The Pastor's Letter

Last weekend was a busy one at our Sunday Masses! Within our liturgies, we included a presentation by Jerry and Diana Mirando on the annual Baby Bottle campaign to assist those who are expecting a child when finances and other factors are leading them to consider an abortion. Diana, in her very fine talk, mentioned that this is the tenth year of our Parish Pro-Life Ministry forming and serving the cause of promoting all life from conception to natural death. They have been most faithful to this ministry and Father Henry Sattler was a great mentor to the group over the course of those years.

As Diana and Jerry were speaking, I could not help but think of all the horrible stories that have come out about some of the Planned Parenthood clinics. What you do by the Baby Bottle campaign and what our Parish Pro-Life Committee has been doing over the years is such a positive action to such horrible news. I often think that two of the ways our parish puts the Gospel into action is by our Pro-Life work, and by our Food Pantry and Parish Outreach Center. I would also mention the compassionate work done by the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. In these ministries we are seeking to defend life and to help people who are in need of assistance with food and shelter. Jesus told us, What you do to the least of my brothers and sisters, you do to me. So God bless our parish as it supports these ministries with time, talent and treasure!



At first I was concerned that blessing and presenting the ministry books on the same weekend as the Baby Bottle presentation might be confusing to the people. Yet, someone suggested to me that it was a perfect combination because we both inviting people to ministry as well presenting a very vibrant example of ministry.

I believe the theme, *Walking the Way with Christ*, is an important time in the life of our parish. As I stressed in my preaching on this topic, this is not a program seeking help for the clergy. Our focus is to invite and challenge all of us to deepen our relationship with the

Lord Jesus. A key way to do that is by seeking to share our time, our talent and our treasure with others.

Certainly our first consideration of time, talent and treasure is with our families. Still we are also called to be involved in our local communities and parishes. I hope that St. Martin's Parish is part of your family life and that you see being part of its life as very important to you. Remember, we are not on a cruise ship but a crew skull-rowing.

o during the coming weeks, I invite you to read the ministry book, *Walking the Way with Christ*. Read it prayerfully. I invite you to invoke the Holy Spirit as you read it, and to seek the grace to know what God might be asking of you. I am fully aware that some of you have serious limitations of health, family and work obligations that may make it difficult to make a commitment to a ministry. However, I think our parish ministries have such a diversity allowing room for everyone in the parish.

In the next couple of weeks, we are going to have what we are calling witness talks during Mass. We are asking various parishioners to offer a few words - not so much on their particular ministry - but on why they choose to do a ministry in service to the parish and the Lord.

Just as we prayed so well during the *Paving the Way for Christ Campaign*, I ask us to turn to the Holy Spirit asking Him to bless our parish during this time of *Walking the Way with Christ*.

Parish Men's Group


A couple of men have approached me about having a men's group in the parish. The main focus of

My Life with the Saints Paperback – by Father James Martin S.J.



I had originally suggested our next book for our spiritual book club would be Mercy by Cardinal Kaspar. Although this is a highly recommended book, I have found it rather heavy to read, and I wonder if other members would have a similar experience. So, I am suggesting we read My Life with the Saints by Father James Martin. November is a good time to reflect on the saints and we will discuss this book during Advent. Our group had previously read Martin's book named Jesus and liked it very much.

It is one thing to read the lives of the saints, quite another to read about somebody who lives with the saints, who thinks about, researches, and calls upon certain saints regularly. Such a person is, today, a rarity. Such a person is GE-exec-turned-Jesuit Martin, associate editor of the Catholic weekly America, who details his introduction to and relationship with more than a dozen of his favorite haloed heroes in this book. They include Jude, patron saint of lost causes, whom Martin refers to as "the saint of the sock drawer" because that's where, when a young man, Martin kept a statuette of Jude; Ignatius Loyola, who inspired Martin to look for God in his daily life; and St. Joseph, whose quiet service to Christ motivates Martin. With wit and candor, Martin brings those and his other seemingly distant role models down to earth, citing instances from their biographies and, with deepest effectiveness, revealing his personal connection to each and how each has assisted his life.



WHAT PARENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT BULLYING

WHAT IS BULLYING?

Many people might think this behavior is easy to define. Their first image of bullying might be a physically intimidating child beating up a smaller classmate. While that might still be considered bullying today, parents need to know that bullying can be much more complex and varied than the stereotype. For example, harmful bullying can also occur quietly and covertly, or through gossip or the Internet, and can cause significant emotional damage.

