

Pastor's Letter

Sometimes, there can be so much bad news in the media that it is hard to take it all in. This recent story particularly disturbed me. Gunmen in southern Yemen on Friday stormed a retirement home run by a charity established by Mother Teresa, killing 16 people, including four Catholic nuns, officials and witnesses said. The killing spree began with two gunmen who first surrounded the home for the elderly in Aden. Meanwhile, four others entered the building on the pretext they wanted to visit their mothers at the facility, according to the charity, Yemeni security officials and witnesses. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to the media. We pray for all those slaughtered on that day in a nursing home where the Mother Teresa nuns took care of people of every nationality, religion and faith. It is easy to call the killers monsters but I have to wonder what brought these young men to have such hatred in their hearts that they could kill the elderly and women religious. This type of evil is as ancient as the Bible itself, and we know our own nation at times faces such horror.

The other night I saw a special on television about the recent death of Harper Lee, the great American writer who gave us the great classic novel, *To Kill a Mockingbird* which gave rise the academy award winning movie of the same title starring Gregory Peck. The special showed one of my favorite scenes from the movie. The novel is set in the 1930's and Tom Robinson, an innocent African-American man, is being held for a crime he did not commit. A group of men from the town go the jail and are planning on lynching Tom before his trail. Atticus Finch his lawyer, rushes to the jail but he is outnumbered by about 30 men. Atticus' daughter Scout has also come to the jail on her own in spite of her father telling her to stay home. She notices one of the men in the angry gang and in her childhood innocence says to him, *Hi Mr. Cunningham. How is your son Walter? We go to school together.* Into this volcano of racial hatred comes the voice of a six year old girl. Mr. Cunningham, the leader of the group, looks down at his shoes and one can see he is clearly, at least for a moment, ashamed of what he is doing. He lowers his gun and tells the men to leave and go home. Shame met hatred and shame won out.

There is a famous scene that I read about in American history. In the 1950's, our nation was naturally deeply concerned about the Soviet Union, especially after they developed the atom bomb with the help of a few American traitors. Senator Joseph McCarthy formed a Senate committee to investigate Communist infiltration into America. No doubt there was reason for concerns but the Senator went overboard in his tactics and started accusing all sorts of innocent people of being members of the Communist Party. Reputations and lives were ruined, and people were afraid of McCarthy, frightened that he might accuse them. A lawyer named Joseph Welch was brought before the committee to defend some men in the United States Army. Senator McCarthy started to accuse a young lawyer who worked for Joseph Welch of being a communist. Welch had had his fill of the bully and gives what is one of the classic statements in American history that some say really ended the power of Joseph McCarty. Welch says to the Senator: *Let us not assassinate this lad further, Senator. You have done enough. Have you no sense of decency sir, at long last? Have you left no sense of decency?* Shame meets verbal violence and shame wins the day. From this point on, McCarthy began to lose his powerful influence.



Jesus said, "Woman, has anyone condemned you?" "No Sir!" "Nor do I; go and sin no more."

I thought of the scene from the movie and the Senate hearing, as well as the violent attack on the nursing home in Yemen as I was praying and preparing my thoughts on today's Gospel. We have a woman about to suffer the horrific death by stoning for committing adultery. Notice we hear of no man being accused. This women means nothing to those who have brought her before Jesus. She is simply an object, a tool, as many women have been through history, to trap Jesus. Her life and salvation mean nothing to those scribes and Pharisees who have brought her forth in humiliation. They have set the trap: the Old Testament calls for death for such an action as adultery. Tragically, this is still a practice of some nations in the Middle East.


If Jesus approves the law, the man of mercy will lose favor with the sinners and ordinary people who see him as the man of mercy and compassion. If he calls for her to be forgiven, he will be condemned by the religious authorities for not following the Jewish law. They believe they finally have him trapped! Jesus starts to write on the ground. Some scholars suggest that he is writing the sins of the accusers. Another interpretation I like is that God only writes twice in the whole Bible. The first time is when God writes the law on the stone tablets. Now he is writing a second time. Perhaps, the new writing is that the law of mercy has replaced the law of harsh judgment. He responds: *Let the one who has no sin be the one to throw the first stone.* The older men who have been around the longest, slowly put their stones down and walk away. The younger men also do the same. At least they have enough shame to know they too are sinners who have broken the law. The woman is alone with Jesus, surely shivering in fear as she has just stood on the brink of death.

The two - the Redeemer and sinner - are all who remain. St. Augustine describes this moment *as Misery Meeting Mercy*. Jesus looks at her and asks, *Woman, has anyone condemned you?* She responds, *No Sir.* Jesus answers, *Go and sin no more*. Notice the word *woman*. That is the same word that Jesus uses at Cana and also from the Cross when he speaks to his mother. He addresses this woman with a title of great respect - *Woman*. Biblical scholars say this was one of the last texts to be put in the Gospels. It has been said that this story scandalized the early church because it made God too merciful. They thought it might make forgiveness look too easy, but the Holy Spirit guided the community and this text of amazing grace and mercy will be read until the end of time.

As we ponder this text, we are drawn in by the mercy of Jesus: he *is* mercy. I have tasted this divine mercy many times in my life. But, sometimes, I have been with those ready to throw stones at others for their sins and failures. Blind to my own sins, I attack others for theirs. But sinners cheer this passage, and the righteous - if they *truly hear* the Lord's words - are brought to shame and then to mercy.





Please write a letter to the pastor, Father Pat Woods, CSSR expressing your desire to become an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion for the Church and/or Hospital Homebound.

TO REGISTER FOR EXTRAORDINARY MINISTER TRAINING: the pastor of the parish must send a letter to Bishop Murphy *at least 10 days in advance* requesting the training for each person attending. <u>This letter</u> <u>must mention the date and location of the session the person will attend.</u>

TIMES AND PLACES FOR MINISTRY TRAINING:

In Nassau:
