The Pastor's Letter

Over the past week or so, several people have gone out the way to compliment me on the newly paved parking lot. I am never one to turn down praise so I graciously thanked them and say we all did a great job. In terms of the quality of the parking lot, I am not an expert on engineering and paving, but I do believe every effort was made to have the work done as well as possible. I am a believer in the old adage, *Buy cheap, buy twice,* so we tried to get quality people and materials and not cut any corners. The same would be true for the school brick work, the school roof, and renovated parish outreach center.

What I want to stress is that this was a parish project, and all that has been accomplished to date on our *Paving the Way For Christ Building Campaign*, has been done by the dedicated and committed efforts of all the parishioners of St. Martin of Tours Parish. This project began with both the members of the Parish Council and the Financial Council recommending that we address the property needs of the parish.

The recommendations led to the *Paving the Way For Christ* fundraising campaign. I shall never forget the meeting when more than 120 people showed up to volunteer on the campaign. 880 families and individuals donated and made pledges to the campaign. You might remember that our fundraising committee said we could probably reach a goal of 1.2 million dollars. The generosity of the parishioners allowed the parish to raise 1.7 million dollars. I am delighted to say that people have continued to be most faithful to the pledges they made. We continue to the present day to receive new additional donations to the fund. I am happy to say there is no diocesan tax on any of these donations.

As the money has been raised, the next step was to begin to address the property concerns. A fine group of men and women volunteered to serve as an advisory board (a Building Committee) to me as we began to seek to outline whom we would hire for the work. They have been most helpful as has the advice from the Diocese of Rockville Centre.

We have finished four major projects: a) the school brick work b) the school roof c) the renovation of the pantry d) the paving of the parking lot. We have used some funds to address some of the doors of the church with more work to be done on them. Two major projects still remain: the lighting of the church and addressing the school auditorium as a place where some sporting activity can occur. We are also committed to having a memorial where we can list all who have been so much part of this effort. I am confident that we will have the funds to do meet these goals. After we pay our bills for the paving, I will give an up-to-date financial report of where we are with our capital campaign funds. I also know that there are parishioners who were not able to donate any money to the campaign. You supported the campaign by your prayers and encouragement and I appreciate what you have done for the parish.

My purpose in writing this letter is to congratulate all the parishioners for what you have done and what you will continue to do. So, if you want to compliment me that is fine (perhaps with Mets tickets to the World Series), but I want all to know what has been is a total parish project. God bless you all for you love of God and your parish.

was thrilled to be at St. Patrick's Cathedral to pray Evening Prayer with the Holy Father, Pope Fran $oldsymbol{\perp}$ cis and a very crowded, enthusiastic, faith-filled congregation. I have been at events for St. John Paul II, Pope Emeritus Benedict, and now one with Pope Francis. I am a bit surprised how moved I was at all three services since they tend to be long, a bit difficult to hear, and difficult to attend because of security. But just a quick glimpse of the Pope at any of these events set off an emotional experience in me. I am so proud to be a Catholic and touched to see the Vicar of Christ.

Two things, among many that struck me at the prayer service was the Pope looked exhausted after his long day with the United States Congress, air flights and motorcades. Yet, the moment he started touching the hands of people and being among the people, he suddenly seemed to be full of energy and life. Being with his flock refreshes him. The highlight of his homily that evening for me was the Holy Father went out of his way to praise the religious Sisters of America, past and present. As you might know, the Vatican, about ten years ago, began an investigation into the American nuns. Many of them found this offensive and disheartening. I think he sought to bring healing to these wonderful women by his words. The entire Congregation gave the Sisters a standing ovation.

As I have gotten older, I have become more politically conservative. From my early days in the seminary of marching in support of civil rights and boycotting grapes in support of Cesar Chavez, I am in a different place in my life today. I am older, but I am not sure if I am wiser. I do know labels such as conservative and liberal really fail to describe a person's views on life. Still, I do find myself listening to conservative political radio commentators, watching Fox News, and reading what I would call conservative websites. And, I do find myself in agreement with many things I hear.

I was extremely disappointed in how the media, in particular the people I listened to, covered the Holy Father in his trip to the United States. It seemed to me they did not like the message the Pope had, and thought he might be too liberal, and that the Democratic Party might benefit from his message. I even heard one ridicule his use of a small car and do a sophomoric imitation of the Pope struggling to speak English. Both the liberal and the conservative media tended to cover the Papal Visit as if he was coming to endorse either Donald Trump or Hilary Clinton.

It seemed to me they could only see and listen to the Holy Father through the lens of their own political views. I have always found that the media - with some exceptions - does a poor job in covering religious events (and usually focusing on negative news) and that was certainly how I felt about their coverage of the Pope. The Pope is the Vicar of Christ seeking to bring people to Christ. He is not a politician seeking to win voters.