TYPES OF BULLYING

- **VERBAL:** Is the most common and easiest to inflict on other children teasing, name calling, making threats, intimidating, making demeaning jokes about someone's differences, slander, spreading rumors.
- **PHYSICAL:** Visible Behavior hitting, kicking, pushing, taking or damaging property, forced or unwelcomed contact.
- **SEXUAL:** Most difficult for child and parents to discuss. Even though the subject may be uncomfortable to talk about, children need to know acceptable boundaries and appropriate behavior in social relationships.
- <u>CYBER</u>: The Internet has become the new BATHROOM WALL. A place where children can post mean and inappropriate comments about their peers. The rise of the Internet and other technology has led to a new, very serious form of bullying CYBER BULLYING. Cyber bullying is when the Internet, cell phones, or other devices are used to send or post text messages intended to HURT OR EMBARRASS another person.

RESULTS OF BULLYING MAY TAKE THE FORM OF:

- School Avoidance and Higher Absenteeism
- Decrease in grades, Inability to concentrate, loss of interest, increase in drop out rates
- Can lead to physical and mental health problems.

It is important that you teach your child to support the target. Nearly 60% of bullying situations end when a peer intervenes.

FEDERAL LAWS

Although no Federal law directly addresses bullying, in some cases, bullying overlaps with discriminatory harassment, when it is based on race, national origin, color, sex, age, disability, or religion. When bullying and harassment overlap, Federally funded schools (including colleges and universities) have an <u>obligation</u> to resolve the harassment. When the situation is not adequately resolved, the U.S. Department of Education - Office for Civil Rights and U.S. Department of Justice Civil Rights Division may be able to help.

Most importantly, be aware of a child's change in behavior about school and social events. Keep an open conversation about school and friends. Once you suspect that your child may be a target of bullying, meet with teachers or coaches to discuss the situation. Be aware of Internet sites. Make your child feel comfortable talking to you about problems they may be having. This will be the first and most important step in addressing this serious, and growing problem.



From the Gospel of Mark 10:46-52



As Jesus was leaving Jericho with his disciples and a sizable crowd, Bartimaeus, a blind man, the son of Timaeus, sat by the roadside begging. On hearing that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to cry out and say, "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me." And many rebuked him, telling him to be silent. But he kept calling out all the more, "Son of David, have pity on me." Jesus stopped and said, "Call him." So they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you." He threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus. Jesus said to him in reply, "What do you want

me to do for you?" The blind man replied to him, "Master, I want to see." Jesus told him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you." Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way.

ur parish book club just finished reading and discussing Harper Lee's novel, *Go Set a Watchman*. The title is taken from the 21st chapter of the *Book of the Prophet Isaiah*: Meanwhile, the Lord said to me, "Put a watchman on the city wall. Let him shout out what he sees." As you know, Harper Lee is the author of one of the great American classics you may have read as a school assignment, *To Kill a Mockingbird*. For almost half a century it was thought this novel was the only one Harper Lee wrote. However, it turns out she had written the novel *Go Set a Watchman* as a young woman before *To Kill a Mockingbird* was ever published. It was only in the last year Ms. Lee allowed this book to be published.

The book has many of the same characters that would later appear in *To Kill a Mockingbird*. The narrator in the book is Scout, the daughter of the hero, Atticus Finch, in *To Kill a Mockingbird*. In the story Atticus is truly a noble and good man, who as a southern lawyer in the 1930's, defends a Black man in a very unjust case. By every standard he is Scout's hero, especially in light of the fact her mother is dead. However, in her first book, *To Set a Watchman*, Scout is an adult woman who is slowly learning that her father, although a very good man, is not perfect. She is ready to reject her hero when she finds out Atticus *does* have prejudice against Blacks. She had been blinded by her heroic image of her father and now is challenged to love him as a real man of flesh and blood, with his great qualities and his faults.

In today's Gospel, we hear a story about a blind man who has been reduced to lying by the side of the road as a beggar. He has heard of the Miracle Worker, Jesus. When Jesus walks by, Bartimaeus cries out to Jesus in a loud voice for help, Son of David, have pity on me! He is shouting so loudly that the people are telling him to be quiet. But he cries out all the louder. So Jesus asks him what he wants. The blind man replies with great vigor, I want to see! Jesus restores his sight and tells him his faith has saved him.

There are always two ways to view this Gospel. The first is to read it as an account of an event in the life of Jesus. We know Jesus to be a man of great compassion and as one who heals. So it is a moving story of the love of our Lord Jesus for a poor blind beggar. I love the question Jesus asks of Bartimaeus, What do you want? We certainly understand that the blind man would ask for sight. Still, I find this to be a good question to ask ourselves, What do I want? On the surface, I might say I want the Mets to win the World Series. I might say I hope we find an oil well on our church property. I am sure some might want to win the lottery.

et, I am sure if we seriously consider this question, we would ask for good health, for the good health of loved ones, for deeper faith for ourselves and our children. We would ask for peace in a violent world or for freedom from terrorists. You might ask for a deeper love in your marriage, or to meet the right person with whom to share your life. Knowing our desires, at the deepest levels of our hearts, reveals what is important to us in life, and in the core of our heart's yearnings, we are most able to hear and discern the voice of God.

