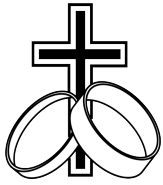

*The Pastor's Letter***Lord, Save Us! We are Drowning!**

As this Father's Day approached, I was working on a homily about fathers and family. Father's Day, a day of barbecues and ballgames, usually falling in late Spring is a perfect day to thank our fathers, grandfathers, godfathers and all the significant men in our lives for their love, and to remember in love our fathers who have gone home to God. I like Father's Day because my nieces always give me a gift under either the title Uncle Pat or Father Pat. As I proved last week with my jubilee, I love celebrating happy events. But my heart was not in preparing a Father's Day homily because of the terrible news of the tragic shooting of nine people in Charleston, S.C. These nine people at Emmanuel AME Church, one of the great historic African-American Churches of the South, were part of a Bible study group. They were killed in a house of worship in our nation. Lest they just be names to us, let me give you their names and a few words about them.

Clementa Pinckney, 41, a father to two children, and pastor of Emmanuel AME Church; Rev. Sharonda Singleton, 45, one of the handful of ministerial staff of Emanuel AME Church; Tywanza Sanders, 26, a 2014 graduate of Allen University's division of Business Administration in Columbia, S.C.; Myra Thompson 59, was on track to be an ordained minister; Cynthia Hurd, 54, a 31-year employee of the Charleston County Public Library. The library stated "she dedicated her life to serving and improving the lives of others,"; Rev. Daniel L. Simmons Sr., 74, a retired pastor from another church in Charleston. Simmons attended Emanuel AME Church every Sunday for services and Wednesdays for bible study; The Rev. DePayne Middleton-Doctor, 49, a mother of four daughters who sang in the church choir; Susie Jackson, 87, a longtime member of the church, was the oldest victim; Ethel Lee Lance, 70, was a sexton at the church. "Granny was the heart of the family," her grandson said.

Naturally, the media and the so called experts will seek to lay blame somewhere and to make sure this most sad event is used for political gain. This will be done, I believe, by people of the left and the right, liberals and conservatives. So we will begin to hear how we are a racist nation, or how we have serious issues with guns and violence, video games and movies are responsible, or our nation's mental health system is failing us. I even saw something in print that sought to lay the blame at the feet of the Fox News Network.

The initial evidence seems to be that the young murderer seemed to be mentally ill, and that his family life was quite difficult. Certainly he was a drug user. I wonder if there will be a call to slow down on the legalization of marijuana in our nation. With all our national problems with alcohol, why the push for this mind-altering substance?

We religious people, like those who gathered to study the Bible in Emmanuel AME Church, know evil. It is one of the oldest stories in the Bible. We know sin and what it means to reject God. I believe there will be few discussions of this reality in the days to come as we reflect what happened in Charleston. As our nation grows more secular and as many seek to remove God from our culture, Christians are not surprised how powerful the attraction to sin in our world is. It is a very sad reality.

It has been said racism is the original sin of our nation since the earliest days our great land allowed slavery. We fought a great Civil War to overcome slavery. Racism, in truth, comes in every color. Prejudice does not belong to any one race. Racism is a sin and we pray for the grace daily not to allow it to capture our hearts in any way.

I have never liked guns, but my nephew, one the finest men I know, has raised his children to understand and appreciate guns in light of the second amendment. I understand the complexity of this question in our nation. I do know that some of the cities with the strongest gun laws still have the highest rate of gun violence.

On this Father's Day, there is nothing greater a father can do than to seek to raise his children in love and with a sense of respect and concern for others. Certainly this applies not only to fathers, but to mothers, teachers, relatives, friends, clergy, and neighbors. I do think some in our society seek to be a friend to their child rather than a mother or father. That is a recipe for trouble. Our children need to be raised where the parents are present, know what is going on with their child, are involved in his or her daily life, and have the ability to say the word *no* to them at times. Being a parent is no easy task since the rewards of parenting are not always seen in the present, but only in the distant future.

In today's Gospel, the apostles are afraid they are about to drown. We read the following, *"Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?"* He woke up, rebuked the wind, and said to the sea, *"Quiet! Be still!"* The wind ceased and there was great calm. Then he asked them, *"Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?"*

Having faith in God is not always easy when we hear of nine people being killed in Church. Jesus never promised us faith would take away the problems of the world. He did promise us he is with us in all moments of our lives and he will never abandon us. Jesus is so very present in the pain and suffering of the families and friends of those who died. We, in our fear of sinking into the waters of depression, turn to him and know he is with us.

Had your mother been shot by this sick, young man, could you have said what Nadine Collier, daughter of Ethel Lance, one of the victims, said, *"I will never talk to her again. I will never be able to hold her again. But I forgive you. And have mercy on your soul. You hurt me. You hurt a lot of people, but God forgives you and I forgive you."*

In the world you and I live in, Jesus is our only hope and salvation.

RE: Statement on Charleston Church Shooting  
FROM: Bishop William Murphy

It is with deep sadness that we learned of the news of the killing on June 17 of nine members of the Emmanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, South Carolina.

Together in solidarity with my fellow bishops, priests, consecrated women and men and the lay faithful of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, we offer the families now in mourning our prayers and heartfelt condolences. We condemn in the strongest possible terms all kinds of racial hatred and violence.

I also join my brother bishops across the country who as Archbishop Kurtz, of Louisville, Kentucky, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops said today in his statement: "The Catholic community stands with all people who struggle for an end to racism and violence, in our families, in our places of worship, in our communities and in our world."

During Masses this weekend, I ask our pastors to remember the deceased, their families and all those affected by this senseless violence.

