The Pastor's Letter



As they went out, they came upon a man of Cyrene, Simon by name; this man they compelled to carry his cross. Jesus told his disciples, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. Matthew. 27:32; 16:24

I am sure if your life is anything like mine, you have found yourself pushed into certain situations where you are asked to do something that you do not want to do. However, the person requesting your assistance is persistent and you do not

know how to get out of it. And in my experience, very often what I have begun to do reluctantly becomes a graced time, and one in which I am grateful to have shared in.

My sister is a great promoter of mine. She is always lining me up to visit people in the hospital or attend wakes of people I barely have known. Sometimes she tells me whom I have never met to call me and that I will help them with some problem. I sometimes remind her that I have a full time job as a pastor in Bethpage, and that Brooklyn has many far more gifted and talented priests than I. Still I am flattered with the great confidence that she places in me, and as I said, after I made my visit to the hospital or wake, I never regretted it. The Holy Spirit, perhaps through my sister, has a way of getting us to where we are needed.

As Catholics, we are very familiar with the Stations of the Cross - the journey of Christ from his condemnation by Pilate, to the cross, and then to his tomb. Meditating on any one of the stations is most fruitful for prayer and reflection. As our parish was planning our ministry booklet, we developed a couple of new ministries that have not yet begun. One of these new ministries is called The Simeon Ministry. This is a ministry based on the Fifth Station of the Cross. As Our Lord Jesus struggles to carry his cross to Calvary, he falls three times. He has lost a great deal of blood by the terrible scourging he endured as well as the crown of thorns that were pressed into his head. The Roman executioners are afraid that Jesus will die on the way rather than on the cross so they enlist a man who is walking by the place where Christ is carrying his cross. They demand that this man, Simon of Cyrene, help Jesus carry the cross. It would seem obvious that this man does not want to get involved with a seeming criminal who is on the way to be executed. We can assume he is most reluctant to do this service, but the soldiers force him to do so. We can also wonder how did Simon experience this journey with Christ? Was he eventually touched by the goodness and innocence of Jesus? As he looked back on that bitter day, did he eventually have a grateful heart for having had this surprise moment in his life. There is some evidence in the Scriptures that his two sons became Christians.

Our Parish Simeon Ministry is an invitation for parishioners to give us their name as being available to help for a particular one-time situation in our parish. It is not a commitment to a regular ministry but to be open to receiving a call or email asking for a couple of hours of help from time to time. If the person is available that is great. If not, that is also fine and he or she will be asked to help at another time. You might be asked to help set up tables, decorate for a party, clean up after an event and so forth. To be a Simeon is to be sort of like Simon of Cyrene: you will be asked to help to do something specific (we won't ask you to carry a cross!). **The ministry is listed on page 46 of our Ministry Booklet entitled** *Walking the Way with Christ***. I ask you as you consider service to this parish, to consider becoming a Simeon. Who knows - we might eventually get you tee shirts!**

Below is a meditation on the Fifth Station:

MEDITATION

Simon of Cyrene is on his way home, returning from work, when he comes upon the sad procession of those condemned - for him, perhaps, it was a common sight. The soldiers force this rugged man from the country to carry the Cross on his own shoulders. How annoying he must have thought it to be suddenly caught up in the fate of those condemned men! He does what he must do, but reluctantly. Significantly, the Evangelist Mark does not only name him, but also his children, who were evidently known as Christians and as members of that community (cf. *Mk* 15:21). From this chance encounter, faith was born. The Cyrenian, walking beside Jesus and sharing the burden of the Cross, came to see that it was a grace to be able to accompany him to his crucifixion and to help him. The mystery of Jesus, silent and suffering, touched his heart. Jesus, whose divine love alone can redeem all humanity, wants us to share his Cross so that we can complete what is still lacking in his suffering (cf. *Col* 1:24). Whenever we show kindness to the suffering, the persecuted and defenseless, and share in their sufferings, we help to carry that same Cross of Jesus. In this way we obtain salvation, and help contribute to the salvation of the world.