So I invite you to spend some time with that question of Jesus. What do you want? Listening to the desires in the core of our being is a way to hear God speaking to us. Yet, whenever there is a story of blindness in the Gospels, there is also a level beneath the surface. Accounts of blindness and healing in the Gospel are also narratives that remind us we are all blind in some areas of our lives. Scout in Go Set a Watchman is blinded by her hero worship of her father and struggles to love him as a real father and man. We say love is blind. There is truth to that. Romantic love moves a man or a woman to make an amazing promise: I will love you forever. However, as the days and years go on, and as the romantic love lessens in light of bills, children, housework and work, we may begin to have our eyes opened to a new reality and see our spouse with their faults and failures. It is not long before a bride or groom learns his partner is not perfect. Then, comes the time to truly love the person as he or she is since our blindness has been removed.

How often were we blind to what our parents said and did as they raised us. Even though we love our parents, we think we know more than they. They are "old fashioned" and "out of touch" with the realities of our world. Then, twenty or thirty years later as we grow older and perhaps raising our own families, we begin to understand them. The blindness of our youth may lessen through the passing of the years.

Perhaps we struggle most with a kind of internal blindness. It is easy for us to overlook our blindness in how we speak about others and how we judge them. It is so easy to become blinded by our own needs and wants we fail to see those of the people around us, perhaps even our closest family members and friends. The power of the pronoun *I* often blinds us to those other pronouns *you* and *us*. I know it is true for me in the case of some of the most important people in my life, I truly only came to appreciate them after they had died.

We can even become blind to Jesus Christ. The blind beggar is attentive and even though he cannot see he knows Jesus is nearby. He calls out to him from his poverty and need. However secure we are financially, we are all beggars. We are dependent on God for each breathe and every moment. We live and move and have our being in God. We are fish swimming in the ocean of God's love. But, it is easy to miss this reality. We can get so caught up in the daily rush of life and activities, that we become blind to the wonder and mystery of God. Pause for a moment and ponder: Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is coming into my heart and yours today at Holy Communion. How quickly that moment passes as we think about the rest of the day. We have to get on with the day; we have met our obligation to worship. We need God and we are often blind to this truth in our life.

After healing Bartimaeus, Jesus told him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you." The blind man knows Jesus is the source of all life and healing. We pray for sight today. We pray for vision that we can see with our hearts that Jesus is our Lord and God.

hen I ask at Mass: "How many of you want to be a saint" very few hands go up. When I ask: "How many of you want to go to heaven" all hands go up. Either we don't think we are worthy to be saints or we think it is ambitious to aspire to be a saint. Actually we all want to be saints because saints are the citizens of heaven and, therefore, if you want to go to heaven, you want to be a saint.

When we think of saints we think of people who are proclaimed saints by the Church and canonized in a big ceremony in St. Peter's. But we also know people in our own lives who are saints. Perhaps a grandparent or parent, an aunt or uncle, a neighbor, a co-worker. We all know people who have lived a virtuous life. They weren't perfect but they were filled with love. We admired them and remain grateful to them after they have died. So you don't have to be perfect to be a saint. You have to be faithful to be a saint: faithful to using the gifts God gave you, faithful to living the Gospel way of Jesus Christ, faithful to the truth, honest and humble.

Admittedly this is a tall order but it is lived out over the course of a lifetime. The key to being a saint is to recognize that we need a Savior and we do not save ourselves. Indeed there is a God and I am not God. I am His creature, created out of love and sustained in existence each day by God's love. The key to being a saint is to recognize one's dependence upon God. Our self-sufficiency and tendency to individualism are obstacles to becoming a saint because it becomes all about me. It is not all about me; it is about us and our journeying together through this life to life on high with Jesus Christ in the Kingdom of love.

The other obstacle to becoming a saint that is prevalent today is the tendency to think that this life is all there is. It is not. This life is but a preparation for eternal life with God. If we expect this life to meet all our needs, we will be disappointed. If we expect other people to take our loneliness away, we will smother the relationship. Saint Augustine said it well long ago: "You have made us for yourself, Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you."

Do you want to be a saint? Then love passionately, compassionately and yet, with a gentle grasp on life. Do you want to get to heaven? Then embrace life and let go of life. Love deeply but freely. And trust in the promise of Jesus to live with Him forever.
