

This past Tuesday, September 22, our church bells peeled at 5:00 p.m. as we welcomed Pope Francis for his first visit to the United States. At this writing, I am looking forward to going to St. Patrick's Cathedral on Thursday for a prayer service with the Pope. If I get close to him, I may offer him tickets to see the Jets.

Certainly, there is a great excitement about the Holy Father coming to America. I think it would be fair to say that he is the most popular person in the world right now (except for those who get caught in papal traffic). He has a marvelous smile and a good sense of humor. He has witnessed to a simple lifestyle by refusing to live in papal quarters, but rather in a more modest residence where he takes his meals in a cafeteria with the staff and workers at the Vatican. Even

the very simple fact that he carries his own travel bag has impressed the media.

I would say that our Holy Father, since he was elected Pope, has had two very explicit messages: the first is that he has great stress on the love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the weak and the neglected; and secondly, he has placed a great focus on the mercy and compassion of Our Lord for each one of us. I have no doubt that Pope Francis will draw great crowds and be applauded everywhere he goes, but I wonder how well our world, and even each of us, is ready to embrace and live the message of the Gospel that he proclaims.

I know there are some Catholics who are concerned that Pope Francis may be too liberal, that he is soft on sin and sinners, and I have even heard some commentators refer to him as a socialist. We have recently heard the news about the Pope allowing priests to forgive the sin of abortion and that he is seeking to make the annulment of marriages more streamlined for those who seek them. Perhaps the news media does not tell us that the Pope has strongly condemned abortion and is a very powerful advocate for marriage and family. Our Holy Father has not changed one teaching of the Church. What he has done is place a great emphasis on each person encountering Christ in his or her life. The forgiveness of sins and the mercy of God are not some new doctrine developed by Pope Francis. He is simply proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ who was heavily criticized for eating with sinners and prostitutes. Maybe some are shocked by what Pope Francis has said and done because what Jesus did was truly shocking to many of the religious figures of his day.

When the Pope gave an interview with a Jesuit magazine, he was asked by the interviewer who he was as a man. Here is the dialogue that followed: The first question ready, but then I decide not to follow the script that I had prepared for myself, and I ask him point-blank: "Who is Jorge Mario Bergoglio?" The pope stares at me in silence. I ask him if this is a question that I am allowed to ask.... He nods that it is, and he tells me: "I do not know what might be the most fitting description.... I am a sinner. This is the most accurate definition. It is not a figure of speech, a literary genre. I am a sinner."

I think most of us are ready to admit we are sinners, but I sometimes wonder if we really believe it since it is so easy to fall into the trap of saying and judging what is wrong with everyone else before truly looking at myself and seeking, by the amazing grace of God, to turn away from sin.

hat is the purpose of the Catholic Church? What is the role of the parish in the life of a community? The most startling answer I ever read to these questions was from Pope Francis in the same interview I mentioned before. Here is how he answered: "I see clearly," the Pope continues, "that the thing the church needs most today is the ability to heal wounds and to warm the hearts of the faithful; it needs nearness, proximity. I see the Church as a field hospital after battle. It is useless to ask a seriously injured person if he has high cholesterol and about the level of his blood sugars! You have to heal his wounds. Then we can talk about everything else. Heal the wounds, heal the wounds.... And you have to start from the ground up.

"The Church sometimes has locked itself up in small things, in small-minded rules. The most important thing is the first proclamation: Jesus Christ has saved you. And the ministers of the Church must be ministers of mercy above all. The confessor, for example, is always in danger of being either too much of a rigorist or too lax. Neither is merciful, because neither of them really takes responsibility for the person. The rigorist washes his hands so that he leaves it to the commandment. The loose minister washes his hands by simply saying, 'This is not a sin' or something like that. In pastoral ministry we must accompany people, and we must heal their wounds.

Wow! The Church, the parish as field hospital, seeking to heal wounds and help people meet Jesus Christ and his mercy! If you remember the television show *MASH*, it was about a Mobile Army Surgical Hospital. Its goal was to provide immediate care of life threatening wounds. That is how Pope Francis sees the Church.

