The Pastor's Letter

Jonas: The Nor'easter of January 23/24, 2016

I lived ten years in a little town called North East that was outside the city of Erie PA, located about a mile from Lake Erie. We averaged about 140 inches of snow in winter, and I never managed to become



friends with great snowfalls. This past weekend made me think I was back in Erie. As a pastor, I have grown to particularly dislike snow because it impacts a parish as it seeks to go about doing its mission. However, I also know that it affects all of you as your homes and apartments become plowed in by the road plows. Schools close and arrangements have to be made for minding the children if we have to work. Shoveling and digging out our cars, paths and driveways is exhausting work and can even be dan-

gerous if we are not physically able to take on such demanding stress.

The first layer is beautiful to see but then we know that the snow will stick around for weeks, making parking hard to find in many situations. I know I am sounding a bit whiny, since the snowplow companies and the ski resorts are delighted with the snowfall and God has the best laid plans for the overall workings of this marvelous creation we call the Universe.

What I would like to do is draw some learnings from this storm that we might consider for the future.

- The first learning I take from the snow is that I am very blessed to have a roof over my head, food in the house, cable television for the football games, and heat. God is good to me. I think of so many people who don't even have shelter in such harsh weather who seek to live on the streets or spend all night at a train station or on the subway just to get out of the cold and frost. Even as I fall into a snowbank walking over to Church, I still know that I do not have near the hardships of so many people in our world and even in our parish. So, Father Pastor, don't be whiner.
- Naturally our Mass attendance on this blizzard weekend was down. When we have such terrible weather, under no circumstance should anyone risk driving in dangerous conditions. Likewise, we have many elderly parishioners who we would not want falling and hurting themselves in snowy, icy conditions. I also realize that many parishioners have their cars plowed in by the snowplows and it is very difficult to dig out. Shoveling our driveways and paths is very hard labor and people must be careful not to overexert themselves. So if you were not able to get to mass this past Sunday, please know you did not do anything wrong. We are not under obligation to go the Mass if it might prove hazardous to our health and well-being.
- We did not cancel Masses here at St. Martin's. The reason we did not is because it is relatively easy for the priests to get to the Church even if there is heavy snow. I will admit to hiring a St. Bernard for the weekend to help me if I got stuck in the snow. There are some people with four wheel drives and others who walk so we usually have a few people in difficult weather. Another reason for our celebrating the Masses is that the Masses have intentions and we try our very best to say the Masses on the day they were requested.

- Something that I need to do better within our parish is to work on better communications through the social media and text messages. Several people did sign up in our ministry sheets and this issue needs to be addressed so we can contact you more quickly about any changes in parish scheduling due to unforeseen events.
- The parish counts on the weekly collection to operate and maintain our budget. Some of you may live paycheck to paycheck. We operate pretty much collection to collection so missing the vast majority of a Sunday collection has a serious impact on our parish budget. Many people do bring in or mail any missed mass collection envelopes due to the bad weather and this is most appreciated. I dread snow on weekends for many reasons!
- I heard some great stories of neighbors and even strangers helping one another cope with snow difficulties. I also know that many of you watch out for your homebound neighbors and family members. Challenges often bring out the best in people and that is certainly true of our parishioners.

I have to go now and bring Jamison, my rented St. Bernard, to his owner. God is good... all the time.

Pope Francis gives encouragement to the young around the world!

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — Don't fall for hate and fearmongering from others; make new friends instead and always help and show concern for others, Pope Francis told the world's teens. "Be brave and go against the tide, be friends of Jesus, who is the prince of peace," he said in a written message for the Jubilee of Mercy for Young People, scheduled to be celebrated in Rome and dioceses around the world April 23-25.

In his written message, released by the Vatican January 14, the pope said the Year of Mercy is open

to everyone so they may experience "a time of grace, peace, conversion and joy."



"God invites everyone, he said, because "there are no walls or distances which can prevent the father's mercy from reaching and embracing us." While three days in April have been set aside for those between 13 and 16 years of age, every day of the jubilee year marks "a chance for us to grow in holiness." It is also a time to realize "that life together as brothers and sisters is like a great

party, perhaps the most beautiful party we can imagine, the endless party that Jesus has taught us to celebrate by his Spirit."