### A Progress Report on the Capital Campaign

I know that some people, quite understandably, have been asking when the parking lot will be paved. This is a very fair question since the Parish Capital Campaign is named *Paving the Way for Christ*. As you all know, it was recommended by our building committee that the brickwork on the school and roof be done first so that the new paving, when the lot was finished, would not be in any way damaged by heavy trucks and machines. The brickwork and the roof of the school have been completed.

We recently hired the engineer Vincent Boccia to do a complete study of the parking lot and the best way to move forward with the paving. The building committee and I were pleased with the work that both Joseph and Vincent did on the school brickwork. We could have just moved to a paving company but the committee and I felt it very important to really know what the issues have been with our parking lot in terms of drainage, sloping, and so forth. We are determined to do this work as well as we can so it will stand the test of time.

We met with Vincent last week for a review of his plan. The committee had some questions that are presently being addressed. I have written to the diocese for permission to bid out the paving. By diocesan norms, you must inform them of each project of the capital campaign and let them know the particular cost. I will not put the cost in this note since I would not want the bidders to know our thinking.

So I hope once our minor questions are addressed, we will put a notice to several respected paving companies for bids. We estimate the work will be done in either two or three stages with one section being shut down while it is being paved. No doubt, this will cause some Sunday challenges for parking.

I am learning that when it comes to this process of bidding, construction and approvals, Murphy's Law is in full effect. I would like this project done by the end of August. However, I ask not to be held to that date. I certainly want it done before next winter. I have two clichés in mind as we continue our process: *Haste makes waste*, and *Buy cheap, buy twice*. We want the work done as soon as possible, but we also want it done correctly.

Finally, I again offer my great gratitude for the wonderful participation in the ongoing funding of the capital campaign. You have been terrific in responding to the needs of the parish and meeting the pledges you made.

**RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY****THE NEW YORK STATE CATHOLIC CONFERENCE: ACTION ALERT!**

**STOP THE ASSEMBLY'S RETALIATORY ATTACK ON THE CATHOLIC CHURCH!** In apparent retaliation for the Catholic Church's strong advocacy for an EDUCATION TAX CREDIT TO HELP FAMILIES AFFORD CATHOLIC SCHOOLS, the leadership of the state Assembly, led by Speaker Carl Heastie, has suddenly decided to bring to the floor a bill that would allow for DECADES OLD TIME BARRED CLAIMS of child sexual abuse to be brought against the Catholic Church while protecting municipalities and public schools, where the majority of non-familial abuse occurs.

The bill has not been considered by the full Assembly since 2008, because of the recognition that by protecting public institutions and targeting the Church and other private institutions, the bill was unjust and created two classes of victims based solely on where the abuse occurred. The timing of this bill moving now cannot be overlooked. Some Assembly members are angry at being called out for their lack of support for Catholic school families, and are pushing for this measure in what seems obvious retaliation.

**ABORTIONS DECLINING IN NEARLY ALL STATES, ASSOCIATED PRESS SURVEY FINDS:** Several of the states that have been most aggressive in passing anti-abortion laws, including Indiana, Missouri, Ohio and Oklahoma, have seen their abortion numbers drop by more than 15% since 2010. But more liberal states such as New York, Washington and Oregon also had DECLINES of that magnitude, even as they maintained UNRESTRICTED ACCESS TO ABORTION. Nationwide, the Associated Press survey showed a decrease in abortions of about 12% since 2010.

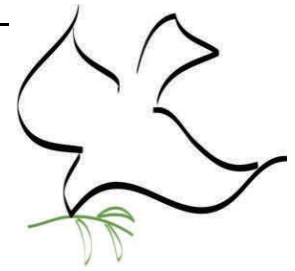
One major factor has been a decline in the teen pregnancy rate, which in 2010 reached its lowest level in decades. There's been no official update since then, but the teen birth rate has continued to drop, which experts say signals a similar trend in teen pregnancies.

Among the groups most active in promoting the restrictive laws is Americans United for Life. Its president, Charmaine Yoest, suggested that the broad decrease in abortions reflected a change in attitudes among pregnant women. "There's an entire generation of women who saw a SONOGRAM as THEIR FIRST BABY PICTURE," she said. "There's an increased awareness of the HUMANITY OF THE BABY BEFORE IT IS BORN."

"Better access to birth control and sex education are the biggest factors in reducing unintended pregnancies," said Cecile Richards, president of the PLANNED PARENTHOOD FEDERATION OF AMERICA. "More restrictive abortion laws do not reduce the need for abortions."

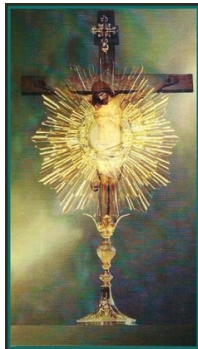

**Talbot House Chemical Dependence Crisis Center**

Talbot House is a 24-hour voluntary chemical dependence crisis center licensed by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) to provide short-term medically monitored inpatient withdrawal services to adult men and women who are in crisis. This facility provides nourishing meals, counseling, limited transportation, support groups, and referrals.

**Outpatient Clinics**

Outpatient clinics help people in recovery maintain sobriety and live independently and productively. Services include individual and group counseling; groups for early sobriety; DWI/mandated and after-care; educational programs; crisis intervention; psychiatric services; medical evaluations; and referrals. The program also serves spouses, adolescents, significant others, co-dependents, and adult children of alcoholics (ACOAs). Our clinics provide counseling services in Spanish.

**Eligibility and Fees**

Programs serve people 18 years of age and older. Sliding scale fees, Medicaid, Medicare, and other third-party insurance accepted.
