## The Pastor's Letter

I love the song You Raise Me Up that Josh Groban sings. The refrain of the song goes like this: You raise



me up, so I can stand on mountains, You raise me up to walk on stormy seas; I am strong, when I am on your shoulders; You raise me up...to be more than I can be.

Since I arrived here at St. Martin's on a hot July day in 2011, you have shown me great love and appreciation. In a very profound and moving way, this past Sunday, June 14, 2015, I was surrounded in love as we raised our hearts in prayer and gratitude to God for my forty years of priesthood. So many of my family and friends have commented

on the warmth and welcoming attitude of our parish. I heard several times from them, Father Pat we are so happy to see you so loved by the people of the parish.

As I often say, it is dangerous to offer particular thank you's since so many people contributed to making my fortieth jubilee a day that I will never forget and a day that moves me forward with great energy for further service of the Gospel. #### Homily for Father Pat Woods 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Ordination John Mc Gowan, C.Ss.R. - June 14, 2015

e are all here today to celebrate not just 40 years of priesthood but the 40 years of Pat Woods priesthood. I once heard a woman at a parish mission say to Father Pat: "If there were more priests like you, the churches wouldn't be empty." How do you make a Pat Woods priest? What is the recipe? What materials and ingredients do you need?

Well, I decided to write a <u>Pat Woods Recipe Book.</u> First of all, you need certain ingredients and materials. So you start with a young boy. Then you'll need lots of other stuff. Put the boy in a brownstone house in the Bay Ridge/Sunset Park section of Brooklyn, New York. that sits in the shadow of OLPH church. Then you need to add a wonderful Irish mother and father – Patty and Margaret Woods. You add to the mix two terrific older sisters, Geraldine and Maryanne. Stir thoroughly for 8 years in OLPH grade school. Add lots Sisters of St. Joseph to the mix. Dress the lad in an altar boy's cassock and surplice, and dungarees, sneakers and let him run on 58th Street playing stick ball, box ball with many kids on the block and give him a best friend named Pete Costello.

For seasoning while the lad is only 14 years old, pour into the ingredients a cup full of an <u>impossible</u> <u>dream</u> for him to become a priest. You need that Dream. That is the most necessary part of the recipe. The Mother of Jesus had an impossible experience when she was 14 and her intended, Joseph, had many angels visiting him in his dreams. So the dream is most important. Then add a dash of <u>Desire</u>. A desire so strong that it pushes the lad to board a bus with dozens of others to travel 500 miles to a high school seminary called "North East."

Similar to Mary's journeys from Nazareth to her cousin Elisabeth, to Bethlehem and to Egypt, have the lad travel from Brooklyn to North East, PA to Ilchester, MD and then to Esopus, NY. Set the oven temperature at not too hot and not too cold and let it baste for 12 years. Then on a sunny June morning take it out of the oven and there you'll have a brand new Redemptorist priest. But that is only the beginning.

You now have to season this rookie priest with a year at Fordham University getting him a Master's degree in literature. Then send him back to St. Mary's Seminary as a teacher for 10 years. While he's there flavor him with many weekends conducting Engaged Encounter weekends to young couples. Give him a year as a preacher and parish priest in OLPH, Brooklyn before you send him to Washington, DC to be rector of major seminarians.

Gradually move him to the top of the oven. Allow him to minister as Vicar to the Redemptorist Provincial for 12 years. Then serve him to the hungry Catholic world as Provincial Superior of the all Redemptorists in the northeastern part of the U.S. Let all enjoy and be nourished by him for 6 years as our leader, pastor, mentor and friend whom many labeled as "the best Provincial we have ever had." But you are not done yet. You are far from finished. Take him out of the administration oven and serve him as pastor to the people of St. Martin of Tours parish in Bethpage, NY. Allow them to savor, taste and delight in the delicious pastoring of this nutritious entrée.

