This was a wonderful week for me. It began with the great Jets win over the Giants, a game which I attended. Several parishioners have suggested I should keep going to the games since I might bring them good luck. The other delightful moment has been our visit with Father Tom Donaldson, CSSR. I have received wonderful positive feedback on the homilies that Father Tom gave as we began the Jubilee Year of Mercy called for by Pope Francis. I know he touched many hearts while he was here. Tom, as you now know, is an extraordinarily gifted preacher. Additionally, for those who met him in his brief time with us, you can see he is a very warm and loving man.

This picture was taken in 1990 at a mission Father Tom and I gave in St. Louis (a few pounds ago). Do not be alarmed by the St. Louis Cardinal's hat I'm wearing! After hearing all my Mets stories in my homilies, they insisted I wear it for the picture. Tom and I became fast friends when we first met in the Redemptorist seminary in 1975. At that time, all the Re-

demptorist seminarians studied at the seminary near Kingston, New York. I was two years ahead of Tom, and I teased him that I tutored him so he could pass his courses. Since he is from a different Redemptorist Province than I am, this was the only time we ever gave a mission together. Fifteen years after I was ordained, Father Tom invited me to work with him on this mission. He had been a full time missionary for many years, and I was working in formation ministry in Washington, DC. I had never heard Tom preach, so I had no idea what to expect. Well, he got up the first night and spoke for more than an hour, never looking at his notes. Among other things, he told jokes, he cried, he stood on the pew, he did sign language, he had the people shouting back to him in response. As I sat listening to him I was both mesmerized and terrified. I could not help thinking, *Oh my Lord, I have to follow him tomorrow night!* After the first night of the mission was over, there was a brief reception in the parish hall. A parishioner came up to me and said, *I can't wait to hear you since they brought you all the way from New York to speak to us!* That comment only added to my already profound level of anxiety. The week proved to be one of the highlights of my priesthood.

Tom and I do not get to see each other too often. He is in Chicago and I am here. I tease him that when I call him on the phone, he tells me how happy he is to hear from me and then says he is on another line and will get right back to me. It can be two years before I hear from him again! Still, when we do meet, it is like we never have missed a beat in our friendship. Since he arrived here, we have been catching up on what has been going on in our lives, and naturally have shared countless memories and stories of the past. I have spent a lot of time laughing over the past few days.

I often think we take friendships for granted in our lives. If people ask you if you are related to someone you are very close to, we almost instinctually say, *No, she is only a friend*. I think the word *only* fails to capture the bond shared with certain friends. There are times when we are often closer to a friend than a family member. There are many friendships that have great depth.

Jesus was a man of friendship with Martha, Mary and Lazarus and had close bonds with Peter, James and John (called *the beloved* because he was so close to Jesus). Friendship is one of the great joys in life often taken for granted. I remember hearing about two friends who celebrated their 25th anniversary of

There are so many kinds of friendships: those from our youth, roommates from college, co-workers with whom we become close, friends we make with the parents of our children's friends, neighbors, people we meet in a parish organization or committee. There are generational friends who may be younger or older than we are. Friendships come in so many ways. When I first met Father Tom in 1975 could I have ever imagined that I would be inviting him to preach at the parish where I am pastor? Life is full of both mystery and surprise.

friendship. They knew God had given them a great gift of the other, and they wanted to thank Him for it.

I know that Father Tom really appreciated how welcoming you were to him. I also know that once he saw the Bethpage Black Golf Course, that we have not seen the last of him! He will be back, and that makes me - and I am sure you - very happy!

When you look at this old tree trunk in the sanctuary of our church, you might think that we are placing a Charley Brown Christmas Tree there. Actually, the strange looking symbol reflects a verse taken from the Old Testament: "And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots." (Isaiah 11:1)

Jesse was the Father of the Great King David. The symbol suggests that even though the Jewish



nation has been conquered and devastated by various powerful nations in its history, great life will eventually come forth from what appears to be a dead nation. The prophet Isaiah is speaking about Jesus Christ who will come to save all people. He will be from the line of David.

