(Homily from July 4th weekend)

consider it a great blessing to be an American. I suppose almost everybody considers their country to be special. I certainly see our nation as blessed by God with all its natural resources, its prosperity, its history of liberty and freedom, and most especially its people who have blended together from all over the world to form a nation. We face challenges as a nation with immigration because so many people want to come into this land of opportunity.

As you know, I love history and I like to think the hand of God helped shaped our nation. I think of August 1776 in Brooklyn when the British Army had George Washington's Continental Army trapped in Brooklyn Heights. If Washington's Army was captured, the Revolutionary War would have been over before it began. General Washington decided to cross over to Manhattan, right around where the present Brooklyn Bridge is located. His army was blessed with fishermen from Massachusetts who understood tides and currents, but the British were so close that Washington was deeply worried that his men might be seen and captured at their most vulnerable moments on the water. However, a great fog came over Brooklyn and it allowed George Washington to escape over to Manhattan in small rowboats. Was the fog a mere coincidence or the providence of God?

I think of a raging battle that had just ended on July 4, 1863, a little more than 150 years ago in a small Pennsylvania town named Gettysburg. During that fierce three-day battle, there were countless moments when the Union Army was close to being broken and defeated. Yet, the victory was won and the Union preserved. Coincidence or the grace of God?

I remember speaking to a friend of mine who was a priest from Belgium. He had lived through the Nazi occupation of his country. He was moved to tears as he spoke about the rows upon rows of crosses in the American cemetery. He said, they were such young boys! They gave their lives to free us from Hitler. I love America!

God has been good to our nation, and we seek to respond to any natural disaster in any part of the world. We send food and supplies to those who are hungry and in need. We try to defend the oppressed. We have our national programs to care for the elderly, the poor, and those in great need.

Yet, we know we are not a perfect nation. We have our flaws and sins. Even though we have made great progress, we still struggle with the haunting remnants of slavery and how to deal with issues that sometimes seem to divide us as a people by color. As a nation of immigrants, we are challenged by so many new immigrants who want to cross our boarders without being documented. The right to life of babies in the womb is not protected by our laws. Violence is a mainstay of our movies and video games that sometimes overflows to real terror in our streets, and in terrible outbursts of multiple murders.

On this Fourth of July, I am worried as an American. I do not seek to point fingers at any one person or political party. My major concern is that the right of a person to hold beliefs based on religious principles and values is slowly being eroded in our nation.

et me start with the most difficult topic to address: same sex marriage. If one is opposed to same sex marriage, he or she is told they are a bigot and a homophobe, that he or she is seeking to deny people of their fundamental rights. The Supreme Court has spoken and affirmed the right to same sex marriage. As an American citizen, leaving aside my religious beliefs, I believe the decision was wrong and should have been left to each state to decide. I do not think nine Supreme Court Justices should define what marriage is.

I believe gay people and gay couples should be given every civil right that any American has. I also believe marriage has been defined by thousands of years of history and was given to human beings by God for the procreation of children and to express committed love between a husband and wife. To believe that, in my mind, is not being anti-gay; it is simply based on history and conviction. I know not everybody believes that. I do not intend to spend my time and energy trying to debate those who disagree with me. The Court has spoken and gay marriage is now legal in all 50 states.

It is a sin to degrade people due to their sexuality, their color, their ethnic background or their age. No Christian should ever belittle a person because of their sexual orientation, their race, creed or color. As Christians, we seek to treat all people with love. At the same time, I think it is also equally wrong to harshly criticize people and even threaten their livelihoods for their deeply held religious convictions. I fear that is a growing trend in our nation.

My concern is not to try to stop same sex marriages. My fear is the law of our land may eventually try to have people act against their values by forcing them to cooperate in a ceremony they do not accept due to their spiritual convictions. This has already been happening. A recent article in the *New York Times* asked the question, "Is it time to challenge religious institutions and their tax exemption status?" If the churches lose their tax exemptions, it would cause almost irrevocable damage to the practice of religion in America. I am convinced some secularists are so against religion that their goal is to destroy it. I am not blaming gay people for this, but rather there is a hardcore group of people, who, for whatever reason, hate religion.

This hostile attitude is so very far from the principles of those who founded our nation in 1776. The founders of our nation were so committed to protecting religious freedom they made it the first amendment of our Constitution: Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

A prominent political figure in referring to abortion rights said this: Deep-seated cultural codes, religious beliefs and structural biases have to be changed. This political figure is demanding that one change his or her religious beliefs to accept abortion. Governor Cuomo said: Extreme conservatives who are right-to-life, pro-assault—weapon, anti-gay...have no place in the State of New York. I am not an extreme conservative, I am not anti-gay, nor do I want an assault weapons, but I am for the right to life from conception to natural death, and I am not leaving the state in to which I was born and raised.

hat is beginning to happen in our nation is well beyond whether we can put a Christmas tree in the town square or sing *Silent Night* at the school Christmas pageant. Christians and other religious groups are beginning to be told since your values may be out of line with American culture, you need to change them or give them up. We feel very safe at St. Martin's celebrating our faith so freely. Such a freedom might be taken for granted since it has always been there.

This homily may too political for you. I have not mentioned our Lord Jesus until now. Forming and following one's conscience is what Christ calls us to do. God reveals himself in the Scriptures, in the Church, and in our hearts. We listen to our conscience to decide how to do what we believe God asks of us.