By the time you read this letter, our Holy Father will have left us. I pray that he will be safe and have had a Holy Spirit-filled visit to our nation. I ask all of us here at St. Martin's to consider taking one personal step flowing from your personal response to the visit from our Holy Father. Here are a few suggestions you might consider:

- Go to an extra Mass during the following week and receive Holy Communion and tell him you love Him.
- Go to the sacrament of Reconciliation.
- Go to the Parish Divine Mercy devotion some Friday at 2:00 p.m.
- Give something up for a week or so and use what you saved for the food pantry or the Saint Vincent de Paul Society.
- Read one of the four Gospels slowly and prayerfully (Mark is the shortest Gospel).
- Get more involved in the "Field Hospital" of St. Martin's.
- Pray every day for the Holy Father.



must confess I am a political junkie since I watched all three hours of the Republican debate the other night. I do have one excuse: the Mets were losing their game so I decided to watch the debate. One of the easier questions the candidates were asked was about how the Secret Service always gives the president a nickname for their communications, what name would each of them choose. To mention a few, Mike Huckabee chose Duck Hunter, Ben Carson - One Nation, Carly Fiorina - Secretariat, Marco Rubio -Gator, and Jeb Bush - Ever Ready. Perhaps the most interesting choice was the name Donald Trump said he would like to have - Humble! That brought forth many laughs from the audience.

In today's Gospel we see the apostles of Jesus struggling with the question of humility. Jesus tells the apostles, *The Son of Man is to be handed over to men and they will kill him, and three days after his death the Son of Man will rise.* This is shocking news to them. Jesus is going to be killed, and then he will rise from the dead. This makes little sense to them. They cannot believe Jesus will be killed and even more confusing is the idea that anyone can rise from the dead. So the apostles change the subject as they are walking to Capernaum and they start arguing who is the most important one among them. Perhaps they argued who was chosen first, or who is Jesus' favorite, or who has the most courage.

When they get to town, they sit down to rest and Jesus asks them what they were talking about as they were walking. None of them want to admit what they were talking about so they remain silent. Jesus has a little child stand in their midst. He says, Whoever receives one child such as this in my name, receives me; and whoever receives me, and receives not me but the One who sent me. Jesus is not talking about the innocence or goodness of children but rather, in the Palestinian culture of the first century children were considered the lowest rung on the social order. A child was totally dependent on his parents and could decide nothing for his or her self.

We like humility in our society. A football player who is a great star and wins the game who attributes his entire success to his teammates and coaches is someone we respect. A doctor who performs a complicated surgery and thanks God for his or her talents or gifts is admired. A graduate who thanks his or her parents for his success, a cook who thanks those who helped prepare the meal, a friend who does a good deed and says, please it was a pleasure to help, are people we see as humble and rightly so. On the other hand, we have seen on television and in our own personal lives people who are very boastful and braggarts. Although they can sometimes make us laugh by their brashness, we really find such people turn us off. Even if you are not a disciple of Jesus, it is good to be humble. We like humble people.

Humility is not about denying our gifts and talents. There is nothing wrong with feeling proud about your achievements and successes. God has given us all a variety of gifts and talents to use for the good of others and to give him praise, and we should be grateful for these abilities. We should know our talents and gifts, value them, and thank God and all who helped us develop them. And we should use them in service to others. Quite honestly, we have all had the experience of saying to someone, Gee, you did a great job. Congratulations. The response sometime is, Oh that was nothing. There are many people who could have done it better than I did. Maybe that is a humble response or maybe the person is fishing for an even greater compliment as we tell them, Oh no, you are wrong. You were great!

do think many of us struggle internally with being humble. We may feel a resentment when we see L someone else in our family, or at our job, or in our parish received praise and recognition. We try to be gracious but in our hearts there is a voice shouting, 'What about me!' Try this out on one of your priests: Tell him about some other priest who is a great preacher, a wonderful pastor, a brilliant man. It won't be long before the priest you are talking to looks at his watch and tells you he is busy.

It is hard to be humble because pride is the mother and father of all sin. Pride is at the root of almost all sins. Strangely, much of pride comes from a poor self-image. We think so poorly of ourselves, we try to mask it by seeing ourselves as better than others. Ultimately, humility and pride raise a most serious spiritual reality. The first sin in the Garden of Eden, was a sin of pride and a failure in humility. Adam and Eve had a perfect life; they had a great friendship with God. They lived in paradise and they had each other. Satan, the father of lies, knew how to trap them: by pride. He tells them: Don't listen to God. If you eat the fruit God has told you not to eat, you will be like God. You will not have to be just humans, you will be like God. And, they fall for this appeal to their pride.

