ears ago, there was a popular movie called *A League of Their Own*. This movie starring Tom Hanks and Geena Davis told the account of a women's professional baseball league developed during World War II since so many men who played professional ball were in the military. Tom Hanks played the part of Jimmy Dugan, who had been a star baseball player earlier in his life but was now a bitter alcoholic. Some say his role was based on Jimmy Foxx who had been a great baseball player in the 1930's. Dugan initially finds coaching women baseball players intolerable. He eventually grows to respect the young women. There is a famous scene where Dugan yells at one of his players for making a mistake. The player immediately breaks down in tears, and Dugan utters the words, *There is no crying in baseball!* 

A week or so ago, this cliché was put to the test. Wilmer Flores was playing shortstop for the Mets when word began to circle via the internet that he had been traded from the Mets to Milwaukee. So on live television, you could see Flores crying while at his position on the field since he did not want to leave the team he had grown up with as a player. The fans began to cheer for him because they could understand what he was feeling. Through a variety of strange circumstances that could only happen to the Mets, the trade was cancelled at the very last moment. Flores' tears have made him a hero among the fans, and this glory was enhanced when he hit a game winning homerun a few days later. Who would have thought crying in a baseball game could win you such acclaim. I may try it sometime after a sermon at Mass and see how it works!

I thought about that story when I read today's second reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Ephesians. St. Paul writes: Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which you were sealed for the day of redemption. All bitterness, fury, anger, shouting, and reviling must be removed from you, along with all malice. And be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another as God has forgiven you in Christ. St. Paul is telling us that to be a follower of Christ we must deal with our negative emotions of anger, fury, and bitterness toward others. Although all of us as human beings deal with our emotions constantly, it is not easy to define what an emotion is. One definition I found states: "An emotion is a complex psychological state that involves three distinct components: a subjective experience, a physiological response, and behavioral or expressive response." Putting this definition in simpler language I would say an emotion is a combination of a physical and mental response to an experience that often leads us to act in a particular way.

Let me give an example of how I think emotions work. I am out driving. No doubt I am already in some kind of feeling state. I may be happy because I am on the way to a nice dinner. I may be anxious because I am late for an important meeting. I may be sad because I heard some sad news while listening to the radio. Then, I try to move into the passing lane, and just as I do, a car speeds up and cuts me off. When this happens I feel something immediately and the emotion is almost always anger. My blood pressure rises and my chest tightens. I do not have to think about this and say I think I will be angry. It happens instantly. My hands are tight on the steering wheel. I think bad thoughts about the other driver. Both my mind and body are in an active state. Now comes the key moment: what do I do. I can try to chase the car in a form of road rage. I can give the other driver a negative gesture (no need to explain), I can let lose a string of vocabulary that I might not use in Church. Or I can calm down. Tell myself that the incident is over and why let it upset me. I can choose to begin to let the negative emotion go. I cannot control the emotion but I can control what I do with it and how I behave.

I often hear people say, Father I have a temper. I can't help it when I get mad. I know what they mean, but I do not completely accept this. Granted, habits are hard to break, and exploding in anger at other people can become a habit, but as a rational human being, I do have the ability to begin to change the negative behavior that follows the emotion.

People often confess anger as sin. I almost always say to them anger is not a sin; rather the sin is what you choose to do with the feeling. If someone in my family says something that hurts me, I may well feel anger inside. That is not a sin since the feeling arose without any choice. Now, what do I do with that feeling? Does it lead me to scream at the other person? Does it lead me to give the person the silent treatment for a week? Does it lead me to speak to others about what happened so as to hurt the person's reputation? Those may well be sinful behaviors. Or, perhaps, after I calm down, I choose to enter into a healthy discussion with the person about what was said. I know at times in my life I have made the mistake of saying something, sending an email, or writing a letter when I was angry and later regretted it.

Being fully human as well as divine, Jesus had emotions. He wept in sadness at the death of his friend Lazarus. He was so afraid of dying he sweated blood in the Garden of Gethsemane. He was angry at the corruption of the Sacred Temple in Jerusalem and he chose to use that anger to overturn the tables of the moneychangers. That was a justifiably response.

St. Paul tells us: All bitterness, fury, anger, shouting, and reviling must be removed from you, along with all malice. This is no easy task and there are times in the Letters of St. Paul we see flashes of anger. However, the most basic step to take when we are angry is most often not to act quickly, but to take a step back and to seek to understand why we are so upset. That can prevent a lot of hurt and pain for others and ourselves.

### **EUCHARISTIC ADORATION**

There is no Adoration hosted by our Youth Ministry during the summer months.

One of the most moving days of my life was my visit to the Auschwitz Concentration Camp in Poland. Seeing the glasses, the shoes, the clothes of those hundreds of thousands of people who were executed made them become very real and alive. To be at this site was to truly see how evil can take root in the hearts of people and lead them to do horrible things. The priest who was our guide took us to the place where Father Maximilian Kolbe died. Here grace and goodness came face to face with horrific wickedness. The following account, taken from the website **AmericanCatholic.org** bears out that greater love than this no one has than to lay down his life for another. Father Kolbe's feast day is August 14<sup>th</sup>.

August 14 St. Maximilian Mary Kolbe (1894-1941)

"I don't know what's going to become of you!" How many parents have said that? Maximilian Mary Kolbe's reaction was, "I prayed very hard to Our Lady to tell me what would happen to me. She appeared, holding in her hands two crowns, one white, one red. She asked if I would like to have them—one was for purity, the other for martyrdom. I said, 'I choose both.' She smiled and disappeared." After that he was not the same.