However, the pope said, "I cannot forget those of you who are living in situations of war, extreme poverty, daily troubles and loneliness. Don't ever lose hope! The Lord has a great dream which, with your help, he wants to come true." Other young people around the world have not forgotten about those who are less fortunate and they "are working for peace and justice for everyone everywhere," he said. "Don't be taken in by the messages of hatred or terror all around us. Instead, make new friends. Give of your time and always show concern for those who ask your help," he said.

Pope Francis reminded young people that preparing for a pilgrimage or jubilee celebration didn't just mean getting backpacks and banners ready, "but your hearts and minds as well." He urged them to grow closer to Jesus and draw nourishment from the sacraments. Becoming more merciful during the Year of Mercy means not only growing "in a love which is courageous, generous and real," it is means greater spiritual growth, too.

"You are preparing to be Christians capable of making courageous decisions in order to build daily, even through little things, a world of peace," he said.



Blessing of Throats




February 3rd marks the Catholic celebration known as the Feast of St. Blaise, the patron saint of those with ailments of the throat. According to tradition, a woman threw herself at the feet of St. Blaise as he was being led into custody, which would eventually lead to his beheading, and begged him to help her only child who was choking on a fishbone. He offered up his prayers, and the child was

cured. Now St. Blaise is invoked for protection against injuries and illnesses of the throat. Following a traditional mass, the blessing is offered by a priest or deacon who places two candles on the throat while reciting a brief prayer.

At the conclusion of all weekend Masses this weekend, January 30th & 31st a general blessing of throats will be offered. If you have a serious health issue of your throat, you can ask the priest or deacon for an individual blessing.

The Book of Forgiving: The Fourfold Path for Healing Ourselves and Our World by Desmond Tutu



Forgiveness is an issue that challenges all of us in our daily lives. In this Year of Mercy, I thought this would be a good book for our spiritual book club. The discussion will take place on **Saturday, March 12th at 10:00 a.m. in St. Alphonsus Hall**. All are welcome

Each of us has a deep need to forgive and to be forgiven. After much reflection on the process of forgiveness, Tutu has seen that there are four important steps to healing: admitting the wrong and acknowledging the harm; telling one's story and witnessing

the anguish; asking for forgiveness and granting forgiveness; and renewing or releasing the relationship. Forgiveness is hard work. Sometimes it even feels like an impossible task. But it is only through walking this fourfold path that Tutu says we can free ourselves of the endless and unyielding cycle of pain and retribution. *The Book of Forgiving* is both a touchstone and a tool, offering Tutu's wise advice and showing the way to experience forgiveness. Ultimately, forgiving is the only means we have to heal ourselves and our aching world.

Make a pilgrimage. Make a journey to one of the four Holy Doors in the diocese or one of the four Holy Doors in the four papal basilicas in Rome. Crossing through

the Holy Door is a spiritual journey that signals, as the Holy Father said, "the deep desire for true confession."

Go to Confession.

Receive the Holy Eucharist "with a reflection of mercy."

Make a profession of faith.

Pray for the pope and for his intentions.

For the elderly, confined and the ill:

Pope Francis said they may obtain the indulgence by "living with faith and joyful hope during this moment of trial."

Receiving the Eucharist, or by attending Mass and community prayer, "even through the various means of communication."

What is an Indulgence?

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (No. 1471): "An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minster of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints. An indulgence is partial or plenary accordingly as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin>' Indulgences may be applied to the living or the dead.

How Long Is This Mass Going to Be?

Our first reading today from the Old Testament of Nehemiah brought to my mind an experience I had several years ago when I was in Ireland. I was with some of my family and a family friend named Mary. Mary has now gone home to God. May she rest in peace. She was a very good hearted woman but she was quick to speak her mind. We might say she did not have too much of a filter. We were in a pub and Mary ran into a man she knew. She proudly introduced the priest from America to the man. Quite honestly, he was not too impressed with me and was far more attentive to his pint of Guinness. Mary told him that Father Pat, yours truly, had said Mass that Sunday morning at the village church. This fact was accompanied by another swallow of Guinness from our man at the bar. Mary went on to quiz him if he had been at Mass that morning. He finally said that he was a very busy man and he did not have time for Church. She quickly told him if he was able to spend four hours on a certain part of his anatomy in the pub, then he could find an hour to go to Mass. At that point, I headed out of the pub lest this theological conversation grew more tense.



I was thinking - what was the longest Church service that I ever attended? I remember being at a Mass where the celebrant decided to speak about each of the 14 stations. After going on for 20 minutes on the first station, I knew the congregation was in trouble. I recall someone saying to me about a homily she heard that reminded her of Kennedy Airport. I was surprised by that and asked her what she meant. She said that sermon had many take off and landings. I love the Easter Vigil and I suppose the longest one I ever went to was almost three hours. I went to a ceremony at the

Vatican where five men and women were being declared beatified by Pope John Paul II, not a saint. I would say that ceremony was about three and half hours. Some folks love to go *The Seven Last Words* services that some churches have on Good Friday. They are traditionally from twelve to three. So, I guess I would say that longest stretch I ever spent in church was about three and half hours. I have noticed here at St Martin's that as the length of Mass nears the hour mark, many people seem to develop emergencies that force them to leave church. I am always surprised by how many of these emergencies develop as Mass is moving towards its conclusion.

I remember watching on television a famous baseball game between the Mets and the Braves. It was a playoff game on October 17, 1999. The game lasted five hours and forty six minutes and I saw every second of this exciting game that the Mets won. I also recall once going to a movie marathon that showed Godfather I and II back-to-back. I think that was almost six hours. I suppose it is not fair to compare time at baseball game or a movie to that of being at Mass or a prayer service. Unless you are a saint or preparing to be monk, many of us find the thought of several hours at a religious service not something we want to do. However, I am sure there have been times when we have had a particular Mass or prayer experience very powerful, and we never noticed the time.

Today, in our first reading, we heard: Ezra the priest brought the law before the assembly, which consisted of men, women, and those children old enough to understand. Standing at one end of the open place that was before the Water Gate, he read out of the book from daybreak till midday, in the presence of the men, the women, and those children old enough to understand.


Did you read that? - from daybreak until midday! That is at least six hours. I wonder if someone was selling beer and soda during the readings. Even more amazing is the verse that says the people listened attentively. They were weeping and crying and prostrating themselves in prayer. What was going on to make this such a powerful experience for our ancestors in faith. This Jewish community had just gone through a terrible period of exile called the Babylonian exile. The Jewish holy city of Jerusalem has been destroyed and the people are held in captivity in a strange land and they are losing the practice of their faith. Finally, King Cyrus of Persia overthrows the Babylonians and allows the Jews to return to Jerusalem and to rebuild the Temple. They are home and can once again be Jews and live their faith. At the end of the reading of the Word of God which they had not heard for years, they celebrated with choice wine and the best of food.

Thank God most of us, unless we come from a land of religious persecution, have never had such an experience. We can go to Mass freely and receive Holy Communion. We can read the Word of God anytime we wish. For a moment, just imagine seeing all our churches shattered and destroyed, the Eucharist desecrated, the Scriptures burned, and all of us moved to a strange land where we could not live in freedom or faith. If we can imagine that, we can certainly imagine the joy we would have if we could return home to our native land and to the practice of our faith.

As I was writing this imaginary scene for our meditation, I was conscious that many Catholics and Christians are experiencing such horror right now in the countries in the Middle East and Africa. Christians are being killed if they do not give up their faith. We pray for them and for an end to such persecution.

We are blessed not to face persecution. I believe our greatest challenge and temptation is that we begin to take the gifts that God has given us in our faith for granted because they are always there. We can easily be casual about receiving Holy Communion or attending Mass. We can grow restless if the Mass may be five or six minutes longer than we wish. Allowing faith to become routine can hap-

pen to any one of us.
