> When the song of the angels is stilled, When the star in the sky is gone,
> When the kings and princes are home, When the shepherds are back with their flocks, The work of Christmas begins:
> To find the lost, to heal the broken, to feed the hungry, to release the prisoner, to rebuild the nations, to bring peace among the people, to make music in the heart.

Iremember receiving these word many years ago in a Christmas card. The sender had the wisdom to send the card several days after New Year's so it would not be lost among the many warm and beautiful Christmas cards that I received. I find the words "the work of Christmas
 begins" to be both thought provoking and challenging. Now that we have celebrated well the birth of Jesus, we are now called to follow him. The day-to-day work of accepting and loving others is no easy task. There are so many poor and suffering people in the world that it is overwhelming for us to think about what we can do to assist them. We see pictures of refugees fleeing the horrors of war, Christians in the mid-East being slaughtered for their religious beliefs, and brutal acts of terrorism occurring all over the world. The work of Christmas begins.

We know the homeless are sleeping on the streets and many people are suffering from untreated mental illness. Gangs have great power in many of our big cities, and educational systems in some areas are failing the children. Food pantries cannot keep up with the demand of the hungry. Knowing that none of these major issues are easily resolved, and that political figures from all the major parties talk and talk, and seem to make promises that are rarely kept, we can easily move from hopelessness to anger, to simply giving up. The work of Christmas begins.

No doubt, even in our own families we face struggles and disappointments. Some of us may be in deep mourning and sorrow over the loss of a recently deceased loved one. There are those of us who wonder if we have celebrated our last Christmas on earth. We are suffering an illness that leaves us exhausted and we fear being a burden to those we love. We may be in a marriage that has serious problems that are only growing worse. Many are disappointed that their adult children have ceased to practice their Catholic faith. Most of us have a person or two (or maybe more) in our lives with whom we are alienated. We know we should work to forgive the person, but we find it all but impossible to let the hurt and resentment go. The work of Christmas begins.

What is the work of Christmas? One of the core messages that Our Lord Jesus Christ revealed to us is that we are to love one another. "Whatever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters you do to me." This is the basis on which Jesus tells us we will be judged (Matthew 25). I think of the words of St. John of the Cross - "In the evening of life, we will be judged by love alone." The work of Christmas begins.

In $n$ the midst of all the challenges I have mentioned, the word love may sound like a simply pious
thought. Some of us may feel life has left us a bit battered and worn out and the flames of love in our
heart are closer to embers and ashes. We may feel love is a nice word but how do ouou live it in a world of
flesh and blood. Still, the Christmas reality is that Jesus Christ, the Son of God, chose to become flesh and
blood and live in this very real world.
Love in the sense of the Gospel is far less about the hearts and flowers we see in our stores as the com-
mercial world seeks to quickly move us from Christmas to Valentine's Day, offering us the necessary cards,
flowers and gifts to keep the cash registers opening. Love to me is a matter of the will. We can choose to
love or we can choose not to love. It is said that the opposite of love is not hate but apathy. Apathy is to
give up and not care - "I have nothing left to give."
Through the years, I have been given coffee cups and plaques with the coat of arms for the name Woods.
Fittingly enough, it is a tree with fruit on it. It often has the motto - A tree is known by its fruit. (Since my
ancestors were rural farmers, I am not sure if my family ever had a coat of arms!) I love the coat of arms
of the Redemptorist which has a cross and the words With Him Is Plentiful Redemption. I suppose if I had
a personal coat of arms other than the orange of blue of the Mets), I would chose these words: and who-
ever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the ame of a disciple--truly I tell you,
none of these will lose their reward. A cup of cold water given in his name will be rewarded. I am not
able to solve the great problems of the world, but I can do simple, kind deeds for another person.
Again, the Christmas message is so simple: "what you do to one another you do to me." The work of
Christmas, the call of a Christian, the heart of a follower of Jesus, is to be a person who gives cups of cold
water to those who are in need, be it your spouse or the homeless man on the street. The work of Christ-
mas begins.

## RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

Father John McKenna sent me this article that he had written, and I would like to share it with you.

12/14/15 Today is the anniversary of the massacre of the innocent school children, and their brave teachers and principal. The hurt, the loss, the emptiness, the sadness never goes away for the families. One man who preferred to remain nameless in Newtown answered a question that a reporter asked by saying that if San Bernardino was terrorism, so was Newtown. Terror that they justify to themselves and plan methodically, is TERROR.

I have been praying the prayer after the Our Father at Mass a little more mindfully lately. "Deliver us Lord, we pray from every evil, and grant us peace in our days....

My connection to Newtown was through Bob and Louise Gay. They are parishioners in Our Lady of Lourdes in Seaford. When everything was happening, Bob called me and told me simply, JOEY WAS IN THAT SCHOOL! She hasn't come to the firehouse. Pray that somehow she is hiding somewhere within the school." Joey was their sweet youngest grandchild. Josephine "JOEY" Gay. SHE HAD JUST TURNED SEVEN 7 YEARS OLD. She was baptized by Fr. Joe Hurley in Seaford. She had autism. She communicated through looks and smiles, and hugs and moods, and filled a world, her world, the world with goodness. Sadly she was one of the innocents that day.

I went to the funeral Mass, the last of the victims of St. Rose of Lima Parish. I don't think I had ever felt more proud of a brother priest, than I had for those men there, Fr. Bob Weiss and the young assistants. They walked with their people, they cushioned their pain, their anger, their hurt, with love and did not try to spiritualize something so awful. All priests have had a few experiences ministering in tragic circumstances. But never so many all at once. These men were a credit to us all. They were pastors, they were fathers. I can only imagine how much it took out of them, how much they went through. I saw the people who had all been through the worst week of their lives coming together, to stand together with each other. I saw when Church and parish are at its best - a people who support each other.