He entered the minor seminary of the Conventual Franciscans in Lvív (then Poland, now Ukraine), near his birthplace, and at 16 became a novice. Though he later achieved doctorates in philosophy and theology, he was deeply interested in science, even drawing plans for rocket ships. Ordained at 24, he saw religious indifference as the deadliest poison of the day. His mission was to combat it. He had already founded the Militia of the Immaculata, whose aim was to fight evil with the witness of the good life, prayer, work and suffering. He dreamed of and then founded Knight of the Immaculata, a religious magazine under Mary's protection to preach the Good News to all nations. For the work of publication he established a "City of the Immaculata"—Niepokalanow—which housed 700 of his Franciscan brothers. He later founded one in Nagasaki, Japan. Both the Militia and the magazine ultimately reached the one-million mark in members and subscribers. His love of God was daily filtered through devotion to Mary.

In 1939 the Nazi panzers overran Poland with deadly speed. Niepokalanow was severely bombed. Kolbe and his friars were arrested, then released in less than three months, on the feast of the Immaculate Conception. In 1941 he was arrested again. The Nazis' purpose was to liquidate the select ones, the leaders. The end came quickly, in Auschwitz three months later, after terrible beatings and humiliations.

A prisoner had escaped. The commandant announced that 10 men would die. He relished walking along the ranks. "This one. That one." As they were being marched away to the starvation bunkers, Number 16670 dared to step from the line. "I would like to take that man's place. He has a wife and children." "Who are you?" "A priest." No name, no mention of fame. Silence. The commandant, dumbfounded, perhaps with a fleeting thought of history, kicked Sergeant Francis Gajowniczek out of line and ordered Father Kolbe to go with the nine. In the "block of death" they were ordered to strip naked, and their slow starvation began in darkness. But there was no screaming—the prisoners sang. By the eve of the Assumption four were left alive. The jailer came to finish Kolbe off as he sat in a corner praying. He lifted his fleshless arm to receive the bite of the hypodermic needle. It was filled with carbolic acid. They burned his body with all the others. He was beatified in 1971 and canonized in 1982.

**Comment:** Father Kolbe's death was not a sudden, last-minute act of heroism. His whole life had been a preparation. His holiness was a limitless, passionate desire to convert the whole world to God. And his beloved Immaculata was his inspiration.

**Quote:** "Courage, my sons. Don't you see that we are leaving on a mission? They pay our fare in the bargain. What a piece of good luck! The thing to do now is to pray well in order to win as many souls as possible. Let us, then, tell the Blessed Virgin that we are content, and that she can do with us anything she wishes" (Maximilian Mary Kolbe, when first arrested).

#### **Confusion Among Catholics**

The Assumption of the Blessed Mother into Heaven, August 15<sup>th</sup>, is usually a holy day of obligation. This year since it falls on a Saturday, it is not a holy day. I believe some Catholics are confused by this: how can a feast day be a holy day one year where we are bound to go to Mass and not a holy day the next year? I would say that confusion is certainly understandable.

It reminds me of something that occasionally happens in our area. If St. Patrick's Day falls on a Friday in

Is it a Holy Day or not?



Lent when meat is not allowed, the New York Archdiocese gives a dispensation from the abstinence since St. Patrick is the patron of the Archdiocese. However, very often the Brooklyn and Rockville Centre Dioceses do not give this permission to eat meat. I have often mused that if I were on the Brooklyn Bridge walking from Manhattan toward Brooklyn on a St. Patrick's Day Friday in Lent, at what point must I put down my corned beef sandwich! When the Church changed the long held no meat on Friday obligation shortly after Vatican II, some wondered what would happen to all those Catholics who were in hell for eating meat on Friday. Although I have profound respect for our Church and its teachings, it can get a bit bewildering at times.

The Church in the United States removes the obligation for attending Mass on the Feast of the Assumption if it falls on a Saturday or a Monday, as it does for certain other holy days - January 1, which is the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God and November 1<sup>st</sup>, the Feast of All Saints. The obligation to worship on the other holy days, the Immaculate Conception and Christmas are <u>always</u> holy days of obligation, no matter what day they fall on. The Ascension is also a holy day but since it falls on a Thursday, it is not affected by the weekend.

The reason the Church has done this is because of the shortage of priests. On a weekend, a priest may well say a regular Saturday morning Mass, a funeral Mass, a wedding Mass, and two or three Sunday Masses. Now saying Mass is not exhausting but saying multiple Masses is a challenge for a priest since the Church never wants her priests to begin to take the Mass for granted or to see it as work rather than a profound prayer. If we added extra Masses on Saturday or Monday, it could lead to the multiplication of the priest saying Masses. Again - because Christmas is such a major feast of our faith, there is no change for this day nor for the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Mother since Mary is the patron of the United States. They are always holy days of obligation.

Still, the importance the Feast Days that have their obligation waived if they fall on Saturday or Monday, is not lessened. The liturgy on these days should be festively celebrated and Catholics should seek to attend the celebrations. I must confess that most often Friday is a regular day for me in terms of my spiritual life. However, when the Church dropped the abstinence-from-meat law, Catholics were told they should find some act of personal penance to practice in its place. This says to me that I sometimes need law to help me practice my faith.