PRAYER

Lord, you opened the eyes and heart of Simon of Cyrene, and you gave him, by his share in your Cross, the grace of faith. Help us to aid our neighbors in need, even when this interferes with our own plans and desires. Help us to realize that it is a grace to be able to share the cross of others and, in this way, know that we are walking with you along the way. Help us to appreciate with joy that, when we share in your suffering and the sufferings of this world, we become servants of salvation and are able to help build up your Body, the Church.

Parish Men's Group


A couple of men have approached me about having a men's group in the parish. The main focus of

My Life with the Saints Paperback – by Father James Martin S.J.



I had originally suggested our next book for our spiritual book club would be **Mercy by Cardinal Kaspar**. Although this is a highly recommended book, I have found it rather heavy to read, and I wonder if other members would have a similar experience. So, I am suggesting we read *My Life with the Saints* by Father James Martin. November is a good time to reflect on the saints and we will discuss this book during Advent. Our group had previously read Martin's book named *Jesus* and liked it very much.

It is one thing to read the lives of the saints, quite another to read about somebody who lives with the saints, who thinks about, researches, and calls upon certain saints regularly. Such a person is, today, a rarity. Such a person is GE-exec-turned-Jesuit Martin, associate editor of the Catholic weekly America, who details his introduction to and relationship with more than a dozen of his favorite haloed heroes in this book. They include Jude, patron saint of lost causes, whom Martin refers to as "the saint of the sock drawer" because that's where, when a young man, Martin kept a statuette of Jude; Ignatius Loyola, who inspired Martin to look for God in his daily life; and St. Joseph, whose quiet service to Christ motivates Martin. With wit and candor, Martin brings those and his other seemingly distant role models down to earth, citing instances from their biographies and, with deepest effectiveness, revealing his personal connection to each and how each has assisted his life.

Changing Back to Red Wine

Recently I was approached about the taste of the white wine we had been using at Mass. I was also told that I switched wines to save money. However, the reason we went from red to white wine was solely because the stains of red wine and the Precious Blood are difficult to remove from the altar cloths. We are blessed to have a dedicated crew of parishioners who wash these cloths, and we go through a great deal of them since we give out the Precious Blood of Jesus at all the weekend and daily Masses. Since I would want no one to deny themselves of the Precious Blood due to the taste, I decided to go back to the red wine. Cost had nothing to do with this decision since there is no difference in price.

Before Mass our task is to balance how much wine is needed for consecration so that there is



not a great deal of Precious Blood remaining after Communion. There have been times when there has not been enough Precious Blood consecrated to meet the needs of our congregation. I apologize for that, but it is a challenge to know how much wine to place on the altar since there is also the issue of having a significant amount of Precious Blood left over.

Out of our profound respect for the Real Presence of Christ in the Precious Blood, all of It must be consumed either by the clergy, the extraordinary minis-

ters, or others who are willing to help with this responsibility after Mass. We would never choose to - nor are we allowed by Church law - to dispose of the Precious Blood in the ground or in any sink. It **must** be consumed.

In his recent address in Philadelphia, Pope Francis noted that "VARIOUS FORMS OF MODERN TYRANNY SEEK TO SUPPRESS RELIGIOUS FREEDOM, or TRY TO REDUCE IT TO A SUBCULTURE WITHOUT RIGHT TO A VOICE IN THE PUBLIC SQUARE." Powerful political and cultural leaders often do not oppose religious freedom outright. Rather, they seek to relegate religion to a private sphere. They claim that religious freedom permits us to worship, but people of faith must shed their religious convictions when they leave the sanctuary and serve the public. This is a severely restrictive understanding of freedom.