The root of the word humble is the same root as the word human. Both words come from the word humus which means earth or ground. To be humble is to know we are human and not God. To be a human being is wonderful; we are made in the image of God and we are both body and soul and are to live forever. Yet to be human is also to know we are not perfect. We have sins and faults, we fail at things, we resent others, we feel unappreciated, we want more than what we have, we hate any limitations, and worst of all, we have no control over so many things: the weather, red lights, other people, and worst of all sickness and death. To be human is a great gift from God, but it is to be limited.

When we know we are creatures made by God for God, we are happy. When we do not know this, when we believe we can have and do it all in life, that there are no limits, we are doomed to unhappiness since we will never be satisfied. We are dust and unto dust we shall return, but it is God who will bring us to the fullness of eternal life. - Father Pat

#### **The Great Commission**

And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to me in heaven and on earth. "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." Matthew 28: 17-20

Whenever I celebrate baptisms here at St. Martin's, I use this Gospel for the reading and a very brief homily to follow. I have learned that with five or six babies present to be baptized, along with many other young children of family members, it is best not to try the patience of the little once by speaking too long. Also, it is fair to say that everyone in church is far more interested in looking at the babies and making *goo-goo* sounds to the infants than in listening to the preacher. I make one simple point in my talk: this Gospel, called the Great Commission since it is really that last command that Jesus gives the apostles before he returns to the Father, is the mission statement of the Catholic Church. Our Church is called to make invite people to be followers of Jesus Christ and to help them learn what it means to be a disciple of Jesus.

All the ministries here at St. Martin's are vital to the life of the parish and to this mission. Some of us proclaim the Scriptures as Lectors, others help distribute the Body and Blood of Jesus at Mass and to the homebound. Others help assist the poor and needy through the Mother Teresa Outreach Center and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Some ministries have the goal of deepening our prayers lives. The Garden Committee seeks to beautify our property and the St. Clement Bakers seek to console those who mourn, as do the Arimatheans who assist the clergy at funerals.

We have many committees that seek to guide the parish in being faithful to its overall mission to proclaim the Good News of Jesus. The ushers take up the collection and we have a team of people to count what is brought in. We need financial support to assist in proclaiming the Gospel. Our altar servers help our priests as they celebrate Mass. I cannot mention all the ministries of the parish since this letter would become longer than the phone book! Still, you name any ministry and I will tell you that it is about making disciples of all nations at its core.

Today on Catechetical Sunday, I want to give recognition and total support to three very vital ministries of



our parish and the men and women who serve in them: the Religious Education Program, the Baptismal Program, and the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults. These three apostolates are key in passing on the Catholic faith to the next generation of parishioners. In the baptismal program, we welcome infants into our community; however, we are also seeking to proclaim to the parents of the babies that they are to be the primary teachers of faith to their children. In the R.C.I.A. program, we welcome people who are seeking

to become Catholics into our community, as well as guiding men and woman who *are* Catholics as they seek to receive sacraments that they may not have received when they were younger.

Finally, we have at least 1,000 children who come to our parish weekly, from grades one through eight, who are entrusted to us by their parents to help them learn about their Catholic faith and to put what they learn into practice. Religious education is a very large program that needs a great deal of volunteers to assist in this most important task of making disciples of all nations. During these eight years of religious education, our children will receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation, Holy Communion and Confirmation. We are blessed by a wonderful staff of coordinators and teachers under the direction of Pat Ryan and Laura Leigh Agnese.

I have great admiration for the men and women who serve in our religious education program. For the next six months, they will come to teach our children about the love God has for each one of them. Most of these volunteers are not trained teachers; they teach because they love Jesus Christ and want to help others to know and love him. Although all who are part of the parish life are part of our evangelization efforts, those who serve in religious education, the RCIA program and the baptismal program are key members of our efforts to proclaim the Gospel. I am also grateful to Erin Horan-Baudille who along with a dedicated team guide the young through the Edge and Lifeteen program. They are seeking to deepen the experience of what our children have learned in religious education.

We are all aware that this is no easy time to be a teacher of the Good News of Jesus since we live in such as secular society. The primary teachers of our children in faith are always their parents. Our programs are excellent, but without the full support and active participation of the parents of the children in our religious education program, it is very difficult to be effective in passing on the Catholic faith.

On this Catechetical Sunday, I thank all the men and women who serve in our many parish ministries. In particular, I ask your prayers for all who serve in the baptismal, R.C.I.A. and religious education programs. They are my heroes.
