The Pastor's Letter

One of my favorite all time movies is *Glory*, starring Denzel Washington, Morgan Freeman and Matthew Broderick. It is based on a true story of when Massachusetts formed an African-American regiment to fight in the Civil War. The officers of this regiment were all white and Matthew Broderick played the role of Robert Gould Shaw, the first commanding colonel of these soldiers. There was fierce prejudice against this brigade on all sides. The Northern soldiers ridiculed them and the South said any captured soldiers would be made slaves or executed. The 54th Regiment goes on to distinguish itself in battle. Many volunteered for an almost suicide mission to assault the Confederate Fort Wagner in South Carolina. A scene that has stayed with me is when the 54th is lined up and ready to go into battle. Colonel Shaw addresses them in this way: *If this banner* (the American Flag), *should fall from this soldier's arms in battle, who will come forward to carry it forward?* All the soldiers shout that they are ready to do so.

I thought of that scene with the recent deaths of two great men of our parish - Harry Smith and Jim Biggin. Both were men who carried the banner of faith and family daily in their lives. Both were devoted husbands and great fathers. Each of them in their own way lived the Catholic life with great conviction. When I came to St. Martin's, I researched the various ministries of the parish, and it seemed almost all of them had been blessed at one time or another by either Jim or Harry and their wives, Carmela and Louise. I do know there have been countless other men and women like them who have also carried the banner of faith for St. Martin of Tours Parish.

Since I have been here, we have lost so many outstanding men. May they rest in God's peace. I know their wives, their families, and their many friends miss them so very much and continue to mourn them deeply. Their lives and goodness are woven into the very fabric of our faith community, and we all know we are standing on the shoulders of good and holy men who prayed and worshipped in the very pews that we do today.

Who will pick up the banner of faith they carried and carry it forward? My friend, Father McGowan, often says the best way we can honor the dead and remember them is by doing what they did when they were alive. If your Mom was a generous and loving person, then when you are generous and loving, she becomes very much alive in your actions. I think of some of my cousins who took up ushering at the same Mass their father did when he was alive.

All of us have different gifts and talents. We are unique, and while I am not inviting you to be Jim Biggin or Harry Smith, I am suggesting that we can imitate their great commitment to family life and service to our parish community. Maybe *you* are the one to pick up the banner and carry it forward.

God rest you, dear Harry and dear Jim.

October the Month of the Rosary


Knute Rockne, former director of athletics and head football coach of the University of Notre Dame, was killed at the height of his career in an airplane crash, March 31, 1931. As a football coach, this "maker of men" as he was called, never had his equal. Born and raised a member of the Lutheran faith, Rockne converted to Catholicism on November 20, 1925. by Father Vincent Mooney baptized Rockne privately the day before a tough contest against Northwestern. Mooney finished the ceremony by giving Knute a rosary, one the coach would carry with him to his final day.

Shortly after takeoff, the plane flew into a storm, became covered with ice and fell into a wheat field. On board this fateful day were 5 passengers and 3 crew members. All on board were killed in the airplane crash in Bazaar, Kansas, on Tuesday, March 31, 1931.A watch on the wrist on one of the victims had stopped at 10:45. One of the passengers held a rosary in his hand. All the bodies were taken to the coroner's office at Cottonwood Falls some thirty miles away for preliminary investigation and identification. It was conducted by the Chase County coroner, Dr. Jacob Hinden and his assistant. "My God!" said the assistant when looking at some papers in his trembling fingers. "It looks like this man is Knute Rockne." It was the victim who held the rosary in his hand. Knute Rockne was dead at the age of 43.

I am what is called a subway alumnus, having never attended Notre Dame as a student (but I did visit a few times). *Notre Dame*, which is French for *Our Lady and Fighting Irish* was more than enough reason to make me a ND fan for life. I must say I have been shocked that I have met a parishioner or two who are heretics: they actually root against Our Lady's team. Please pray for their conversion!

