The Pastor's Letter

The first presidential primary elections will soon be held in Iowa and New Hampshire. Although I would admit to being a political news junkie, I would say that there is no candidate of either major party that has yet to capture my mind or heart. I do hope that will change for me over the course of this year. Commentators will often speak about the different areas that a candidate needs to address: foreign affairs - including how to protect the nation from terrorism - economic issues, immigration, education, crime, health care, and social issues. Social issues often refer to gay marriage, abortion, and gun control laws.

Every one of these topics is incredibly complex and impossible to reduce to a clear statement in a 30 second sound bit or shouting over another candidate in a debate. I believe most of us try to be informed voters who are likely to vote for the candidate whose ideas and thoughts are closest to our own principles. We do know that we will never find a candidate who matches our all our beliefs. Quite honestly, many people tend to vote for candidates who they believe will be good for us personally. If a candidate speaks a great deal about the elderly and what he or she will do to help them, then an elderly person might well be attracted to such a candidate. If a political figure promises free college tuition, then a young person might support a platform. It is hard to vote for the best interests of the nation, over the natural tendency to vote for the one who will help me.

I think it is also fair to say that we sometimes vote for reasons that are not based on the policies of the candidates. We may say to ourselves: I don't like the way he looks, I can't stand her voice, he looks like a big phony to me and so forth. On the other hand, I like him because he is Irish or Italian or whatever nationality we are. Perhaps because he is a Catholic (who may or may not have seen the inside of a church in years), she is a woman and we need a woman in the White House, or he speaks Spanish and there are many Spanish speaking people in our country.

Another key factor is the media. I am firmly convinced that it is very difficult to get unbiased news on the political candidates. Liberal reporters and networks work to make their candidate look good and to make their opponents look bad. I believe the same is true for conservative reporters and stations. Sometimes I think it is all but impossible to get objective information.

Some people say they are single issue voters. They have one issue that is vital to them and they will vote for the candidate who best represents their position. I am very concerned about a candidate's stand on the right to life from conception to natural death. Still, I want a candidate who will also work for peace while protecting us, be just and fair to immigrants, and assist the working class people, the elderly, and the poor. I would say these are all core values of Jesus and the Catholic faith. Will I find a candidate who will meet them to the best of my expectations is a question that I have yet to answer. Our faith does call for us to be informed voters and to vote our consciences.

It is hard work to be a good citizen. We know how incredibly blessed we are to live in the United States. We know we have our difficulties and challenges, but I thank God daily for our country. In a world filled with dictators, how fortunate we are to live in a nation where we can talk freely about our beliefs and have the right to choose our leaders. Our political leaders need and deserve our prayers.

St. Paul says in his First Letter to Timothy:

First of all, then, I urge that entreaties and prayers, petitions and thanksgivings, be made on behalf of all men, for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity. This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior.

Pope Francis gives encouragement to the young around the world!

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Don't fall for hate and fearmongering from others; make new friends instead and



always help and show concern for others, Pope Francis told the world's teens. "Be brave and go against the tide, be friends of Jesus, who is the prince of peace," he said in a written message for the Jubilee of Mercy for Young People, scheduled to be celebrated in Rome and dioceses around the world April 23-25.

In his written message, released by the Vatican January 14, the pope said the Year of Mercy is open to everyone so they may experience "a time of grace, peace, conversion and joy."

"God invites everyone, he said, because "there are no walls or distances which can prevent the father's mercy from reaching and embracing us." While three days in April have been set aside for those between 13 and 16 years of age, every day of the jubilee year marks "a chance for us to grow in holiness." It is also a time to realize "that life together as brothers and sisters is like a great party, perhaps the most beautiful party we can imagine, the endless party that Jesus has taught us to celebrate by his Spirit."

However, the pope said, "I cannot forget those of you who are living in situations of war, extreme poverty, daily troubles and loneliness. Don't ever lose hope! The Lord has a great dream which, with your help, he wants to come true." Other young people around the world have not forgotten about those who are less fortunate and they "are working for peace and justice for everyone everywhere," he said. "Don't be taken in by the messages of hatred or terror all around us. Instead, make new friends. Give of your time and always show concern for those who ask your help," he said.

Pope Francis reminded young people that preparing for a pilgrimage or jubilee celebration didn't just mean getting backpacks and banners ready, "but your hearts and minds as well." He urged them to grow closer to Jesus and draw nourishment from the sacraments. Becoming more merciful during the Year of Mercy means not only growing "in a love which is courageous, generous and real," it is means greater spiritual growth, too.

"You are preparing to be Christians capable of making courageous decisions in order to build daily, even through little things, a world of peace," he said.







The Book of Forgiving: The Fourfold Path for Healing Ourselves and Our World by Desmond Tutu



Forgiveness is an issue that challenges all of us in our daily lives. In this Year of Mercy, I thought this would be a good book for our spiritual book club. The discussion will take place on **Saturday, March 12th at 10:00 a.m. in St. Alphonsus Hall**. All are welcome

Each of us has a deep need to forgive and to be forgiven. After much reflection on the process of forgiveness, Tutu has seen that there are four important steps to healing: admitting the wrong and acknowledging the harm; telling one's story

and witnessing the anguish; asking for forgiveness and granting forgiveness; and renewing or releasing the relationship. Forgiveness is hard work. Sometimes it even feels like an impossible task. But it is only through walking this fourfold path that Tutu says we can free ourselves of the endless and unyielding cycle of pain and retribution. *The Book of Forgiving* is both a touchstone and a tool, offering Tutu's wise advice and showing the way to experience forgiveness. Ultimately, forgiving is the only means we have to heal ourselves and our aching world.

Make a pilgrimage. Make a journey to one of the four Holy Doors in the diocese or one of the four Holy Doors in the four papal basilicas in Rome. Crossing through

the Holy Door is a spiritual journey that signals, as the Holy Father said, "the deep desire for true confession."

Go to Confession.

Receive the Holy Eucharist "with a reflection of mercy."

Make a profession of faith.

Pray for the pope and for his intentions.

For the elderly, confined and the ill:

Pope Francis said they may obtain the indulgence by "living with faith and joyful hope during this moment of trial."

Receiving the Eucharist, or by attending Mass and community prayer, "even through the various means of communication."

What is an Indulgence?

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (No. 1471): "An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minster of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints. An indulgence is partial or plenary accordingly as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin>' Indulgences may be applied to the living or the dead.


