The Pastor's Letter

I think it was Johnny Carson who said never try to compete with kids or animals when you are doing a talk show. Well, I might be taking that risk now. What has dominated the news cycle for the last week has been the death of Cecil the Lion who was killed by an American dentist named Walter Palmer, a recreational game hunter. The New York Times wrote, "The 13-year-old lion was a star attraction at the Hwange National Park in Zimbabwe, out of which the hunters lured him with a carcass, and he wore a collar by which scientists at the University of Oxford had been tracking him since 2008. It was wrong and, according to the Zimbabwe Conservation Task Force, illegal to kill Cecil. Doctor Palmer, who reportedly paid more than \$50,000 for the hunt, said he relied on local guides and did not know it was an illegal hunt."

I was saddened by the death of Cecil. I have always loved lions and found them to be such beautiful creatures that God created. Perhaps some of my love comes from the movies, *The Lion King* and *The Wizard of Oz*. I have a little statue of the Cowardly Lion in my office. I really have never thought much about big game hunting and those who do it. I know many are horrified by this practice while others claim is it necessary to thin the herd for conservation reasons. Maybe this terrible incident will become a moment when people can reconsider the question of hunting wild animals.

What has surprised me is the overwhelming media coverage this killing has generated. It has been front page news in the papers for several days. I have read that this story is being covered all over the world. Although I certainly understand that people are justifiably angry at Doctor Palmer, I am also surprised at the rage and threats of violence that have been directed at him. If Palmer broke the law, he should be punished. However, there is no excuse for people wishing to kill him or harm his family.

Why this great outburst over the death of Cecil? I think the first thing that comes to my mind is that he had a name. That sounds simple, but if the papers were writing about a lion being killed, I do not think it would have near the power of saying "Cecil" was murdered. Also Cecil was an innocent creature of God who posed no threat to the hunters if he had been left alone. I like most animals, but I do understand that there are many people who have a profound love for the animals God has created and someone like myself can learn from them.

Still at the same time this tragic story about Cecil was dominating the newspapers, there were serious reports about Planned Parenthood casually talking about selling the body parts of eight and nine month old babies who had been aborted. Several videos have emerged from undercover reporters that are horrifying as clinic doctors discuss so casually about harvesting organs from late term abortions. The videos are very difficult to watch. The media has been quick to downplay these videos and say that they are doctored. It strikes me that the films do not lie no matter how much they may or may not have been edited. But a great part of the media is pro-abortion and has no tolerance for anything that threatens their position. However, a very strong pro-abortion leader and a great supporter of Planned Parenthood, Hilary Clinton recently said she was disturbed by undercover videos of Planned Parenthood officials discussing the sale of fetal tissue. "I have seen pictures from them and obviously find them disturbing," Clinton told The New Hampshire Union Leader.

I understand what a divisive issue abortion is in our nation. I also have spoken with many women who had abortions, perhaps when they were young or under enormous pressure. Having an abortion is wrong, but God's mercy is powerful so when I write or speak about abortion I want those who have had abortions never to feel outside the love and mercy of God. I am not condemning you.

What troubles me is the abortion industry that masks itself as being so favorable to women. No mention is ever made of what a baby in the womb experiences in a late term abortion. I was surprised to read that even a country as liberal as France does not allow abortion after 20 weeks. Kirstin Powers states, "The United States is only one of four countries (China, North Korea and Canada) in the entire world which allows abortions to be performed so late, and for any reason." You read that right. We are one of four out of 196 countries in this world that permit abortion after twenty weeks of gestation. This industry does not speak about their profits. Even more troubling is that Planned Parenthood is subsidized by the Federal Government with our tax dollars.

So my question is why are we not as disturbed about what some units of Planned Parenthood are doing as we are with Cecil the Lion? Certainly the late term aborted babies are as innocent as Cecil. Granted, they are unnamed and hidden away from us because the dark practices of late term abortion and the sale of infant body parts. If they came to light, it would outrage most Americans and would threaten practices that are supported by much of the media and do harm to pro-abortion politicians. I Googled Planned Parenthood and the *New York Times*, and all their recent articles of the paper were saying that these undercover videos were doctored and that the problem lies with radical conservatives out to restrict abortion.

