The Pastor's Letter

Three brothers were having a conversation about their childhood. The oldest brother said, "You know, Mom has thousands of pictures of me in various photo albums. I think there was not a moment of my entire early life from the moment I was born until the day I went to kindergarten that is not captured with a photo!" The second oldest son said, "I envy you! I have several beautiful photo albums Mom bought, but there are no pictures in any of them!" The youngest son answered, "Stop complaining! I don't even have a photo album!"

Although I am sure this story is a bit of an exaggeration, there is a certain ring of truth. It is not that parents love any one child more than the other, but when it comes to photos, the first child seems to be the most filmed. I like to use this story to talk about the Blessed Trinity. We all use the word God very much in our day to day lives. Good news brings a quick, *"Thank God!"* Bad news leads to *"Oh My God!"* Flashing red lights behind our car when we are driving often leads to *"Oh, God, no!"* Although we can occasionally slip, we try to use the name of God with reverence and respect.

Still as Christians, it has been revealed to us in the Bible that God is three persons. This is a most com-



plex mystery for us but we speak of God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It seems as Catholics, in our own ways, we tend to assign different roles and jobs to God: the Father is the Creator of the Heavens and Earth. He is the one who dealt with Adam and Eve. The Father is the person that Jesus is often speaking to in the Gospels. Jesus sits at the right hand of the Father. All of us have had a father. Most likely we had good relationships with our father and the word father evokes a warm feeling toward God the Father. He is often pictured as an elderly, kind figure with a long beard - sort of a Santa Claus image.

I think we are most familiar with Jesus. There are many beautiful paintings and images of him in the world of art. Here at St. Martin's, we have a powerful image of the Risen Christ above our altar. We have seen Jesus scourged in the Mel Gibson's movie, *The Passion of the Christ*. We have seen images of Jesus in the musicals *Godspell* and *Jesus Christ Superstar*. Most of all, we hear about what Jesus said and did every Sunday as the Gospels are proclaimed. Of the three persons of the Blessed Trinity, most of us would feel more of a connection to Jesus. He had a mother. He was hungry. He ate meals. He died out of love for us. We can get our mind around these ideas.

The Holy Spirit is the most elusive. The very word spirit conveys someone without a body, someone who is not controlled by space and time. In the Scriptures, as we heard in our first reading today, the wind is a great image of the Holy Spirit. Unless we are scientists or meteorologist, we do not know where the wind comes from or where it goes. Still we can see its effect: there is nothing like a cool and gentle breeze on a hot summer day. We know the power of the wind as we recall the incredible power of Hurricane Sandy as it knocked down homes, trees and tossed boats about on the sea. We do not see the wind but we can certainly feel its effect. In the story of Pentecost, red flames are seen on the heads of the apostles - thus we associate red with the Holy Spirit. When you watch a fire in a fireplace, it is changing and moving every second. There is no way to predict exactly what it will look like moment to moment. The fire brings light to the darkness and warmth to the cold. We experience its effects.

Any of us struggled with the changes we experienced in the new Missal several years ago. I know I did. Still, there is one sentence that at first bothered me, but it has now come to touch my heart very much. Just before the consecration of the Mass, the priest extends his hands over the bread and wine and says, *Make holy these gifts, we pray, by sending down your Spirit upon them like the dewfall.* The laying on of hands is always a symbol in our faith, asking the Holy Spirit to come among us. A bishop lays his hands on a person to be confirmed or a young man about to be ordained. In the sacrament of the sick, the priest lays hands over the sick person asking for the healing presence of the Spirit of God. In marriage, the priest extends his hands over a newly married couple as he prays the Nuptial blessing. When I want to leave to go somewhere hurriedly in the morning, the dewfall can be annoying. But on a hot summer day, if you are on vacation and go for an early morning walk in the grass without your shoes, it is a delight to walk among the fresh water that mysteriously fell upon the earth during the night. It is another image of the Holy Spirit.

Throughout the Gospel, Jesus told us about the Holy Spirit. He told us, "I will not leave you orphans. I will send an Advocate, the Holy Spirit, who will be with you to guide you until the end of the ages." The Holy Spirit is the presence of God on earth. We know the Spirit best, not in seeing his presence but in experiencing his action in our lives. Spiritual writers tell us that most often when we say God helped me at that moment of my life, or I felt the presence of God at that moment, or even I know Jesus was guiding me, or I could not have done that without the help of God, we are speaking about the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit of God is present among us. Most often the Spirit gives us gentle nudges to do something for another or to change some part of our lives. Still, there are other times, when the Holy Spirit hits us like a two by four calling us to a radical change in our lives or a new beginning. If we look over any day of our lives, we will see the Holy Spirit was active in it. The Spirit may have invited us to do certain actions or say certain words. Maybe we responded, maybe we did not, but He was there.