Back to the conservative media: It is my suspicion they were upset with the pope for some of the following reasons: He was too kind to President Obama. He did not speak enough about abortion or gay marriage. They do not want him to speak about the poor; they do no want him to speak about immigration. They did not want him to speak about climate change; they fear what he has to say about capitalism and his life style threatens them. This is my judgment. I could be wrong but it is my opinion. Let me say something about each issue.

Kindness to President Obama: I do not know if Pope Francis likes President Obama or not. I would certainly expect the President of the United States to greet the Holy Father cordially and I would expect the Pope to treat the President of the United States with respect because of the office he holds. I think Pope Francis is a naturally warm and kind man and it flows from him. Certainly, we all know there are issues with which the Pope would stand in total disagreement with the President. It would also be my belief that the best time to surface such points is in the private conversations they had. I was proud to be a Catholic and an American as I saw the Holy Father welcomed with such dignity.

Is the Pope soft on abortion: Here are some recent statements from Pope Francis on abortion: Curiously," he said, these countries with very strict laws regarding the protection of minors, who even punish fathers or mothers who spank their children, "have laws allowing them to kill their children before they are born." Francis has been an open critic of modern abortion policies, calling abortion "a sin against the Creator," and denounced the fiction that "supporting abortion somehow helps women." Last Christmas, he compared babies killed in the womb to King Herod's massacre of the innocents in his efforts to hunt down the Christ child to murder. Pope Francis underscored the contradictions of modern societies that have tight regulations regarding child welfare and yet allow babies to be killed in the womb.

<u>The Pope talks too much about the poor</u>: One out of every ten sentences in the four Gospels is about the poor. In the case of the Gospel of Luke, one out of every six sentences refers to the poor. Would we say Jesus spoke too much about the poor?

Jesus described the last judgment this way: Then the king will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous*— will answer him and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?' And the king will say to them in reply, 'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers or sisters of mine, you did for me.

<u>Too much talk on immigration</u>: Immigration is one of the most difficult challenges facing the American people today. Our American Bishops in their written documents do not expect us to have open borders and unlimited immigration. I have no simple answer on who is right about what to do in terms of immigration. I do sense that breaking up families and deporting eleven million people may cause more harm to people than good. The Pope's family emigrated from Italy to Argentina; most of us are the descendants of immigrants. What to do about illegal immigrants is a haunting question. As we read earlier, *Jesus said to us: I was a stranger and you welcomed me.* The Pope stabs at my conscience when he speaks on this issue.

<u>Climate Change:</u> I struggle with this question. The Pope's recent Encyclical to care for the earth makes sense to all people. We are all against pollution and anything that is harmful to the environment. We know the earth and our very lives are all gifts from God. I know scientists debate whether climate change is real or not. Politics certainly enters into what should be scientific debates. The Pope is not infallible when it comes to making scientific statements. Still, I believe he is calling us to ponder and act on caring for the world around us.

<u>Capitalism</u>: Several months ago, Pope Francis spoke against unbridled capitalism that left the poor in desperate situations. Because of his statements, some pundits in the United States and other countries wondered if the Pope is a socialist. After receiving criticism for what he said, Our Holy Father promised to further study the question. When he spoke to the Congress on his recent visit, he had a different view that praised our way of capitalism but called us to use it for the good of the poor. We have done a great deal of that in our county through social security, food stamps, Medicare and Medicaid and other social programs. Americans do not want to see people stave to death or be homeless. I believe the Holy Father is not against people making money based on their abilities and skills. What he does say, as did Our Lord Jesus, that we cannot forget those who are in serious need.

<u>A threat to certain lifestyles:</u> Many celebrities and Hollywood stars would agree with many things the Pope says, especially those about climate change and the poor. Yet, many of these celebrities live in mansions and own private jets, several luxury cars, and spend millions on clothes. The Pope deliberately chooses to live a simple lifestyle (as much as a pope can). I think his small Fiat irritated some commentators because they like to ride in big limos. The Pope did not condemn them for that; he simply chose a different path. We all know lots of people talk the talk but we also have a sense that Pope Francis walks the walk.

Perhaps, I am being too hard on the conservative media. I do know the issues that the Holy Father spoke of are very important to him and consistent with the message of Jesus and the Church through the centuries. Actually, the core message of the Pope was to proclaim the love of Jesus Christ for all people, especially sinners and those on the margins of society. Pope Francis has been called *The People's Pope*. I like that name but I think I would call him *The Mercy Pope* since he is so vigorous in his proclamation of the mercy of God for all of us and in our call to be merciful and charitable to one another. That is a message that is very challenging to embrace since it calls us to die to ourselves for the sake of others. When we do this, it brings abundant life. That is the Good News of Our Lord Jesus Christ!