The Jesse Tree tradition originated in the medieval church in the form of carvings, stained glass windows, or illuminated manuscripts illustrating (literally). Typically, the objects centered on a tree culminated with the figure of Christ and/or Mary, with branches showing the ancestors of

Christ as listed in the gospel of Matthew. Our religious education students will soon decorate this tree with symbols of our faith.

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RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

A CHRISTMAS MIRACLE

One Catholic Church in Queens built its NATIVITY SCENE JUST IN TIME FOR THE HOLIDAYS - and JUST IN TIME FOR A SMALL MIRACLE! Last month, a newborn baby was left in the Baby Jesus' manger. A



custodian returning from his lunch break didn't think much at first of the cries coming from the nativity scene, which was just constructed that morning at the Holy Child Jesus Church in the Richmond Hill neighborhood of Queens, N.Y. According to Parish Secretary Cerni, the custodian found the baby boy wrapped in a towel, with the umbilical cord still attached. "The baby seemed fine," Cerni told ABC News. He was a fortunate child. THE MOTHER MADE THE RIGHT CHOICE!" The newborn baby was taken to Jamaica Hospital Medical Center in Queens. The baby, who was believed to

be just four or five hours old, was listed in stable condition.

New York's SAFE HAVEN LAW states that AN ADULT WITH LEGAL CUSTODY OF AN INFANT CAN DROP THE BABY OFF AT A HOSPITAL, CHURCH, POLICE OR FIRE STATION WITHOUT FACING LEGAL REPERCUSSIONS, according to the NATIONAL SAFE HAVEN ALLIANCE. The law also stipulates that the child is supposed to be handed off to a RESPONSIBLE PERSON AND NOT LEFT UNATTENDED. "God has a way of working mysteriously because I believe when this woman who came in with this child, saw this crèche, this CRECHE, THIS EMPTY HOME, THIS HOME IN WHICH WE'LL WELCOME JESUS in just a few weeks, I believe she found in it a home for her child," Fr. Christopher Heanue told ABC News in N.Y.

Parishioner Katherine Mooney, who has been attending the church for more than 30 years, told ABC that the CHURCH'S OPEN DOOR POLICY is what allowed the mother to bring the child to the church free of judgment. "It's a tragedy in the woman's life," she said. "BUT FOR THE BABY, WE FEEL THAT ONLY GOOD THINGS WILL HAPPEN NOW!"

BABY SAFE HAVEN: A CHILD NEED NEVER BE ABANDONED AGAIN! If you're pregnant and do not feel you can care for your baby, or if you have a baby you cannot care for, you have a place to come. It's Safe! It's anonymous! It's an option you and your baby can live with!

BABY SAFE HAVEN PROJECT: A project of the NATIONAL SAFE HAVEN ALLIANCE. In 1999, an overwhelming number of infant abandonments took place. Never before in a single year had so many mothers decided that they couldn't care for their children, and then disposed of their newborn infants in an unsafe and tragic way. In response, a group of dedicated people worked together to create a law that would guarantee no mother would ever have to SECRETLY DISPOSE OF HER NEWBORN INFANT. This law would protect the mother and assure her that she would not be prosecuted for relinquishing her baby. So long as the baby was safe and given to a responsible adult at a designated location, the mother WOULD BE FREE TO GO ANONYMOUSLY. SINCE IT'S INCEPTION, OVER 2,000 babies are known to have been positively impacted by the Baby Safe Haven Program.

In New York State there are many prospective ADOPTIVE FAMILIES searching for a child to become part of their family. 



This recent headline from the *New York Daily News* was very disturbing to me. I know the New York tabloids, the *Post and News*, duel to create readers and shock. For me, this headline was over the top, and I was somewhat reluctant to put it here in the bulletin since I so very much disagree with what it had to say. Still since many people read the *Daily News*, I wanted to say something about it.

Certainly it is a political headline since only Republicans were challenged for offering prayers since they have different views on gun issues than do many Democrats. I will not enter into that debate since that is a political debate and one for the voters to decide.

