be a proclaimer here in Bethpage.

I think we may grow weary of second collections and diocesan appeal. I know I do at times, but they remind us that we are not a church in isolation - we are part of the universal church with concerns about all the people of the world. A key aspect of being a member of a parish is to help each other in faith. We go to God together. I need you to help me in my living the Gospel and you need me to assist you. When we speak about the body of Christ, we can speak of Christ's body while he was on earth, the resurrected body of Jesus, the Body of Christ in the Eucharist, and the Body of Christ in one another. *Amen* means *I believe*. We say *Amen* as we receive Holy Communion and we say another form of *Amen* as we greet each other in Christ in the sign of Peace.

When I was in the seminary as a student, I dreamed of going on the missions to Brazil. Periodically, we would hear great stories of priests riding horses for hours to go to the smallest villages to baptize and preach. I did not receive that assignment and the horses of Brazil wrote a thank you letter to the provincial. Since I struggle with English, I am not sure if I ever could have learned Portuguese. Still, I was called to be a missionary in my daily priestly life in New York, Washington, Erie PA, and now here in St. Martin's. The same holds true for you. Although a few of our parishioners have gone on mission projects, most of us have the mission of living the Gospel in our families, in our neighborhoods, in our parish, and in our work. Most of us do not preach, yet the greatest preaching of all is the witness of our lives. Like the first apostles, we face many challenges to be faithful to the Gospel. Our society is growing more and more secular. There was a study released that shows belief in Christ is on the decline in the USA.

But we go forth with great courage and conviction, fortified by the Eucharist and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit to follow the words Christ gave before he returned to the Father: *Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature*. As we open our hearts to the Holy Spirit, we will be guided to our own path of proclaiming the Good News.

Services include individual and group counseling; groups for early sobriety; DWI/mandated and aftercare; educational programs; crisis intervention; psychiatric services; medical evaluations; and referrals. The program also serves spouses, adolescents, significant others, co-dependents, and adult children of alcoholics (ACOAs). Our clinics provide counseling services in Spanish.