The false notion of religion as a purely private affair has fueled a spate of threats to Catholic HOSPI-TALS; FREEDOM TO CARE FOR PEOPLE ACCORDING TO THE MORAL TEACHING OF THE CHURCH. In recent years, several Catholic healthcare entities and medical professionals have been punished by people who seek to require that they PROVIDE ABORTIONS and STERILIZATIONS. The notion seems to be that religion (or for that matter, morality) should not interfere with the practice of medicine. It's fine to have a little chapel and pictures of Jesus and Mary, but an increasingly influential segment of the population argues that Catholic hospitals and healthcare workers are no different from others. Opponents of truly Catholic healthcare demand that our FAITH NOT BE REFLECTED IN HOW WE PRACTICE MEDI-CINE AND SERVE OTHERS.

This argument from people who have never run healthcare entities is rather odd, since the CHURCH IN-VENTED THE HOSPITAL. While clinics and early medical practices existed in the pre-Christian world, an institution dedicated to medicine and in-patient care developed from monasticism. In the 4th century, St. Basil the Great took the institutionalized system of care that existed within the monastery and combined it with the public work of charity that lay Christians had been doing, and THE HOSPITAL WAS BORN. One great accomplishment of this institution was that persons previously thought to be UN-TOUCHABLE, like LEPERS, were given care rather than treated as animals. Illness was destigmatized. Christian hospitals sought in tangible ways to promote human dignity, an effort which has been at the HEART OF THE GOSPEL FROM THE BEGINNING.

Pope Francis has said, RELIGIOUS FREEDOM CERTAINLY MEANS THE RIGHT TO WORSHIP GOD, individually and in community, as our consciences dictate. But, RELIGIOUS LIBERTY, BY ITS NATURE TRANS-CENDS PLACES OF WORSHIP AND THE PRIVATE SPHERE OF INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES." The Holy Father has repeatedly REMINDED THE PUBLIC THAT RELIGIOUS FREEDOM IS NOT MERELY PRIVATE. It is a freedom to serve in public, and indeed, in the healthcare setting, a freedom to care. Faith in the Lord who calls us to service forms the bedrock on which many of the Church's greatest contributions to the world have been built.

WE SERVE THE POOR, THE VULNERABLE, AND THE SICK **BECAUSE** OF OUR RELIGION, **NOT** IN SPITE OF IT. WE CANNOT COMPROMISE THE PRINCIPLES ON WHICH OUR INSTITUTIONS ARE BASED.

Father Pat's Homily of 11/1/15

n St. Patrick's Day, especially in the city, one can see a great diversity of people wearing buttons that testify to some concept of the Irish. Certainly there is the ever popular, *Kiss Me I'm Irish* and *Erin Go Bragh* which is Gaelic for *Ireland Forever*. I have also seen *Warning: Irish Temper/Italian Attitude*. I am not sure what to make of that! But one other button that fascinates me which I've seen rather often has some form of green beer on it with the words, *St. Patrick was a Saint. I Ain't.*

Today, November 1st is the Feast of All Saints Day. Most of us who are a little bit older grew up with saints, and most of our churches were filled with paintings and statues of many saints. It seemed that after Vatican II, newer churches had less saints than the older houses of worship. Some even seemed to disappear such as St. Christopher and St. Philomena. We know that some of our Protestant Brothers and Sisters often say, "You Catholics worship saints!" That certainly has never been true. We worship only God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Still, I am happy to say that I think saints are beginning to be rediscovered and appreciated by today's Catholics. We love our saints and feel like they are our close friends.

Certainly the greatest of all our saints is Mary the Mother of Jesus, the Son of God. Her husband, St. Joseph, is the patron of the Universal Church and also of a peaceful death since the tradition is that he died with Jesus and Mary present with him. There are those who believe if you bury St. Joseph upside down in your yard, he will help you sell your house. You won't find this in our Creed but I know people who claim it worked for them. Our dear friend in heaven, St. Anthony seemed to be in charge of God's "lost and found department!" I know I pray to him when I lose something important which seems to be on a daily basis. Anthony has suggested that if I cleared my desk, I might find many missing items.

