Pastor's Letter

# What is your Favorite Prayer?

My great nephew and niece love when I tell them jokes. They ask me to say the same jokes over and over again. They are my best audience! One of their favorites goes like this: a man is out for a walk in the woods. Suddenly, he comes upon a giant Grizzly Bear who lets loose a loud roar when he spots the

man. The frightened man starts to run for his life as the large bear chases him. Eventually, the poor fellow comes to a cliff with a thousand foot drop and he is finally cornered by the great bear. The man prays to God: *O Lord, let this bear be a good Catholic animal!* To the delight of the desperate man, the bear blesses himself with the Sign of the Cross. He cries out in joy, *O Lord you have saved me!* Then he hears the bear say, *Bless us O Lord and these thy gifts which we about to receive...* 



What is *your* favorite prayer? I am sure this question would draw many responses from us. Certainly, the rosary is a beloved prayer for many for its rhythmic recitation of the Hail Marys and Our Fathers which help move us into a kind of state where we can meditate on the mysteries of the rosary. I would say that there is a growing devotion to the Divine Mercy prayer given to us by Our Lord Jesus through Sister Faustina. This beautiful prayer helps one enter into the wonder of the mercy of God. The Church has a treasure house of prayers to the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph and the saints, as well as prayers for particular situations that we face in life. I love Psalm 23 where we pray knowing that the Lord is our Shepherd guiding us through the dark valleys of life. I like the prayer of St. Patrick (naturally) which recognizes how we live and move and have our being in the presence of Jesus Christ, *Christ before me, Christ behind me...* Perhaps, the most popular prayer may be *Bless us, O Lord and these thy gifts which we are about to receive...* since we know a meal is to follow. Some like short prayers which we say in our hearts: My merciful Jesus; Jesus, I love you, and so forth. I know when I am on a plane and it hits turbulence, I quickly say the Memorare, asking the protection of the Blessed Mother. Some of us say a prayer to St. Christopher when we are traveling.

One of my favorite ways of praying is to read a section from the Bible and ponder how it applies to my daily life. I know many people, including myself, like to pray to God in our own words. An important way to pray is to be silent and to seek to listen to the voice of God that speaks to us in our minds and hearts. Each of the ways that I mentioned are all excellent ways *to lift our minds and hearts to God* which is the Baltimore Catechism's definition of what prayer is. Whatever helps us to slow down and place ourselves in the presence of God is a gift from God and is the way for you to pray.

Even though there are so many ways to pray, the greatest prayer we have as Catholics is the celebration of the Mass. On Holy Thursday, Jesus told us to *do this in memory of me*. Certainly, he was speaking of invoking God to turn the bread and wine into His body and blood. However, the essence of the Mass extends to Good Friday and Easter Sunday. To attend a Mass is to enter into the dying and rising of Our Lord Jesus. All celebrations of the Mass, be they the early morning daily Mass or the Midnight Mass at Christmas, are part of one and the same reality: entering into the dying and rising of Christ. It is as if we are sitting at the Last Supper, standing under the Cross of Calvary, and meeting the Risen Christ on Easter Sunday. The celebration of the Mass is at heart of our faith. Even if the sermon is terrible, even if the music was dreadful, even if the majority of the people were half-asleep, it is Christ the one High Priest, who through the power of the Holy Spirit, offers praise and glory of his Heavenly Father. I fully realize as I struggle with it in my own life, that our great challenge is that we get so used to the routine and rituals of the Mass, that we can easily take them for granted since we have done them so many times in our lifetime. I lived 18 years on Shore Road in Brooklyn, and I could look out my window and see the ships passing in and out of the Narrows into New York. It was a spectacular view. Sometimes when a friend or family member would visit, they would say something like, *Wow! What a view!* I would answer, *where?* I had gotten so used to the view that I barely noticed its wonder and beauty. I think a similar pattern could happen like that in terms of our attendance at Mass. We can even get used to the most Divine Mystery of God taking flesh in the ordinary bread and wine of the Mass.

The Mass is a communal act. We do not pray alone at Mass, but pray with the other congregants and with the priest. We need each other. When you pray and sing well, it is an encouragement to me. I love the story of the four men who carried their paralytic friend to Jesus and lowered him down through the roof by taking the tiles off of the building since there was such a crowd around the Lord. We are both the four friends helping one another by our presence at Mass, and we are also the paralytic in need of loving support. We call the congregation at Mass the assembly. What a diverse group we are: we are all ages and nationalities. Some of us may be very strong in faith while others of us are struggling to believe. Some of us are married, others are widowed, single or divorced. There are little children who bring their toys to Mass and some *big children* play with their phones if the Mass is too long. Some may be in grief since they recently lost a loved one, while others are dreaming of their upcoming wedding day. There are people who are sitting next to their spouse who had a fight on the way to church, some who are angry about the parking in the church, and others who are looking forward to a ham and cheese omelet or a chocolate donut. What a diverse group, but we are all brothers and sisters on the way to the Lord!

Next, I want to speak about the particular parts of the Mass that have a special way or helping us pray, but I will wait for next week lest I overwhelm you with too many words. It is like an episode of *Blue Bloods* that is to be continued...







**CNA/EWTN: LITTLE SISTERS OF THE POOR TO SUPREME COURT: "DON'T MAKE US PICK BE-TWEEN FAITH AND POOR.** Religious Sisters should not be forced to choose between caring for the poor and obeying their conscience, THE LITTLE SISTERS OF THE POOR told the Supreme Court adding that this is what the government is demanding through the HHS MANDATE. "As Little Sisters of the Poor, we offer the neediest elderly of every race and religion a home where they are welcome as Christ," said Sister Lorraine Marie Maguire, Mother Provencal of the Sisters.

UPDATE: CNS: A HOPEFUL SIGN? NEW DEVELOPMENT IN THE LITTLE SISTERS COURT CASE: Washington D.C. March 29, 2016. The Supreme Court on Tuesday asked for parties in the LITTLE SISTERS case to submit alternative means, if possible of ensuring contraceptive coverage while maintaining religious freedom. At the heart of the case Zubilk v. Burwell is the administrations mandate that employers provide cost-free coverage for contraceptives, sterilizations and drugs THAT CAN CAUSE ABORTIONS, and the so-called "accommodation" offered to objecting non-profit employers. The plaintiffs like the LITTLE SISTERS as well as many other nonprofits - argue that this still forces them, under threat of HEAVY FINES, to cooperate with practices they believe are immoral. Several other prelates have voiced their admiration and appreciation for Mother's contribution to the faith, to the Catholic Church in the U.S. and the world Catholic communications, including Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI and the Vatican's spokesman, Fr. Federico Lombardi. Although Francis has expressed his belief that Mother Angelica is already in heaven, the formal process for declaring her a saint has yet to begin. She spoke to us in humor and wit, and reached out to us in a way that, sitting there in her chair, it was like she was sitting beside us! Sleep well in our Lord's arms, dear Mother!