And that's my <u>How to Make a Pat Woods Recipe Book.</u> Then it dawned on me. When all is said and done, it is impossible to make another Pat Woods priest. There is only one. There can never be a clone. There might be many imitations of the original but there will never, ever be another priest quite like Father Pat Woods. So we will just have to settle with the original. When God called Father Patrick Woods into being through the love of Margaret and Paddy Woods, He threw away his recipe book. Father Pat Woods is a one and only. He is a first edition. Let's bless, praise and thank God for that.

So let's forget about my recipe book and allow me to tell you the Pat Woods story. When I celebrated my 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary as a priest, Pat gifted me with a pewter St. Patrick chalice. Around the cup were scenes from the life of St. Patrick. Along the base Pat had engraved the words: Teacher – Priest – Preaching Partner – Pastor – Friend. These words are actually a definition Father Patrick Woods. They are words quite similar to the 4 legs of Alphonsian spirituality: The Crib – the Cross – the Eucharist – and Mary. Those words also describe the life and the priesthood of Father Pat Woods.

#### 1) The **Crib** refers to the **Incarnation** – Christ becoming one of us.

So did Father Pat. He is one of us. Jesus once said, "I no longer call your servants but friends." Pat has been a FRIEND to all of us. He is first of all friend to his two families: his biological family and his Redemptorist family. He shows this friendship most of all in his presence to and with us. He loves being present to his sister Maryanne and her children, Chrissy, Claire, Robbie, their spouses and their children.

Like Jesus Pat has always had an open heart for the underdog. He has been a long suffering Jet, Met, Ranger and Knick fan. He has also befriended and cared for so many lesser known characters in our Redemptorist community. His presence in their lives, the time and attention he gave them has brightened many a confrere's life. Having Pat Woods as your friend makes your life special. Ask John Mc Gowan, Kevin O'Neil, Francis Gargani and Al Bradley. Ask his sister Maryanne and her children Christine, Claire and Robbie. Ask Kathy Peterson and his many good friends from North East and Erie, PA. Ask all the Collins and Brody families. In his 40 years as a priest, Father Pat has baptized, married and buried more of his relatives than St. Francis Xavier did in his entire career. As one cousin put it so well "Father Pat is always there for us." If Christianity is a religion of friendship, then what a friend we have in Jesus! And what a gospel friend we have in Father Pat Woods! "The Word became flesh and dwells among us ."Patrick Woods became a priest and dwells among us too.

2) The second leg in Alphonsian spirituality is **the Cross.** 

Pat has known and experienced the cross in his life. His darkest day was the day his sister Geraldine died suddenly and all too soon before her time. He has known the cross of a serious illness – operated on for an aortic aneurysm. "I'll see you on the other side." He's known the cross of a terrible snow storm on the day he marched as the grand marshal in the Bethpage St. Patrick's Day parade.

He knew the pain, the worry, the sleepless nights with the Madoff ponsey scheme that would have damaged the C.SS.R. financially had not Pat as our Provincial directed us to tighten our belts with a leaner lifestyle. He single handedly got us through that crisis.

Like all of us he has lost people he loved – his parents, relatives and friends - but he believes and preaches so often that the cross is not the end; that the cross is the great icon of love we have in our days. Jesus' death on the cross saved us from sin and death and Pat constantly reminds us of the greater love Jesus has for each and everyone of us.

Pat's favorite Biblical word is Emmanuel - "God with us." He believes and preaches constantly to all of us that no matter what happens - no matter what sorrow or loss come our way, we are not alone. Christ is with us.

The third leg of Redemptorist spirituality is **the Eucharist.** The Table of the Word and the Table of the Sacrament. Father Pat Woods is a Eucharistic person. We experience this in his creative and imaginative sermons and his homilies and writings. He has the great gift of making connections with the Word of God and peoples' lives. He has the Bible in one hand and the New York Post in the other. He connects the spiritual world with the secular world.

Pat is a master story teller, a great recantour. If he lived in Ireland he'd be a "Shenachie." I know and enjoy all his stories from preaching over 83 parish missions with him (with 3 in Ireland) and about 20 weekend retreats. That's how I became a witness to his amazing Catholic imagination. Father Pat lives in the enchanted world of statues, holy water, stained glass windows, candles, saints, medals, rosaries and holy pictures. Deacon Jim Biggin once told me in jest that St. Martin of Tours Church needs some more walls to hold all the holy pictures, scenes and portraits that Pat has installed.