I saw Joey's parents Bob and Michelle, and her two sisters. I heard the parent speak about the privilege of having been her parents, and blessed to share their life with her, and how much Joey taught them. One sister drew how she was processing all of this that was much too much for any of us, let alone someone so young.

My prayer for all victims of violence, crime, war, accidents, is a gentle song, the third verse from AWAY IN A MANGER.

BE NEAR ME, LORD JESUS, I ASK YOU TO STAY CLOSE BY ME FOREVER AND LOVE ME I PRAY. BLESS ALL THE DEAR CHILDREN IN THY TENDER CARE AND TAKE THEM TO HEAVEN TO LIVE WITH THEE THERE.

Forgiveness is hard work. Sometimes it even feels like an impossible task. Ilove the Christmas season here at St. Martin's, beginning with the very beautiful Thanksgiving Day Liturgy that we celebrate, through the Sundays of Advent with their message of anticipation of the birth of Jesus, to the six Christmas vigil Masses with overflowing, joyful crowds, to the always delightful children's Christmas pageant, to seeing the great generosity of the donations to the Giving Tree for those in need, and finally to the singing of We Three Kings for the Feast of the Epiphany. I am always moved when I see families and individuals gather around the parish Christmas crèche. Our music under the wonderful direction of Elena Scollo, and our church decorating team led by Ann Hughes and T.J. Hance, make the Christmas season so very sacred and special here at St. Martin's.

Tomorrow the Christmas decorations in Church will begin to come down since today, the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus, marks the end of the Church's Christmas Season. The world around us started to advertising for Valentine's Day on December $26^{\text {th }}$, but we Catholics give the birth of Jesus a full season for several weeks. I have always found January and February to be months of cold and darkness, and I have often suffered from a bout of the Christmas blues, especially since the Jets season is over and Mets are months away.

Today is a kind of transition day in our Gospel readings. We are no longer hearing about Bethlehem, shepherds, magi and the newborn King of the Jews. We are almost startled as we move to see Jesus, now a man, beginning his public ministry by being baptized by another figure of the Nativity Gospels, John the Baptist. Like a parent taking a son to college, we find ourselves amazed at the quick passage of time.

Unless we entered the Catholic faith as an adult, most of us have no memory of our baptisms. Unlike our birthdays, most of us do not know the date of our baptisms. Still, we do know that it was at our baptisms that we became Catholic and that our souls were marked, as the Baltimore Catechism taught, with an indelible mark on the soul. A priest or deacon poured water over our heads and said, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. "

I like celebrating baptisms here at St. Martin's. The babies are so beautiful, the parents are glowing, and the family and friends are so very happy. I feel like a movie star since almost every action I take during the ceremony is photographed, but my role is like that of John the Baptist, since it the newborn baby and the Holy Spirit who are at the center of this sacrament.

I was taught as a young person that baptism makes us children of God. When I celebrate baptisms, I prefer to say to the parents that your child was a child of God from the moment he or she was conceived. Baptism celebrates that the child is entering into the Catholic faith, a community of believers, and now belongs to the family of the Church. The parents and godparents, speaking for the infant, say we want to know and love Jesus Christ and make him the center of our lives.

T do not talk too much about Original Sin because it is a rather difficult concept to present as we are surrounded by all the innocence and wonder of a baby. Although I have no doubt about the reality of Original Sin, it is very hard to ponder that these children have been touched by it. I often say that Original Sin is one of the easiest documents of the Church to prove because all one has to do is read the newspaper or watch the news on television. There is a constant and endless litany of human cruelty and sin toward one another. Starvation, war, intolerance and hate reign in the world. If I look into my own heart and soul, I can feel the power of selfishness. I want to put my needs ahead of anyone else in the world. The seven capital sins - Pride, Lust, Gluttony, Greed, Sloth, Anger and Envy - are very familiar to me and I battle each of them every day. Only the grace of God allows me to overcome any of their overwhelming power. You and I are born with a human nature that daily struggles with such forces. Only the Blessed Mother is free from the power of Original Sin.


Yet we are baptized in the name of the Trinity. We have been saved by the Blood of Jesus Christ. The power of the Holy Spirit is with us. Today John the Baptist plunges Jesus into the waters of the Jordan River. The Son of God had no need of baptism, in particular this baptism of John which was a form of repentance. Jesus is showing us that just as he entered into humanity as a baby in Bethlehem, he is now entering into the fullness of human nature with all its joys and struggles.

Some Churches have baptismal fonts that look like small pools or Jacuzzi's. I recall seeing a video of a wedding photographer walking down the aisle of the Church as she faced the newly married couple walking down the aisle. Since she so attentive to filming the couple, she did not realize that she was about to plunge head over heels into the parish baptismal font. Fortunately she was not hurt, other than that of her pride.

Here at St. Martin's we have a beautiful baptismal font. On Holy Saturday night, if an adult is coming into the church, he or she stands in the small pool and water is abundantly poured over the newly baptized. Fundamentalist Christians like to baptize people in rivers or oceans. I can recall my visit to the River Jordan and watching people joyfully play and dance in the river as they sang and were baptized.

The symbol of being plunged under water and rising out of it is very powerful. It is teaching us that we are dying to sin and rising to new life in Christ. When we celebrate a funeral, we sprinkle water on the casket and place a white pall on it. These are signs that we have entered fully into union with God.

So as this New Year begins, you and I would do well to ask ourselves the question: Have I been putting on the Lord Jesus Christ? By the grace of the Holy Spirit, am I seeking to overcome a particular fault or sin in my life? Am I a stronger Christian today than I was at this time last year? We will soon be coming forward to receive the Body of Christ. As we open our hearts to this great Gift, we pray to let the life of Jesus Christ grow in our lives.
