Pastor's Letter

One of the best definitions I heard of how to pray at Mass was a rather surprising place. It was on the show *Everybody Loves Raymond*. Raymond is having an argument with his wife Debra about going to Mass on Sunday. He wants to stay home and relax. He asks Debra, "Why do you go to Mass?" She responds in this way, When I am at Mass, I feel like I am part of something greater than my own world. I feel connected to God and the rest of the world. I like to thank God for the week that I had with you and the children, and then I pray to God for the strength to get though the next week. I think this is a perfect answer to Ray's question.

Last week, I wrote about some ideas to help us appreciate the celebration of the Mass. This week I would like to offer some practical ideas on how to pray during the Mass. I am sure you have your own ideas, so these are simply suggestions for your consideration.

- Sunday Mass begins and ends with a procession with the servers, lector, deacon and priest entering
 and leaving the community. This simple act reminds us that we are all on journey from the God
 who created us to the God to whom we will someday return. It is reminds us of the journey of our
 lives.
- Music is important to the liturgy. St. Augustine famously said, *The one who sings, prays twice*. Usually music is part of both weddings and funerals since the music so enhances the event. A birthday is not a birthday without the song, *Happy Birthday*. Sporting events lend *themselves* to the entire stadium singing, *Sweet Caroline* or *The Piano Man*. When we choose to sing, we are truly entering into the celebration of the Eucharist.
- The first prayer said at Mass is the Sign of the Cross. The mass is an act of adoration and praise, as we go to the Father in the name of Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit. The presider then greets us with a prayer asking God to be with us, and we respond similarly to that greeting by praying for the Spirit to be with him.
- We then sing or pray for God's mercy and the forgiveness of sin. We go to God knowing that we
 are loved sinners and need his mercy. If we have no need to cry out for the mercy of God, then we
 are suggesting we do not need the grace of God to guide and help us in our daily living. We might
 at this point of the Mass think of one fault or one person we have hurt and bring it to prayer in the
 penitential rite.
- In the past, the opening prayer of the Mass was called The Collect. After the celebrant says, Let us pray, there is a pause before he says the prayer. This is a time for us to gather our thoughts. We might consider choosing a particular intention in our hearts for the Mass we are attending. I may say this Mass is for a particular person I love who has died, or who is sick, or whom I am struggling with.
- Glory to God in the Highest is the prayer of the angels at Christmas. As we say or sing the Gloria,
 we are praising God for being God and for allowing us to enter the world and to be part of his plan
 for the universe.

- Next comes the readings from the Word of God and the homily. This is a time to truly listen. There is
 a danger that we can get so focused on praying for something or somebody that we fail to *listen* to
 God. God speaks to us in many ways. Certainly the readings at Mass and the homily are key ways to
 seek to hear the voice of God speaking to me in a personal way. (If the homily is too long, then you
 can pray that it will soon end!)
- For almost 2,000 years, Catholics have been saying creeds which are prayers of what we believe. At Mass we say the Nicene Creed that goes back to the year 325 when the leaders of the Church from the then-known world, called upon the Spirit and gave us this Creed. The word *creed* comes from the words *I believe*.
- Obviously, the Prayer of the Faithful is our communal prayers spoken out loud to God. Generally, there is a kind of order to the Prayer of the Faithful, beginning with praying for the Pope, then the needs of the world, then the sick and suffering, the deceased and perhaps something affecting our nation or local community in some particular way. The power of the Prayer of the Faithful is that it is a communal prayer. We turn to God together and lift our voices in prayer for the great needs of the world around us.
- At the offertory the collection is taken, members of the community bring up the bread and wine, and the priest offers them to God in our name. The bread and wine are very ordinary. They represent us offering our lives to God. What do I want to put on the bread and wine that is being carried to the altar? The offertory is asking the Lord to transform all the ordinary moments of my life to be in union with Jesus as he is offered to his Father. The collection is also a prayerful moment. This is my gift to the parish, to the community, to the Lord that comes from my hard work, my social security check, or my retirement funds. It is my prayerful gift to God.
- Holy, Holy, Holy is an ancient Biblical prayer of praise and adoration to God. We cry out from our humanity in adoration to God. We can almost hear the crowd chanting on the first Palm Sunday as Jesus came into Jerusalem. In a few moments, in the prayers of the Church, Jesus will be coming into us in Holy Communion.
- The preface and Eucharistic prayers now bring us very intimately into the setting of the Last Supper. The Holy Spirit is invoked as the priest places his hands over the bread and wine and calls down the power of the Holy Spirit to transform this bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Jesus. The words of Jesus from the Last Supper are prayed, This is my Body, this is my blood which will be poured out upon you. The prayer is not only for the transformation of the bread and wine into Christ, but for the congregation to become the Body of Christ. We have done what Jesus has told us to do: Do this in memory of me.
- During the Eucharistic Prayer, we will pray for the Pope, for our Bishop, for us the living and for those who have died. We will remember and call upon the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph and other great saints of our Church. The Eucharistic Prayer ends with The Great Amen. The celebrant is inviting us to say all that we have done an Amen which means, *I believe*.

- The Our Father is the prayer that Jesus taught his apostles when they asked him how to pray. It is a perfect prayer to say before the Sign of Peace since we are praying to forgive one another as God has forgiven us. The Sign of Peace is far more than just a chance to wish those around us a friendly greeting. This is a powerful symbol that teaches us that I must seek to see Christ in other people just as I seek to see him in Holy Communion. We think of the words of Jesus, Before you bring your gift to the altar, be first reconciled with your brother or sister.
- Our Catholic Mass has its roots very much in the Passover Meal of our forefathers and sisters in faith the Jewish People. The unleavened bread we eat reminds us of the unleavened bread of the Passover. The blood of a lamb was sprinkled on the doorposts of the Jewish families to protect them from the Avenging Angel. We are not saved by the blood of lambs or goats, but by the Blood of Jesus Christ. So as we pray the beautiful prayer, Lamb of God you who take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us, we place up to Jesus the Lamb all our sins, our guilt, our anxieties and worries, our sorrows and struggles and ask the Lamb to set us free from these burdens.
- Another similar great Biblical prayer follows: Lord, I am not worthy that you should come under my roof, but say
 the word and my soul will be healed. These words were spoken to Jesus by a Roman centurion seeking healing
 for his servant. We come to the Eucharist for strength and healing of our wounds. We are sinners in need of
 mercy. Saint Pope Pius X said the following, Communion was a remedy for shortcomings, not a reward of perfection. We come to the table of the Lord with our failures and sins.
- Certainly the reception of the Eucharist is a moment of the deepest intimacy with God. The Body of Christ becomes part of our body and we are in union with the Body of Christ God's people throughout the world. This is a solemn moment to pray from the depth of our hearts.
- A final communal prayer is then said, followed by the blessing and the dismissal, *Go, the Mass is ended*. This is a most important prayer to hear and to put into practice. We are being challenged to now go home to our families and neighborhoods, to our jobs and our daily lives, to seek to put into practice what we have celebrated at Mass. The dismissal is a powerful prayer that the Mass continues as we leave Church.

I have often seen the following sign in sacristies where I have prepared to say Mass. I believe this quote is a meditation for all - both clergy and laity - who celebrate the Holy Mass:

Priest of God, say this Mass, As if it were your First Mass, Your Last Mass, Your Only Mass!


