The Pastor's Letter

I will begin this Epiphany homily with two old jokes. The first one is about a very distinguished Protestant minister who gets into a cab at Kennedy Airport and tells the Irish cabby to take him to the Church of God in Manhattan. The cabby quickly drives away and soon arrives at the doorsteps to St. Patrick's Cathedral. The minister says, "This isn't the Church of God; it is St. Patrick's Cathedral!" The Irish driver responds, "Buddy, if he isn't here, he is isn't anywhere!" The joke is so old that it has an Irish cab driver in New York, a most rare possibility.

The other is a bit irreverent but fits my talk today. A first grade religion teacher asks her students, "Where is God?" A little boy eagerly raises his hand and says that God is Church. Teacher commends him for his answer. A little girl speaks up and says that God is in our hearts. The teacher is very impressed with that response. A third boy, eagerly waving his hands says, God is in our bathroom at home. The rest of the kids laugh and the teacher is perplexed and says to the boy, why do you think God is in your bathroom. Well, he says, every morning my dad yells at my sister who is the bathroom and says, "God! will you get out of that bathroom?"

Where is God? Ask a little child, or even an adult, and he or she will point their finger to the heavens. We certainly believe as Catholics that God is in our Church in the most profound way when we celebrate the Mass and also in our tabernacle where he is present under the form of the consecrated host. I think many of us would agree with the little girl in the story who said that God is present in our hearts. We have been created by God who has breathed his life into us at our conception. We know that atheists say there is no God and this entire universe is simply here by random chance - a bunch of molecules smashing into each other. There are philosophical agnostics who say there may or may not be a God, but either way, it has no impact on them. Then there are the rest of us, believing in a personal God, and practicing our faith in a variety of ways, some with great passion and others with indifference.

Today, is the Feast of the Epiphany, sometimes called Little Christmas. There are some nationalities that celebrate this day with great festivity. However, I think most of us by his time, are bit



"Christmased" out, and worried about two things: stepping on the bathroom scale and the mail that will bring our credit card bills.

Epiphany comes from a Greek word which means an appearance or manifestation especially of a divine being. The second definition is also important: a moment in which you suddenly see or understand something in a new or very clear way.

We love the three wise men named Gaspar, Balthasar, and Melchior who follow the star to the stable of Bethlehem and bring gold, frankincense and myrrh. Actually the Bible never gives us the names of the wise men nor does it say there were only three. The number three some from the fact that there were three gifts. The Magi wear colorful costumes and ride camels. They come from the East.

A key aspect of this feast is that it speaks to us that Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, is for **all** people. First he appears to the shepherds and then to kings. He is born of a Jewish mother, but the Magi from the East teaches us that Jesus is not only the long awaited Messiah of the Jewish people, but he came to save all people of every nationality. God is for all people. Granted, many reject him but he has come with mercy for all sinners.

Back to my question, "Where is God?" Do we have a star similar to the one the guided the Magi to Jesus? Have we had our own epiphanies where for a moment a flash of grace and wisdom touched our hearts and souls, and we came to know something that we did not understand before? Many of you who are parents have had an epiphany when you recalled the words that your parents said to you when you were young - "Wait until you have your own children and then you will understand! I bet what they said came to be true for you in your own experience of parenting. I love the words that Mark Twain said when he was 20 that he could not believe how little his father knew; when he was forty he was shocked how much his father had learned in 20 years! As we get older, we often do see and understand things far differently than when we were young.

There are many spiritual epiphanies a person can have in life. There are certain times when I look at the sky, at the ocean, the tiny fingers of a newborn baby, hear the wisdom of an elderly person, hear of some very kind act that one person has done for another and I know that God is so very real and alive. Recently, as I was walking a bit gingerly in the midst of a crowd, a stranger said to me, "Are you okay, Poppy?" I was initially outraged! How dare he call *me*, a young man full of life and energy - *Poppy*? Later that night, still stewing about being called *Poppy*, I recalled that my nieces and nephews called my father Poppy. Suddenly it all changed, and I felt so very close to Dad. It was as if he had sent me a message from heaven. And this happened on mother's anniversary of death. Did they come up with that stranger together?

Epiphanies of grave and of wonder of God happen all the time, in the midst of the most ordinary moments of life. God does not just have one star in heaven for us to follow. I looked on line and read that there are a billion trillion stars in the universe! (kind of sounds like the national debt). God has given us countless paths to know Him and his love. He is always revealing himself to each one us.

I pray that God bless you with many epiphanies of his presence and love in your daily lives as he does with the gift of the Holy Eucharist that we will receive today.

Looking Over the Past Year Pondering in Our Hearts

Early on in his Gospel, Luke twice mentions Mary doing something extraordinary, namely, pondering something "in her heart." The first occasion is after the departure of the shepherds at the Nativity; the second is when she and Joseph discover the Child Jesus speaking with the Temple elders. Luke's phrase is telling. For Mary to "ponder" something "in her heart," is not simply for her to remember the details or get her facts straight. Rather, it seems more a way to take in something in its totality and to let it sink down deep, into the heart, the place where it can change you.

Were we to be like Mary, how might we ponder in our hearts what we ourselves have seen and heard this past Christmas season so that, before it closes, we might learn something more from it than we did the first time through? Something which might just sink down deep and somehow change us.

Perhaps these questions might be of some help.

- What was the best, the greatest, gift you received this year not the brightest gift or the shiniest or the fastest or the most expensive gift, but the best gift, the greatest gift? Who gave it to you? And do they even know they did?
- What was the best gift you gave this year, one that may have cost you a little or one which may have cost you a lot. And the little or a lot that it might have cost you might not have been money at all.
- If there was something you did in the last several weeks which was just what someone else needed, just when they needed it, just what was it?
- If there was one time when all your troubles, your cares and worries, seemed to you far, far away what was that time? And what chased your troubles away?
- If there was one glance you had of someone else that allowed you to see them fresh, as if for the very first time, yet see them as well radiant with all that they mean to you what was that time? And who was that person?
- Was there ever a time perhaps in a crowd and surrounded with people or perhaps by yourself that it struck you that you are a lucky, lucky person? What was that time? Who were those people around you, if people were there? And what seems to have brought that feeling on?
- If you said one thing exactly right, exactly true and straight from your heart, just what exactly did you say? And to whom did you say it? And why?
- If within the last few weeks you brushed a tear from your eye secretly so that no one else could see it, why did that tear come? And what did that tear mean?

• When do you feel the proudest? The happiest? The most content? Indeed, the most yourself?

If you could look back over the many, many moments of this tender season now ending and pick out one moment from among them all – just one –pick the one where somehow you knew in your heart that it was all true: the angels indeed did sing, the shepherds indeed did worship, the kings indeed did bring their gifts and bow low – and all of this because at that one moment you felt almost held aloft by kind and mighty hands; and if you could take that one moment and hold it in your heart forever, take it out and gaze upon it from time to time as if to look upon a kind of snow globe, just what would that one moment be?