I am glad that Cecil's tragic death received media coverage. I only wish our media would have given equal, if not *more* coverage, to another horror that is occurring in our nation: the calloused practices of many Planned Parenthood clinics.

So they said to him,

I had a wonderful two weeks of vacation with my family in the Outer Banks of North Carolina. On the way down, which is more than a nine hour drive, I listened to an audio book on the *Wright Brothers* by David McCullough. He is a wonderful writer, and I found that the Wright Brothers were two very fascinating men. So, since our rental house was only a half hour or so from Kitty Hawk, the scene of the Wright Brothers' first flight, I suggested to the family that we go and visit this historical site. It turned out to be a terrific day. The museum guide gave a great talk, the weather was perfect, and we climbed up the rather large hill where the Wright Brothers practiced their gliding.

Since I was on a roll, the family suggested I pick a nice place for lunch and, using a trusty *app* on my cell phone, I came up with the *Black Pelican*, a restaurant that overlooked the ocean. This was when I faced a great crisis on vaca-

tion. I could not make up my mind what appetizer I wanted. The menu spoke of fried green tomatoes, a jumbo lump crabmeat cocktail, stuffed Jalapeno peppers, baked crab brie, fried coconut shrimp, Gulf Stream tuna bites, and Buffalo fried shrimp. Each one sounded better than the other. I might get away with ordering two appetizers, but the main courses were also equally delightful. I suggested to the kids that they order some of my favorites since I knew they would not eat them, but they were more interested in coloring the paper menus and ordering hot dogs. I knew my family would share their choices but still, I was left with the powerful dilemma - what did I *really* want to eat.

I tell that story because today's Gospel, along with the Gospels for the next several Sundays, has Jesus speaking about the Bread of Life. In today's Gospel, a great crowd of people is following him because he has fed them with five loaves and two fish. They believe this is the man who will feed them. They are correct in that assumption, but the food he offers for hunger is of a different nature. Jesus tells the crowd: Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life. Certainly, I think we would say that Jesus is telling us about the Holy Eucharist that we receive at Mass. This is a very correct understanding of this text, but I also think Our Lord is asking us to look even deeper into our hungers and desires to see what they may teach us about the yearnings of the soul.

Very often, we go to lunch or dinner and say, "I am starving. I could eat a horse!" After that meal we may say, "I never want to look at food again!" After a big lunch, we tell ourselves that is enough - "I am stuffed!" Still, we know that in the evening, we will get the munchies. Food is not just about the body. It is also about the mind. Even if we are not hungry, the Golden Arches at McDonald's might convince us that we are. At the supermarket, there is always candy at the cash registers in hopes that in spite of a grocery cart full of food, we will reach for a Baby Ruth or a Snickers Bar. Even if you ate breakfast before this Mass, this homily may make your hungry. When we walk in a bakery, our eyes look about at all the delights and convince us we are hungry. Some of us eat when we are happy, or when we are sad, or when we are nervous or bored. It is hard for me to watch a movie without popcorn, or attend a ballgame without a hot dog. I believe that dieticians call these things which set off an appetite even when not hungry, triggers. I am an expert on food because I have lost and found hundreds of pounds over the years. Jesus makes a simple statement about food. "You will eat and be hungry again. I am the only food that satisfies true hunger."

Hunger is a most primary biological need just as is water. We cannot live without food and drink. We need shelter from the cold and the heat to protect us. We need sleep and rest to restore our bodies. But we have other needs. We want to love and be loved. We long to share our lives with other people. We do not want to be alone. We marry, have children, make friends, and join groups out of the fundamental need for relationships. So many people are in Internet chat rooms seeking some kind of bond and connection. We use expressions such as "he is starving for attention" or "she is such a demanding, needy person." At some level we are hungry for recognition, affection, and success. If you come to me and tell me that you were in another parish and the priest gave the greatest sermon you ever heard, I will say, "That's great! I would love to hear him. But my inner voice might say, "What about me?" People who brag and boast are really hungry and starving for something. People who are angry and hostile and push others away are hungry for love. People who say, "Leave me alone; I do not need anyone!" really do need someone.