For me the best image to give us a sense of the Holy Spirit is breath. Spirit means breath. The word *inspire* comes from the Latin - to breathe into. We know that breath is a fundamental sign of life. If we are breathing, we are alive. If we wish to know how close God the Holy Spirit is to us, pay attention to your breathing. Breathe in, breathe out. God the Holy Spirit is in the breath of life.

If we approach with faith, we too will see Jesus... for the Eucharistic table takes the place of the crib. Here the Body of the Lord is present, wrapped not in swaddling clothes but in the rays of the Holy Spirit. -- St. John Chrysostom

Recently, a fellow called me who I had not spoken to in almost fifty years. He lived here on Long Island in Suffolk, had seen my name somewhere and got in touch with me. He wanted to go to lunch. I was certainly surprised by the call since it had been so long since we talked. We were part of a Brooklyn crowd that played stickball, box ball, went to Coney Island and Met games all through the summer. Long before the high tech video games of today, I had created a baseball game in my basement that entertained my buddies for hours.

Before I went to lunch, I was a bit anxious. What would we talk about? Fifty years is a long time. Remarkably, he looked the same as I remembered him and we had a very nice lunch at Sweeney's. We talked about growing up, especially our high school days since he had gone to the Redemptorist minor seminary as did I, and then we talked about our lives over the past years. It was a very pleasant lunch.

Remembering is the opposite of dismember. When someone is dismembered, they lose part of themselves, perhaps a limb or a finger. To remember is to hold onto, to not let go. Remembering tells us who we are, where we have come from, what makes us who we are today. We sort our memories: some makes us smile, some embarrass or shame us, some bring a tear, and some slow-ly fade away in time. How often we begin a sentence with the phrase, "I remember when..." I think the older we get the more we speak about our memories. One of the hardest times of my life was when I saw my parents slowly lose their memories. It is said when you have Alzheimer's. Your memories die before your actual death.

Catholics love to remember; it is essential to our faith. The Bible is our family album, our book of memories as we tell stories about creation, being rescued from slavery by Moses, and about arks and whales. The core memory of our faith is the Eucharist as we recall the words of Jesus at the Last Supper: *do this in memory of me*. Every time we have Mass, we are remembering in such a profound way that the past becomes the present. At the Eucharist, we believe Christ is dying and rising now just as he did 2,000 years ago. We are swept up in the mystery of Our Lord's death and resurrection.

oday, Memorial Day, is the day we remember as Americans all the men and women who have given their lives for us in protection of our nation, our values, and our liberty. Many of these men and women died not only for our nation but to free people under oppression all over the world. This is a day when we think of Yorktown, Gettysburg, the trenches of World War I, Normandy, Guadalcanal, Korea, Vietnam, Iraq, and Afghanistan.

Today, there are men and women in the far corners of the world, in the skies, and on and under the ocean who cannot sit at a family barbecue, watch a ballgame, or walk the beach because they are on duty for us. I cannot help but think of the three police officers from our region who have died since last Memorial Day while serving us: Wenjian Liu, Rafael Ramos, and Brian Moore. Other police officers in our nation also have paid the highest price for their commitment. How sad that some have sought to besmirch the character of the men and women who walk a beat and drive a squad car. We think of the firefighters and all the rescue personnel of 9/11 who lived the words of the Gospel: *There is no greater love than to lay down your life for another*.

Our nation has its faults; we are not perfect. Still, we come from good stock. Generation after generation has come forward to serve our nation and they show us what is best in all of us. Remembering is not simply about the past. True remembering inspires us to move forward, to claim what is best from our past, to make it part of our present, and to move forward with courage and hope. God has blessed our nation with countless men and women, most unknown to us who died in service to others. We pray for them and their families. We commit to doing what we can do, in our ways, to make our nation a just and compassionate land, faithful to one another and to God.

emorial Day Weekend was perfect this year with clear, sunny weather and a wonderful time to sit with family at a backyard barbeque. There is also the other side of Memorial Day Weekend. The traffic! The long waits on lines for those sales. Sometimes we forget the real meaning of Memorial Day!

Every man and woman that gave his or her life in the line of duty is memorialized on that day! For every war, every conflict that put America in danger, a life was sacrificed from the Revolutionary War to the Gulf War and on and on. Imagine! The program also serves spouses, adolescents, significant others, co-dependents, and adult children of alcoholics (ACOAs). Our clinics provide counseling services in Spanish.