October is the month of the Rosary, one of the greatest prayers we have as Catholics. The rosary has been a strong tradition of the Catholic Church for more than 1,000 years, and countless graces have been showered upon the world through this powerful prayer. Our Lady in her appearances at Fatima, asked us to say the rosary. It is a very Biblical prayer based on words from Sacred Scripture. It is also a wonderful way to ponder the great mysteries of the Catholic faith since we have twenty mysteries of the Holy Rosary. It is an easy prayer to say and it takes only fifteen or twenty minutes to pray. We can recite it on the way to work or before we fall asleep. Today there are many apps on cell phones and computers that can help with the recitation of the rosary. If you have not said the rosary in a long time, perhaps you can begin by saying a single decade a day.

During the month of October, we will say one decade of the rosary five minutes before each of our Sunday Masses. I believe this will be a beautiful way to prepare to celebrate the Sacred Mysteries of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus.

RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH

Slightly over one-fourth of women (aged 15 and up) in the United States have undergone an abortion. Women, and all those involved in the decision to abort, must believe, or try to believe, that there was no human life present in the womb. To admit this is to admit complicity in the killing of an innocent human being. Condemning abortion would mean condemning themselves or the wife, daughter, sister or friend whom they love. And so society refuses to recognize the incontrovertible facts about human life before birth.

Many people close to a women in a crisis pregnancy don't feel comfortable with the decision to abort, but they don't know what to say. They want to be supportive and non-judgmental, so they say something like, 'You're really in a bad situation and I'll support whatever you decide.' The helpful response, the right response should be, 'Don't have an abortion. I will not abandon you. Together we will find a way for you to have your baby.'

The Catholic Church has long recognized abortion's impact on women and their families. While law and society often pit the interests of a mother against those of her unborn child, the Church recognizes that their best interests are joined. What is best for the child is also best for the mother.

Project Rachel began over fifteen years ago as an outreach of the Catholic Church to women, men and families who have been affected by abortion. The Church is a place of healing. It speaks the truth about abortion to men and women contemplating this action. 'Don't do it! It is wrong and it will hurt you and the baby,' but it also speaks the full truth: 'If you have had an abortion, God's mercy is great enough to forgive that, too.' Jesus offers forgiveness and healing. He offers the hope and promise of resurrection and reunion with the child who is waiting for his parents in heaven.

People who call Project Rachel are offered referrals to professional counselors or to priests specially trained for spiritual guidance and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. But basically everyone in the Church is a part of Project Rachel. Everyone is a part of the healing ministry of Christ. You may know someone whom you think has had an abortion. You never accuse or confront. A simple word that will touch their hearts and release them from fear and isolation can begin the healing process.

Father Pat's Homily from October 4, 2015

There is an old joke, one you have probably heard some version of, that goes like this: a man is out for a walk and he stumbles over a rock. The rock rolls over and out pops a genie. The genie says, Oh thank you so much, sir. I have been trapped under this rock for 500 years and you are the man who finally liberated me. Because you have been so helpful to me, I will grant you any one wish you have. The man thinks for a while and says, Well, I have always wanted to go to Hawaii. That will be my wish: to visit Hawaii. The genie says, That is so easy! I will buy you first class airline tickets and you will be on your way. The man says, Oh no! I am terribly afraid to fly! The genie thinks for a minute and says, Okay there are cruise ships out of Los Angeles that go to the Hawaiian Islands. I will get you tickets on one of those ships. The man responds that he gets seasick and refused to travel by boat.

The frustrated genie says, *Sir, how am I going to get you there if you won't fly or take a ship!* Our man tells the genie he likes to drive. He suggests the genie build a highway that goes from Los Angeles to Honolulu. The genie is stunned! *I can do almost anything but a 5,000 mile highway over the depths of the ocean is an engineering feat beyond the capabilities of even me! You will have to ask for another wish.* The disappointed fellow says, *Okay, my wife always tells me I don't understand her. Can you help me to understand women?* The genie quickly responds, *Do you want the highway to be two or four lanes?*

In our first reading today, we hear what may be one of the most life changing sentences in the entire



Bible: "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a suitable partner for him. When he brought her to the man, the man said: 'This one, at last, is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; this one shall be called *woman*, for out of *her man* this one has been taken.' That is why a man leaves his father and mother and clings to his wife, and the two of them become one flesh." The Bible is giving us the origin of marriage. It is the plan of God that man and woman shall cling to each other and the two shall become one flesh. In one of the beautiful prayers said in the Catho-

lic marriage ceremony, marriage is described as one of the only blessings not lost by original sin after man falls.