What bothers me about this headline is that there is also an undercurrent that prayer is useless in the face of such evil. For me, this raises serious questions for us. Several parishioners have asked me to place a prayer against terrorism into our Sunday Masses. I certainly understand this suggestion; I have responded that we do pray almost every Sunday in the Prayer of the Faithful for freedom from terrorism. I have also added at times to the closing of the Prayer of the Faithful the Prayer of St. Michael who is the patron saint of warding off the evil of Satan and his followers. Does it help to pray to end terrorism? Why don't we see more results from our prayers? Good and challenging questions! Will our well intentioned prayers change anything?

Unlike the *Daily News*, I am a great believer in the importance of prayers of petition to our Heavenly Father. Jesus told us over and over again to raise our prayers in petition to his Father. *Ask and you shall receive, knock and the door will be opened to you*. Jesus gave us several parables about the importance and power of prayers of petition. So, we pray in petition to our God for what we most need and desire.

I will admit that prayers of petition are a kind of mystery to me. In purely human terms, I ask myself if I am trying to change God's mind about something that is about to happen due to the evil choices of certain people. Quite honestly, I do not always see how many heartfelt prayers are seemingly not answered by God. This troubles many of us, including people of deep faith. We not only pray for freedom from terror, but we pray for our sick and suffering who have cancer and other diseases. We pray that they get well; sometimes they do, but very often they do not. I do believe all prayers are answered but not in ways that I can always see and understand. To truly pray a prayer of petition is to recognize that I am not in charge of the world and how it operates. It is to recognize I am a creature and dependent on God. To pray is to enter into mystery: I pray as well as I can and leave the rest in the hands of Almighty God. To pray in the most difficult moments of life, especially when we do not seem to receive the response we seek, is a great act of faith and trust in God.

At the same time, our prayers of petition for the suffering people of San Bernardino and Paris, as well as for others who have suffered the horrors of terrorism, puts me in solidarity and union with the suffering people of the world. It is to say to them that we are **with** them. We **love** them. I know that I draw comfort and strength from those who tell me they are praying for me. These prayers lead us into the suffering of our fellow human beings. We allow their pain to touch our own hearts.

Sometimes, our prayers of petition lead us to action. We may donate to a relief fund or a college education fund because we want to help other people who have been devastated by terror. Our prayer of petition becomes a very strong reminder to allow our prayer to lead us to also take whatever action we can reasonably take. Granted, you and I can do very little to stop ISIS and radical Islamic Jihadists. But we can work to make our own homes, our families, our places of work, our neighborhoods, our society as good and loving place as possible. We can work for peace and understanding with the very people we meet each day. Our prayers of petition may move our hearts to help someone or be compassionate to a person in need.



Advent is the great season of hope. Our Savior Jesus was born into the most violent area of the world and it continues to be so. However, we choose not to give into despair and cynicism. We know that ultimately God will prevail over evil. We walk in faith and draw strength from our hope in the Gospel. We choose to hear the words spoken so often in the Scriptures: **Do Not Be Afraid**.

Do not let anyone seek to take that hope away from you! Keep storming heaven with your prayers of petition!

ne day, after celebrating Mass, the aged Pope Leo XIII was in conference with the Cardinals when suddenly he sank to the floor in a deep swoon. Physicians who hastened to his side could find no trace of his pulse and feared that he had expired. However, after a short interval, the Holy Father regained consciousness and exclaimed with great emotion: "Oh, what a horrible picture I have been permitted to see!"

He had been shown a vision of evil spirits who had been released from Hell and their efforts to destroy the Church. But in the midst of the horror the archangel St. Michael appeared and

cast Satan and his legions into the abyss of Hell. Soon afterwards Pope Leo XIII composed the following prayer to Saint Michael, which is the original version:

Saint Michael the Archangel, defend us in battle, be our protection against the malice and snares of the devil. May God rebuke him we humbly pray; and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and all evil spirits who wander through the world for the ruin of souls. Amen.