When we suffer illness and death in life, we are confused and battered. We ask the most fundamental question of all. "What is the meaning of life?" "Why am I alive and here on this earth?" "What is the point of it all?" These are questions of the spirit, of the soul. We try to avoid feeling the burning hunger that they cause so we try not to think about them often. But the funeral a family member, a tragedy in the paper, a biopsy at the doctors, makes us pause and wonder.

There are many hungers. Some we meet by food and drink. Others we meet by love and friendships. Still, however wonderful our marriage is, however much joy our children bring us, however much success we have in life, those hungers of the heart are not fully satisfied except by being in a living relationship with Jesus Christ. Jesus tells the hungry crowd and each of us, "For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." Jesus is speaking about the Eucharist of course, but he is also referring to himself, to the Word of God, to our faith community, and to our Church. Only in Jesus will we find our hungers met. One of the great saints of the Catholic Church, St. Augustine, in the fifth century after a life of wild living and searching, finally finds Jesus in his life. This is what he wrote:

"Late have I loved you, beauty so old and so new: late have I loved you. And see, you were within and I was in the external world and sought you there, and in my unlovely state I plunged into those lovely created things which you made. You were with me, and I was not with you. The lovely things kept me far from you, though if they did not have their existence in you, they had no existence at all. You called and cried out loud and shattered my deafness. You were radiant and resplendent, you put to flight my blindness. You were fragrant, and I drew in my breath and now pant after you. I tasted you, and I feel but hunger and thirst for you. You touched me, and I am set on fire to attain the peace which is yours."

## PLANNED PARENTHOOD VIDEOS: www.usccb.oral/.../15-117c United States Conference of Catholic Bishops

Washington - Cardinal Sean O'Malley OFM Cap. Archbishop of Boston and Chairman of the USCCB responded July 29 to recent videos showing leaders from Planned Parenthood discussing the provision of fetal organs, tissues and body parts from their abortion clinics. Full text of Cardinal O'Malley's statement follows: Pope Francis has called abortion the product of a "widespread mentality of profit, the throwaway culture, which today has enslaved the hearts and minds of so many."

The recent news stories concerning Planned Parenthood direct our attention to two larger issues involving many institutions in our society. The first is abortion itself, a direct attack on human life in its most vulnerable condition. The second is the now standard practice of obtaining fetal organs and tissue through abortion. Both actions fail to respect the humanity and dignity of human life. This fact should be the center of attention in the present public controversy.

Hundreds of women along with scores of men, gathered in front of the U.S. Capitol to protest what they see as betrayal of the nation's women at the hands of Planned Parenthood. "There are women being betrayed and profited off of when they're in a crisis situation, when we should be giving them help," said Social Media Coordinator for Life Matters Journal - Anti-violence and Consistent Ethic-Of-Life Magazine. "I think this is offensive, to me as a feminist," she told CNA. The Washington D.C. rally was one of the more than 60 demonstrations held across the country in protest of Planned Parenthood and its taxpayer funding. The demonstrations followed videos of Planned Parenthood officials discussing the procuring of body parts of babies in exchange for money.

Planned Parenthood has defended its actions in the videos, saying that it is not making significant or illegal profits from the process and that it receives appropriate consent from mothers. From 2013 - 2014 Planned Parenthood received over \$528 MILLION in grants from the FEDERAL GOVERN-MENT. The organization also reported a PROFIT of \$127 MILLION for the same time period. A Bill to revoke taxpayer funding for Planned Parenthood failed to secure the 60 votes needed to invoke cloture. The Senate voted 53 - 46 failing to get enough votes to defund the organization on August 3rd. Had the cloture veto been approved and the bill passed, and should the House pass its own Bill to defund Planned Parenthood, President Barack Obama said he would veto the measure.