Father Pat sees in all things Catholic hints of a deeper and more pervasive sense that allows him to see the holy lurking everywhere in creation. His world is haunted by the sense that objects, events and people of everyday life are revelations of grace.

Pat is a Eucharistic person. At the Last Supper, Jesus took, broke, blessed and gave. Everyday Father Pat **takes** and accepts God's will. He **breaks** his own will so often for God and others. He **blesses.** He is a blessing person. He says well to and of others. And he **gives** of himself each day. He **does** all this and so much more in memory of Him. The 4<sup>th</sup> leg of Alphonsian spirituality is **the love of Mary.** Father Pat Woods is a lover of Mary. His favorite gospel passage is Luke's account of the Annunciation. Pat calls this the most important event in all history: the moment when Mary of Nazareth gave her YES to the Angel Gabriel and became the Mother of God. The moment her womb became HOLY GROUND - when she contained the Uncontainable.

Father Pat loves her most of all under the title of **Our Mother of Perpetual Help.** The icon of Perpetual Help became the wallpaper of Pat's life. He grew up in her parish, received his early sacraments there and 40 years ago he celebrated his first mass at the altar in her upper church. Her icon gazed at him in the home at 528 58<sup>th</sup> Street, from classroom walls, from rectory parlor walls and from hundreds of homes, chapels, shrines and churches.

The icon's eyes and his eyes looked at each other every day. He loved her so much that he labored hard to get her icon installed at a side altar in St. Patrick's Cathedral in Manhattan. Although he never got her to a side altar, he managed to get Cardinal Dolan to accept 2 copies of the icon for the cathedral rectory. He has left the OLPH icon in the many parishes where he preached a mission.

So there you have it. I could go on and on but we'd never finish the mass and miss out on the feast of food. To paraphrase the end of St. John's gospel: "There are still many other things to say about Father Pat Woods, yet if they were all written about in detail, I doubt that there would be room enough in the entire world to hold the books to record them."

We bless, praise and thank God for having gifted our lives with the likes of Father Patrick Woods – priest, Redemptorist, preacher, pastor, brother and most of all friend. You are all these things and more, Pat. But your great gift and blessing to my life personally and to so many of us here today is that you are our **FRIEND**. We thank you so much for that. The words of that woman are so true: "If there were more priests like Father Pat Woods, our churches wouldn't be empty."

May the road rise to meet you. May the wind be always at your back. May the sun shine warm upon your face, the rains fall soft upon your fields. And wherever you may go may God hold you, may God hold you. May you be held in the palm of God's hands.

Congratulations, Pat. Please keep it up.

esus said to the crowds: "This is how it is with the kingdom of God; it is as if a man were to scatter seed on the land and would sleep and rise night and day and through it all the seed would sprout and grow, he knows not how. Of its own accord the land yields fruit, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the grain is ripe, he wields the sickle at once, for the harvest has come." Mark 4: 26-34

There is an old song called *The Garden Song in the* musical *The Fantastics* that you might have sung in kindergarten or with one of your grandchildren. Part of it goes like this: *Inch by inch, row by row, I'm gonna make this garden grow.* All it takes is a rake and a hoe and a piece of fertile ground Inch by inch, row by row, someone bless these seeds I sow Someone warm them from below 'til the rain comes tumbling down.

Jesus loved the mystery of plant life, seeds and growth since he was from a culture that was very agricultural and rooted in the earth. He sees the growth of fruit as a kind of mystery. How does something grow from the soil and bring forth wonderful food that nourishes us and sustains our life.

Jesus said to the crowds, "This is how it is with the kingdom of God; it is as if a man were to scatter seed on the land and would sleep and rise night and day and through it all the seed would sprout and grow, he knows not how. Of its own accord the land yields fruit, first the blade, then the ear, then the full grain in the ear. And when the grain is ripe, he wields the sickle at once, for the harvest has come."