First a word about the story of Adam and Eve. Our Church teaches us that we can either take this story literally, exactly as we read it, or we can read it as a narrative story, given and inspired by the Holy Spirit to explain the plan of God for his creatures. Whether we take it literally or a teaching story, the fundamental truth revealed to us in this Word is God is the source of all creation. Everything created, whether you believe in evolution or creationism, the world as we know it and human beings as we are, come from God. The only thing about our world that God is not the source of is sin and evil.

I have never been married which is certainly a blessing to some woman in this world. There are times when I have envied married couples for the life and companionship they share, for their gift of having children and grandchildren, for the love they have for one another. Yet, there are other times, when I think how hard it must be to be married. What a challenge to love the same person, day in and day out, for forty, fifty, sixty years.

s a priest, over the course of my forty years, I have heard many stories about marriages that have grown stale, cold, harsh, silent, bitter and tragic and sometimes even violent. I am well aware marriage is a great and wonderful gift from God. I am also aware it is not easy to have and to hold, from this day forward, in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, for richer for poorer, until death to us part. As much joy and happiness as our children bring us, sometimes there is great pain and sorrow in families as they struggle to love one another.

love these words from the American writer Thornton Wilder: I didn't marry you because you were perfect. I didn't even marry you because I loved you. I married you because you gave me a promise. That promise made up for your faults. And the promise I gave you made up for mine. Two imperfect people got married and it was the promise that made the marriage. And when our children were growing up, it wasn't a house that protected them; and it wasn't our love that protected them--it was that promise."

God bless you who have made that promise to God and to each other. May it continue to sustain you on your married journey. I suspect the most important quality needed in a marriage is the grace of healing and forgiveness. The healing and forgiveness is not just about big matters, but more about the day-to-day struggles to let go of hurts, disagreements and misunderstandings and seek to make the other as important as you are.

Recently, you might have read that our Holy Father has sought to make the annulment process more available to Catholics. As a church, we know that some people at the time they married, were truly not able to enter into a sacramental marriage. There have been times when I have encouraged a married person to separate from the other because the relationship was so destructive. Divorce done for serious reasons is not a sin; it is the remarriage that the Church does not accept since we still recognize the bond of marriage until it is annulled. A married person is called to do everything he or she can to sustain their marriage, but God is also a God of mercy who recognizes our struggles.

Because of what we read today in our readings, the Catholic Church only accepts marriage as between a man and woman. We are not against homosexuals. They are our brothers and sisters and as much the children of God as are we. Sexual intimacy in a marriage is a sacrament. In the theology of our Church, a sacrament is a sacred encounter with God's love. When a married couple expresses their love in sexual union, a married man and woman are not only loving each other, but encountering God in that love. Such love, which is so powerful and sacred, is the gift God gives to married couples to support and sustain them in their relationship. I think our culture today has done much to cheapen and devalue the power of true sexual married love.

There are single people, by choice or by circumstances, widows and widowers, celibate priests and religious, who are also sexual beings. They may not enter into sexual unions but they are people, who desire, and rightly so, affection, friendship, love and community. I have heard the fair complaint that many sermons and programs seemed geared to people who are married and not single.

Whatever your vocation is - single, married, or widowed - today's readings remind us we are God's creatures, made for love and sharing life. Many of us are called to be married, and some of us are not. Relationships - be they marriage, family or friendships - are a great gift from God for the journey of life. It is in such relationships that we most usually face the joys and challenges of being a follower of Jesus.