I love this quote from Abraham Lincoln and I will end this homily with it. When Lincoln was asked if God was on the side of the Union in the Civil War - *Sir, my concern is not whether God is on our side; my greatest concern is to be on God's side, for God is always right.* God bless America!

At some of the Masses last weekend, I told the story of one of my memories of the Fourth of July. My Dad was a very hard working man, who I believe might have had two weeks of vacation after working many years at Grand Central Terminal. We sometimes went away to the Catskills for a week but most often it was Rockaway and Coney Island on day trips. I think Dad spent most of the summer working on projects around the house on a long "Honey Do" list from Mom. But every year on the Fourth of July he would say, "It is the Fourth of July! The summer is over!" My sisters and I would yell that the summer was just beginning. Now that I am at the age when he was saying that, I truly do begin to understand how fast the summer passes.

If we are lucky enough to have a vacation, and blessed enough to have good health to travel from home, and can afford it, it is blessing to have a time of recreation. At first glance, the word recreation might sound like a word that kindergarten children would use right before the milk and cookies and nap time. But, I prefer the word recreation over vacation. I may be stretching it a bit, but I find recreation a more spiritual term than vacation.

I went to an interesting website entitled *Online Etymology Dictionary*. This nifty site outlines the history of a word and from whence it has come down to modern times from the past.

vacation (n.)

late 14c., "freedom from obligations, leisure, release" (from some activity or occupation), from Old French vacacion "vacancy, vacant position" (14c.) and directly from Latin vacationem (nominative vacatio) "leisure, freedom, exemption, a being free from duty, immunity earned by service," noun of state from past participle stem of vacare "be empty, free, or at leisure" (see vain).

recreation (n.)

late 14c., "refreshment or curing of a person, refreshment by eating," from Old French recreacion (13c.), from Latin recreationem (nominativerecreatio) "recovery from illness," noun of action from past participle stem of recreare "to refresh, restore, make anew, revive, invigorate," from re-"again" (see <u>re-</u>) + creare (see <u>create</u>). Meaning "refresh oneself by some amusement" is first recorded c. 1400.

As you can see from reading the two different words, they certainly have some similarities. Freedom from obligations would be appealing to many of us, as well as a being free from duty, immunity earned by service. It seems to be the root of the word vacation is vacancy, vacant position. Although *vacation* is a fine word, literally it seems to me more about leaving something rather than moving toward something. *Recreation* has a different shade of meaning. I like the focus on *refreshment, make anew, revive, invigorate, to create.* Recreation seems to be a more active words than vacation.

You may think I'm getting too picky over words but I think I am speaking more about a mindset than the meaning of a word. People love their leisure, especially a vacation of a week or two. There is a great need in modern society to slow down and to rest. But I hope, when on a vacation, we are also about refreshing and recreating ourselves. How do you do that?

ell, first of all, we would all do very well to put down our cell phones and iPads. We all say we just want some peace and quiet; well then recreation is about finding the time to slow down and **be** quiet. We could read a book that we have longed to read and have not had the time. It can be a beach novel or a more serious book that allows us to think a little more deeply about life. We might go for a hike through a scenic area or bike ride at a leisurely pace (I have no other speed). Meals with family and friends can be savored and enjoyed rather than rushed. We might sit at night and recover the lost skill of conversation.

Recreation is more about being than doing. Perhaps if you don't mind getting up a bit early, you might make daily Mass part of your recreation or a five or ten minute period of prayer. I like to look at the word recreation as re-creation. I hope that I come back from vacation a little bit different, refreshed and ready to live with energy and enthusiasm. I would caution you not to try to do much on your vacation. I know I have sometimes said after a vacation, that I need a vacation after my vacation! Try once a day to quote the psalm: Be still and know that I am God. Perhaps consider putting a note on the refrigerator of wherever you are on vacation: Make time for quiet moments as God whispers and the world is loud.

I have always liked song *Morning Has Broken* sung by Cat Stephens and written by Eleanor Farjeon. Once the world was new and fresh, being created by our loving God. But the song writer tells us that every day is a time to enter into God's recreation of the new day.

Morning Has Broken

Morning has broken, like the first morning Blackbird has spoken, like the first bird Praise for the singing, praise for the morning Praise for the springing fresh from the word. Sweet the rain's new fall, sunlit from heaven Like the first dewfall, on the first grass. Praise for the sweetness of the wet garden Sprung in completeness where his feet pass. Mine is the sunlight, mine is the morning Born of the one light, Eden saw play. Praise with elation, praise every morning God's re-creation of the new day.

Speaking of vacations and recreation, I will be taking vacation from July 10th to July 26th. Fathers Henry, Jim and Ciya will be here and any pastoral needs can brought to them. God bless you and I will pray for you on my re-creation!



Talbot House Chemical Dependence Crisis Center

Talbot House is a 24-hour voluntary chemical dependence crisis center licensed by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) to provide short-term medically monitored inpatient withdrawal services to adult men and women who are in crisis. This facility provides nourishing meals, counseling, limited transportation, support groups, and referrals.

Outpatient Clinics

Outpatient clinics help people in recovery maintain sobriety and live independently and productively. Services include individual and group counseling; groups for early sobriety; DWI/mandated and aftercare; educational programs; crisis intervention; psychiatric services; medical evaluations; and referrals. The program also serves spouses, adolescents, significant others, co-dependents, and adult children of alcoholics (ACOAs). Our clinics provide counseling services in Spanish.

Eligibility and Fees

Programs serve people 18 years of age and older. Sliding scale fees, Medicaid, Medicare, and other third-party insurance accepted.