I think every first grade classroom I have ever visited had several little plants near the window sills with the name of each child on one. The teachers were introducing the children to the wonder and mystery of how things grow. Although they are the dread of homeowners, I am always amazed at the power of tree roots and how the can push up hardened concrete, or the sight of a little flower of plant growing between two slaps of concrete. It is as if Nature is boldly proclaiming that you can't stop me with all you modern efforts. It would seem that many continue the age old fight with weeds, using every kind of weed killer and tool to uproot these nuisances. I am not sure if that fight with ever be won.

One of my memories is of my first trip to a little Caribbean island named Dominica. It is a small island with only 65,000 people or so. It is a very lush land that I must admit is even more green than Ireland. Bananas, as well as many other fruits, grow everywhere. The people are poor but no one is ever hungry. We Redemptorists had several missionary priests on the island and I had the assignment to visit them and see how the missionary work was progressing. A friend of mine picked me up and gave me a tour of the beautiful island. I recall that the sun was shining very powerfully and there were gentle breezes that were blowing off of the Caribbean Sea that surrounded us.

We drove up a pretty high mountain and he stopped the car when we got to the top. The view was unbelievable. He took a few steps over to a tree and cut off a grapefruit and opened it with a knife and handed it to me. I do not think I have ever tasted anything sweeter. How did this delicious fruit grow from this earth? How did that happen? I could read science books that might try to explain it all, but I prefer to just sit in wonder at the working of God.

believe that in our Gospel reading today, Our Lord is inviting us into mystery and wonder. When m L was the last time you stood in awe at something? Perhaps it was a newborn child or grandchild, or the majesty of the ocean, or a star-filled evening. Maybe you heart was moved at a simple act of love, a few verses of music, a hot cup of coffee, or that which is most wondrous of all, a piece or chocolate. Wonder! Awe! We live and move and have our being in the presence and mystery of God. Sometimes we are moving about so fast, worrying about what I need to do tomorrow or feeling bad about what happened yesterday, that I can fail to sit and live in the wonder and presence of God. Carl Jung, the great psychologist defined neurosis as "a failure to live in the present." I remember when I was a child in grade school the Nuns taught us about the sacrament of the present moment. St. Therese of Lisieux lived in a Carmelite convent and died at the age of 24, but among her last words were, "All is grace." We might put it in another way, "Everything is a gift from God."

My all time favorite scene from literature is from Thorton Wilder's play, Our Town. The play is about ordinary life. There are three acts: Daily life, Marriage and Death. Over the course of the play we come to know a young girl named Emily. She eventually marries the boy next door named George. Emily dies in childbirth. The last act has all the deceased of the town in the cemetery. They are sitting on chairs talking to one another. Emily says that she wants to go back to life. The rest of the characters tell her not to do it. She begs for one more day and she is given the gift of going back to her 12<sup>th</sup> birthday and to relive it exactly as it was.

Her twelfth birthday is a nice time, but very simple and ordinary. Emily, back from the cemetery, is so pained watching how we all rush through life and fail to see how precious each moment is. She finally says that she must go back since it is too difficult to watch. Emily utters these famous words:

"Let's really look at one another!...It goes so fast. We don't have time to look at one another. I didn't realize. So all that was going on and we never noticed... Wait! One more look. Good-bye, Good-bye world. Good-bye, Grover's Corners....Mama and Papa. Good-bye to clocks ticking....and Mama's sunflowers. And food and coffee. And new ironed dresses and hot baths...and sleeping and waking up. Oh, earth, you are too wonderful for anybody to realize you. Do any human beings ever realize life while they live it -- every, every minute? To be alive, to be loved by God, to walk the face of this earth, to have people to love and be loved by, to be a believer in our Lord Jesus Christ, know that we are to live forever...To live in this reality is to be in the midst of the kingdom of God."

The Parish Spiritual Book Club is presently reading the great classic work, Story of a Soul, the autobiography of St. Therese of Lisieux. There are many editions, including abridged versions, of this famous book. I am reading the third edition translated by Father John Clarke, O.C.D. - a highly respected translation. There are some parts of the book that you may find a little challenging, but it is well worth reading.