It is said that Good Saint Anne will help a lady find a man. She may be more efficient than many of the online dating services! Some people upon hearing of such customs would call them almost bordering on superstition. For me they are really charming traditions that remind us how close the grace of God is in our world.

When we were blessed to have Father Biju helping us one summer, he painted five beautiful saints. We have our good friend St. Anthony whom I already mentioned and St. Anne, the grandmother of Jesus. We have so many grandparents who are so active in caring for their grandchildren. There is a painting of St. Therese also called the Little Flower, one of the most popular of all Catholic saints. We have the painting of Saint Peregine, patron of those suffering from cancer, and the very popular patron of impossible cases - St. Jude. I see many Jet fans praying in front of him.

We also have other lovely images - The Holy Family, St. Martin of Tours - our patron, and the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. There are also pictures of St. Monica, patron of those praying for family members to return to the faith, and Redemptorist St. Gerard renowned for those couples seeking to have a child and for a safe delivery. As you leave the Church, you will see St. Michael, patron of soldiers, police officers and first responders battling Satan. Outside in our prayer garden, we have a lovely statue of the great St. Francis of Assisi.

 \vec{V} e also added a statue of St. Bernadette to our Lourdes area. We have named one building after St. Alphonsus and another after St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta. Over by the rectory garage is a



large statue (some have wondered if it is me a few pounds ago) of Blessed Francis Seelos a wonderful Redemptorist who lived in the 1850's. As the Book of Revelation says, we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses. We have saints in our church and grounds just as a family has pictures of loved ones in their homes.

When we pray to a saint, we are honoring God. It is Almighty God who hears and responds to prayers. We can always go right to God with any prayer we have, but many Catholics feel a certain bond with particular saints. We are attracted by their great holiness and their humanity. Both St. Therese of Lisieux and Mother Teresa

were great women of faith who, at times, suffered from serious struggles with faith and depression. St. Peter denied Christ three times while St. Thomas doubted that Christ had risen. St. Alphonsus suffered from a serious case of scruples and wondered if he had confessed all his sins. The saints inspire us to be like them, but we also see their faults. They were people of flesh and blood, not statues of plaster or stained glass. I love the story of St. Theresa of Avila who had an accident in which she fell from her carriage into mud, completely ruining her habit. The great Spanish mystic said to God: *If this is how you treat your friends, it is no wonder you have so few.* When St. Pope John the XXIII was asked how many people worked at the Vatican, he said *about half.*

The Church gives us the saints to help us live our Christian lives. They are cheering us on like the crowds at the New York Marathon. All Saints Day is a special day because is a time to think about all the unnamed men and women in heaven who are now saints since they are with God. They may not be officially canonized but we trust that their good lives have brought them home to the Lord. We often say about a person who has died: *she was a saint*, or *if anybody should get to heaven it is he*. I think of my own parents. Although they had their faults, they loved God, did their best to raise their families and tried to be good neighbors. I often talk to them and pray to them. The same is certainly true for my sister Gerry, a Sister of St Joseph who fits that definition of *if she is not in heaven, then I am in trouble*. There are countless people who have died who have inspired me by how they lived, many of them whose funerals I have celebrated here at St. Martin's. All Saints Day is kind of like honoring the unknown soldiers in Arlington. This is the day to thank God for all his saints. I have no doubt you have countless people in your lives whom you believe are home with the Lord. This is their day!

Finally, the canonized and unknown saints of our personal lives, remind us that our main goal in life is to **be** a saint. That might intimidate us a bit like the button that tells us that *St. Patrick is saint. I ain't*. But the only other option to being a saint after we die is not one that any of us would like. The souls in purgatory are on the list to become saints. The souls in hell have chosen to reject God and by their lives say they want no part of him.

So on this All Saints day, pray to God and all the saints in heaven to help you and me become what God wishes for us: *Saints!*
